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Northern Territory at a Glance





The Northern Territory comprises a land area of 1 346 200 km². It is the third largest of the states and territories after Western Australia and Queensland, yet has the smallest population. Compared to other states and territories, the Northern Territory has a relatively young population (median age of 31 compared to the national median age of 37) and the highest proportion of Indigenous people (approximately 30%). The Northern Territory has the highest ratio of males to females of the states and territories, with an estimated 108 males per 100 females.

Darwin is the capital city of the Northern Territory, and is the largest of all the Territory's towns and cities, with an estimated population of 77 290. The second largest is Palmerston, with an estimated population of 30 140, and approximately 16 kilometres south of Darwin. Alice Springs is the third largest population centre, with an estimated population of 27 987.
