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#### INTRODUCTION

The Classification and Classified List of Occupations are designed primarily for use in classifying occupation descriptions shown on Schedules obtained at the 1966 Census of the Commonwealth of Australia and should be used in conjunction with the companion volume, Index of Occupations, 1966.

The occupation descriptions appearing in the Classified List have been used on Schedules at past Censuses. The list has been expanded considerably since the 1961 Census and there is reason to believe it will be extended much further after the 1966 Census. The Classification of Occupations has been adapted from and closely adheres to the principles embodied in the International Standard Classification of Occupations issued by the International Labour Office, Geneva, 1958. The International Standard Classification of Occupations was prepared after extensive discussions and research by world experts in this field, to provide an adequate classification framework for countries interested in occupation classification, and, at the same time, provide a basis for international comparison of occupation data obtained mainly from Censuses of Population.

Statistically, the adequate classification of occupation data from Census Schedules has proved an intractable subject. In the past, most classifications have been detailed, often requiring a degree of precision in classification not attainable from the data available, nor by the methods necessarily adopted for the expeditious processing of such a large volume of data as is collected at a Census of Population.

The Australian Classification of Occupations, presented herein, contains 11 Major Groups, 72 Minor Groups and 313 Occupation Categories. It is considered that this classification will provide meaningful information by occupation groups, consistent with the precision of data obtainable at a Census of Population, without the necessity for elaborate statistical cross-classification by Industry.

In accordance with the International Standard Classification, occupations have been grouped by the general similarity of the characteristics of the work they entail. The most important feature of each minor group is that the occupations included are more closely related to each other than to occupations outside the minor group as regards the functions involved and the skills, knowledge and abilities required for satisfactory performance. Other factors taken into consideration in forming these groups have been material worked on, work place environment, use of specialized equipment, etc.

Certain occupation descriptions appearing in the Classified List are qualified as follows:-

n.e.c.—Not elsewhere classified.

- (so described).—When an entry in the index is qualified in this manner, generally only reported occupation descriptions with the same or synonymous wording may be coded to the number appearing opposite the entry.
- (Pr. & S.).—Primary and Secondary Schools.

(L.G.).—Local Government.

(P.M.G.).—Postmaster-General's Department.

In a number of other cases self-explanatory supplementary information has been added in full.
