Situated generally between 10° and 29° south latitude and between 138° and 154° east longitude, Queensland occupies the north-eastern portion of the Australian continent. Of the six States of the Commonwealth, Queensland ranks second in area and third in population.

Queensland is a constituent State of the Commonwealth of Australia, observing the Federal Constitution, and, while returning elected members to both upper and lower houses of the Federal Parliament, is governed by its own State Parliament. 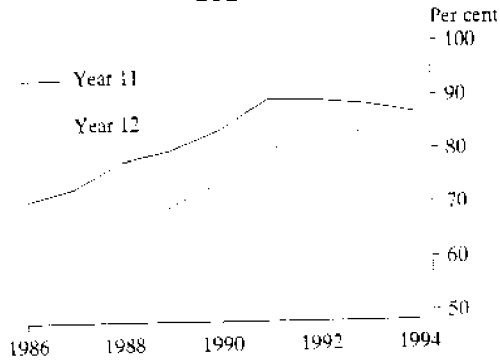

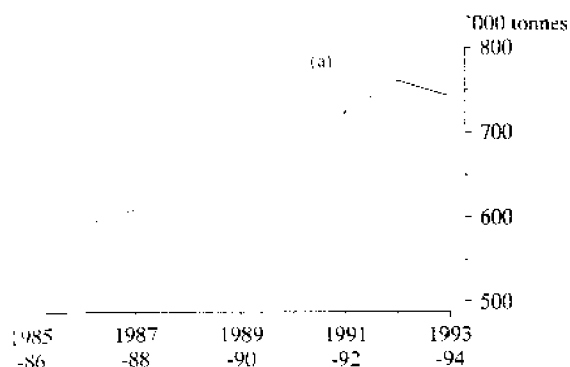

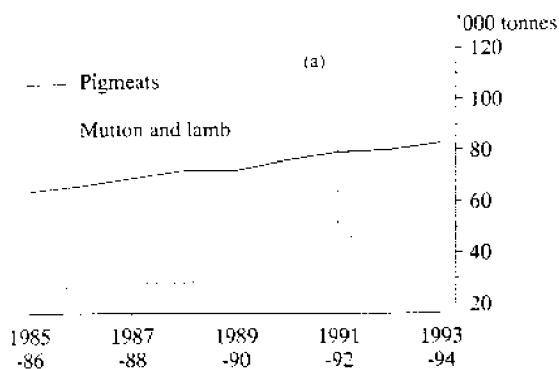

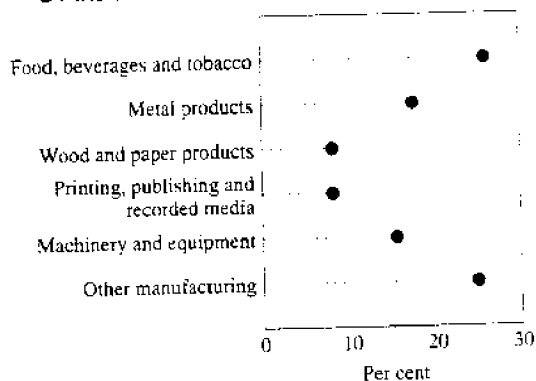

MANUFACTURING EMPLOYMENT: PROPORTION BY INDUSTRY, QUEENSLAND, 30 JUNE 1993

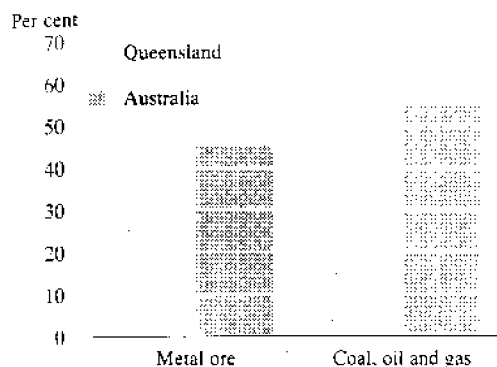

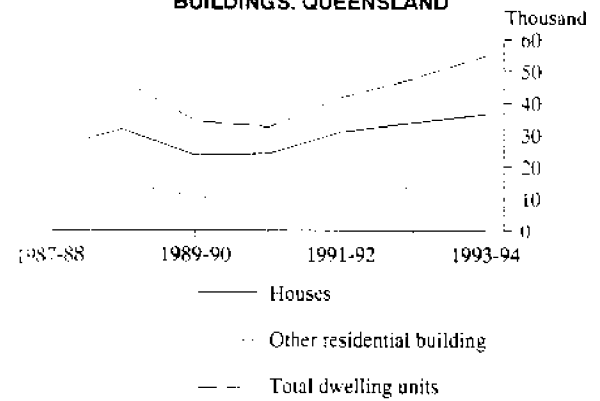

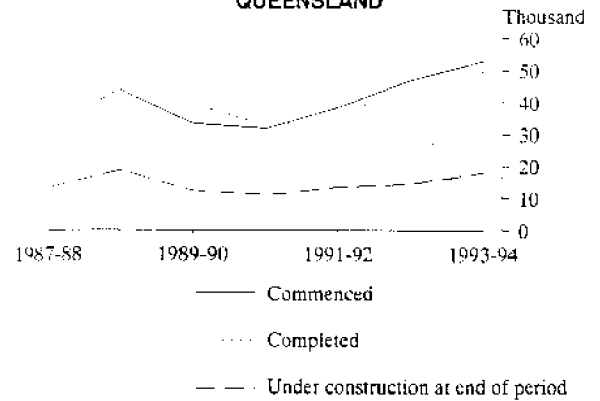

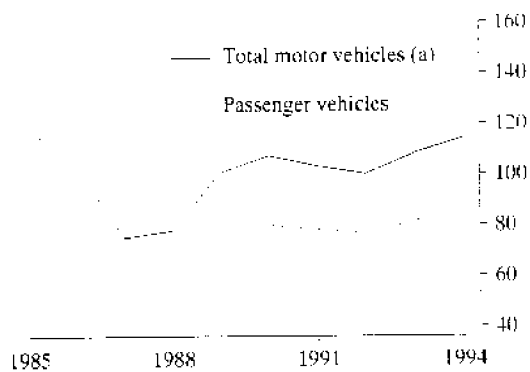

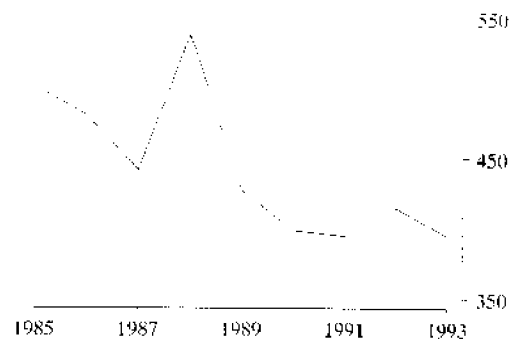

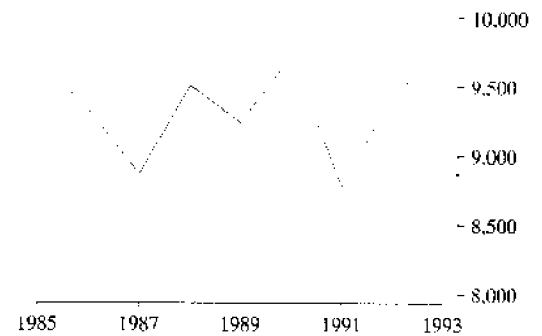

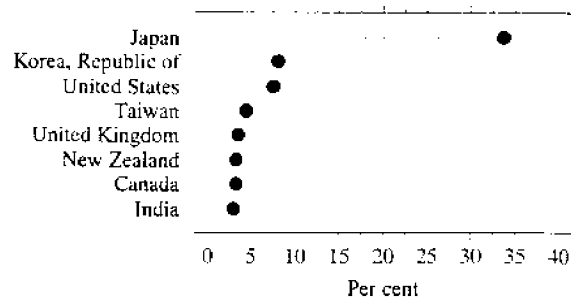

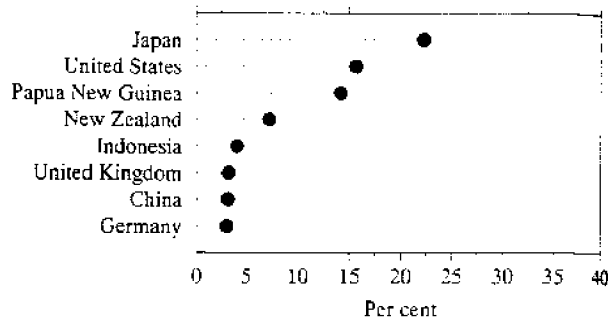

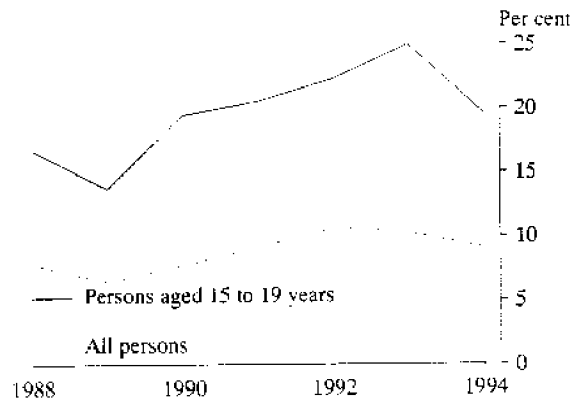
