

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UPDATED SERIES

Series updated since the January 1996 issue are: labour force, industrial disputes; housing finance, building approvals; consumer price index; retail turnover; new motor vehicle registrations; aggregate indicators; and engineering construction.

NOTABLE MOVEMENTS

Unemployment

The trend number of persons employed in the ACT decreased in January 1996 to 159,000, a fall of 0.1% (or 200 persons). The trend unemployment rate in the ACT was 7.4% in January (up from 7.3% in December) and was the lowest of all States and Territories except for Northern Territory. The participation rate in the ACT remained a high 74.2%.

Industrial disputes

In the year to October 1995 there were only 9 working days lost per 1,000 employees in the ACT compared with 91 working days lost per 1,000 employees nationally.

Housing

The trend number of dwelling units financed in the ACT during November 1995 increased by 3.6% to 873 dwellings. The trend estimate for the value of commitments in the ACT in November 1995 was \$86.7 million, an increase of 4.5% on the previous month.

December 1995 produced the fourth consecutive month of increases in the trend number of dwelling units approved in the ACT with 287 approvals, an increase of 6.7%. Nationally the total number of dwelling units approved fell by 0.6% in December 1995 to 10,198. This follows falls of 1.8 and 1.4% in October and November, respectively.

The ACT had an increase of 0.8% for the All groups CPI between September and December quarters 1995, resulting in an annual increase to December quarter 1995 of 5.4%.

Retail turnover


The trend estimate for retail turnover in the ACT for December 1995 was \$184.4 million, the same as that reported for the previous month. The largest decrease in turnover for the ACT occurred within the hospitality and services industry (-0.7%). Nationally trend retail turnover has increased by 8.0% over the last 12 months compared to 4.2% for the ACT.

New motor vehicle registrations The trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations for the ACT in December 1995 was 1,056, an increase of 2.2% from December 1995, and 5.9% higher than for December 1994. Nationally the trend for total new motor vehicle registrations for December 1995 remained at the same level as the previous month, and is 6.9% below the April 1995 peak and 4.3% lower than in December 1994.


Trend gross State product in the ACT grew by 0.5% in the September quarter, the lowest increase of the States or Territories. This follows similar low growth rates in the three previous quarters. The ACT also recorded a fall in final demand for the fourth consecutive quarter. The September quarter fall of 0.6% took it to a level 3.1% below that of September quarter 1994.


NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS




LABOUR FORCE --- TREND UNEMPLOYMENT RATE




BUILDING APPROVALS NUMBER OF DWELLING UNITS APPROVED




HOUSING FINANCE — TOTAL HOUSING COMMITMENTS

1993-94 HOUSEHOLD EXPENDITURE SURVEY — CAPITAL CITY COMPARISONS

Canberra and Darwin had the highest average weekly household incomes in 1993–94 with \$1,037.39 and \$864.44, respectively, compared to the average for all capital city households of \$783.14. They also had the greatest proportion of income in the form of employee income (79% for Canberra and 85% for Darwin), the lowest proportion in the form of government pensions and allowances (6% and 8%, respectively) and the lowest proportions of persons in the 65 and over age group.

The pattern of expenditure, as well as the total expenditure for households living in different geographic areas also varied. For example, Canberra households spent 73% more on fuel and power (for cooking and heating) than in Brisbane. There was also considerable variation in housing costs (which included rental payments, mortgage interest payments, rates, insurance and repairs). Overall average weekly household expenditure was highest in Canberra (\$749) and Darwin (\$685) followed by Sydney (\$669) and Melbourne (\$634). Hobart reported the lowest average weekly household expenditure with \$555.

Food and non-alcoholic beverages was the main expenditure group of all capital cities in 1993–94, with the exception of Canberra. Canberrans spent the greatest proportion of their income on transport (17.0%) followed by food and non-alcoholic beverages (16.9%). Overall the main areas for expenditure for all capital cities were food, transport, housing and recreation. These four expenditure groups combined to account for 62.6% and 61.7% of average expenditure in Canberra and for all capital cities, respectively.
