AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY BUSINESS INDICATORS, MARCH 1995**SUMMARY OF FINDINGS**

Series updated since the February 1995 issue are: labour force, industrial disputes; housing finance, building approvals, price index of house building materials; average weekly earnings, retail turnover; hotels, motels and guest house accommodation; and new motor vehicle registrations.

Notable movements in this issue include:

- The trend unemployment rate in the ACT rose from 6.9 per cent in May/June 1994, to a peak of 7.3 per cent over the period September to November 1994. Since then the trend has been declining and in February 1995 stood at 6.9 per cent. Similarly, the trend participation rate fell in February 1995 to 72.2 per cent from a peak of 72.9 per cent in September/October 1994. The unemployment rate for the ACT was below the national rate of 8.9 per cent, while ACT's participation rate was above the national rate of 63.4 per cent in February 1995.
- Long-term unemployment in the ACT rose from 2,456 in December 1994 to 2,636 in January 1995; representing an increase of 7.3 per cent. However, when compared to January 1994, the number of long-term unemployed in the ACT fell by 18.2 per cent. The proportion of long-term unemployed in the ACT in January 1995 was 20.5 per cent (up 0.4% from December) which compares to a national proportion of 32.6 per cent (down 1.9%).
- There were no working days lost due to industrial disputes in November 1994 for the ACT. Nationally, there were 62 disputes involving a loss of 106,400 working days in the same period, representing an increase of 117 per cent from the previous month. This was the highest number of working days lost in a month for Australia since March 1993. For the ACT, the number of days lost per thousand employees for the year ending November 1994 was 9, compared to the national figure of 81 days.
- The trend series for the value of monthly housing commitments for the ACT has continued to decline and is now 20 per cent lower than its peak of \$110.2 million in March 1994. The national trend series has also showed a consistent fall from its peak in April 1994 and is now 18 per cent lower.
- Trend average weekly earnings for the ACT decreased by 0.8 per cent in the November quarter 1994, which was mainly caused by a decrease in earnings by males of 1.0 per cent. Nationally, there was a 0.9 per cent increase in trend average weekly earnings. Trend ordinary time earnings for full-time adults saw a drop of 0.2 per cent in the ACT in the November quarter 1994, which was the highest fall recorded for all States/Territories.
- Trend estimates of retail turnover in the ACT decreased by 0.3 per cent in January 1995. The main contributor to this decrease was the hospitality and services sector which fell by 1.5 per cent. In the twelve months from January 1995, the retail turnover for the ACT showed a 0.4 per cent increase.
- The trend in room nights occupied in hotels, motels and guest houses with facilities increased marginally by 0.1 per cent in the September quarter 1994 to reach 210,200 room nights occupied for the ACT. This is an increase of 7.8 per cent from September quarter 1993. Takings from accommodation at current prices rose by 3.9 per cent in trend terms, with takings from accommodation at average 1989-90 prices rising slightly less at 1.8 per cent from the previous quarter. Corresponding national trend estimates showed a 1.4 per cent rise at current prices and 2.0 per cent rise at average 1989-90 prices for the September quarter 1994, with the number of rooms nights occupied increasing by 0.2 per cent to reach 8,610,400 nights.
- The trend estimate for the number of new motor vehicles registered in the ACT was 1,060 vehicles in January 1995; an increase of 4.8 per cent from the previous month. This was the largest increase of all States and Territories, with the overall increase being 0.9 per cent.






LABOUR FORCE Unemployment Rate




INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES Working days lost per '000 employees




AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS OF EMPLOYEES Ordinary time earnings for full-time adults




DWELLING UNITS APPROVED
