SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UPDATED SERIES

Series updated since the April 1996 issue are: State accounts; labour force, industrial disputes; housing finance, building approvals, building commencements; consumer price index, average retail prices; retail turnover; new motor vehicle registrations; and engineering construction. A feature article on the profile of small business operators in ACT is included on page 6.

NOTABLE MOVEMENTS

State accounts

Trend gross State product at average 1989-90 prices for the ACT increased by 0.4% in the December quarter 1995 to \$2,099 million an increase of 1.1% over the year. The trend gross State product at current prices increased by 0.8% in the December quarter 1995 and increased by 2.3% over the year, which was the lowest of any State or Territory.

Unemployment

The trend number of persons employed in the ACT has fallen for each of the last five months from a peak of 159,700 persons in October 1995 to 155,400 persons in April 1996 (an overall fall of 4,300 persons or -2.7%). Over the same period, the trend unemployment rate has steadily increased from 7.0% to 8.3% and the trend participation rate has decreased from 74.3% to 73.0%.

Industrial disputes

In January 1996, there were only 10 working days lost per 1,000 employees in the ACT compared with 80 working days lost per 1,000 employees nationally.

Housing

The trend number of dwelling units financed (includes refinancing) in the ACT during February 1996 decreased by 0.2% to 870 dwellings. The trend estimate for the value of commitments in the ACT in February 1996 was \$88.1 million, an increase of 1% on the previous month.

The trend number of dwelling units approved in the ACT has fallen for each of the last 4 months from a peak of 245 dwellings in November 1995 to 151 dwellings in March 1996 (an overall fall of 38.4%). Over the same period nationally, it remained at the same level.

The number of new residential housing commencements in the ACT increased by 9.8% in the December quarter 1995 to 380, compared with a fall of 6.1% nationally. The ACT also recorded an increase of 9.8% in the value of building commencements, nationally there was a fall of 7.5% for the December quarter 1995.

Prices

The ACT had an increase of 0.7% for the All groups CPI between the December and March quarters, resulting in an annual increase to March quarter 1996 of 3.9%.


Retail turnover

The trend estimate for retail turnover in the ACT for March 1996 was \$188.1 million, up slightly on the previous month's figure of \$187.2 million. Nationally trend retail turnover increased by 8.2% over the last 12 months compared to 4.3% for the ACT.


New motor vehicle registrations The trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations for the ACT in March 1996 was 1,033, a decrease of 1.5% over February, and 1.4% lower than for March 1995. Nationally, the trend for total new registrations has shown consecutive rises since October 1995, with March 1996 recording a 1% increase.


BUILDING APPROVALS — NUMBER OF DWELLING UNITS APPROVED




LABOUR FORCE — EMPLOYMENT




LABOUR FORCE — TREND UNEMPLOYMENT RATE




HOUSING FINANCE -TOTAL HOUSING COMMITMENTS

PROFILE OF SMALL BUSINESS OPERATORS IN ACT

Summarised below are results for the ACT from the Characteristics of Small Business Survey which was conducted in February 1995. The survey addressed a number of aspects of the operations of small business as well as the characteristics of small business operators.

The survey found that there were around 13,300 small businesses in the ACT operated by 19,900 people who were either sole proprietors, working directors or business partners. Most (67%) of the ACT small business operators were aged between 30 and 50 years and had gained either a degree or diploma (35%) or had secondary school qualifications (38%). Just over 70% of small business operators indicated that they worked full time in their business.

Of the 13,300 small business in the ACT, 1,800 (14%) had been operating for less than one year. Only 2,800 (21%) of all small businesses had a written business plan, but of these, 93% were currently operating from that plan. In the 12 months to February 1995, 10,600 small businesses (80%) consulted some form of advisory service, the most common being external accountants.

Nearly all (93%) of the small businesses identified in the survey were considered to be successful by their operators, with 25% rating their business as highly successful. These businesses stated that having a quality product or service was the main factor leading to this success.
