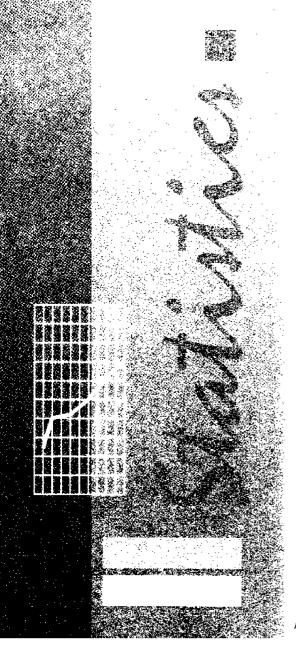

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UPDATED SERIES

Series updated since the July 1997 issue are: housing finance; labour force; industrial disputes; building approvals and commencements; retail turnover; consumer price index; engineering construction; and new motor vehicle registrations. There are two feature articles, one on income distribution in the ACT and the other on labour force experience in the ACT on pages 7–9.

NOTABLE MOVEMENTS

Labour force

Trend employment increased marginally (up 0.1% to be 159,400) in July with the ACT recording its eigth consecutive month of growth. The rate of growth in the ACT has slowed considerably for the past two months. The marginal increase in the trend unemployment rate (up 0.1 percentage points to 7.2%) was due to a small rise in the participation rate (up 0.1 percentage points to be 73.1%), the seventh consecutive month of increase. The ACT has continued to outperform the national labour market which showed decreased employment for the fifth consecutive month.

Industrial disputes

In April 1997, there were 130 working days lost per 1,000 employees in the ACT and 117 days lost per thousand in Australia. This represented a 0.8% increase for the ACT and a 4.1% decrease for Australia from the previous month's figure.

Housing finance

The trend number of dwelling units financed (includes refinancing) in the ACT during June 1997 decreased to 641 dwellings, a fall of 5.7%. The trend estimate for the value of commitments in the ACT was \$67.3 million, a decrease of 5.6% on the previous month. Refinancing of existing dwellings comprised 23.0% of the total number of new dwelling units financed in June 1997, which was up 0.9 percentage points on the previous month.

Housing and construction

The trend number of dwelling units approved in the ACT decreased by 12.8% to 109 dwelling units in June 1997. The trend number of dwelling units approved in the ACT has fallen for each of the last five months. Nationally the total number of dwelling units approved decreased by 0.3% in June 1997. Nationally, this represents the first fall in dwelling units approved after eleven consecutive months of increase.

The value of non-residential building approvals was \$13.0 million in June 1997; a decrease of \$17.1 million (or 56.9%) from the previous month and a decrease of \$46.4 million (78.1%) from June 1996.

Retail turnover

The trend estimate for retail turnover in the ACT for June 1997 was \$194.5 million, up 0.3% on the previous month's figure of \$194.0 million. This increase was the first, after six consecutive months of decline. The national trend retail turnover experienced an increase of 0.1% on the previous month.

Consumer price index

The ACT experienced a 0.8% decrease for the All Groups CPI for the June quarter 1997. This fall came after four successive quarters where the CPI remained stable. The ACT annual CPI rate to June 1997 also recorded a negative figure of 0.8%, compared to the weighted average of the eight capital cities which experienced a 0.3% increase.

Engineering construction

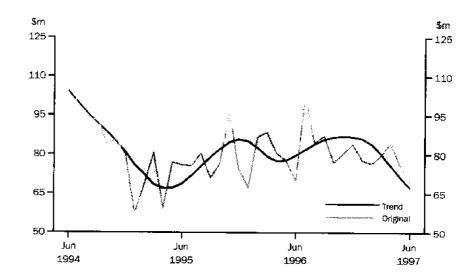
The value of engineering construction work done by the public sector in the ACT during the March quarter 1997 decreased by 21.5% to \$16.4 million from the previous quarter, yet was up 4.5% on the March quarter 1996. Nationally, the value of public sector engineering construction was down 13.1% on the previous month and down 17.1% relative to the March quarter 1996. The value of private sector work done in the ACT during the March quarter 1997 increased to \$13.3 million (up 22.0%) on the previous quarter. In contrast the value of engineering construction work done in the March quarter 1997 throughout Australia dropped to \$2,005.9 million (down 14.7%), but was up 7.7% relative to the same period last year.

Motor vehicle registrations

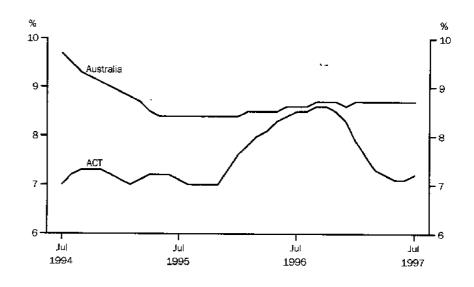
The trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations for the ACT in June 1997 was 1.169, up 4.5% on the previous month, and up 20.5% on 12 months ago. The series has now recorded eight consecutive months of increase. Nationally, the trend for total new registrations in June 1997 recorded a 1.1% increase on the previous month's figure.

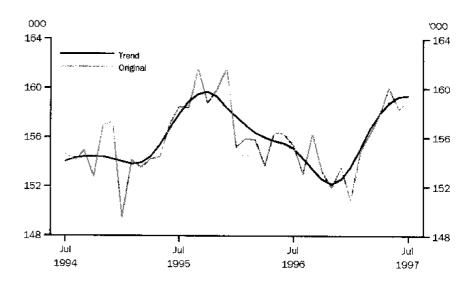
HOUSING FINANCE COMMITMENTS



LABOUR FORCE — TREND UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

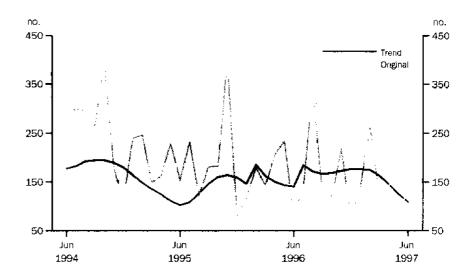


LABOUR FORCE -**EMPLOYMENT**

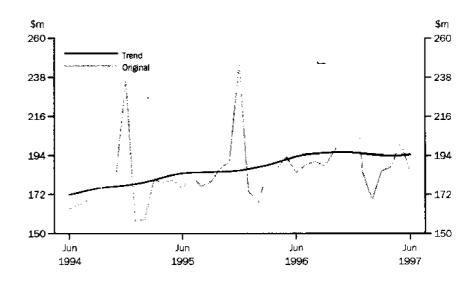

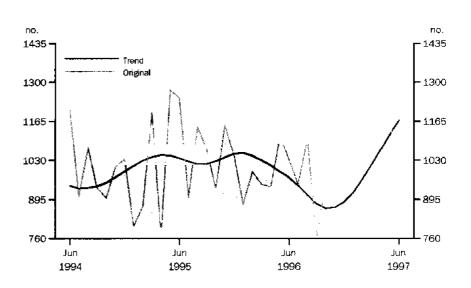
BUILDING APPROVAL — DWELLING UNITS APPROVED

INCOME DISTRIBUTION IN THE ACT

In 1995-96 the average weekly income received by couple families in the ACT was \$1,078 (\$868 for Australia), by one-parent families *\$585 (\$433 for Australia) and by single persons \$457 (\$370 for Australia).

Survey results show that levels of income are strongly related to life-cycle stages, such as early youth, and the formation, maturation and dissolution of nuclear families.

Young, independent single persons aged under 25 in the ACT had an average weekly income of \$365 (compared with the Australian average of \$313). This rose to \$555 (\$495 for Australia) for single persons aged 25-34, reflecting their higher employment rates and higher salaries.

As young people enter into relationships their income rises as they often have two income earners contributing to their family income. Young couples under 35 with no dependent children received an average of \$1,129 a week. This compares with the Australian average of \$1,092 a week.

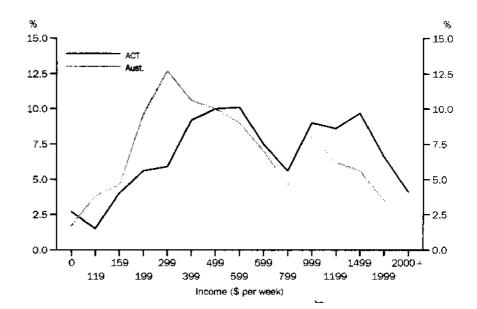
Usually the birth of children and the early years of child rearing are associated with reduced labour force participation rates of parents, and therefore reduced average weekly earnings. This was not the case, however, for ACT couples with young children (with the eldest under 5). These couples had average weekly incomes of \$1,194 (some \$65 per week higher than couples without children). Nationally such couples had average weekly incomes of \$925 per week. Income rises again as the children grow older. Couples with older children, eldest 15-24, had an average weekly income of \$1,312 (compared with the national average of \$1,080 per week).

For one-parent families the average weekly income increased with the age of the parent. Lone parents in the ACT aged between 25 and 34 received an average weekly income of *\$421 per week, which is \$27 more than the national average income of \$394. For lone parents over 45, the ACT average weekly income was **\$720 per week compared with \$524 for the national average.

The level of income received by ACT couple families was at its peak when they were between 45 and 54 years, at \$1,289 a week. This was also the case nationally, with couple families achieving their peak income level between 45 and 54, at \$1,077 a week. As parents age and children become independent, income again declines, in particular in the pre-retirement and retirement years. Couples aged 55-64 received an average income of \$1,064 and for those aged over 65 the average income fell to \$501 a week. The drop in income after 65 was not as large nationally, although for those aged 65 and over their average weekly income fell to \$429 per week after averaging \$703 a week during the 55-64 age bracket.

Single persons aged 45-54 had an average income of \$596 (\$442 nationally) per week and those aged over 65 an average of \$303 (\$226 nationally).

LABOUR FORCE EXPERIENCE IN THE ACT

In February 1997, the ACT's civilian population included 216,437 people aged 15-69 years. In the 12 months to February:

- 182,253 people (84%) were in the labour force at some time during the year with 69% (125,567 people) working or looking for work for the full 52 weeks. This compares with much lower national proportions of 77% and 56% respectively.
- 170,558 people (79%) worked at some time during the year, with 66% (112,181) working for all 52 weeks. Males were more likely to work the full 52 weeks, with 72% of males working for the whole year compared to 59% of females. Nationally the male rate was similar at 71% while the female rate was slightly higher at 61%.
- 31,454 people (15%) looked for work at some time during the year. Of these, 2,922 looked for work for 52 weeks with the largest proportion spending between 4 and 13 weeks looking for work (33% or 10,417). This was typical of the national results.
- 90,870 people (42%) were not in the labour force at some time during the year. Of these, 34,184 were not in the labour force at any time during the year.
- For males, the most commonly reported main activity while not in the labour force was 'Attended an educational institution' (34%), followed by 'Holiday or travel or leisure activities' (27%) and 'Retired or voluntarily inactive' (15%). For females, the most commonly reported main activity while not in the labour force was 'Home duties or childcare' (45%) followed by 'Attended an educational institution' (20%), 'Holiday or travel or leisure activities' (18%) and 'Retired or voluntarily inactive' (8%).
- Both nationally and in the ACT, about 96% of males with children under 15 participated in the labour force at some time during the year, compared with 86% for males without children under 15 in the ACT and 81% nationally.
- For females, the rate of participation in the labour force at some time during the year was about the same for women with or without children under 15. However, 55% of females with children under 15 participated in the labour force for the full 52 weeks, compared with 64% of females without children under 15. Nationally, 39% of females with children under 15 participated in the labour force for the full 52 weeks, compared with 48% of females without children under 15.
