AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY BUSINESS INDICATORS, OCTOBER 1995

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Series updated since the September 1995 issue are: population; labour force, job vacancies, industrial disputes; housing finance, building approvals; retail turnover; new motor vehicle registrations; State accounts; and business expectations.

Notable movements in this issue include:

- The estimated resident population of the ACT at 31 March 1995 was 303,900, an increase of 2,300 (0.8%) in the March quarter and 3,700 (1.2%) since 31 March 1994. Over the year to 31 March 1995 natural increase contributed 86 per cent of the population growth with net migration only contributing 14 per cent. In previous years, the contribution from net migration was much higher but this contribution has been declining over recent years (49% in year to June 1991; 33% in 1992; 23% in 1993). Australia's population reached 18 million in March 1995 and it took 5 years to gain the latest million people.
- Trend total employed in the ACT increased by another 1,200 persons to reach 160,400 persons in September 1995, which was 5,800 (or 3.8%) above the level recorded in September 1994. However the estimate of trend full-time employed decreased by 500 persons over the year to September 1995, with part-time employment providing all the growth in total employment. The trend unemployment series declined slightly (down 200 persons) in September 1995 to now stand at 12,000 persons, which was much the same level of a year ago. The participation rate for the ACT rose by another 0.4 percentage points in September 1995 (an additional 900 people to the labour force) to reach 74.7 per cent, the highest on record and around 9 percentage points above that for Australia. The trend unemployment rate for the ACT in September 1995 was 7.0 per cent which was the lowest of all States/Territories and below the national level of 8.3 per cent.
- The estimate of job vacancies in the ACT declined by 35 per cent in the quarter to August 1995 and

- by 66 per cent over the year to August 1995. This compares to a national increase of 15 per cent in the August 1995 quarter and a decline of 10 per cent over the year.
- There were no working days lost due to industrial disputes in June 1995 for the ACT. Over the year to June 1995, only 6 working days per 1,000 employees was lost in the ACT, which was well below the national figure of 86 days.
- The trend series for the number of dwellings financed and total value of commitments show that April 1995 was the low point following 13 consecutive monthly falls in the ACT. From April to July 1995, both series showed monthly increases with the number of dwellings financed increasing by 12 per cent and the value of housing commitments financed increasing by 8 per cent in the ACT. This turnaround is consistent with the national trend series.
- The trend for the total number of ACT dwelling units approved declined for the tenth consecutive month with 133 dwelling units being approved in August 1995, compared to the high of 285 in October 1994.
- The trend estimate for retail turnover in the ACT for August 1995 was \$185.2 million, an increase of only \$0.2 million (0.1%) over the previous month's turnover. This compares with a 0.9 per cent increase for Australia in August 1995. The national trend retail turnover has increased by 8.7 per cent over the last 12 months, compared to 6.4 per cent for the ACT.
- The trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations for the ACT in August 1995 was 1,005, a decrease of 2.1 per cent from July 1995, but 9.8 per cent higher than for August 1994. The trend series in the ACT has shown a slight decrease for each of the last four months. Nationally there was a 1.5 per cent decrease from July 1995 and an increase of 3.1 per cent over August 1994.

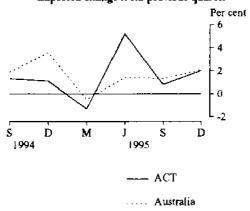

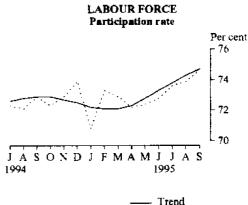
- Experimental estimates of trend constant price Gross State Product (GSP) for the ACT grew 0.4 per cent in the June quarter and 2.5 per cent through the year, showing similar rates to the national growth in GDP (I).
- The short-term outlook of businesses sales of goods and services for the December quarter 1995 compared with the September quarter 1995 indicated an increase of 2.0 per cent for the ACT, compared to 2.1 per cent for Australia.

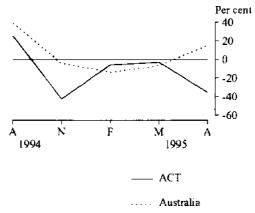
EXPECTED SALES OF GOODS AND SERVICES Expected change from previous quarter

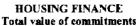


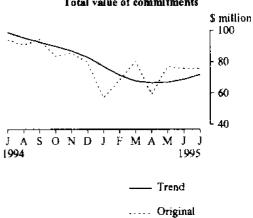

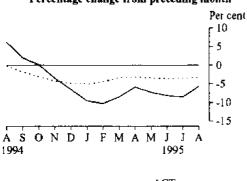
JOB VACANCIES Percentage change from previous quarter

GROSS STATE PRODUCT At average 1989-90 prices

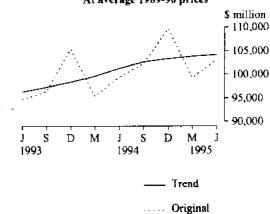
