

#### **PREFACE**

South Australian Economic Indicators is a monthly publication which contains the latest available data at the time of preparation for a range of statistical series that have been identified as indicators of economic activity in this State. In a number of cases the figures presented are preliminary and subject to revision in subsequent issues.

Written and graphic commentary have been included for many of the selected series and analysis has been augmented with the calculation of the percentage change from the previous reference period together with the presentation of comparative Australian data. Time series information has been included to provide a historical perspective on many of the selected indicators. Future issues may be expanded to include further historical data in response to expressed user needs. This product is under continuous review and any suggestions for enhancement will be welcomed.

This issue incorporates the revised format for the presentation of retail trade statistics. Following each Retail Census (last conducted for the period 1991-92), the Retail Trade survey undergoes a review. These reviews encompass statistical, technological, data collection and data release issues and take into account users' views on retail statistics. Presentation of the data now focuses on industry groups rather than individual retail industries. Further details can be obtained from the Information Paper, Introduction Of Improved Monthly Retail Trade Statistics (8511.0)




#### Overview

- Gross State Product (trend estimates in 1989-90 prices) grew by 0.9% in the September quarter 1994, compared with the national average growth rate of 1.4%.
- The value of overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months ended October 1994 were 3.0% below the level for the previous three month period.
- The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in South Australia has been increasing over the past 8 months. The November 1994 estimate was 2.1% above the level of 12 months ago, while the trend unemployment rate has remained constant for the past 2 months
- Following a short period of decline earlier this year, the South Australian trend estimates for retail sales have shown strong growth over the four months to October 1994.
- The trend estimate for dwelling units approved in South Australia in October 1994 was 1.4% lower than the September estimate and 0.9% below October 1993.
- The level of average weekly ordinary-time earnings of full-time adult employees in South Australia increased by 0.5% between May and August 1994.
- Established house prices in Adelaide increased by 4.7% between September 1993 and September 1994.
- The number of short-term visitor arrivals to South Australia in September was 25.6% higher than in August 1994, but 20.7% below the September 1993 total.

#### State Accounts

Gross State Product (GSP)

GSP (trend estimates in 1989-90 prices) grew by 0.9% in the September quarter 1994, well below the national average of 1.4%, and the third lowest of all the States. Only Tasmania (0.3%) and the ACT (-0.1%) had lower growth rates for the same period.

The rate of growth in GSP however has continued to increase progressively with rises of 0.1% (December quarter). 0.3% (March quarter) and 0.6% (June quarter).


The September 1994 quarter GSP was 2.0% higher than the September quarter 1993 but significantly below the national average growth of 5.7%.

State Final Demand

State Final Demand (trend estimates in 1989-90 prices) increased by 1.8% during the September quarter 1994, marginally higher than the national average of 1.6%. Private gross fixed capital expenditure rose strongly for the second consecutive quarter with an increase of 7.0% (5.4% in the June quarter). Private gross fixed capital expenditure was 14.3% higher than in September 1993.

Private final consumption expenditure increased by 0.9% in the September quarter and has grown by between 0.9% and 1.1% in each quarter since September 1993 and was 3.8% higher than in that quarter.

#### International Accounts

Exports


Overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months ended October were valued at \$993.4 million, 3.0% below the level for May to July. Metals and metal manufactures constituted 12.2%, while petroleum and petroleum products and cereals and cereal preparations each accounted for 8.5% of the total value during the three months to October.

Exports to Japan accounted for 17.2% of the total during August to October, followed by ASEAN countries (13.1%) and the United kingdom (9.7%).

**Imports** 

Overseas imports into South Australia during the three months ended October (compiled from import documents lodged in South Australia) were valued at \$780.1 million, 10.5% above the level for the period May to July. Road vehicles, parts and accessories constituted 28.4%; machinery 21.3%; and petroleum and petroleum products, 10.7% of total imports during the three months to October.

#### TOTAL MERCHANDISE IMPORTS AND EXPORTS




#### Consumption and Investment

#### Retail Turnover

The retail trade trend estimate indicates that retail sales increased by 1.2% in October 1994 compared with an Australian rise of 0.9%. Following a short period of decline earlier this year, the South Australian trend estimates have accelerated to show strong growth over the last four months. The retail turnover estimate in original terms for October 1994 was \$700.4 million, an increase of 4.5% from September 1994. Nearly all retail industry groups showed growth during this period.

## RETAIL TURNOVER PERCENTAGE CHANGE FROM PREVIOUS MONTH TREND ESTIMATES




New Motor Vehicle Registrations

The provisional trend estimate for new motor vehicle registrations in October 1994 fell 0.6% from September, after falls of 0.3% and 0.5% respectively in the previous two periods. This followed a upward movement which had been evident for 9 months. The seasonally adjusted estimate for October 1994 fell by 1.8% from September 1994 but was 9.8% higher than in October 1993. In original terms there were 3.371 new motor vehicles registered in October 1994, 6.9% less than September 1994 but 9.9% more than October 1993. For new passenger vehicles only, the leading makes registered in October 1994 were Holden (670 vehicles), Ford (602). Mitsubishi (539), Toyota (418) and Mazda (136).

Tourist Accommodation

When the September quarter 1994 is compared with the September quarter 1993, rooms available in hotels, motels and guesthouses in South Australia decreased slightly by 0.4% whereas bed spaces increased from 29,697 to 29,746. Overall the room occupancy rate rose from 46.8% to 48.7%, ranging from 26.0% for one star rated establishments to 64.0% for four star rated establishments. Regional room occupancy rates ranged from 55.6% for the Adelaide Statistical Division to 36.9% for the South East Statistical Division. Takings from accommodation increased by 4.8% to \$34.7m with average takings per room night occupied rising from \$73 to \$74.

Private New Capital Expenditure


Private new capital expenditure in South Australia for the June quarter 1994 was \$349 million, an increase of 2.0% over the previous quarter. New buildings and structures accounted for \$43 million while equipment, plant and machinery was \$306 million. Private new capital expenditure during 1993-94 was 10.1% below the 1992-93 level.

#### **Production**

**Dwelling Approvals** 

The trend estimate for dwelling units approved in South Australia in October 1994 was 959 which represented 1.4% decrease from the September estimate and 0.9% below October 1993. Nationally the trend has remained at historically high levels, falling by 0.6% in October 1994 to 16,255. The South Australian proportion of trend dwelling unit approvals was 5.9% in October 1994.

**Dwelling Commencements** 

The estimate of 3,065 derived from the Building Activity Survey for the number of dwelling units commenced during the September quarter 1994 was 6.7% higher than that derived for the previous quarter.

Value of Non-residential Building Approvals The October 1994 value of non-residential building approved was \$26.7 million. 19.3% below the September figure of \$32.6 million. Australia-wide the value of non-residential building approvals was 886 million which was 57.2% higher than in September and 38.3% above the October 1993 total. The South Australian proportion of non residential building approvals was 3.0% in October 1994.

Value of Total Building Activity

The total value of building work commenced during the June quarter 1994 was \$329.3 million which was 4.4% higher than for the previous quarter and resulted from a 13.2% increase in the value of new residential commencements. This more than counteracted the 10.9% fall in non-residential commencements.

At \$328.8 million the value of building work yet to be done at the end of the June quarter 1994 was 2.6% below the March quarter figure and 20.3% below that for the previous June quarter. By contrast the value of work yet to be done for Australia was 7.0% higher than for the March quarter 1994 and 10.6% higher than for the June quarter 1993.

At \$352,2 million the value of *building work done* during the June quarter 1994 was 6.2% above the March quarter figure although still 9.4% below that for the previous June quarter. By contrast the value of work done for Australia was 16.4% higher than for the March quarter 1994 and 12.8% higher than for the June quarter 1993.

Value of Engineering Construction

The June quarter 1994 estimate of engineering construction work done in South Australia was \$197.3 million, an increase of 8.4% from the (revised) March quarter estimate of \$182.0 million. Most categories contributed toward increasing the total in June but in absolute terms roads, highways and subdivisions, and pipelines recorded the largest movements. Increased activity was widespread throughout Australia during this period as the national value of work done improved by 15.8%. All States and Territories recorded increases over the March quarter estimates.

#### **Prices**


Consumer Price Index

In the September quarter 1994 the all groups Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Adelaide rose 0.4% resulting in an annual increase of 2.0%. Nationally prices rose 0.6% for the quarter and 1.9% on an annual basis.

House Building Materials

Prices of house building materials have risen just 1.3% in Adelaide over the past twelve months - the lowest nationally. The highest was recorded by Hobart (4.0%), followed by Sydney (3.6%), with the Six Capitals Weighted Average being 2.9%. This movement is reflected also in monthly rises of 0.7% for Hobart, 0.6% for Sydney and only 0.1% for Adelaide and Perth. For the Six Capitals Weighted Average, there was a monthly rise of 0.3%.


#### MATERIALS USED IN HOUSE BUILDING Change from Previous Month



#### Non-house Building Materials

The change in the prices of non-house building materials is in contrast to that of house building materials for the past twelve months - Adelaide shows the greatest rise (2.7%), Hobart the lowest (1.0%), Sydney comparable to Adelaide (2.6%) with the Six Capitals Weighted Average recording a 2.1% increase. Materials that rose during the month of October were: pre-cast concrete products (1.9%); aluminium windows (2.0%); plumbing (1.5%); while the price of ready-mixed concrete fell 0.5%.


#### MATERIALS USED IN BUILDING OTHER THAN HOUSE BUILDING Change from Previous Mouth



House Prices

Nationally, established house prices increased by 1.5% between the June and September quarters in 1994. At the same time prices in Adelaide increased by 2.4%. On an annual basis to the September quarter 1994, prices rose 4.8% nationally and 4.7% in Adelaide.

Darwin, with an annual increase of 17.8%, was again the pacesetter in prices of established houses, while Canberra was the only city to show a negative (-0.8%) annual movement.


#### Labour Force and Demography

#### Population

The estimated resident population of South Australia increased by 2,040 persons during the March quarter 1994 to 1,468,563. The largest component was natural increase which accounted for 2,286 persons, while the net interstate migration outflow of 1,290 persons was partially offset by a net gain from overseas migration of 1,044 persons.

Interstate departures from South Australia amounted to 8.590 persons, 2,566 (29.9%) of whom moved to Queensland. Interstate arrivals were 7,300 in the March quarter, with 1,982 persons (27.2%) coming from Victoria.


### ESTIMATED RESIDENT POPULATION COMPONENTS OF CHANGE



Employment

The underlying trend estimate of employed persons in South Australia has been increasing over the past 8 months. The November 1994 estimate of 648,700 was 13,200 above the level of 12 months ago (an increase of 2.1%).

The underlying trend estimate of employed persons in Australia has been increasing since February 1993, reaching 8.025,600 in November 1994. Over the past 12 months, full-time and part-time employment have increased by 2.9% and 4.9% respectively.



Unemployment

The trend unemployment rate for South Australia has remained at 10.4% for the past 2 months, following a general downward movement evident in 1994. Over the month from October to November 1994, the trend unemployment rate for males remained at 10.8% while the rate for females fell by 0.1 percentage points to 9.8%.

The trend unemployment rate for Australia has been decreasing since October 1993 and had fallen to 9.2% by November 1994 which was slightly below the October level of 9.3%.


Overtime

Industrial Disputes

The proportion of employees who worked overtime in South Australia in August 1994 was 18.5% compared with 17.3% in August 1993.

There were no working days lost through industrial disputes in South Australia from July 1994 to August 1994. Compared to the other States, South Australia recorded the lowest level of disputation. For Australia. 37,200 working days were lost between July 1994 and August 1994.

In the twelve months to August 1994, 15,000 working days were lost through industrial disputation in South Australia.



Short-term Overseas Visitors Arrivals Short-term visitor arrivals to South Australia rose to 4,707 in September 1994, 25,6% up from August 1994 and were 20,7% lower than in September 1993.

Although the Australian figures for September 1994 also showed a decrease (down 4.6% to 252,800) this was still 12.9% higher than September 1993. The trend estimate for arrivals of overseas visitors increased 1.3% compared with September 1994. The total number of visitors for the nine months from January 1994 (2.36 million) represents a 13% increase over the corresponding period in 1993.

The State or Territory of stay of overseas visitors is determined from the intended address reported on arrival in Australian ports and airports. A short-term visit is any intended length of stay of less than 12 months.

#### Short-term Resident Departures

There were 10,217 short-term departures of South Australian residents in September 1994 which was 2.3% higher than August 1994 but 17.8% lower than September 1993.

There were 34.2% more short-term departures of Australian residents in September than August 1994. This figure was 5.6% greater than in September 1993. The trend estimate increased 0.4% compared with August 1994. The total number of short term departures by Australian residents for the nine months from January 1994 (1.73 million) represents a 4.0% increase over the corresponding period in 1993. The main destinations were New Zealand (15%), the United States of America and the United Kingdom (both 12%) and Indonesia (9%).

#### Incomes

#### Average Weekly Earnings

Average weekly ordinary-time carnings of full-time adult employees in South Australia increased (from \$599.80 in May 1994) to \$602.60 in August 1994. Male full-time ordinary-time carnings increased from \$622.90 in May 1994 to \$628.20 in August 1994. For the same period, the comparable level for females rose from \$551.40 to \$553.70.

Average weekly total earnings of all employees in South Australia were \$507.40 in August 1994, up from \$504.80 for the previous quarter.

Since it is an average of earnings across all employees, changes in average weekly earnings may occur through changes in employment as well as changes in pay levels.

#### Award Rates of Pay

Over the 12 months to September 1994, the weekly award rates of pay index for full-time adult employees in South Australia increased by 1.3%.

The largest annual movement of the index for full-time adult male employees occurred in the construction industry, with a 3.5% increase from September 1993.

The largest annual movement of the index for full-time adult female employees occurred in the manufacturing industry, with a 2.7% increase from September 1993.


#### **Financial Markets**

#### Housing Finance

Total housing finance commitments for owner occupied dwellings decreased during the month of September by \$35.2 million (11.7%) to \$265.9 million.

The main component, financing commitments for the purchase of established dwellings was down by \$15.0 million (8.1%) to \$170.5 million. Financing commitments for construction of dwellings was down by \$9.5 million (18.3%) to \$42.3 million and purchase of newly erected dwellings fell by \$3.8 million (24.0%) to \$12.1 million which is the lowest figure recorded in this category since December 1991.

Personal Finance

In September 1994, total personal finance commitments totalled \$165.9 million. This represented a marginal decrease of \$3.5 million (2.1%) from August 1994.

Personal finance commitments under total fixed loan commitments decreased \$3.2 million (2.6%) to \$120.5 million in September 1994. Of the main components in this category, 'used motor cars and station wagons' decreased by \$1.7 million to \$39.2 million and 'new motor vehicles and station wagons' decreased marginally by \$0.2 million (1.2%) to \$13.7 million

Personal finance commitments under revolving credit commitments also decreased slightly by \$0.3 million (0.7%).

Commercial Finance

Total commercial finance commitments made by significant lenders decreased in September to \$361.3 million from the total for August of \$701.4 million. Large decreases were recorded for both commitments under fixed loan facilities and commitments under revolving credit facilities.

In September 1994 commercial finance commitments under fixed loan facilities were down \$178.4 million (43.8%) on the August 1994 figures. The most significant decrease was recorded for 'manufacturing' which was down by \$132.0 million. The 'finance, investment and insurance' industry decreased by \$13.9 million and 'agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting' by \$14.2 million.

Commercial finance commitments under revolving credit facilities decreased significantly to \$131.9 million in September 1994 from \$293.6 million in August. The greatest decreases were in 'manufacturing' (down \$113.6 million) and 'retail trade' (down \$35.8 million).

Lease Finance

The value of goods under new finance lease commitments totalled \$24.5 million in September 1994. This was a decrease of \$1.1 million (4.3%) on the August 1994 figure of \$25.6 million.

The main fall was for 'new heavy trucks,' down \$4.4 million from a very high August figure. Total motor vehicles decreased by \$4.8 million (26.1%) to \$13.5 million in September 1994. Finance lease commitments for 'electronic data processing equipment' rose by \$3.3 million to \$5.6 million and the other main increase was for 'construction and earthmoving equipment' up \$0.9 million.

### Grape Growing and Wine Production 1993-94

#### **Grape Growing**

Preliminary information from the 1993-94 Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Viticulture collection indicates that Australia's grapegrowers had 68.000 hectares cultivated to vines, 6,000 hectares of which were not yet bearing grapes.

At 29,480 hectares South Australia had the largest total area of vines of all the States and Territories. Three-quarters of Australia's grape vines are planted in South Australia and Victoria. The total area of vines in Australia is still lower than in the 1970s following the vine grubbings that took place during the 1980s.


#### Wine Production

Each financial year the ABS also collects statistics on wine production, grapes crushed, spirit production and usage from winemaking enterprises who crush more than 400 tonnes of grapes. The data are collected on a location basis and where possible are published for the major wine producing regions.

#### Beverage Wine

A record volume of 530.5 million litres of beverage wine was produced in Australia in 1993-94, an increase of 28 per cent over 1992-93. The increased production was greatly influenced by a favourable grape harvest and also reflected a planned upward shift in production by wineries.

#### BEVERAGE WINE PRODUCTION, STATES



The 1993-94 production of beverage wine in South Australia was also a record at 259.7 million litres, an increase of 86.4 million litres (50%) from 1992-93. Fortified wine production increased by 11.3 million litres (127%) to 20.1 million litres, while production of

unfortified wine rose 75.1 million litres (46%) to a record 239.5 million litres.

South Australia remained the major beverage wine producer of the States and Territories with almost 50% of the Australian total. All South Australian wine producing regions reported an increase in the production of beverage wine in 1993-94. The table below shows the regional production for 1993-94 and the percentage change from 1992-93.


#### Distillation Wine and Spirits

The production of distillation wine in 1993-94 for South Australia was 41.4 million litres, an increase of 22%, or 7.5 million litres from the previous year. This compared with an increase of 21% for the total Australian distillation wine production, from 47.0 million litres in 1992-93 to 56.8 million litres in 1993-94.

Brandy production for Australia in 1993-94 was 1.5 million litres of alcohol, an increase of 20% over 1992-93. Grape spirit production also increased in 1993-94 by 34% to 6.2 million litres of alcohol. This followed four years of declining production from 1988-89. South Australia was the main producer of these products with 94% (1.4 m litres of alcohol) of brandy and over two-thirds of grape spirit made.

#### Grapes Crushed

The South Australian crush increased by 36%, from 282.185 tonnes in 1992-93 to 384,666 tonnes in 1993-94. South Australian wincress crushing between 50 and 400 tonnes crushed an additional 5,358 tonnes.

#### Wine Stocks

Data relating to the level of stocks of wine and brandy are collected from winemaking enterprises who have had domestic sales of wine greater than 250,000 litres in the past financial year. Data are at the Australian level only.

Total beverage wine stocks held by winemakers in Australia at 30 June 1994 were a record 669.2 million litres, a 12% or 70.6 million litres increase from stocks at 30 June 1993. The significant increase in wine stocks followed a slight decline between June 1992 and June 1993 and continued the growth in wine stocks evident since 1988,

Table wine constituted 77% of all wine held in stock, 13% was fortified wine, while most of the remainder was sparkling wine. Table wine stocks increased by 15% to 516.6 million litres in 1993-94.

#### **Domestic Sales**

Data relating to domestic sales of Australian wine are collected from winemaking enterprises who have had domestic sales greater than 250,000 litres in the past financial year. Data are at the Australian level only.

As can be seen from the following table domestic sales of Australian wine have been steady in recent years while brandy sales have declined.



Although, overall wine sales have been steady in recent years, changes in consumer preference have emerged. For table wine sales, which account for around 80% of total wine sales, white wine sales have decreased by 16.3 million litres (8%) since 1985-86 while sales of red table wine have increased by 20.2 million litres (54%).

#### **Exports**

Although domestic sales have shown little movement over the last few years, the volume and value of wine exports have increased markedly with about two-thirds of wine exports being produced in South Australia. The value of Australian wine exports totalled \$114.5 million in 1988-89 including \$71.4 million from South Australia while in 1993-94 these values had risen to \$368.4 million and \$238.4 million respectively.



South Australia continued to be the predominant source of Australian wine exports in 1993-94 supplying 87 million litres representing 65% of the Australian total. The following table shows the countries of destination of the majority of South Australian wine exports in 1993-94.




