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#### **PREFACE**

South Australian Economic Indicators is a monthly publication which contains the latest available data at the time of preparation for a range of statistical series that have been identified as indicators of economic activity in this State.

Written and graphic commentary have been included for many of the selected scries and analysis has been augmented with the calculation of the percentage change from the previous reference period together with the presentation of comparative Australian data. Time series information has been included to provide a historical perspective on many of the selected indicators. This March issue was expanded to provide more detailed commodity data on South Australian produced exports than was available in previous months. Future issues may be expanded to include further historical data in response to expressed user needs. This product is under continuous review and any suggestions for enhancement will be welcomed.

More detailed information on each series (including explanatory and technical notes) can be obtained from other Australian Bureau of Statistics publications or alternative data sources. To assist those seeking further information a source publication for each of the series has been documented in the statistical summary.

This issue includes a special article entitled South Australian Overseas Exports. Future issues will contain further articles on statistical topics which concentrate on longer term trends or other issues pertinent to the South Australian economy.

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### REVIEW

#### Overview

- The seasonally adjusted estimate for new motor vehicle registrations in South Australia for February 1994 was 15.7% higher than in January and 20.1% above February 1993.
- Trend estimates indicate that retail sales for South Australia have shown a growth of 0.4% in January compared with the Australian rate of 0.5%.
- The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in South Australia fell slightly in February 1994, continuing the downward movement evident since August 1993, while the trend unemployment rate remained flat.
- Secured housing finance commitments in South Australia for owner occupied dwellings in January 1994 fell 19.5% from the record high of December 1993.
- Takings in hotels, motels and guesthouses in South Australia for the December quarter 1993 were 5.6% above the December 1992 figure with star grade four and five establishments recording an increase of 11.9%.
- The provisional trend estimate for the total number of dwelling units approved in January 1994 continued the downward movement evident since January 1993.
- The value of overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months to January 1994 was 3.1% lower than the level for the same period twelve months previously.

#### **State Accounts**


The estimates for Gross State Product (GSP) and State Final Demand (SFD) in seasonally adjusted and trend constant prices were published for the first time for the September quarter 1993. Further information is available in Australian National Accounts: State Accounts (5242.0).

#### Gross State Product

Trend estimates show that the rate of growth in Gross State Product (0.8%) continued to slow in the September quarter 1993 after the more substantial rises recorded in the previous December and March quarters (1.6 and 1.5% respectively). However, the growth rate over the year to September quarter 1993 (5.0%) remained above that for Australia (4.7%).

Gross operating surplus fell 0.7% in the September quarter 1993 continuing the slow down from the strong growth recorded in the December and March quarters (2.9% and 2.3% respectively).

State Final Demand

The growth rate of State Final Demand (trend estimates expressed in 1989-90 prices), continued to increase in the September quarter 1993 rising by 1.0%, significantly higher than the Australian average of 0.3%.

In the private sector, strong growth was recorded in dwelling and non-dwelling construction, increasing by 5.6% and 4.2% respectively. Private final consumption expenditure increased 0.9% in the quarter, marginally higher than the Australian average of 0.6%.


In the public sector, gross fixed capital expenditure declined 8.1%, while consumption expenditure increased 2.4%.

#### International Accounts

Exports

Overseas exports of South Australian produced commodities during the three months to January 1994 were valued at \$958.2 million which was 3.1% lower than the level for the same period twelve months previously. In the latest three-month period cereals and cereal preparations constituted 12.4%; road vehicles, parts and accessories, 10.4%; wool and sheepskins, 9.6%; and meat and meat preparations, 8.9% of total exports.

**Imports** 


Overseas imports into South Australia during the three months to January 1994 (compiled from import documents lodged in South Australia) were valued at \$700.2 million, 13.4% below the level for the same period twelve months previously. In the latest three-month period road vehicles, parts and accessories constituted 21.6%; machinery, 20.7%; and petroleum and petroleum products, 8.9% of total imports.

### Consumption and Investment

Retail Turnover

Trend estimates indicate that retail sales for South Australia have shown a growth of 0.4% in January compared with the Australian rate of 0.5%. Growth in sales has been experienced in other food stores, hotels, liquor stores and licensed clubs and footwear stores while sales have been declining in butchers and furniture stores. The retail turnover estimate in original terms for South Australia was \$612.7 million for January, a decrease of 29.5% from the December level of \$868.4 million. In seasonally adjusted, constant price terms the estimate for the December quarter 1993 rose 4.2% from the corresponding quarter of the previous year.


# RETAIL TURNOVER PERCENTAGE CHANGE FROM PREVIOUS MONTH TREND ESTIMATES



New Motor Vehicle Registrations

The seasonally adjusted estimate for new motor vehicle registrations in South Australia for February 1994 was 15.7% higher than in January and 20.1% above February 1993. This increase resulted in a revision of the provisional trend series which now shows upward movement over the past four months. In original terms there were 3,186 new motor vehicles registered in February 1994, 42.3% more than in January 1994 and 19.9% more than February 1993.


#### NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS



Tourist Accommodation

When the December quarter 1993 is compared with the December quarter 1992, rooms available in hotels, motels and guesthouses in South Australia decreased by 1.0%. However, the room occupancy rate overall rose from 47.8% to 50.3% with star grade four establishments increasing by 4.8 percentage points and star grade five by 4.9 percentage points. Takings increased by 5.6% to \$38.1 million, with star grade four and five establishments recording an increase of 11.9%. Average takings per room night occupied rose 1.4% from \$76 to \$77.

Private New Capital Expenditure


Private new capital expenditure for the September quarter 1993 was \$422 million, an increase of 5.8% from the previous quarter. The estimate for the twelve months ended September 1993 was \$1,529 million, an increase of 9.4% over the twelve months to September 1992. The Australian estimate for the same period showed an increase of 9.6%.

### **Production**

**Dwelling Approvals** 

The provisional trend value for dwelling units approved in South Australia during January 1994 was 910 dwellings. The monthly figure has declined steadily since a peak was reached in January 1993 and was 16% below that level in January 1994. In contrast the Australian estimate grew by 1.0% in January to be 5.5% higher than its level of one year ago. The national trend will not fall unless there is an exceptional 12% fall in the seasonally adjusted number of dwelling units approved in February 1994.

**Dwelling Commencements** 

Preliminary estimates from the December quarter 1993 Building Activity Survey indicate that 2,772 dwellings were commenced in South Australia during that 3 month period. This was 13.3% less than the previous quarter and was the first time since the March Quarter 1992 that this estimate has fallen. As a consequence South Australian dwelling commencements accounted for 6.3% of the Australian total in the December Quarter, compared with 7.0% in the previous quarter.

Value of Non-residential Building Approvals South Australian authorities approved \$28.0 million of non-residential work in January 1994. This represented a slight improvement from the previous month (2.4%) but because of the extremely low value recorded in January 1993 (\$14.4 million) the increase over the 12 months to January 1994 was a high 95.1%. South Australia contributed only 5% of the non-residential work approved throughout Australia in January 1994.

Value of Total Building Activity

The value of building work commenced (at current prices) during the September quarter 1993 was \$338.3 million. More than 78% of this was directed toward residential buildings where new residential work valued at \$233.4 million and alterations and additions worth \$30.9 million were commenced.

The value of work done (at current prices) during the September quarter was \$400.3 million. This represents a slight increase of 3.0% from the preceding quarter. The value of residential work increased by more than 10% in contrast to the falls in residential alterations and non-residential building. A contraction in the work done on offices was primarily responsible for the downward movement in the non-residential category.

The value of work yet to be done (at current prices) at the end of the September quarter 1993 was \$362.7 million, a decrease of 12.1% from the previous quarter. This was a direct result of a fall in the value of non-residential work to be done, particularly in the educational and offices categories.


Value of Engineering Construction


The September quarter 1993 estimate for the value of engineering work done in South Australia was a modest \$170.4 million, which was 35.3% down from the revised June quarter estimate. The Australian estimate declined also in the September quarter by 19.1% to \$2,843.0 million. In South Australia activity was lower in most construction categories with the most noticeable reduction recorded by roads, highways and subdivisions which had exhibited strong growth early in 1993.

#### **Prices**

Consumer Price Index

In the December quarter 1993 the all groups Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Adelaide rose 0.1%, resulting in an annual increase of 1.9%. Nationally prices rose 0.2% for the quarter and 1.9% on an annual basis. Australia's Consumer Price Index compares favourably with many of its international trading partners. For the all groups excluding housing for the year ended September quarter 1993, the annual percentage change for Australia was 2.6%, compared with USA 3.1%, Japan 1.8%, UK 3.4%, Hong Kong 6.7%, Korca 4.2%, Taiwan 1.9% and New Zealand 1.1%.






House Building Materials

Prices of house building materials in Adelaide increased by 0.7% over the three months to January 1994, compared with a rise of 0.6% nationally. On an annual basis, Adelaide prices rose 12.1% compared with 5.5% nationally.


#### MATERIALS USED IN HOUSE BUILDING Change from Previous Month



Non-house Building Materials

Over the three months ended January 1994 prices of materials used in building other than house building rose by 0.3% in Adelaide, compared with no price change for the weighted average of the six State capital cities. In Adelaide no single item had significant price rises, although falls of 5.0% occurred for non-ferrous pipes and fittings and paint and other coatings fell 4.8% over the three months.

House Prices

In the September quarter 1993 prices of established houses in South Australia fell 7.0% while prices of project homes rose 3.4%. The movement in the prices of established houses should be viewed as a short-term adjustment following rises over the previous two quarters. On an annual basis, prices of established houses rose 0.6% while prices of project homes rose 4.0% compared with 2.7% and 2.8% nationally.

### Labour Force and Demography

Population

The estimated resident population of South Australia increased by 1,667 persons during the June quarter 1993 to 1,461,721. South Australia experienced a natural increase of 2,479 persons, a gain partially offset by a net interstate migration outflow of 850 persons.


The net gain from overseas migration of 38 persons in the June quarter was 1,004 lower than in the previous quarter, however, South Australia was one of only three States and Territories to experience a net gain.

During 1992-93 the growth rate for South Australia was 0.4% compared with 1.0% for Australia. Victoria had the lowest rate of population growth at 0.3%.

**Employment** 

The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in South Australia fell slightly to 635,100 in February 1994, continuing the downward movement evident since August 1993.

The underlying trend estimate for employed persons in Australia has been increasing since February 1993 and currently stands at its highest level since October 1990. The full-time employment estimate has been increasing since October 1993.



Unemployment

The trend unemployment rate for South Australia remained flat at 11.1% from December 1993 to February 1994. The trend unemployment rates for males and females were 11.8% and 10.1% respectively.

In February 1994, the trend estimate for the unemployment rate for Australia fell slightly to 10.5%.




#### Overtime

The percentage of employees who worked overtime in South Australia in November 1993 was 18.0% compared with 17.8% in November 1992.

Over the twelve month period to November 1993, significant increases in the percentage of employees working overtime occurred in the following industries: construction; wholesale trade; transport and storage; communication; and public administration and defence. Notable decreases occurred in the mining and community services industries.

#### Industrial Disputes

There were no working days lost through industrial disputes in South Australia in November 1993. For the twelve month period to November 1993, 26,900 days working days were lost. Over this period South Australia, at only 4.1% of the national total, had a relatively low level of industrial disputation.



#### Short-term Overseas Visitors Arrivals

Total short-term visitor arrivals to Australia in November 1993 numbered 284,788. This was 6.6% higher than the previous month and was 11.7% higher than in November 1992. The trend estimate increased by 0.3% from October 1993.

Short-term visitor arrivals to South Australia in November 1993 rose by 36.5% from October 1993, to a total of 7,581. This figure was 26.0% higher than in November 1992.

The State or Territory of stay of overseas visitors is determined from the intended address reported on arrival in Australian ports and airports. A short-term visit is any intended length of stay less than 12 months.

#### Short-term Resident Departures

Short-term departures of South Australian residents decreased to 7,174 in November 1993 which was 12.2% less than in October 1993 and 16.8% less than in the previous November.

Departures of Australian residents in November 1993 fell to 170,534, a decrease of 3.6% from October 1993 and 2.3% lower than the November 1992 figure. The trend estimate increased 0.2% between October and November 1993.

#### Incomes

#### Average Weekly Earnings

Average weekly ordinary time earnings of full-time adult employees in South Australia decreased slightly to \$599.40 in November 1993, down from \$603.30 in August 1993. Male ordinary time earnings decreased to \$626.50, compared with \$631.00 for the previous quarter. Female earnings decreased slightly to \$543.20.

Average weekly total earnings for all employees was \$492.50 in November 1993, down slightly from \$503.10 in August 1993.

Since it is an average of earnings across all employees, changes in average weekly earnings may occur through changes in employment as well as changes in pay levels.

Award Rates of Pav

Over the twelve months to January 1994, the weekly award rates of pay index for full-time adult employees in South Australia rose by 1.1%. The percentage change in the index for females was the second highest of the States.


The largest annual movement of the index for full-time adult males occurred in the wholesale and retail trade industry with a 3.2% increase since January 1993. For adult females employed full-time, the wholesale and retail trade was again prominent, showing a 2.9% rise between January 1993 and 1994.

#### **Financial Markets**

Housing Finance

Secured housing finance commitments for owner occupied dwellings in January 1994 was \$245.9 million, a decrease of \$60.8 million (19.8%) from the December 1993 record of \$306.7 million.

This decrease was experienced across the board with financing commitments for construction, purchase of newly erected dwellings and purchase of established dwellings falling \$16.7 million (32.9%), \$1.5 million (7.4%) and \$39.0 million (20.1%) respectively.

Personal Finance

In December 1993 the total value of personal finance commitments was \$161.0 million. This was \$14.3 million (9.7%) greater than that recorded for November 1993.

This increase was evident for commitments under both fixed loan and revolving credit facilities which increased by \$9.2 million (9.2%) and \$5.0 million (10.7%) respectively. Under fixed loan facilities, the most significant increase occurred in the category of refinancing (up 36.2%), followed closely by travel and holidays (up 35.3%).


Commercial Finance

Commercial finance commitments made by significant lenders in December 1993 was \$392.5 million, a decrease of \$64.4 million (14.1%) from November 1993.

Commercial finance commitments under revolving credit facilities fell 37.2% from \$260.7 million in November 1993 to \$163.8 million in December 1993. By far the largest decrease was recorded in the public administration industry, down \$51.5 million.

Commitments under fixed loan facilities, however, increased \$32.6 million (16.6%) to \$228.8 million in December 1993. The industries with the largest increase in commercial finance commitments were property and business services (up \$10.4 million); agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up \$9.4 million); and wholesale trade (up \$6.7 million).

Lease Finance

Lease finance commitments for December 1993 totalled \$20.7 million. This represented a fall of \$6.0 million (22.5%) on November 1993 and \$6.4 million (23.6%) from December 1992.

The most significant decrease in lease finance commitments was recorded for the category of electronic data processing equipment, down \$7.6 million (83.5%) to \$1.5 million in December 1993.

### South Australian Overseas Exports

#### Introduction

Overseas export statistics published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) are compiled from information submitted by exporters or their agents to the Australian Customs Scrvice. For merchandise exports 'State of Origin' is defined as the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.

Exports commodity statistics presented in this article are generally classified according to the United Nations Standard International Trade Classification (SITC).

Overseas exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia. The value of exports is the free-on-board transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars.

#### Total Exports 1988-89 to 1992-93

Overscas exports of South Australian produced goods reached \$3,760 million in 1992-93, an increase of 9.6% over the previous financial year. Since 1988-89 exports have increased steadily each financial year at an average annual rate in excess of 11%. The total value of exports has increased by almost 54% over this period.

#### **Commodity Groups**

Details of each commodity group used to classify export data in this article are given below. Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export figures but may affect commodity details in State of Origin and Country tables



This group contains wheat, barley, rice, maize, rye, oats, and processed stages from flour to cakes.


# MERCHANDISE EXPORTS CEREALS AND CEREAL PREPARATIONS Final Production in SA




Wine

The wine category embraces table, sparkling and fortified wines, whether bottled or bulk, and also unfinished commodities such as grape must.

### MERCHANDISE EXPORTS WINE




Wool and sheepskins



The wool and sheepskins group encompasses sheep and lamb skins (with and without wool), greasy wool and processed wool to the combed stage.


#### Machinery

The machinery group takes in items such as electric motors, car engines, agricultural machinery, lathes, laser cutters, air conditioning and refrigeration machines, office machines, electrical equipment, domestic appliances, and machine parts.




#### Metals and metal manufactures

Metals and metal manufactures embodies three divisions: iron and steel, non-ferrous metals and metal manufactures. The iron and steel division ranges from pig and east iron through to formed steel products such as rod, rail and pipe. Non-ferrous metals includes metals such as zinc, lead and copper whether refined or unrefined, while metal manufactures includes items from nuts and bolts to cooking utensils.




#### Fish and crustaceans

This category encompasses fish, lobsters, prawns, shell fish and their processed stages.




Road vehicles, parts and accessories

Included in this group are assembled and unassembled cars, trucks and buses, vehicle bodies, brake assemblies, vehicle parts, trailers, semi-trailers and caravans.



Petroleum and petroleum products

This group contains crude oil, petrol, diesel fuel, refined motor oils, kerosene and bitumen.



#### Commodity changes since 1988-89

Since 1988-89 there has been a notable change in emphasis in the nature of commodities exported with the increasing importance of manufactured goods relative to agricultural commodity exports. Of note has been the increase in value of exports of road vehicles, parts and

accessories; machinery; wine; and metals and manufactures of metals.



### **Major Destination Countries for South Australian Produced Goods**

In 1992-93 Japan was the country which took the highest proportion of South Australian exports (\$589 million), followed by the USA (\$326 million), New Zealand (\$256 million) and the United Kingdom (\$218 million).

In the past few years there have been a number of countries rapidly growing in importance as export destinations. The value of exports to Indonesia increased from \$18.6 million to \$164.2 million (more than 800%) between 1988-89 and 1992-93 so that it is now the sixth most important overseas market for South Australia.

#### Japan

At \$230 million, food made up nearly 40% of the total value of exports to Japan in 1992-93.

Fish, crustaceans and molluscs accounted for just over one-third of the value of food exports while meat and meat preparations; and cereals and cereal preparations, each constituted around one-quarter. Dairy products and fruit and vegetables were lower in value but have increased their share of the total since 1988-89.

United States of America (USA)

Over one-third of the \$326 million of exports to the USA in 1992-93 were made up of road vehicles and their parts and accessories. This means that the USA is one of this State's most prominent motor vehicle export markets, representing almost 35% of total transport equipment exports. The next largest commodity group was meat and meat preparations at \$77 million (23.6%).

#### New Zealand

Machinery made up over one-half of this State's exports to New Zealand in 1992-93. Of the total \$256 million, \$134 million consisted of machinery exports and of this more than three-quarters was \$105 million in road vehicles. Electrical machinery made up another \$20 million, or 14.8% of the machinery group.

#### United Kingdom (UK)

Of the \$218 million exported to the UK in 1992-93, beverages constituted \$91 million (41.9%) which mainly consisted of wine. The next most valuable commodity group was non-ferrous metals at \$53 million, or 24.2%. Most of the remainder was evenly spread across a range of broad commodity groups such as \$25 million in food exports. The value of machinery exports more than doubled between 1991-92 and 1992-93 to \$21 million.

#### Taiwan

South Australia's fifth most valuable export market in 1992-93 was Taiwan at \$179 million. The main commodities taken were non-ferrous metals (mainly refined lead), \$53 million; iron and steel, \$31 million; textile fibres (mainly wool), \$22 million; cercals \$20 million; and fish, crustaceans and molluses, \$17 million.

#### Indonesia

Three commodity groups made up almost 90% of South Australia's \$164 million of exports to Indonesia in 1992-93. By far the most important in value was petroleum and petroleum products which constituted \$99 million or 60.1%. The petroleum group also made up the largest part of the 72.9% increase in total exports to Indonesia from \$95 million in 1991-92. Non-ferrous metals and iron and steel were the other two groups, having approximately equal shares at 14.0% (\$23 million) and 13.4% (\$22 million) respectively.

#### China

Textile fibres and their wastes made up the major part of this State's \$151 million exports to China in 1992-93, (\$116 million or 76.8% of the total), with greasy wool the most prominent commodity in this group. However, a sizeable proportion was also made up by old clothing and rags. The only other group of significance in 1992-93 was food at \$20 million.
