


# 2002 CUEENSLAND AT A CLANCE



Situated generally between  $10^\circ$  and  $29^\circ$  south latitude and between  $138^\circ$  and  $154^\circ$  east longitude, Queensland occupies the north-eastern portion of the Australian continent. The coastline extends for 13,350 kilometres, including islands (6,970 kilometres on the mainland). Of the total area -1,730,650 square kilometres - just over half is north of the Tropic of Capricorn. Of the six States of the Commonwealth, Queensland ranks second in area and third in population.

Queensland is a constituent State of the Commonwealth of Australia, and observes the Federal Constitution. While returning elected members to both upper and lower houses of the Federal Parliament, Queensland is governed by its own State Parliament. Local government derives its powers from Acts passed by the State Parliament. The capital city is Brisbane.
