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Retail trade maintains strong growth

The Australian retail turnover trend estimates remain strong, averaging 0.8 per cent per month over the three months to September 1994. This is despite a slightly weaker 0.6 per cent increase recorded for the September month. The annual growth rate in the trend (September 1994 over September 1993) was 8.2 per cent.

The grocery industry, which contributes about 30 per cent to the total estimate, continued to record strong growth with the trend showing around 0.9 per cent increase over each of the last five months. Growth in the hotel, liquor store and licensed club industry has weakened with monthly growth dropping from a strong 1.2 per cent in both April and May 1994 to 0.2 per cent in September. Department stores and clothing and fabric stores, which had been in decline, are now showing growth.

Of the remaining industries covered by the survey, butchers, footwear stores, domestic hardware stores/jewellers, electrical goods stores, furniture stores and pharmacies were showing growth. Newsagents and other food stores were showing a declining trend in turnover to September.

In constant price (i.e., allowing for price changes) seasonally adjusted terms, the total Australian estimate of turnover for the September quarter 1994 rose by 3.2 per cent over the June quarter 1994 and by 6.8 per cent over the September quarter 1993.

New estimates track demography of indigenous Australians

The Australian Bureau of Statistics has released for the first time experimental estimates of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population.

The estimates of the indigenous population are 'experimental' in that the standard approach to population estimation is not possible because satisfactory data on births, deaths and internal migration are not generally available. As a result, a method based on the use of life tables has been applied. The figures are also affected by changes in the propensity of people to identify as being of indigenous origin.

The estimated resident Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population at 30 June 1991 was 283,000, an increase of 32,200 since 30 June 1986. The average annual growth rate of the indigenous population of Australia for the period 1986 to 1991 was 2.4 per cent, higher than the rate for the total population of 1.5 per cent.

The 30 June 1991 estimate of the indigenous population represents 1.6 per cent of the total population (17,284,000), an increase of 0.1 percentage points since 1986.

New South Wales had the largest indigenous population at 30 June 1991, with 75,000, or 26.5 per cent of the total indigenous population, followed by Queensland with 26.2 per cent.


The indigenous population of the Northern Territory comprised 26.1 per cent (43,300) of the total Northern Territory population at 30 June 1991. This is the highest proportion of any State/Territory. The lowest was 0.4 per cent (17,900) for Victoria.

The Northern Territory had the lowest average annual growth rate (2.1%).

MEDIAN AGES OF THE INDIGENOUS AND TOTAL POPULATIONS, PERSONS 30 June 1991



At 30 June 1991, Australia's indigenous population had a median age of 20.0 years, about 12 years younger than for the total population. The median age of the indigenous population ranged from 18.8 years in Tasmania to 20.8 years in Victoria.

The median age of the indigenous population increased by 1.1 years in the five years to 30 June 1991. For the total population this increase was 1.3 years.

The median age of indigenous males at 30 June 1991 was 19.6 years and for indigenous females 20.4 years. The median age for males was about one year lower than for females for all States and Territories except Tasmania where the median age for males was about the same as for females.

The proportion of the indigenous population under 15 years of age was 39.1 per cent compared with 21.9 per cent for the total population. Persons aged 65 and over comprise 2.5 per cent of the indigenous population and 11.3 per cent of the total population.

The age structure of the male indigenous population is similar to that of the female indigenous population.

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Day surgery on the rise in private hospital industry

Results from a national census of private hospitals show there were 417 private hospitals in operation in Australia during 1992–93, comprising 323 acute and psychiatric hospitals and 94 free-standing day hospital facilities.

Although there was little change in the numbers of private acute and psychiatric hospitals since the previous year (from 319 in 1991–92 to 323 in 1992–93), the numbers of free-standing day hospital facilities rose significantly from 72 to 94. There was also a significant rise, from 30 to 45, in the number of day surgery units established within private hospitals.

Separations and occupied bed days

The number of inpatient separations from private acute and psychiatric hospitals in Australia during 1992–93 was 1,202,200 — an increase of 3.9 per cent on the previous year's figure.

Over five million (5,006,300) occupied bed days were recorded in respect of all separations, 2.4 per cent greater than the total for the previous year. The average length of stay for inpatients across all private acute and psychiatric hospitals was 4.2 days, unchanged from 1991–92.

The number of patient separations from free-standing day hospital facilities in Australia during 1992–93 was 149,390, a 21.1 per cent increase which reflects the growth in the numbers of these centres since 1991–92.

Services provided

For health fund benefits purposes patients are categorised according to the type of services they receive. These categories comprise surgery (separately identifying advanced and minor surgery), obstetric, medical, psychiatric and rehabilitation.

Of the 1.2 million inpatient separations from private acute and psychiatric hospitals in 1992–93, 69.4 per cent were classed as surgery (including advanced and minor surgery), 22.2 per cent as medical, 4.7 per cent as obstetric, 2.3 per cent as psychiatric and 1.3 per cent as rehabilitation.

Some 94.5 per cent of separations from day hospital facilities during 1992–93 were classed as surgery patients. Of these, 50.8 per cent were categorised as minor surgery, 48.4 per cent as surgery and the remaining 0.8 per cent as advanced surgery.

Finances

The average operating expenditure per inpatient separation for all private acute and psychiatric hospitals in Australia during 1992–93 was \$1,705 or \$409 per occupied bed day. Total operating expenditure was \$2,049.4 million, up by 4.9 per cent on the previous year. The expenditure category, 'wages and salaries including on-costs', accounted for 61.3 per cent of total expenditure.

The average operating expenditure per patient separation for all free-standing day hospital facilities was \$327 in 1992–93. The large growth in free-standing day hospital facilities between 1991–92 and 1992–93 resulted in a 38.3 per cent increase to \$48.9 million in their total operating expenditure. Some 40.0 per cent of this total was for wages and salaries, including on-costs.

For all private acute and psychiatric hospitals, total revenue amounted to \$2,325.5 million in 1992–93 and 95.7 per cent of this was received as patient fees. Total revenue for free-standing day hospital facilities was \$60.8 million of which 96.1 per cent was received as patient fees.


