

Almost all 1976 and 1981 Census occupation codes match exactly. The main exception is some items in the minor group, Teachers, which have been regrouped as follows:

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
After the paragraph headed 'Intercensal classification changes, 1976-81', add a new paragraph as follows:

Significant changes in the coding of 'machinists' 1976-81

The approach to the coding of answers on occupation in each succeeding census aims at improving the quality of the data. In 1976, the response 'machinist' was not automatically given the code 747, but an attempt was made to refine the occupation by examining the industry of the respondent. For example, they may have been coded to one of the following occupations:

76 Code	76 Descriptor
152	Office Machine Operators
406	Machinemen and Drilling Machine Operators, Mining and Quarrying
603	Knitters and Knitting Machine setters, including Hosiery
613	Machinists, Sewers, Embroiderers, Textile Products, Leather Garments and Gloves
634	Machine Tool Setters and Operators, Metal, including Metal Machinists (so described) as well as appearing as entries in many other classification codes.

In 1981, however, the response 'machinist' was always given the code 747 and the link to the various industries was left to output tables which cross-classified Industry and Occupation (see 1981 Census Table 74). This has resulted in the Australian figure for code 747 increasing from 8,459 persons in 1976 to 67,837 persons in 1981 and the other related codes showing a proportional decrease.

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SECTION 1

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

In the 1981 Census of Population and Housing, data on occupation were collected from persons aged 15 years and over who were employed members of the labour force.

This paper defines occupation for census purposes, shows how it is obtained from the census question, and explains and lists the occupation classification.

The occupation question

Question 27 on the 1981 Census schedule requested information about occupation in the following manner:

27. In the main job held LAST WEEK, what was the person's occupation?	Occupation
 Describe as fully as possible, using two words or more (do not use initials or abbreviations, e.g. builder's labourer, not bld. lab.). 	
 Where possible, include award or government designation. 	
Members of the Armed Services should state their rank.	

Responses to the question were, in effect, each individual's self-perception and self-description of his/her occupation, which was used to code to a standard classification.

What is occupation?

An occupation is defined as a collection of jobs sufficiently similar in their main tasks to be grouped under a common title for classification purposes. In other words, an occupation classification relates basically to the kind of work performed.

The classification of a person's occupation from responses to the census question is difficult because one kind of work can be described in different ways and, conversely, many different kinds of work can be described by a single name. This should be kept in mind when using census data on occupation.

Related census characteristics

Occupation should not be confused with two other closely related census characteristics, namely occupational status and industry.

A person defined as having an occupation for census purposes may have one of four occupational status codes allocated. They are:

- Status 1, for a wage or salary earner;
- Status 2, for a person conducting his/her own business but not employing others;
- Status 3, for a person conducting his/her own business and employing others; or
- Status 4, for a helper not receiving wages or salary.

Each person with an occupation works within some industry. The industry in which a person is employed is determined by the main kind of economic activity of the establishment in which he/she works or performs an occupation.

Individuals performing quite different occupations may be employed by the same establishment but all will belong to the one industry to which the establishment is coded.

In the processing of the census, occupation is coded only for those people who are in the labour force. An understanding of who constitutes the labour force is necessary for an understanding of census occupations.

Who is in the labour force?

For the 1981 Census, the labour force was defined as:

- (i) those persons who worked during the week prior to census night;
- (ii) those who had a job from which they were temporarily absent;
- (iii) those who were temporarily laid off without pay for the whole of the reference week; and
- (iv) those who did not work or did not have a job but were actively looking for work.

Persons helping but not receiving wages or salary and who worked less than 15 hours in the week prior to census night were excluded from the labour force. Bonded trainees (including trainee teachers) and cadets engaged in full-time study at educational institutions were also excluded, even if the institutions at which they studied were run by their employers.

Only employed members of the labour force have an occupation code (i.e. categories (i), (ii) and (iii) above). The rules for labour force status allocation are contained in Appendix B.

Procedures for determining census occupation

Where the information stated in reply to question 27, Occupation, was listed in the 1981 Census processing manual *Index of Occupations* (1211.0) either as described, or in some alternative similar word form, it was coded as indicated in the index. Where the occupation did not appear in the Index of Occupations, but the answers to Questions 28, Name and Place of Work, and 29, Industry, indicated that the person was employed by a government department or authority, a Supplementary Index of Government Designations for each State was consulted.

If the occupation description on the census schedule was not precise enough for an exact code to be allocated, it was necessary for census coders to examine the occupation description in conjunction with the answers to other questions, in particular the following:

Question	2	Sex
Question		Age

Question 4 Relationship to Person 1 (where relevant) for spouses or other relations engaged in

family businesses

Question 20 Trade or other qualification

Questions 23-26 Occupational status

Questions 28, 29 Industry, name and place of work

Question 30 Hours worked

(Appendix A contains a facsimile of these questions.)

For example, in some instances occupational status was important for determining certain occupations such as proprietors and shopkeepers, workers on own account, Status 2 (see 'Related census characteristics' in this paper), n.e.c., retail and wholesale trade (code 203).

In a small number of cases where professional or trade qualifications are important in determining certain occupations, the replies to question 20 were used.

If after reference to questions 23-26, 28, 29 and any other related questions, no code could be allocated to a particular answer, it was inleuded in code 865: occupation inadequately described or not stated.

Occupation classification

The occupation classification used for coding responses to the 1981 Census question on occupation has been adapted from, and closely adheres to, the principles embodied in the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO) issued by the International Labour Office, Geneva, 1958, and revised in 1968.

The ISCO, 1958, was prepared after extensive discussion and research by world experts to provide an adequate classification framework for countries interested in using an occupation classification, and, at the same time, to provide a basis for international comparison of occupation data obtained mainly from censuses of population.

In the Australian Classification of Occupations there are three hierarchical levels to which census occupation statistics are aggregated:

(i) 11 major groups, represented by a one or two digit numerical code;

(ii) 73 minor groups, shown by numerical alphabetic codes; and

(iii) 389 occupation codes, ranging from 001-865.

(Section 2 lists major and minor groups and Section 3 lists the detailed classification with the 389 codes.)

Occupations within this classification are grouped according to the kind of work performed, as indicated by the duties of the job, and taking into account other related factors such as the processes, materials and equipment or machinery used, and the degree of responsibility and/or education or training required.

Intercensal classification changes, 1976-81

Almost all 1976 and 1981 Census occupation codes match exactly. The main exception is some items in the minor group, Teachers, which have been regrouped as follows:

In 1976 the 'unemployed' classification was split into 'unemployed looking for first job' and 'unemployed looking for work (not first job)'. These classifications were combined for 1981 into 'unemployed'.

Abbreviations

The following abbreviations appear in the classification of occupations listed in Sections 2 and 3 of this paper:

ASIC Australian Standard Industrial Classification. This is the basis of the census industry classification.

Not elsewhere classified. A reported occupation description was coded to a classification qualified as n.e.c. only after the coder had found that the description on the census schedule did not appear elsewhere in the occupations indexes.

When an entry in the classification is so described, only reported occupation descriptions (so described)

with the same or equivalent wording were coded to that category.

Occupational status classification-refer to 'Related census characteristics' in this paper. Status 1, 2, 3, 4 Postal and Telecommunications Commissions. Post and Telecom
