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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

In 1993, 260,229 births were registered in Australia, an increase of 7 per cent since 1983 when 242,570 births were registered, considerably less than the 20 per cent increase in the female population of child-bearing age in the same period. Since 1990 the number of births has fluctuated around 260,000.

Fertility


The Total Fertility Rate (the number of children one woman would expect to bear during her child-bearing lifetime) was 1.9 in 1993, the same as in 1983. The Total Fertility Rate has fluctuated around 1.8 since the early 1980s. In 1993, the Australian Capital Territory recorded the lowest Total Fertility Rate of all States/Territories of 1.7 while the Northern Territory had the highest rate of 2.3, primarily due to higher fertility rates in the younger age groups in the Northern Territory.

A comparison with other countries reveals that Australia's fertility pattern most closely resembles that of the United Kingdom (see Table 32). Countries with high Total Fertility Rates include Papua New Guinea (4.9 in 1992) and Indonesia (3.1 in 1992). Countries with low Total Fertility Rates compared to Australia include Hong Kong (1.4 in 1992), the Federal Republic of Germany (1.5 in 1992) and Japan (1.7 in 1992), all well below the replacement level of about 2.1 children per woman.

The Net Reproduction Rate (the number of daughters born to women who are exposed to the fertility and mortality rates of the reference year) was 0.9 in 1993. Since falling below replacement level (1.0) in 1976, the Net Reproduction Rate has remained fairly stable.

Age Specific Birth Rates (the number of births per 1,000 women of a specific age group in the population) in the younger age groups continued a gradual decline in 1993. Despite this decrease, the 25-29 year age group remained the peak fertility group with a fertility rate of 130.0.

In contrast to the decline in fertility among younger women, the trend in recent years of increased fertility in the older age groups continued in 1993. In the last decade, women aged 30-34 years have overtaken the 20-24 year age group as the second most fertile group. In

1993, women aged 30-34 years experienced a fertility rate of 105.5 births per 1,000 women compared to 71.1 for women aged 20-24 years.

Age of Parents

The median age of parents (the age where there are as many parents above the middle age as there are below it) continued to rise in 1993.

The median age of mothers reached 28.9 years in 1993, an increase of 2 years since 1983. In 1993 the median age of mothers for nuptial confinements was 29.7 years compared with 24.5 years for ex-nuptial confinements. Of all births registered in 1993, 34 per cent (88,279) were to mothers aged 25-29 years, while another 30 per cent (77,004) were to 30-34 year old mothers.

The median age of fathers of births resulting from nuptial confinements in 1993 was 32 years, rising from 30 years in 1983. Fathers of births resulting from ex-nuptial confinements where paternity was acknowledged tended to be younger than their married counterparts with a median age of 27.5 in 1993. Married people refers to those in registered marriages and does not include people in de facto marriages.

Previous births of the registered marriage

Of the 192,518 nuptial confinements registered in 1993, 40 per cent (77,718) were of mothers giving birth for the first time, while a further 36 per cent (68,389) already had one child.

The proportion of married first-time mothers aged under 25 years decreased from 43 per cent in 1983 to 23 per cent in 1993. The median age of married mothers giving birth for the first time was 28.3 years in 1993, an increase of 2.6 years since 1983.

In the last ten years around 8 per cent of confinements have resulted in births to married parents who already had 3 or more children. This compares with 12 per cent in 1973 and 23 per cent in 1963.

Duration of marriage

The median duration of marriage prior to birth is the point where there were as many births to couples who had a duration of marriage above the mid point as there were to those who had a duration of marriage below the mid point. In 1993, the median duration of marriage was 2.5 years for nuptial first confinements compared to 2.3 years in 1983. The median for all nuptial confinements was 4.6 years in 1993.


Ex-nuptial births

The proportion of births outside registered marriage continued to increase in 1993 with 64,874 ex-nuptial births, representing 25 per cent of all births. In 1983, 35,646 or 15 per cent of births occurred outside registered marriage. In 1993, the proportion of ex-nuptial births varied considerably across the States/Territories. The Northern Territory recorded the highest proportion of ex-nuptial

births (55%) while Victoria had the lowest proportion (20%).

In 1993, paternity was acknowledged by 82 per cent (53,016) of fathers in ex-nuptial births, an increase from 64 per cent (22,983) in 1983. The proportion of paternity acknowledged ex-nuptial births in 1993 ranged from 88 per cent in the Australian Capital Territory to 64 per cent in the Northern Territory.

Birthplace

Of the 193,518 nuptial confinements in 1993, the majority (62%) resulted in births to parents who were both born in Australia. In a further 20 per cent of cases one parent was born in Australia and the other born overseas, while 13 per cent were to parents born in the same overseas country. The remaining nuptial confinements resulted in births to parents who were born in different overseas countries.

European-born parents having children in 1993 were more likely to be married to Australian-born partners than to partners born in the same European country. More than half of all parents born in Europe had Australian-born partners. The main exceptions were parents from the Former Yugoslav Republics and Poland with more than half having partners from their own country of birth.

A high proportion of parents having children in 1993 and born in South East Asia were also married to someone from the same South East Asian country. This was the case for fathers born in the Philippines (90%) and Viet Nam (88%). In addition, 91 per cent of mothers born in Viet Nam also had partners born in the same country. A notable exception was Filipino-born mothers who were more likely to be married to Australian-born men (40%) than Filipino men (38%).

Malaysian-born parents having children in 1993 recorded the highest proportion of partners born in a different overseas country (24 per cent of fathers and 25 per cent of mothers), followed by 23 per cent of mothers born in the Philippines. Filipino fathers, in contrast to their female counterparts, were unlikely to be married to someone from a different overseas country (3%).

Overseas-born mothers tended to be older than Australian-born mothers, with 38 per cent of Australian-born mothers aged 30 years and over compared to mothers born in Italy (61%), China (63%) and Malaysia (67%). Of the present main immigrant source countries to Australia, only mothers born in the Former Yugoslav Republics (38%) and Lebanon (34%) had a smaller proportion of mothers aged 30 years and over than Australian-born mothers.

The age of peak fertility for Australian-born mothers was 25-29 years. However, for mothers born in China, Italy, Malaysia, the Philippines and the United Kingdom, peak fertility occurred among women aged 30-34 years. For Chinese-born mothers, fertility was particularly high in this age group with 41 per cent of Chinese-born mothers aged 30-34 years.

Multiple births

Of the 256,703 confinements registered in 1993, 1.4 per cent (3497) resulted in twins, triplets or higher order births. The vast majority of these multiple births were twins (97%). Eighty per cent of confinements resulting in multiple births occurred within registered marriage.

Births of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children

Details of indigenous births registered in South Australia and the Northern Territory have been included in this publication for the first time (see Part C). Details for other States and the Australian Capital Territory are either not considered to be of a publishable standard or not available in the case of Queensland.

In 1993, 519 indigenous births were registered to mothers usually resident in South Australia, representing 3 per cent of all births in that State. Indigenous people accounted for around 1 per cent of the South Australian population in 1991. In the Northern Territory in 1993, 1,359 indigenous children were born or 38 per cent of all Northern Territory births. In 1991, an estimated 26 per cent of the Northern Territory population was indigenous.


Based on the 1991 Census of Population and Housing, the Total Fertility Rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women declined sharply during the 1970s from around 6.0 children per woman to 3.0 children per woman. In 1986-91 the Total Fertility Rate for all indigenous women in Australia was 3.1, more than 50 per cent higher than the figure for all women (1.9 in 1991). In the 1986-91 period the Total Fertility Rate for South Australian indigenous women was 3.0 and for the Northern Territory 3.4.

Based on birth registrations, the indigenous populations of South Australia and the Northern Territory experienced higher fertility rates in 1993 than the population in general. The Total Fertility Rate for indigenous mothers was 2.5 in South Australia and 3.0 in the Northern Territory, compared to 1.8 and 2.3 for all mothers in South Australia and the Northern Territory respectively. The

higher fertility rates recorded for indigenous mothers were primarily due to higher rates among women in the younger age groups.

The apparent decline in Total Fertility Rates from 1986-91 to 1993 does not necessarilty reflect an actual decline in fertility as the data are not strictly comparable. 1986-91 figures are calculated using the own-children method of fertility estimation (see p. 23) whereas 1993 figures are based directly on birth registrations.

In South Australia, indigenous women aged 15-19 years experienced a birth rate over 5 times higher than for all South Australian women in that age group. Fifty-five per cent of indigenous mothers giving birth in South Australia in 1993 were aged 24 or younger compared to 23 per cent of all South Australian mothers.

Young indigenous women in the Northern Territory also experienced relatively high fertility rates. The fertility rate for indigenous women aged 15-19 years was over double that for all Northern Territory women in that age group. More than 65 per cent of indigenous mothers giving birth in 1993 were aged 24 years or less compared to 40% of all Northern Territory mothers.

Year of Occurrence

The preceding commentary relates to birth data based on year of registration. In Part B of this publication data are presented on the basis of births occurring in 1993 and registered by the end of June 1994. Year of occurrence data for 1993 has resulted in numbers and rates which are lower than those recorded for the same period on a registration basis. A number of factors may contribute to these variations, including lags between the occurrence and registration of a birth, problems encountered during the registration process, or changes introduced to this process by individual State or Territory Registrars.

On year of occurrence basis there were 256,173 births in Australia in 1993, an increase of 6 per cent from 10 years ago (242,190). The same period saw a decline in Total Fertility Rate from 1.9 births per woman in 1983 to 1.8 in 1993.


In 1993, March was the most common month for giving birth with 8.8 per cent of births occurring during that

month. February and November were the least common months, each accounting for 7.8 per cent of births.

1992 Family Survey

Results from the 1992 Family Survey (see Part E) show that an estimated 9 per cent of women aged 45-59 years had remained childless. Women in this age group were more likely to remain childless if they had never been in a registered marriage (43,895 women or 92% of those who had never married) than if they had ever married (76,328 women or 6% of ever married women). This pattern was also evident among younger women.

An estimated 341,592 women, or 6 per cent of all women aged 15-59 years, were living in de facto relationships in 1992. Women in de facto relationships tended to be younger than women in registered marriages and have a registered marital status of never married. About 50 per cent of women in de facto relationships were childless.

The average number of children per mother increases with age, with an average of 2.9 children for mothers aged 45-59 in 1992. The greatest increase in the average number of children per mother was apparent between mothers aged 25-29 years (1.8 children) and mothers aged 30-34 years (2.3 children). For mothers in de facto relationships, the greatest increase in the average number of children per mother was apparent between mothers aged 20-24 years (1.4 children) and mothers aged 25-29 years (2.0 children). This reflects a difference in the ages of peak fertility between de facto mothers (20-24 years) and all mothers (25-29 years).

PART C: BIRTHS OF ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER CHILDREN

Indigenous children are those where either one or both parents are recorded as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin. Regardless of State of registration, indigenous birth data are presented on a state of usual residence basis. The quality of indigenous birth data varies considerably and only data from South Australia and the Northern Territory are considered to be of publishable quality. These data are at least 90 per cent complete. Although New South Wales, Victoria, Western Australia, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory have provision for identification of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin, data for these states are significantly under-recorded. Queensland does not currently identify indigenous births in its registration process.


Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander fertility

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population has a much younger age structure than the rest of the population, a reflection of their higher birth rates and shorter life expectancy. An examination of trends in the fertility rates of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women provides insight into the likely future growth of the population and potential changes in its age profile.

In addition to consideration of the fertility of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women, including those with non-Aboriginal partners, measures of Aboriginal fertility in terms of its population growth effect should also include consideration of Aboriginal children born to non-Aboriginal women i.e. those with Aboriginal fathers. In 1991, 43% of Aboriginal couple families with children had two Aboriginal parents, 32% had an Aboriginal mother and a non-Aboriginal father, and 25% had an Aboriginal father and a non-Aboriginal mother. These latter families contained 24% of all Aboriginal children in couple families. However, higher proportions were observed among younger children (27% of children under one year) compared to older children (21% of children aged 10-14 years). This suggests that Aboriginal

Total fertility rate

The fertility of a population is usually measured by the total fertility rate. This is the average number of children that a woman could expect to bear by the end of her reproductive life span if she were to bear children throughout her lifetime according to the prevailing age-specific fertility rates. The age-specific fertility rate is the number of barths in a given time period to women of a particular age group.

Estimating Aboriginal fertility

The total fertility rate is usually derived from buth registrations data. However, most States have only recently included an identifier of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander origin on birth registration forms. There are thus insufficient data currently available to enable adequate estimates to be made. Calculations of Aboriginal fertility have therefore usually been based on five-yearly population census data. It has also been possible to derive estimates for some States using data from two other sources: Aboriginal birth registrations in South Australia and the Northern Territory, and data from the midwives' collections which are a set of health and demographic data on women during confinement. routinely collected by the health departments in some States and Territories. A comparison of the different methods of extimating Aboriginal fertility is presented in a recent paper by Dugbaza'.

The method of deriving fertility estimates from a population census using data on the relationships between household members is termed the 'own-children' method'. The estimates are averages for the five-year period ending at the census data. While the total fertility rate is satisfactory, the estimates understate fertility levels for the 15-19 years age group and overstate them for the 40 years and over age group. Unless otherwise stated the estimates presented in this review are based on this method.

children with non-Aboriginal mothers comprise an increasing share of the children in Aboriginal families. Information about them is consequently an important supplement to fertility measures calculated for Aboriginal women.

Fertility levels and trends

Estimates from the 1991 Census³ indicate that the total fertility rate of Aboriginal women is about 3.1 children per woman, over 50% higher than the figure of 1.9 for total women. Over the last 30 years, there has been a substantial decline in fertility for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal women. Accompanying this has been a narrowing of the fertility differential between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal women. In the 1960s, Aboriginal fertility, at about 6.0 children per woman, was about twice the rate for total women.


Fertility declines for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal women over the last 30 years have followed a similar pattern with the sharpest decrease recorded during the 1970s. However, the fertility decline for non-Aboriginal women commenced in the 1960s while for Aboriginal women fertility was largely stable in the 1960s followed by a sharp decline in the early 1970s. In the ten years to 1991, the fertility of both populations has been reasonably stable.

Age-specific fertility

Aboriginal women have children at younger ages than non-Aboriginal women. Fertility among 15-19 year old Aboriginal women was more than five times higher than among all 15-19 year old women in 1991. Among 20-24 year olds, Aboriginal fertility was about two and a half times higher. Aboriginal fertility peaks in the 20-24 years age group while for the total population the peak child-bearing ages are 25-29 years. The fertility of women aged 30 years and over is similar in both the Aboriginal and total Australian populations. Aboriginal

Age-specific fertility rates




women aged 15-24 years contributed over 75% of the difference in the total fertility rate between Aboriginal women and all Australian women. The earlier age at commencement of child-bearing by Aboriginal women, and the higher fertility of 15-24 year old Aboriginal women are most responsible for the higher fertility of Aboriginal women.

Trends in age-specific fertility

Over the past 30 years declines in Aboriginal fertility have occurred in all age groups. Older women experienced proportionally larger declines than younger women. The smallest fall in relative terms was among the 15-19 years age group, so that the contribution of this group to the total fertility of Aboriginal women has increased relative to that of other age groups. In 1961, the age-specific fertility rate of 15-19 year old Aboriginal women was 80% that of 30-34 year olds. In 1991 the fertility of 15-19 years olds was just as high as that of 30-34 year olds.


The net effect of this has been a decline in the average age of Aboriginal mothers at child-bearing. In comparison, the average age of women at child-bearing in the total population has been increasing. The trend towards younger ages of Aboriginal mothers may continue. On the other hand, the contribution of the different age groups to total Aboriginal fertility in 1991 is not dissimilar to that for the total population in 1971, when much higher fertility was observed in the 15-24 years age group. It is possible that Aboriginal fertility will in the future move further towards that of non-Aboriginal women.

Contribution of age groups

In 1991, Aboriginal women under 25 years contributed about half of total Aboriginal fertility, while the contribution to total fertility of all women under 25 years was only a little over a quarter. Correspondingly, in the total population, older age groups contributed more to total fertility than older Aboriginal women did to total Aboriginal fertility. For example, women aged 25-34 years contributed about 63% of total fertility compared to 41% of Aboriginal fertility.

The contribution of a particular age group to the total births in a population depends on the age-specific fertility rate as well as the relative size of the age group in the population. Not only do younger Aboriginal women have higher fertility rates but they also comprise a higher proportion of Aboriginal women of child-bearing ages relative to the total population. In 1991, 40% of Aboriginal women aged 15-49 years were under 25 years of age compared to 30% of all women aged 15-49 years.

State/Territory differences

Aboriginal fertility varies between States as does the fertility differential between the Aboriginal and the total population. The highest rates of Aboriginal fertility were recorded in Western Australia and the Northern Territory (3.6 and 3.4 respectively) and the lowest rates in

Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory (both 2.6). In most States and Territories the Aboriginal population represents only a small proportion of the total population, and the fertility of the non-Aboriginal population can be approximated by the fertility of the total population. In the Northern Territory, however, Aboriginal people comprise about a quarter of the total population and the total fertility rate for the Northern Territory is significantly higher than that for other States and Territories (2.3 compared to 1.7-1.9). When the total fertility rate is calculated for the non-Aboriginal population of the Northern Territory, the figure of 1.9 conforms to the Australian average.

Differences in fertility reflect differences in socio-economic factors including urbanisation, education and labour force status⁴. Studies by Gray^{5,6} have shown that these factors also influence Aboriginal fertility which is higher in rural than in urban areas, and higher for Aboriginal women without post-school qualifications than for those with them.

The high Aboriginal fertility in Western Australia and the Northern Territory is associated with low proportions of Aboriginal people living in the capital city, low Aboriginal labour force participation and low proportions of Aboriginal people who stayed at school beyond the age of 15 years, relative to the Australian average. Correspondingly, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory, where Aboriginal fertility is lowest, have the highest Aboriginal education levels and the highest Aboriginal labour force participation rates.

Overall, 30% of Aboriginal families had a non-Aboriginal mother in 1991. This proportion was considerably lower in the Northern Territory and Western

Australia (13% and 20% respectively) and considerably higher in Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory (45% and 42% respectively).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

Registration of births is the responsibility of individual State and Territory Registrars and is based on the data provided on an information form completed by one of the parents. This information form is the basis of the data provided to the ABS, by individual Registrars, for compilation into the aggregate statistics in this publication. There is a high commonality of data items collected across States and Territories and thus statistics at the national level are available for most characteristics. Some States, however, collect additional information and this is available on request from that State or States.

Date of occurrence and date of registration

2. The statistics in Part A of this publication refer to births registered by the State and Territory Registrars during the calendar year shown. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a birth and, as a result of delay in registration, some births occurring in one year are not registered until the following year or even later.

To aid comparison of the number of births registered and the number occurring in a particular year, summary statistics on the basis of year of occurrence are presented in Part B of this publication (Tables 23, 24, 25 and 26).

Statistics for States and Territories

- 3. Statistics for States and Territories have been compiled and presented in respect of the State or Territory of usual residence of the mother. Table 21 shows the number of births cross-classified by State or Territory of usual residence and State or Territory of registration. Births which took place outside Australia are excluded from the statistics.
- 4. Following the 1992 ammendment to the Acts Interpretation Act to include the Indian Ocean Territories of Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands as part of geographic Australia, changes have been made to the presentation of State and Territory of usual residence birth data commencing with 1993. Another category of the State/Territory level has been created, known as 'Other Territories'. 'Other Territories' include Jervis Bay Territory as well as Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands.
- 5. Prior to 1993 usual residence birth data for Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands were included with off-shore areas and migratory in Western Australia while usual residence birth data for Jervis Bay Territory were included with the Australian Capital Territory. In 1993, there were 11 births to mothers usually resident in Jervis Bay Territory, 11 to mothers

usually resident in Christmas Island and 15 to mothers usually resident in the Cocos (Keeling) Islands,

1992 Family Survey

6. The aim of the 1992 Survey of Families in Australia (Family Survey) was to provide information on the types of support that family members give to each other, and receive from outside the household, and to analyse the family's resources in relation to its support needs, according to selected demographic and socio-economic characteristics. The survey was conducted by the ABS over a twelve week period from 2 March 1992 to 29 May 1992.

Definitions

- 7. Births. For statistics in this publication, the term birth relates to live births i.e. the delivery of a child, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, who after being born, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as heart-beat.
- 8. Confinements are the number of pregnancies resulting in at least one live birth. Nuptial first confinements are the first confinements in the current marriage and therefore do not necessarily represent the woman's first ever confinement resulting in a live birth.
- 9. Nuptiality. Live births are identified as nuptial where the father registered was married to the mother at the time of the birth, or where the husband died during the pregnancy. Other confinements, and the children resulting from them, are classified as ex-nuptial whether or not the parents were living together at the time of the birth and whether or not the child may subsequently have been legitimated or adopted.
- 10. Previous births are the number of children born alive (which may be still living or now dead) to a woman during her current (which may be her second, etc.) marriage. In some States legitimated and legally adopted children as well as children by the same father who were born to the mother before the marriage are included.
- 11. Paternity-acknowledged births refer to ex-nuptial births where paternity was acknowledged by the child's father.
- 12. The crude birth rate is the number of live births registered during the calendar year per 1,000 of mean estimated resident population for the calendar year.
- 13. Age-specific birth rates are the live births registered during the calendar year, according to age of mother, per 1,000 of the female resident population of the same age as estimated for 30 June. For calculating these rates, births to mothers under 15 are included in the 15-19 female age group, and births to mothers aged 50 and over are included in the 45-49 female age group. Pro rata adjustment is made in respect of births for which age of mother is not given.
- 14. Total fertility rate is obtained by summing the 5-year age-specific birth rates, multiplying by 5 and dividing by 1,000. It represents the number of children

one woman would expect to bear if the age-specific rates of the year shown continued during her child-bearing lifetime.

- 15. The female gross reproduction rate is the sum of the female age-specific fertility rates (i.e. the number of female live births according to age of mother per 1,000 females of that age) multiplied by 5 and divided by 1,000. It represents the average number of daughters that would be born per woman in a group of women all of whom survive to the end of the reproductive period and had born daughters at each age in accordance with the rates prevailing during that year. It is an indication of the extent to which the population would reproduce itself under these conditions, except that it does not allow for females who fail to survive to the end of the childbearing period.
- 16. The female net reproduction rate allows for such mortality. It is obtained by multiplying the female age-specific birth rates by the proportion of survivors at corresponding ages in a life table, adding the products and dividing by 1,000. The female net reproduction rate represents the average number of daughters born to a group of women who are subjected to the fertility rates of that year and to the mortality rates of the life table.
- 17. The sex ratio of births is the number of male live births per 100 female live births.
- 18. Median age is the age which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, one half of the cases falling below this age and one half exceeding it.

Marital status

19. Two separate concepts are measured by the ABS. These are Registered Marital Status and Social Marital Status. They are different personal characteristics and are independent variables with separate classifications. Marital Status in this publication relates to Registered Marital Status which refers to formally registered marriages for which the partners hold a marriage certificate. A de facto marriage relates to Social Marital Status and refers to a relationship where a man and woman live together as husband and wife but are not in a registered marriage.

Country of birth

- 20. The classification of countries in this publication is based on the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS). For more detailed information refer to the ABS publication Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (1269.0).
- 21. Recent political developments in Europe and the Former USSR have resulted in a number of changes to the ASCCSS. These changes have affected some of the categories in this publication and are detailed in Revision 1,02 of the ASCCSS.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population

22. The population used to calculate indigenous birth rates and fertility rates in Part C of this publication (Tables 28, 29, 30 and 31) are 1993 population projections. These projections are based on 1991

experimental estimates of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population. For more information contact Andrew Howe on (06) 252 7083.

Additional statistics available

23. In some cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published.
