CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) undertook reduced processing of marriage and divorce data in 1995. Full processing was resumed for 1996 marriage and available divorce data. (See paragraph 24 of the Explanatory Notes for further detail.)

REVISIONS

In 1994, children data for Victoria (divorce collection) were found to be understated and hence numbers were suppressed for that State and Australia. These data have been finalised in this issue for both Victoria and Australia (see paragraph 26 of Explanatory Notes).

PLEASE NOTE

Because of the complexity and variety of concepts included in this publication, users are advised to consult both the Explanatory Notes and Glossary for clarification.

Final figures for births and deaths may differ slightly from those used to compile natural increase for population estimates because it is necessary to use preliminary births and deaths data when finalising population estimates.

Australia details for population, births and deaths include Other Territories (see paragraph 2 of the Explanatory Notes).

ESTIMATED RESIDENT POPULATION

The estimated resident population of Victoria at 31 December 1996 was 4,581,600. This was an increase of 9.5% over the last 10 years.

The median age of people resident in Victoria at 30 June 1996 was 33.9 years, almost one year higher than that for the resident Australian population, which was 33.0 years.

OVERSEAS MIGRATION

In 1996, Victoria experienced a net gain of 26,714 people from overseas migration (permanent and long term). All States and Territorics experienced a net overseas migration gain in 1996, the total gain for Australia being 111,157.

INTERSTATE MIGRATION

More people left Victoria for other parts of Australia than settled in Victoria in 1996. The net loss to Victoria from Interstate migration was 13,822 persons. The State recording the highest intake of persons from Victoria in 1996 was Queensland (27,655 persons or 38% of all interstate departures from Victoria).

BIRTHS

Registration basis

In 1996 there were 61,143 births registered in Victoria, a rate of 13.5 births per 1,000 population which was slightly below the Australian rate of 13.9 births per 1,000 population.

The total fertility rate has, over the last 10 years, fluctuated around 1.8 children per woman. In 1996, the total fertility rate in Victoria decreased to 1.7 children per woman and is lower than the rate of 1.8 recorded for Australia.

The peak age group for mothers giving birth in Victoria was 30–34 years with a birth rate of 113 per 1,000 mothers . This is reflected in the increasing median age of Victorian mothers over the previous ten years. Prior to 1996, the peak age group was 25-29 years. The birth rate for this age group has decreased from 141 per 1,000 mothers in 1986 to 112 per 1,000 mothers in 1996.

Ex-nuptial births represented 22% of all births registered in Victoria in 1996 (13,210) compared with 12% in 1986 (7,395).

Occurrence basis

In 1996, a total of 60,727 births occurred in Victoria, compared with 60,610 in 1986, an increase of 0.2%. The number of births occurring each year has decreased since 1992.

The highest number of births occurred in the month of October (5,449) and the lowest in December (4,830).

DEATHS

Registration basis

The number of deaths registered in Victoria in 1996 was 32,726, a rate of 7.2 deaths per 1,000 population.

The standardised death rate in Victoria in 1996 was 6.3 per 1,000 standard population, compared with a standardised rate of 7.5 per 1,000 in 1986.

The median age at death was 74.7 years for men and 81.3 years for women. By comparison the 1986 medians were 71.5 years and 78.4 years, respectively.

The infant mortality rate was 5.0 per 1,000 live births compared with 8.6 in 1986.

Occurrence basis

In 1996, a total of 32,231 deaths occurred in Victoria. This was a 6.2% increase on the number occurring in 1986.

The highest number of deaths in 1996 occurred in the month of July (3,222) and the lowest in December (2,313).

The number of infant deaths which occurred in 1996 was 289, a decrease of 42% from 1986.

MARRIAGES

There were 26,074 marriages registered in Victoria in 1996. This was 11% less than the number registered in 1986, which was 29,390.

In 1996 the crude marriage rate of 5.7 per 1,000 population continued the downward trend which commenced in 1972.

The median at first marriage age was 27.8 years for men and 26.0 years for women, compared with 25.7 years and 23.7 years respectively in 1986.

DIVORCES

In Victoria in 1996 there were 12,491 divorces granted compared with 9,670 in 1986.

Men and women divorcing in 1996 were older than men and women divorcing in 1986. In 1996, the median age at divorce was 40.0 years for men and 37.3 years for women. The comparative medians in 1986 were 37.3 years and 34.7 years respectively.

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SECTION 1

DEMOGRAPHIC SUMMARY

POPULATION

At 31 December 1996, the estimated resident population of Victoria was 4,581,600. This represents a growth of 0.9% for the year. Northern Territory and Queensland had the highest growth at 2.2% and Tasmania had virtually zero growth. The population of Australia increased by 1.3% to 18,426,900.


COMPONENTS OF POPULATION CHANGE

While the Victorian population was 25% of the Australian population, its total growth of 43,079 in 1996 represents only 18% of the Australian growth. The smaller percentage for total growth was predominantly caused by an interstate migration loss of 13,822 which was mainly to Queensland where there was an interstate migration gain of 33,817. This interstate migration loss increased significantly from 1990 reaching a peak of 32,000 in 1993.

BIRTHS AND CONFINEMENTS

The Victorian births registration figure of 61,143 for 1996 includes 61,121 births to Victorian mothers and 22 births which occurred in Victoria where the usual residence of the mother was overseas. Residents of Melbourne Statistical Division accounted for 72% (44,054 births) of all Victorian births.

The average fertility rate for Victoria was 1.754 in the period from 1994 to 1996. This represents the average number of children each woman would bear if the current birth rates continued during their child-bearing lifetimes. The highest total fertility rate for a statistical division was 2.280 in Mallee (SD), while the lowest fertility rate was 1.650 in Melbourne (SD).

SECTION 2

POPULATION

Estimated Resident Population


The population of Victoria passed the one million mark in 1887, two million in 1945, three million in 1962 and four million in 1982.

At 31 December 1996, the estimated resident population of Victoria was 4,581,600 comprising 2,262,900 males and 2,318,700 females.

Population change

In 1996 the population of Victoria increased by 40,927 persons (or 0.9%). This was due to gains of 28,035 from natural increase and 26,714 from net overseas migration and a loss of 13,822 from net interstate migration. The following graph shows the contribution of the three components of change in the total population of Victoria since 1986.


COMPONENTS OF POPULATION INCREASE



Age distribution

Estimated resident population by age at 30 June 1996 shows the continuance of the trend toward an ageing of the State's population. In 1996 the proportion of aged persons (those aged 65 years and over) in Victoria was 12.5% compared to 9.2% in 1976. In contrast, the proportion of children (persons aged less than 15 years) in Victoria is decreasing. In 1996 the proportion of children in Victoria was 20.8% while the figure for 1976 was 27.0%.






Tourism

The impact of tourism to and from Australia is reflected in statistics of short term movement (i.e. overseas arrivals and departures for less than 12 months). In 1996, there were 543,100 short-term visitors to Victoria and 641,600 Victorian residents departing for overseas for less than 12 months. The corresponding figures for 1986 were 234,900 and 390,100 respectively.

In 1996, the major source countries of overseas visitors to Victoria were New Zealand (19.3%), United Kingdom (including Ireland) (10.7%), United States of America (9.9%) and Japan (8.5%).



BIRTHS - YEAR OF REGISTRATION

BIRTHS -- YEAR OF REGISTRATION

In 1996 there were 61,121 live births registered (in Australia) to mothers whose usual residence was in Victoria and 22 births registered in Victoria where the usual residence of the mother was overseas. The crude birth rate was 13.5 births per 1,000 of total population. The sex ratio was 107 males born for every 100 females. The *total fertility rate*, expressed as the number of children one woman would expect to bear during her child-bearing lifetime, decreased from 1.8 to 1.7 in 1996. This is lower than the Australian total fertility rate of just under 1.8 children per woman and is the second lowest in the country.

CRUDE BIRTH RATE



Ex-nuptial births

There were 13,210 ex-nuptial births registered in 1996. The proportion of ex-nuptial births to total births decreased slightly from 21.8% in 1995 to 21.6% in 1996. This proportion varied considerably between Melbourne Statistical Division (SD) (19.4%) and the remainder of Victoria (27.3%) . The highest ex-nuptial percentage was found in East Gippsland SD (31.6%), followed by Gippsland SD (30.2%).


EX-NUPTIAL BIRTHS, Proportion of Total Births



Teenage mothers

The highest proportion of ex-nuptial confinements occur to younger women. In 1996, 87% of the 1,954 confinements occurring to teenage mothers were ex-nuptial. This proportion decreased to 47% for women in the 20-24 year age group and to 12% for women in the 30-34 year age group. The proportion of ex-nuptial births to total births for mothers at each age is shown in the following chart.

Paternity acknowledgment

The proportion of ex-nuptial births where the father is acknowledged has steadily increased from 69% in 1986 to 86% in 1996 (19% of total births).


Multiple births

The 61,143 Victorian births resulted from 60,294 confinements of which 847 confinements gave rise to multiple births (1 in every 71 confinements). This included 825 sets of twins, which was a similar proportion (1.4%) of total confinements as in 1995. In 1996, 22 sets of triplets were born.

Nuptial first births (to current marriage)

The highest proportion of nuptial first births occurred during the second year of marriage (22%), while 17% occurred in the third year and another 15% within the first year. Almost 7% of mothers had their first child of their current marriage after eight or more years of marriage. The median age of mothers at the birth of the first child of their current marriage continues to increase steadily, and reached 29.1 years in 1996. Mothers aged 30 years and over contributed 42% of nuptial first births in 1996, compared with 24% in 1986.

NUPTIAL FIRST CONFINEMENTS, Duration of Marriage




Previous children

In 1996, 41% of married mothers had no previous children, while 36% of married mothers had one previous child. The average number of children per mother (including the current birth) was 1.9 which has varied only marginally since 1986.

Median ages of parents (nuptial confinements)

The median ages of both parents in nuptial confinements have continued to increase which continues the trend that has been in evidence in the past two decades. In 1996, the median age at birth of child was 30.5 years for married mothers and 32.8 years for married fathers.

Country of birth of parents

Of all nuptial confinements registered in 1996, 61% were to parents who were both born in Australia, 15% were to parents born in the same overseas country and 19% were where one parent was born in Australia and the other parent was born overseas. The remaining 4% were to parents who were born in different overseas countries.

SECTION 4

BIRTHS — YEAR OF OCCURRENCE (PRELIMINARY)

There were 60,727 births in Victoria which occurred in 1996 and have been registered up to the present time. This represents a 3% decline from the total number of births occurring in 1995 which itself experienced a 2.4% decline from the previous year. The number of births occurring in Victoria each year has generally been in decline since 1971 and reached a recent peak of 66,565 in 1990.

Birth trends are more meaningful when based on year of occurrence rather than year of registration data because a proportion of births that occur in each calendar year, particularly those occurring towards the end of the year, are not registered until the following year or even later. Based on data for previous years, it is estimated that about 11% of births that occurred in 1996 would not have been registered in 1996. However, only a small percentage would not have been registered by the time the tables in this section were produced.


Month of occurrence

The number of births that occur each year varies considerably from month to month, ranging between 4,800 and 5,500 births per month in 1996. October had the largest proportion of births (9.0%) and December the smallest (8.0%). March and October between them have had the highest proportion of births over the past ten years.

Day of occurrence

Of the births occurring in 1996 that were registered in the same year more occurred on Thursdays (16%) than other days of the week, and less births occurred during the weekend (10.6% on Sundays and 11.7% on Saturdays). This pattern of daily births occurs consistently from one year to the next, as shown in the following graph.


BIRTHS BY DAY OF WEEK-1995 AND 1996



Age group of mother

Women aged 25-29 years and 30-34 years both made the highest contribution (33% each) to Victorian births in 1996. The proportion of births to women aged 30 years and over has increased from 34% in 1986 to 49% in 1996. In contrast, the proportion of births to women aged less than 25 years has decreased from 26% in 1986 to 17% in 1996.



SECTION 5

DEATHS — YEAR OF REGISTRATION

There were 32,665 deaths of Victorian residents registered (in Australia) in 1996 and 61 deaths registered in Victoria where the usual residence of the deceased was overseas. The crude death rate was 7.2 deaths per 1,000 of total population. The 1996 total comprised 17,009 males and 15,717 females, a sex ratio of 108 males per 100 females.

CRUDE DEATH RATE



Infant Deaths

There were 308 infant deaths registered in 1996, a rate of 5.0 deaths per 1,000 live births, a 42% decrease since 1986. The infant death rate first dropped below 100 (per 1,000 live births) in 1900, then below 50 in 1929, below 20 in 1954 and below 10 in 1981. Almost 40% of infant deaths occurred during the first day of life and two-thirds occurred within the first month. The sex ratio of infant deaths was 138.8 males for every 100 females compared with the sex ratio at birth of 106.9 males for every 100 females.







Age at death

Male deaths generally outnumbered female deaths until age 80. The highest ratio at death in 1996 was 345 males per 100 females in the 20-24 year age group. The age group 80 years and over accounted for 55% of all female deaths, but only 33% of all male deaths. There were 141 females and 25 males who died at age 100 years or older.

Life expeniency


The life expectancy at birth in Victoria in 1994-6 is 81.2 years for females and 75.6 years for males. The corresponding figures in 1971 were 75.2 years and 68.6 years respectively. The increase in life expectancy since 1971 is mainly due to decreasing mortality rates from degenerative diseases (other than cancer) and the dramatic decline in the infant death rate, particularly during the perinatal period.



Major causes of death

The leading cause of death in Victoria in 1996 was cancer (*Malignant neoplasms*) which accounted for 27.7% of all deaths. This represents 29.6% of male deaths and 25.6% of female deaths. Heart attack (*Ischaemic beart disease*) accounted for 22.3% of all deaths, representing 22.9% of male deaths and 21.5% of female deaths. Deaths due to *Cerebrovascular disease* (including stroke) resulted in 7.5% of male deaths and 11.9% of female deaths.

LEADING CAUSES OF DEATH



AiDS-related deaths refer to those cases where AIDS was mentioned on the Medical Certificate of Cause of Death. There were 134 AIDS-related deaths (128 males and 6 females) of Victorian residents registered in 1996. This represents a decrease of 13% from the 1995 total of 154 deaths (139 males and 15 females). Of the 134 AIDS-related deaths in 1996, 57% (76) were in the age group 30-44 years.

Suicide

There were 500 suicide deaths of Victorian residents registered in 1996, including 388 male deaths and 112 female deaths. This compares with 566 suicide deaths (439 males and 127 females) in 1995 and 519 suicide deaths (378 males and 141 females) in 1986.

The most frequent method of suicide for males was *Hanging, strangulation and suffocation* (144 deaths) followed by *Poisoning by other gases and vapours* (including motor vehicle exhaust gas) (134 deaths). Deaths from Firearms and explosives accounted for 77 deaths, a slight increase from the 1995 figure of 72 deaths. The most frequent method of suicide for females was *Poisoning by liquid or solid substances* (38 deaths), followed by *Hanging, strangulation and suffocation* and *Poisoning by other gases and vapours* each with 28 deaths.

In 1996, males aged 25-44 years had the highest rate of suicide with 26.0 deaths per 100,000 population, which was very similar to the rate for males in 1986 of 26.1 suicide deaths per 100,000 population. The highest rate of suicide for females, in 1996, was in the same age group with 6.7 deaths per 100,000 population, compared with 5.2 suicide deaths per 100,000 population in 1986. The number of suicides by females increased significantly from 1985 (83) to 1986 (141) with the highest rate of suicide for females, in 1986, occurring in the 45-64 year age group (12.5 deaths per 100,000 population).

Motor vehicle traffic accidents

Motor vehicle traffic accidents accounted for 410 deaths (296 males and 114 females) of Victorian residents in 1996, compared with 436 deaths (302 males and 134 females) in 1995 and 744 deaths (547 males and 197 females) in 1986. The most common motor vehicle traffic accident deaths involved a *Collision with another vehicle* (173 deaths). There were also 63 deaths involving a *Collision with a pedestrian* and 103 deaths involving *Other collisions on the highway*. The age group 15-29 years accounted for 42% of male deaths (123) and 34% of female deaths (39) from motor vehicle traffic accidents.


DEATHS—YEAR OF OCCURRENCE (PRELIMINARY)

In Victoria, there were 32,231 registered deaths that occurred in 1996. This was a marginal decrease on the number of deaths occurring in 1995 (32,407).

Death trends are more meaningful when based on year of occurrence rather than year of registration data because a proportion of deaths that occur in each calendar year, particularly those occurring towards the end of the year, are not registered until the following year or even later. They could also be affected by any abnormal delays or fluctuations in the registration processes. Based on data for previous years, it is estimated that about 5% of deaths that occurred in 1996 would not have been registered in 1996. However, only a small percentage would not have registered by the time the tables in this section were produced.

Month of occurrence

The 32,231 deaths which occurred in 1996 average out over the whole year at 88 deaths per day. The highest monthly total of 3,222 deaths occurred in July which averaged 104 deaths per day, while August was the second highest with 2,927 deaths or 94 deaths per day. The summer months of December and February had the lowest totals of 2,313 and 2,410 with daily averages of 75 and 83 respectively.


In 1996 there were 26,074 marriages registered in Victoria, compared with 26,607 in 1995 and 29,390 in 1986. The number of marriages registered has declined each year since 1988, the 1996 figure being the lowest since 1964. The long-term downward trend in the crude marriage rate (the number of marriages per 1,000 population) has continued. In 1996 this rate was 5.7 per 1,000 population, the lowest rate since 1931 during the Great Depression. The highest rate recorded this century was 12.1 per 1,000 population in 1942 during World War II. In 1996 the national rate was 5.8 per 1,000 population.



AGE AT FIRST MARRIAGE

The age at first marriage in Victoria continues to increase steadily. The median ages for men and women marrying for the first time in 1996 was 27.8 years for men and 26.0 years for women. The median age is the age at which there are as many marrying above the age as there are marrying below it. The lowest median ages at first marriage this century, 23.4 years for men and 21.2 years for women, were recorded in the early seventies. In first marriages in 1996, 33% of bridegrooms and 23% of brides were aged 30 years or more compared with 19% and 10% respectively in 1986.

MEDIAN AGE AT MARRIAGE, Selected Marital Status




AGE SPECIFIC MARRIAGE RATES

Between 1986 and 1996 age-specific marriage rates (per 1,000 population) decreased for men and women in most age groups. While the peak age group for men remained 25–29 years, the rate declined slightly over this period. The 20–24 year age group for men experienced the largest decline in the marriage rate, decreasing by 52% from 1986 to 1996. Over the same period, the peak age group for women increased from 20–24 years to 25–29 years. The largest decline in age-specific marriage rates since 1986, occurred in the 20–24 year age group which decreased by 42%.

DAY AND MONTH OF MARRIAGE

Saturday is traditionally the most popular day of the week for marriage, and 66% of marriages registered in 1996 were celebrated on a Saturday, 20% were celebrated on a Sunday and 7% on a Friday. The most popular month for marriage in 1996 was March with 3,723 marriages celebrated followed by November with 3,262. The least popular month in 1996 was July with 965 marriages celebrated.

PREVIOUS MARITAL STATUS

Of all marriages registered in Victoria in 1996, 69% were the first marriage for both partners. In 11% of all marriages, both partners were previously divorced.

CATEGORY OF CELEBRANT

Between 1976 and 1996 the percentage of marriages performed in Victoria by ministers of religion declined from 73% to 55%. More than half of this decline occurred between 1976 and 1986 when the corresponding figure was 62%. Of these marriages in 1996, 86% of men and 88% of women had never been in a registered marriage. By comparison, of those people married by civil celebrants (45% of all marriages) 65% of men and 67% of women had never been in a registered marriage.

In 1996, 22% of all marriages performed in Victoria were by Catholic priests while 11% were by Anglican ministers.

BIRTHPLACE OF PARTIES

Of the marriages registered in Victoria in 1996, the birthplaces of the parties to these marriages were as follows: 65% were between Australian-born couples; 14% were between couples born overseas; 9% were between Australian men and non-Australian women; 12% were between Australian women and non-Australian men. Of those marriages between overseas-born couples, two-thirds were between couples born in the same country.


SECTION 8

DIVORCES GRANTED

There were 12,491 divorces granted in 1996, compared with 11,838 in 1995 and 9,670 in 1986. The figure for 1996 is the highest since 1976, when 16,633 divorces were granted, which was immediately after the introduction of the *Commonwealth Family Law Act* (1975) in January 1976.

The crude divorce rate in 1996 was 2.8 per 1,000 population, continuing the slight upward trend established since 1987 when the crude divorce rate was 2.3 per 1,000 population.

CRUDE DIVORCE RATE




DURATION OF MARRIAGE

Of couples who divorced in 1996, 47% had separated within seven years of marriage, and 24% separated within three years. The most common interval was between one and two years. The median interval between marriage and separation was 7.6 years and the median interval between marriage and divorce was 10.8 years. The same median intervals for Australia were 7.6 years and 11.0 years respectively.

AGE AT DIVORCE AND FINAL SEPARATION

The median age at divorce (the age at which there are as many divorcing above it as there are divorcing below it) for both men and women continued to rise in 1996. The median age at divorce for men was 40.0 years in 1996 compared with 37.3 years in 1986. For women, the median age at divorce was 37.3 years in 1996 compared with 34.7 years in 1986. The median age at final separation for men divorcing in 1996 was 36.7 years compared with 34.6 years in 1986. For women, the median age at final separation was 34.0 years in 1996 compared with 31.9 years in 1986.


MEDIAN AGE AT DIVORCE



MONTH OF SEPARATION

For divorces granted in 1996 the month during which most couples separated was January (10.5%). January has consistently been the most common month of separation for people who became divorced. The corresponding percentages for the three previous years were 10.3% (1993), 10.1% (1994) and 10.2% (1995).

MONTH OF SEPARATION




SEX OF APPLICANT

In 1996, 21% of divorces were the result of joint applications by both husband and wife compared with 6% in 1986. Husbands lodged 34% and wives lodged 46% of all divorces granted in 1996. Comparative percentages for 1986 were 40% and 53% respectively.

DIVORCES INVOLVING CHILDREN UNDER 18

At the time of application for divorce 52% of divorces granted in Victoria in 1996 involved at least one child under the age of 18 years (59% in 1986). The 12,491 divorces granted in 1996 involved 12,019 children compared to 11,159 children involved in 9,670 divorces in 1986.

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EXPLANATORY NOTES.....

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication brings together a number of closely related series of statistics on demography including births, deaths, marriages and divorces. It also includes information on the estimated resident population and migration. For details of publication of other data related to demography, see Related Publications, at the end of these notes.
- **2** As a result of an amendment, made in 1992 to the Acts Interpretation Act, the Indian Ocean Territories of Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands have been included as part of geographic Australia, hence another category of the State and Territory classification has been created. This category, known as Other Territories, includes Christmas Island, the Cocos (Keeling) Islands and Jervis Bay Territory. Australia details for population, births and deaths include Other Territories.
- **3** Details of persons who were usually resident, or were born or died while being usually resident in Jervis Bay Territory have been, where possible, excluded from this publication from 1990 onwards. These numbers are statistically insignificant. Marriages registered and divorces granted in the Australian Capital Territory do not necessarily exclude persons resident in Jervis Bay Territory.

POPULATION

4 This section consists of estimates of the resident population (ERP), with information on overseas arrivals and departures and net interstate migration.

Population estimates

5 Estimates of the population of Victoria are made to varying degrees of accuracy throughout the year, and this publication has used the latest 1991 based estimates for each particular table.

MIGRATION

Overseas migration

6 Data on overseas arrivals and departures relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than to the number of travellers. However, the statistics exclude the movements of operational air crew and ships' crew, transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia.

Interstate migration

7 Data on interstate migration has been derived from aggregated statistical information on interstate changes of address advised to the Health Insurance Commission in the process of administering Medicare. The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) adjusts the Health Insurance Commission data to make allowance for the number of persons who do not inform the Commission of their change of residence. Further details are available in *Information Paper: Demographic Estimates — Concepts, Sources and Methods* (3228.0).

BIRTHS

- **8** Birth statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the mother, regardless of where in Australia the birth occurred or was registered.
- **9** Births to mothers usually resident in Australia which took place overseas are excluded. Births to mothers usually resident overseas which occurred in Australia are included in the State or Territory where the birth occurred.
- **10** Data presented in section 3 of this publication refer to births registered during the calendar year shown. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a birth, and, as a result of delay in registration, some births occurring in one year are not registered until the following year, or even later. However, most births are registered soon after they occur. More than 99% of births occurring in one year are registered by 30 June of the following year. Data presented in section 4 show the number of births occurring in a particular year.
- **11** Data on stillbirths (fetal deaths) may be found in summary form in section 5 of the publication.
- **12** The live birth statistics used to calculate the fetal and neonatal death rates have been adjusted (in accordance with the World Health Organisation definition of perinatal death) to exclude cases where the birthweight was known to be less than 500 grams. However, infant death rates are calculated using all live births registered because figures are not available for infants who weighed less than 500 grams at birth and who lived for 28 days, but died before they were one year old.
- **13** Death statistics are presented on the basis of the State or Territory of usual residence of the deceased, regardless of where in Australia the death occurred or was registered.
- **14** Data presented in section 5 of this publication refer to deaths registered during the year shown. There is usually an interval between the occurrence and registration of a death, and as a result some deaths are not registered in the year in which they occur. However, most deaths are registered within six months of occurrence. More than 99% of deaths occurring in one year have been registered by 30 June of the following year. Data presented in section 6 show the number of deaths occurring in a particular year.
- **15** Life tables are shown in tables 5.4 and 5.5 and summarise expectation of life. From 1995 onward these life tables are based on deaths occurring in the reference and previous two years. They are produced at the Australian and State and Territory level as a joint venture between the ABS and the Australian Government Actuary. These life tables are known as the Australian Actuary/Australian Bureau of Statistics Life Tables. Before 1995 life tables shown in this publication were prepared by the ABS. The Australian Government Actuary also constructed life tables based on deaths occurring during the three years around and including the census year. The latest life tables prepared by the Australian Government Actuary were based on deaths during 1990 and 1992. These were released in 1995 and copies are available from the Commonwealth government Bookshops or the Mail Order Sales Service.

DEATHS

MARRIAGES

- **16** Marriage statistics refer to marriages registered by the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages of Victoria during the years shown. There is usually an interval between the celebration and the registration of a marriage. As a result of the delay in registration, some marriages celebrated in one year are not registered until the following year. Under the *Australian Marriage Act 1961*, marriages may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month, and within six calendar months, before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration to a District Registrar in the State in which the marriage took place.
- 17 In 1973, the minimum age at which a person may marry without parental consent was reduced from 21 to 18 years, although women were legally free to marry from 16 years with parental consent. Further amendment to the Marriage Act in 1991 designated the minimum age at which both sexes are legally free to marry to be 18 years. Persons between the ages of 16 and 18 years may marry with parental or guardian consent and an order from a judge or magistrate. Any two persons under the age of 18 years may not marry each other.

DIVORCES

- **18** All divorce data in this publication, with the exception of data in Appendix D, are for State or Territory of registration, based on the location of the Family Court where the divorce was granted and registered.
- **19** Divorce statistics shown in Appendix D are based on the State or Territory of usual residence at the time of separation. This takes account of some Family Courts having responsibility for hearing divorce cases relating to other States or Territories. The ACT Family Court hears cases from most of south-eastern New South Wales and part of Victoria. State or Territory of usual residence data are only available for 1993 and 1994 due to a decision taken by the Family Court in 1995. See paragraph 24 for more information.
- **20** Under the *Family Law Act 1975*, the only ground on which a divorce may be granted is that of irretrievable breakdown of the marriage. This ground is established by the husband and wife having lived apart for 12 months or more, and there being no reasonable likelihood of reconciliation. Application for nullity of marriage under Family Law legislation must be on the ground that there was a failure to meet a legal requirement, such as that neither party be already lawfully married to another person. There is no provision for judicial separation under Family Law legislation.
- **21** Successful applicants for a divorce are initially granted a decree *nisi*. This becomes absolute after one month, unless it is rescinded or appealed against, or the Court is not satisfied that proper arrangements have been made for the welfare of any children involved.
- **22** The statistics shown in this publication are compiled by the ABS from information supplied by the Family Court in respect of each application which resulted in the granting of a decree absolute.
- **23** In the interpretation of data, it is important to bear in mind that the availability of judges and the complexity of the cases brought before them can affect the number of decrees granted or made absolute in any one year. A rise in numbers may reflect only the clearing of a backlog of cases from an earlier period.

DIVORCES (continued)

- **24** The Family Court of Australia introduced new divorce application forms in February 1995. With the introduction of these forms some data items that had been collected ceased to be available. The data items that are no longer available are:
- Characteristics of the divorce:
 - postcode and State or Territory of separation;
 - rite of marriage; and
 - number of children aged over 18 years.
- Characteristics of the husband and wife:
 - previous marital status at marriage;
 - number of previous marriages;
 - occupation at separation;
 - date of first arrival in Australia; and
 - duration of residence.
- **25** In light of the Family Court decision and ABS budgetary considerations, only limited data on divorces registered in 1995 were processed. The data items were State or Territory of registration; date of birth of parties; age of parties at marriage, separation and divorce; duration of marriage until separation and divorce; and sex of applicant. With the exception of those data items which the Family Court no longer collects, ABS resumed full processing for 1996 divorce data. To assist in analysis of 1995 data, additional tables of divorce characteristics available from complete 1994 data have been included in Appendix D.
- **26** In 1994, it was found that the number of children involved in divorce was understated for Victoria. This necessitated the suppression of this data for that State and Australia. The Victorian Registry and ABS investigated the shortage and finalised children data for 1994 are shown in this issue. Children data for 1995, for all States and Territories, were not processed due to budgetary considerations.

GEOGRAPHIC BOUNDARIES

- **27** The geographic boundaries for small area data are defined in the *Statistical Geography: Volume 1 Australian Standard Geographical Classification*, (ASGC), *Edition 5* (1216.0).
- **28** The boundaries used for birth and death statistics are the Statistical Local Area boundaries at 1 July 1996.

COUNTRY OF BIRTH

- **29** The classification of countries in this publication is the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS). For more detailed information refer to the ABS publication *Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics* (ASCCSS) (1269.0).
- **30** Political developments in Europe, the Former USSR and Africa have resulted in a number of changes to the ASCCSS. These changes have affected some of the categories in this publication and are detailed in Revisions 1.01, 1.02 and 1.03 of the ASCCSS.

GENERAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

31 ABS publications draw extensively on information provided freely by individuals, businesses, governments and other organisations. Their continued cooperation is very much appreciated: without it, the wide range of statistics published by the ABS would not be available. GLOSSARY

Age-specific birth rates

Age-specific birth rates are the number of live births registered during the calendar year, according to age of mother, per 1,000 of the female estimated resident population of the same age as estimated for at 30 June. For calculating these rates, births to mothers under 15 are included in the 15–19 age group, and births to mothers aged 50 and over are included in the 45–49 age group. Pro rata adjustment is made in respect of births for which age of mother is not given.

Age-specific death rates

Age-specific death rates are the number of deaths at a specified age per 1,000 of the estimated resident population of that age at 30 June. The infant mortality rate is used for the age-specific rate for children under one year of age. Pro rata adjustment is made in respect of deaths for which the age of deceased is not given.

Age-specific divorce rates

Two different populations are used in the calculation of age-specific divorce rates:

- Per 1,000 population at 30 June this relates the number of divorces, by age at decree made absolute, to the estimated resident population in specific age groups. Males under 18 and females under 16 are excluded from the population.
- Per 1,000 married population at 30 June this relates the number of divorces by age at decree made absolute, to the married population in specific age groups. Those classified as permanently separated are included in the married population. Males and females under 15 are excluded from the population.

Age-specific marriage rates

Two different populations are used in the calculation of age-specific marriage rates:

- Per 1,000 population at 30 June this relates the number of marriages, by age at marriage, to the estimated resident population in specific age groups.
 Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.
- Per 1,000 not currently married population at 30 June this relates the number of marriages, by age at marriage, to the not currently married population in specific age groups. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.

Birth

The delivery of a child, irrespective of the duration of the pregnancy, who after being born, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat.

Category of movement

Overseas arrivals and departures are classified according to length of stay (in Australia or overseas), recorded in months and days by travellers on passenger cards.

There are three main categories of movement:

- permanent movements
- long-term movements (one year or more)
- short-term movements (less than one year).

A significant number of travellers (i.e. overseas visitors to Australia on arrival and Australian residents going abroad) state exactly 12 months or one year as their intended period of stay. Many of them stay for less than that period and on their

Category of movement continued

departure from, or return to, Australia are therefore classified as short-term.

Accordingly in an attempt to maintain consistency between arrivals and departures, movements of travellers who report their actual or intended period of stay as being one year exactly are randomly allocated to long-term or short-term in proportion to the number of movements of travellers who report their actual length of stay as up to one month more, or one month less, than one year.

Children (divorce collection)

Children in the divorce collection are unmarried children of the marriage who were aged under 18 years at the time of application for divorce. Under the *Family Law Act 1975*, these may include (in certain cases) adopted and ex-nuptial children and children from a former marriage. Children who are married or aged 18 years or more are not subject to custody and guardianship orders and are excluded.

Children (marriage collection)

Children in the marriage collection refer to persons under 16 years of age born from previous marriages. The term children should not be confused with the term previous births used in births data (see Previous births).

Confinement

A pregnancy which results in at least one live birth.

Crude birth rate

The crude birth rate is the number of live births registered during the calendar year, per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June of that year. For years prior to 1994, the crude birth rate is based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year.

Crude death rate

The crude death rate is the number of deaths registered during the calendar year, per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June of that year. For years prior to 1994, the crude death rate is based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year.

Crude divorce rate

The crude divorce rate is the number of decrees absolute granted during the calendar year, per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June of that year. For years prior to 1994, the crude divorce rate is based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year. In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is unmarried or below the minimum age of marriage.

Crude marriage rate

The crude marriage rate is the number of marriages registered during the calendar year, per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June of that year. For years prior to 1994, the crude marriage rate is based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year. In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is below the minimum age of marriage or is already married.

Date of final separation

The date of final separation is that date, given on the application for divorce, from which the period of living apart is calculated for the purpose of establishing grounds for divorce. In determining the date of final separation, a single period of resumed cohabitation of less than three months may be ignored, provided the periods of living apart before and after resumed cohabitation amount to a total of 12 months or more.

Divorce

Decree absolute of dissolution of marriage.

Duration of marriage

Duration of marriage is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date of divorce.

Duration of marriage until separation

Duration of marriage until separation is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date of separation.

Estimated resident population

Estimated resident population data are quarterly estimates of the Australian population obtained by adding to the estimated population at the beginning of each period the components of natural increase (on a usual residence basis) and net overseas migration. For the States and Territories, account is also taken of estimated interstate movements involving a change of usual residence. After each census, estimates for the preceding intercensal period are revised by incorporating an additional quarterly adjustment (intercensal discrepancy) to ensure that the total intercensal increase agrees with the difference between the estimated resident populations at the two respective census dates.

Estimates of the resident population are based on adjusted (for underenumeration) census counts by place of usual residence, to which are added the number of Australian residents estimated to have been temporarily overseas at the time of the Census.

The concept of estimated resident population links people to a place of usual residence within Australia. Usual residence is that place where each person has lived or intends to live for six months or more in a reference year.

Rates shown in this publication for the years since 1974 are calculated using estimates of resident population. A description of the conceptual basis of the estimated resident population is contained in *Information Paper: Demographic Estimates — Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 3228.0). Revised population estimates are published in *Australian Demographic Statistics* (Cat. no. 3101.0) (issued quarterly).

Female Reproduction rate

The Female net reproduction rate makes allowance for all women not surviving until the end of the reproductive period. It represents the average number of daughters born to a group of women who are subject to the fertility rates of that year and to the mortality rates of the life table. It indicates the extent to which the population would reproduce itself. The net reproduction rate is obtained by multiplying the female age-specific birth rates by the proportion of survivors at corresponding ages in a life table and adding the products.

Fetal death

The delivery of a child weighing at least 500 grams at delivery (or of at least 22 weeks gestation, if birthweight is unavailable) which did not, at any time after delivery, breathe or show any other evidence of life such as heartbeat.

Fetal death rate

The fetal death rate is the number of fetal deaths per 1,000 live births who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or of at least 22 weeks gestation, if birthweight was unavailable), plus fetal deaths combined.

First marriage rates

First marriage rates are the number of men and women, in an age group, marrying for the first time per 1,000 (mid-year) population of never married men and women in the same age group.

Indigenous origin

Persons who identify as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.

Indigenous origin continued

An Indigenous birth refers to the birth of a live-born child where either the mother or the father has identified as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.

An Indigenous death refers to a death where the deceased was identified as being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.

Infant death

An infant death is the death of a live-born child who died when less than one year old.

Infant mortality rate

The number of deaths of children under one year of age in a calendar year per 1,000 live births in the same calendar year.

Life expectancy

Life expectancy refers to the average number of additional years a person of a given age and sex might expect to live if the age-specific death rates of the given period continued throughout his or her lifetime.

Long-term arrivals

Long-term arrivals comprise overseas visitors who intend to stay in Australia for 12 months or more (but not permanently) and Australian residents returning after an absence of 12 months or more overseas.

Long-term departures

Long-term departures comprise Australian residents who intend to stay abroad for 12 months or more (but not permanently) and overseas visitors departing who stayed 12 months or more in Australia.

Marital status

Two separate concepts are measured by the ABS. These are registered marital status and social marital status. They are different personal characteristics and are independent variables with separate classifications. Marital status in this publication relates to registered marital status which refers to formally registered marriages or divorces for which the partners hold a certificate.

Marriage

Under the *Australian Marriage Act 1961* (Cwlth), a marriage may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month but within six calendar months before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration to a district registrar in the State or Territory in which the marriage took place.

Median value

The median value (age, duration, interval) is that value which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, half falling below this value, and half exceeding it. Where the value for a particular record has not been stated, that record is excluded from the calculation.

Multiple birth

A multiple birth is a confinement which results in two or more issue, at least one of which is live-born.

Neonatal death

A neonatal death is the death within 28 days of birth of any child weighing at least 500 grams at delivery (or of at least 22 weeks gestation, if birthweight was unavailable) who after delivery, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as a heartbeat.

Neonatal death rate

The neonatal death rate is the number of neonatal deaths per 1,000 live births who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or at least 22 weeks gestation, if birthweight was unavailable).

Nuptial first confinement

A nuptial first confinement is the first confinement in the current marriage and therefore does not necessarily represent the woman's first ever confinement resulting in a live birth.

Nuptiality

Nuptiality relates to the relative marital status of parents. Confinements and births are identified as being nuptial where the father registered was married to the mother at the time of birth, or where the husband died during the pregnancy.

Paternity-acknowledged birth

A paternity-acknowledged birth refers to an ex-nuptial birth where paternity was acknowledged by the child's father.

Perinatal death

A perinatal death is either a fetal or a neonatal death, as elsewhere defined.

Perinatal death rate

The perinatal death rate is the number of perinatal deaths per 1,000 live births who weighed at least 500 grams at birth (or at least 22 weeks gestation, if birthweight was unavailable) plus fetal deaths combined.

Permanent arrivals (settlers)

Permanent arrivals (settlers) comprise travellers who hold migrant visas (regardless of stated intended period of stay), New Zealand citizens who indicate an intention to settle and those who are otherwise eligible to settle (e.g. overseas-born children of Australian citizens).

Permanent departures

Permanent departures are Australian residents (including former settlers) who on departure state that they do not intend to return to Australia.

Previous births

Previous births refer to children born alive (who may be still living or now dead) to a mother prior to the registration of the current birth. In some States and both Territories, legitimated and legally adopted children are included.

Previous births of the current marriage relates to nuptial births to the same parents prior to the current nuptial confinement.

All previous births of the mother includes all births prior to the current confinement, regardless of nuptiality and paternity.

Previous issue

See Previous births.

Remarriage rates

Remarriage rates are the number of remarrying men and women, of a certain age, per 1,000 (mid-year) population of widowed or divorced men and women of the same age.

Sex ratio

The sex ratio relates to the number of male events (births and deaths) per 100 female events.

SDR

See Standardised death rates.

Short-term arrivals

Short-term arrivals comprise overseas visitors whose intended stay in Australia is less than 12 months and Australian residents returning after and absence of less than 12 months overseas.

Short-term departures

Short-term departures comprise Australian residents whose intended period of stay abroad is less than 12 months and overseas visitors departing who stayed less than 12 months in Australia.

Standardised death rates

Standardised death rates enable the comparison of death rates between populations with different age structures by relating them to a standard population, in this case all persons in the 1991 Australian population. They are expressed per 1,000 persons. There are two methods of calculating standardised death rates:

- The *direct method* this is used when the populations under study are large and the age-specific death rates are reliable. It is the overall death rate that would have prevailed in the standard population if it had experienced at each age the death rates of the population under study. The direct method is used for comparing State and Territory and Australia rates.
- The indirect method this is used when the populations under study are small and the age-specific death rates are unreliable or not known. It is an adjustment to the crude death rate of the standard population to account for the variation between the actual number of deaths in the population under study and the number of deaths which would have occurred if the population under study had experienced the age-specific death rates of the standard population. The indirect method is used for comparison of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rates and Statistical Local Area rates.

State or Territory of registration

State or Territory of registration refers to the State or Territory in which the birth, death, or marriage was registered or the State or Territory in which the divorce was granted. For further information about how this affects divorce see paragraphs 18 to 19 of the Explanatory Notes.

State or Territory of usual residence


State or Territory of usual residence refers to the State or Territory of usual residence of:

- the population (estimated resident population);
- the mother (birth collection);
- the deceased (death collection); and
- the parties at separation (divorce collection). For further information about how this affects divorce see paragraphs 18 to 19 of the Explanatory Notes.

In the case of overseas movements State or Territory of usual residence refers to the State or Territory regarded by the traveller as the one in which he/she lives or has lived. State or Territory of intended residence is derived from the intended address given by settlers, and by Australian residents returning after a journey abroad. Particularly in the case of the former, this information does not necessarily relate to the State or Territory in which the person will eventually establish a permanent residence.

Total fertility rate

The total fertility rate represents the number of children one woman would bear if the age-specific birth rates of the year shown continued during her child-bearing lifetime. It is obtained by summing the five-year age-specific birth rates and multiplying by five.



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
