## OVERSEAS ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES MARCH 1973

This publication provides summary statistics of overseas arrivals in and departures from Australia during the month of March 1973 and the nine months ended March 1973 with comparable statistics for earlier periods. More detailed statistics are published quarterly – see Overseas Arrivals and Departures (Reference No. 4.1).

### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

Permanent movement consists of persons arriving in Australia with the stated intention of settling permanently in Australia, and Australian residents departing with the stated intention of residing permanently abroad. Settlers are persons who, on arrival in Australia, indicated that they came intending to settle. Former settlers are persons who, on departure from Australia, stated that they had come to Australia intending to settle, had stayed for a period of twelve months or more, and were now departing permanently.

2. Long-term movement (which is distinct from permanent movement) consists of the arrival of visitors and the departure of Australian residents with the stated intention of staying (in Australia or in a country abroad, respectively) for twelve months or more, and the departure of visitors and the return of Australian residents who have stayed (in Australia or in a country abroad, respectively) for in a country abroad, respectively) for twelve months or more.

3. Short-term movement consists of all other movements, including the movement of Australian troops irrespective of the period of stay, and U.S. troops visiting Australia on rest and recreation leave. The last U.S. troops to visit Australia under this scheme arrived in December 1971.

4. The statistics for December 1972 and later months are somewhat affected by two procedural changes, and are not strictly comparable with statistics for previous periods. From the beginning of December 1972, overseas passengers arriving at Sydney airport intending to proceed overseas on another flight without leaving the airport were encouraged to use a newly established transit area, and those who did so were excluded from the statistics of arriving and departing overseas visitors. The number so excluded is expected to exceed 1,500 per month. Also, beginning in the December quarter, the region and length of time within which ships' journeys out of and back to Australia are treated as "cruise" trips were extended. Passengers on such extended cruises, formerly included in statistics of short-term Australian residents, are expected to number about 6,000 per annum. The majority of cruises take place in the spring and summer months. These procedural changes will result in the passengers affected being included in the statistics of transit passengers through Australia by air, and of passengers returning from short pleasure cruises by sea, published in the Appendix to the quarterly issue of Overseas Arrivals and Departures (Reference No. 4.1).

5. Seasonally adjusted figures of total and short-term arrivals and departures are shown in Tables 2 and 5. In the adjustments, account is taken of "trading day" effects as well as normal seasonal factors. Details of the methods used and selected measures of variability are available on request and will be published in *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators – 1973* (Reference No. 1.10) to be issued shortly.

6. Statistics of characteristics of travellers in the short-term movement from April 1971 to September 1972 are estimates derived from a fifty per cent sample of short-term travellers. From October 1972, the sample comprises one-third of short-term movement. While the total number of such travellers and statistics of their mode of transport are fully known, statistics in various classifications, e.g. nationality, may differ from those that would be obtained from complete processing. A measure of this difference is given by the standard error. There are about 2 chances in 3 that the difference will be less than 1 standard error, and 19 chances in 20 that it will be less than 2 standard errors. The standard error varies with the size of the estimate and the following table shows the standard errors of various estimate sizes, based on samples of 1 in 2 (applicable to statistics up to September 1972) and 1 in 3 (applicable to statistics thereafter).

7. Statistics of permanent and long-term movement are based on records of all travellers in this movement and therefore do not contain sampling errors. However, since short-term movement is a component of *total* and *net total* movement, statistics of characteristics of travellers in such movements are subject to sampling errors.

8. A fuller description of the sampling procedures is published in the quarterly bulletin Overseas Arrivals and Departures (Reference No. 4.1).

9. A line drawn across a column between two consecutive figures indicates a break in the continuity of the series.

### COMMENT

10. In March 1973, overseas departures (103,465) exceeded overseas arrivals (89,058) by 14,407. Net losses occurred also in December 1972 (-18,674) and in March, April, May, June and August of that year. However, an excess of arrivals over departures in the first two months of 1973 (23,879 and 16,387) caused a net gain of 25,859 for the first quarter of 1973 as a whole. With reduced numbers of settlers arriving, the net gain in the March quarter 1973 although higher than the net gain in the March quarter 1972, is well below that of corresponding quarters in previous years.

11. Settler arrivals in March 1973 (9,655), while lower than in March 1972 (10,583), were the highest since last October. For the March quarter as a whole, settler arrivals (23,575) were well below those a year earlier (26,079) and below any quarter since September quarter 1963 (22,996). Assisted settlers arriving during the March quarter 1973 (11,214) were 2,525 less than those arriving in March quarter 1972; other settlers remained more or less at the same level. Departures recorded as former settlers (i.e. persons who state on departure that they had come to Australia intending to settle, had stayed for a year or more and are departing permanently), 7,123 for the three months ended March 1973, were below those for any quarter since June 1971 (6,697). However, the number of other Australian residents departing permanently continued to rise, the figures for the March quarter 1973 (3,494) exceeding the previous highest quarterly figure (3,304 in March quarter 1972).

12. The number of Australian residents leaving during March on trips lasting less than twelve months (45,741) was the highest for any March, and those leaving during the three months ending March 1973 (113,788) the highest for any March quarter. Nevertheless, the figures were below the peak attained in the June quarter 1972 (144,396). As a consequence, the numbers of Australian residents returning after visits abroad lasting less than a year (35,400 during March 1973, 153,122 during the three months ended March 1973) were the highest ever recorded.

13. The numbers of visitors arriving in March from overseas for stays of less than a year (37,594) were less than those arriving in March 1972 (38,812), but for the first three months of 1973 (118,924) exceeded the numbers during the March quarter twelve months earlier. After seasonal adjustment, however, the March quarter figures are below those for any quarter since June 1972. Short-term overseas visitors departing in the March quarter reached an all-time high of 144,853.
