## OVERSEAS ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES DECEMBER 1973

#### MAIN FEATURES

#### For the year 1973

- o Settler arrivals were 105,003. Since the present series began in 1959 the settler figure has been as low as this only in the three years 1959, 1961 and 1962.
- o The number of Australian residents returning after stays abroad was the highest ever. This includes increasing numbers of persons who had been overseas for a year or longer.
- The net movement of Australian residents on overseas visits of one year or more shows, for the first time on record, an excess of returns over departures, although slight.
- o The excess of total arrivals over total departures (40,418) is the second lowest since 1947, but represents an increase over 1972 (27,846).
- Overseas visitor arrivals (short-term) increased from 426,403 in 1972 to 472,124 - a 10.7 per cent increase.

For the month of December 1973 and December quarter 1973.

- o The net movement for the quarter (40.805) was almost the same as that for the year 1973, because the substaintial loss in June quarter (58,917) was offset by gains in the March and September quarters,
- o Overseas visitor arrivals (seasonally adjusted) increased in November and December, after declines from July to a low in October. The number of overseas visitors arriving (short-term) in December was 152,670, compared with 178,224 Australian residents departing (short-term).
- o Australian residents returning after stays abroad of one year or more (9,510 in December) were substantially greater than in the corresponding month in 1972 (7,762).

#### Introduction

This publication provides summary statistics of overseas arrivals in and departures from Australia during the month of December 1973 and the six months ended December 1973 with comparable statistics for earlier periods. More detailed statistics are published quarterly and annually — see Overseas Arrivals and Departures (Reference Nos 4.1 and 4.23).

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### **Definitions**

- 2. Permanent movement consists of persons arriving in Australia with the stated intention of settling permanently in Australia, and Australian residents departing with the stated intention of residing permanently abroad.
  - Settlers are persons who, on arrival in Australia, indicated that they came intending to settle.
  - Former settlers are persons who, on departure from Australia, Stated that they had come to Australia intending to settle, had stayed for a period of twelve months or more, and were non departing permanently.
  - Long-term movement (which is distinct from permanent movement) consists of the arrival of visitors and the departure of Australian residents with the stated intention of staying (in Australia or in a country abroad, respectively) for twelve months or more, and the departure of visitors and the return of Australian residents who have stayed (in Australia or in a country abroad, respectively) for twelve months or more.
  - Short-term movement consists of all other movements, including the movement of Australian troops irrespective of the period of stay.

### Procedural changes affecting comparability of series

- 3. The statistics for December 1972 and later months are affected by two procedural changes, and are not strictly comparable with statistics for previous periods. From the beginning of December 1972, overseas passengers arriving at Sydney airport intending to proceed overseas on another flight without leaving the airport were encouraged to use a newly established transit area, and those who did so were excluded from the statistics of arriving and departing overseas visitors. The number so excluded is believed to exceed 1,500 per month.
- 4. The second procedural change involves the treatment of passengers on pleasure cruises. As from 13 June 1972 the region within which ships' journeys may be treated as 'cruise' trips was extended from the south-west Pacific to ports adjoining the western Pacific and the eastern Indian Oceans; and the maximum length of such cruises was extended from 30 days to six weeks. About 6,000 passengers per annum embark on such extended cruises (that is, cruises to ports adjoining the western Pacific and eastern Indian Oceans). The majority of cruises take place in the spring and summer months. Before June 1972 passengers on these extended cruises would have been included in statistics of the short-term movement of Australian residents.
- 5. Passengers affected by these two procedural changes are included, respectively, in statistics of:
  - transit passengers through Australia by air
  - passengers returning from short pleasure cruises by sea.

These statistics are published in the Appendix to the quarterly issue of *Overseas Arrivals and Departures* (Reference No. 4.1)

#### Seasonally adjusted series.

6. Seasonally adjusted figures of total and short-term arrivals and departures are shown in Tables 2

and 5. In the adjustments, account is taken of "tradings day" effects as well as normal seasonal factors. Details of the methods used and selected measures of variability are available on request and were published in Seasonally Adjusted Indicators - 1973 (Reference No. 1.10).

#### Sampling aspects

- Statistics of characteristics of travellers in the short-term movement from April 1971 to September 1972 are estimates derived from a fifty per cent sample of short-term travellers. From October 1972 to November 1973 the sample comprises one-third of short-term movement. In December 1973 it comprises one quarter of short-term movement. While the total number of such travellers and statistics of their mode of transport are fully known, statistics in various classifications, (e.g. nationality) may differ from those that would be obtained from complete processing. A measure of this difference is given by the standard error. There are about 2 chances in 3 that the difference will be less than 1 standard error, and 19 chances in 20 that it will be less than 2 standard errors. The standard error varies with the size of the estimate and the table below shows the standard errors of various estimate sizes, based on samples of 1 in 2, 1 in 3, 1 in 4, applicable to the various periods covered in this publication.
- 8. Statistics of permanent and long-term movement are based on records of all travellers in this movement and therefore do not contain sampling errors. However, since short-term movement is a component of total and net total movement, statistics of characteristics of travellers in such movements are subject to sampling errors.
- 9. A fuller description of the sampling procedures is published in the quarterly bulletin Overseas Arrivals and Departures (Reference No. 4.1).

#### Presentation

10. A line drawn across a column between two consecutive figures indicates a break in the continuity of the series.
