RENTERS IN AUSTRALIA, APRIL 1994, PRELIMINARY

Introduction


During April 1994, the ABS conducted a survey throughout Australia to obtain information about the characteristics of people who are renters, boarders and those who live rent-free. The survey was based on a sample of approximately 35 000 dwellings. Information was sought, by interview (from persons aged 15 years and over) on demographic characteristics, employment status, nature of occupancy, housing costs, income, landlord type and rental history.

2. This publication contains preliminary information from the survey. Detailed information from the survey will be available in the publication *Renters in Australia*. *April 1994* (4138.0) which is expected to be released shortly.

Characteristics of rental tenants

- 3. In April 1994, 61 per cent of Australia's adult population either owned or were purchasing their home, while 25 per cent (3 400 100 persons) were renters or boarders. The remaining 14 per cent of people lived rent—free or had some other form of tenure.
- 4. Renters and boarders tend to be concentrated in the younger age ranges. More than half of all renters were aged between 20-34 years and the median age group for renters was 30-34 years. In contrast, 47 per cent of all owners and purchasers were aged between 30-49 years with the median age group being 45-49 years. Nearly 20 per cent of all owners and purchasers were aged 65 or more compared with only 7 per cent of renters and boarders. Those in the rent—free category also tended to be younger, with 75 per cent aged 15-24 years. A significant proportion of these would be children living in the family home.

Household characteristics

Owners and purchasers accounted for 73 per cent of the 6 468 800 households in Australia in April 1994. Renters made up 25 per cent, rent-free one per cent and other types of occupancy less than one per cent. These proportions are slightly different from those for persons. The main difference is the very low proportion of rent-free and boarder households. Most of the persons boarding or living rent-free do so as part of a wider household as opposed to being a household in their own right. Renters accounted for a far greater percentage of one parent, one person and other households than they did for couple households. Renters accounted for 46 per cent of one

parent households, 35 per cent of one person households and 46 per cent of other households, but only 16 per cent of all couple households.

For all households in all types of occupancy the most common type of dwelling was a separate house (80% of all households in Australia). Over 90 per cent of all owner and purchaser households lived in a separate house. However, the propensity for renting households to live in separate houses was much lower at just over 50 per cent.
