


## MAR QTR 1995 KEY POINTS

### TREND ESTIMATES

- GDP(A) increased 0.5% in March quarter 1995 to a level 4.1% higher than in March quarter 1994.
- While the growth rates of GDP(I), GDP(E) and GDP(P) have varied considerably over recent quarters, all measures of GDP have recorded slowing growth rates in the last three quarters.
- The terms of trade continued to improve in March quarter 1995 resulting in real gross domestic income increasing faster than GDP(A), (+0.9% in the March quarter).

### SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

- GDP(A) increased 0.5% in March quarter 1995 and is now 3.7% higher than in March quarter 1994.
- Both GDP(I) and GDP(P) grew 0.7% in the March quarter, while GDP(E) increased 0.1%.

## REVISIONS IN THIS ISSUE

Estimates of GDP(I) and GDP(E) at current prices for December quarter 1994 have been revised. Later data from the Survey of Company Profits resulted in a \$701 million reduction in the gross operating surplus for private corporate trading enterprises. More complete survey data from the Survey of Employment and Earnings, the Building Activity Survey and the Stocks Survey resulted in significant revisions in December quarter 1994 to wages, salaries and supplements, private gross fixed capital expenditure on non-dwelling construction and increase in private non-farm stocks, respectively. Revisions have also been made to various services components of private final consumption expenditure for September and December quarters 1994. In addition, the "health" component of private final consumption expenditure has been seasonally reanalysed.

Estimates of GDP(P) have been revised for all years as a result of finalising new industry data for the base year income-based estimates of industry gross product. The base data used in the December quarter 1994 accounts were preliminary estimates based on the new industrial classification introduced by the ABS in 1994. They were changed to a reallocation of wages, salaries and supplements and general government gross operating surplus (depreciation) by industry, which has taken place since the December quarter national accounts were prepared. Recent quarterly estimates of GDP(P) have also been affected by the availability of more complete survey data.

In the September and December quarters 1994 GDP(E) has been revised to a greater extent than the other measures. While the net effect of revisions to all measures in recent quarters and the addition of the March quarter data has been to increase quarterly growth rates in trend GDP(A) for each of June, September and December quarters 1994, the overall pattern continues to show a deceleration in growth of trend GDP(A) in recent quarters.

## MARCH QUARTER

### SUMMARY COMMENT

### FINAL CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE

- Private expenditure grew 1.0%, with increases in all categories except cigarettes and tobacco, furniture and floor coverings, other fuels and net expenditure overseas. Food was the major contributor to growth.

### GROSS FIXED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

- Private dwelling construction fell 1.4%, the first fall since September quarter 1991. By contrast, growth in non-dwelling construction was 3.8%, the largest increase since September quarter 1989. Private investment in equipment grew by a modest 1.7%, following four quarters of very strong growth.

### INCREASE IN PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS

- An increase of \$1,075 million in March quarter 1995 compared with an increase of \$1,110 million in the previous quarter suggests the steady acceleration in the stock build-up shown over the previous eight quarters may have ended.

### EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

- Grew 0.8%. Exports of goods contributed 0.7 percentage points of the increase, with a decline in rural exports being more than offset by an increase in non-rural exports of goods. Exports of machinery contributed 0.6 percentage points to export growth.

### IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

- Increased by 2.9% with imports of goods contributing most of the increase. Machinery and industrial equipment, and computer equipment were the major contributors.

## MARCH QUARTER SUMMARY COMMENT

### AGRICULTURE, FORESTRY AND FISHING

- Fell 7.0% in trend terms and 3.1% in seasonally adjusted terms. The fall in seasonally adjusted terms was largely influenced by a decline in production of livestock products.

### MANUFACTURING

- The trend estimate increased 0.7% to be 7.4% higher than in March quarter 1994. (The seasonally adjusted estimate increased 0.5%.) Of the nine manufacturing subdivisions, production declined in two and increased in seven. Non-metallic mineral products, Machinery and equipment, and Other manufacturing continued to display strong growth.

### WHOLESALE AND RETAIL TRADE

- Wholesale production continued to grow strongly, up 2.3% (1.7% in seasonally adjusted terms) to be 13.7% higher than in March quarter 1994.
- Retail grew at a more moderate 0.9% (0.1% in seasonally adjusted terms) to be 4.4% higher than in March quarter 1994.

### TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

- Increased 1.5% in trend terms but showed no change in seasonally adjusted terms. This industry has now grown by 10.7% since the March quarter 1994. All sectors except rail transport have shown strong growth over this period.

## MARCH QUARTER SUMMARY COMMENT


### WAGES, SALARIES AND SUPPLEMENTS

- Rose 1.8% (2.9% in seasonally adjusted terms).
- The rise reflects an increase of 1.5% in the number of wage and salary earners and 0.3% in the underlying average earnings. The corresponding changes in seasonally adjusted terms were a rise of 2.3% in the number of wage and salary earners and an increase of 0.6% in average earnings.


### GROSS OPERATING SURPLUS

- GOS of private corporate trading enterprises increased marginally by 0.3% (0.8% in seasonally adjusted terms) to a level 6.1% higher than in March quarter 1994.

## ANALYSES AND COMMENTS

### RELIABILITY OF CONTEMPORARY TREND ESTIMATES

Seasonally adjusted series include both the trend effects and the irregular effects which influence movements in a series. As a result, seasonally adjusted estimates do not necessarily provide a good indication of the underlying behaviour of a series. On the other hand, trend estimates represent the underlying direction of the series, excluding seasonal effects and residual/irregular factors. Trend estimates are calculated by smoothing the seasonally adjusted series using a statistical procedure based on centred Henderson moving averages. The procedure used is designed to minimise distortions in the trend level, turning point shape and timing of turning points.

For the most recent quarters, insufficient data exist to use centred Henderson moving averages to calculate the trend values and so approximations to the Henderson moving averages are used for the latest three quarters. This means that revisions to the trend estimates for the last few quarters are unavoidable, even if none of the original data have been revised. More details about trend estimation are contained in the ABS Information Paper *A Guide to Interpreting Time Series — Monitoring Trends; An Overview* (1348.0) which was released on 19 April 1993.

Potential revisions to trend estimates can be indicated by showing the effects of particular changes in seasonally adjusted estimates that might occur in the next quarter. The table below shows the trend estimates for the last few quarters and the values to which they would be revised if the notional movements in seasonally adjusted GDP(A) actually occurred in June quarter 1995.

Seasonally adjusted growth of 0.9% is required in June quarter 1995 to maintain the trend growth, in June quarter, of 0.5% currently estimated for March quarter 1995.



The graph below provides a comparison of the quarterly growth rates (percentage changes) in constant price GDP(A) in both seasonally adjusted and trend terms in recent years.


Percentage changes



### HOUSEHOLD SAVING RATIO

The proportion of household disposable income devoted to consumption in the March quarter was 97.4%. The balance, household saving, was 2.6%. Caution should be exercised in interpreting this ratio in recent years, because major components of household income and expenditure may still be subject to significant revisions. The impact of these revisions on the saving ratio can cause changes in the apparent direction of the trend. The following graph presents the household saving ratio derived from trend data (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 26).



### PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS TO-SALES RATIO

In trend current price terms, the book value of private non-farm stocks increased by \$1,619 million (2.5%) this quarter, while sales increased by \$1,579 million (2.2%). Consequently, the stocks to sales ratio increased from 0.904 to 0.907. The following graph presents the ratio of private non-farm stocks to sales derived from trend data (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 24).


Trend at Current Prices



### IMPORTS TO SALES RATIO

The imports to sales ratio, trended and at current prices, rose to 0.260 this quarter from 0.257 last quarter. The following graph presents the ratio of imports to sales derived from trend data (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 25).

Trend at Current Prices



### TERMS OF TRADE

In March quarter 1995 the terms of trade index derived from trend estimates (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 16) rose 0.8%. A rise of 1.1% in the implicit price deflator (IPD) for exports more than offset by a rise of 0.3% in the IPD for imports.


Trend (1989-90 = 100)



### REAL GROSS DOMESTIC INCOME

GDP at constant prices is a measure of the volume of goods and services produced in Australia. If the terms of trade change significantly over the period of comparison, then this measure of real GDP will not accurately reflect the change in real purchasing power of the income generated by domestic production. (See the Technical Note included in the September quarter 1993 issue of this publication for a more detailed discussion.) A better measure of the real purchasing power of income generated by domestic production is GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices adjusted for the terms of trade effect, which is referred to as *real gross domestic income*. The graph below provides a comparison of trend GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices and real gross domestic income. Trend and seasonally adjusted estimates of real gross domestic income are shown in Tables 75 and 76 respectively.

### PRIVATE GROSS FIXED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE— NON-DWELLING CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT

Movements in private gross fixed capital expenditure can often be affected by large second-hand transactions and large one-off purchases. Details of recent transactions in second-hand assets between the private and public sectors, expenditure on new equipment and new work on non-dwelling construction are provided in the table below.

## **ANALYSES AND COMMENTS** (continued)

### AVERAGE EARNINGS

Estimates of average non-farm wages, salaries and supplements per non-farm wage and salary earner are published in Table 70 on both a trend and seasonally adjusted basis. (Percentage changes in these estimates are shown in Tables 9 and 10.) These estimates are frequently compared with the average weekly earnings series (AWE) which is published by the ABS in *Average Weekly Earnings, Australia, Preliminary* (6301.0) and *Average Weekly Earnings, States and Australia* (6302.0).

There are a number of significant differences between average earnings on a national accounts basis and the AWE series. The AWE series relates to earnings in a single pay period in the middle of each quarter whereas the national accounts measure is based on total earnings for the quarter which is collected from a large sample of employers in the Survey of Employment and Earnings (SEE). The AWE series excludes various irregular payments such as back pay, severance and termination payments, holiday pay etc, but these components are included in the national accounts measure. In addition the national accounts measure includes supplements which comprise employers' contributions to superannuation funds and workers' compensation claims.

Over recent quarters the growth in the national accounts measure of average earnings over the corresponding quarter of the previous year has been considerably lower than the corresponding movement in AWE. For example, from December quarter 1993 to December quarter 1994 the national accounts measure of seasonally adjusted average earnings rose 2.1% compared with a rise of 3.9% in the corresponding AWE measure. While it is not possible to quantify the impact of all the differences between the two measures, a significant part (0.8 percentage points) of the difference over this period is due to a reduction in severance and termination payments.

Seasonally adjusted average earnings on a national accounts basis rose 2.2% from March quarter 1994 to March quarter 1995 compared with an increase of 3.6% in the corresponding AWE series. A separate estimate of the severance and termination payments is not yet available from the preliminary SEE results for the March quarter.

### REAL ESTATE TRANSFER EXPENSES

There was a large fall (13%) in seasonally adjusted constant price real estate transfer expenses in March quarter 1995. The decline reflects a significant reduction in the quarter in the number of real estate transfers across all States and Territories except for the Northern Territory.

### GROSS FIXED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE - PUBLIC ENTERPRISES

Growth in public gross fixed capital expenditure has a history of being quite erratic, particularly that by public enterprises. This reflects purchases of individual expensive items, such as commercial aircraft and ships, and the fact that expenditure is dominated by relatively few enterprises.

In the March quarter, the trend estimate of gross fixed capital expenditure by public enterprises increased by 5.1% to be 13.6% higher than in March quarter 1994. The Commonwealth sector was the major contributor to the growth.

### PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS

The seasonally adjusted estimate of private non-farm stocks increased by \$654 million in the March quarter. This follows a much larger increase of \$1,411 million in December quarter 1994. Gross domestic product is defined to be equal to domestic final demand *plus* increase in stocks *plus* exports *less* imports. Hence, the lower increase in stocks in the March quarter made a negative contribution to the growth in that quarter of 0.7 percentage points.

## **ANALYSES AND COMMENTS** (continued)

### **IMPLICIT PRICE DEFLATORS**

The implicit price deflator (IPD) of the seasonally adjusted estimates of private final consumption expenditure increased by 1.2% in the March quarter, following seven quarters for which the IPD increased by no more than 0.5%. This growth pattern roughly parallels that of the CPI excluding housing costs (the components of the CPI are used extensively in deriving constant price estimates of private final consumption expenditure).

The IPD for seasonally adjusted private gross fixed capital expenditure on non-dwelling construction increased by 0.2% in the March quarter, following several quarters of erratic movements. The constant price estimates of this item are derived by revaluing estimates of current price expenditures on building and engineering construction by State (ie 16 components) using appropriate price indexes. These price indexes have grown at different rates since the base year (1989-90) with the result that their levels now vary appreciably. As a consequence, changes in the composition of expenditure (between buildings and engineering construction and between States) from quarter to quarter can lead to changes in the overall IPD independently of changes in the individual price indexes.

Similar compositional changes also led to changes in the IPD for seasonally adjusted gross fixed capital expenditure on equipment. In the March quarter the index fell by 0.4%. A significant contributing factor was that an expensive LNG tanker was purchased in the December quarter 1994. As the price index used to revalue the ship was at a comparatively high level, it pushed up the IPD for the December quarter. In the absence of a similar ship being purchased in the March quarter, the IPD was pushed down. Other factors contributing to the decline of the IPD in the March quarter stem from the movements of the elemental price indexes used to revalue capital expenditure on equipment, which include ABS import and Australian-manufactured goods price indexes and a US computer equipment price index. A distributed lag is applied to the import price indexes in an attempt to mirror the lags that occur between changes in import prices and final purchasers' prices. Thus, recent increases in import prices had a muted effect on the March quarter deflator. Also, the computer equipment price index, which has a considerable weight, continues to decline.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

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### INTRODUCTION

**1** This publication contains estimates of the components of gross domestic product and national expenditure and supporting tables for the latest quarter, together with comparative estimates for the eight previous quarters and the last four financial years. Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates of the major aggregates and some selected series are also provided for the latest quarter, together with comparative estimates for the twelve previous quarters. The List of Tables, pages 13–14, show the full range of data provided.

### CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

**2** These are documented in *Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (5216.0). In association with the introduction of constant price estimates at average 1989–90 prices, some of the methods used to derive constant price estimates were changed. The major changes are described in Section 4 of the Information Paper *Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989–90 Prices* (5243.0).

### ACCURACY OF QUARTERLY ESTIMATES

**3** Estimating for a period of less than one year presents special problems. It is often difficult to adhere strictly to definitions used in annual estimates when deriving quarterly ones. This is particularly the case for the quarterly measure of income, because it is not always possible to match the value of production for a quarter with the cost incurred in that production. Difficulties are also encountered in obtaining detailed data for short periods and in preparing consistent estimates from different sources with different accounting procedures and periods. Furthermore, the quarter-to-quarter growth in seasonally adjusted terms is very sensitive to the timing of recording a transaction. If the recording of a transaction is delayed by one quarter, seasonally adjusted movements will be distorted for three consecutive quarters. All these problems affect the accuracy of the current and constant price estimates and should be taken into account in interpreting the estimates.

### REVISIONS

**4** Most figures are subject to revision as more complete and accurate information becomes available. The revisions are of two types: those made to recent quarters and those made as a consequence of a redistribution across all quarters within a year following revisions to annual totals. Major revisions made this quarter are discussed on page 2.

### TREND ESTIMATES

**5** Given the qualifications regarding the accuracy and reliability of the quarterly national accounts, the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) considers that trend estimates provide the best guide to the underlying movements, and are more suitable than either the seasonally adjusted or original data for most business decisions and policy advice.

**6** A trend estimate is obtained by removing the irregular component from the seasonally adjusted series. For estimates in this publication, it is calculated using a centred 7-term Henderson moving average of the seasonally adjusted series. Estimates for the three most recent quarters cannot be calculated using this centred average method; instead an asymmetric average is used. This can lead to revisions in the trend estimates for the last three quarters when data become available for later quarters, even if none of the original data for earlier quarters have changed.

**7** If a series has a high 'irregular' component, then the trend estimates will be subject to greater revision for the latest few quarters as data become available for subsequent quarters than would otherwise be the case. However, it is important to note that this does not make the trend series inferior to the seasonally adjusted or original series. In fact, in such cases the effect of the irregular component on overall movements is likely to be even more marked in the seasonally adjusted and the original estimates than in the trend series.

Two feature articles which have appeared in the ABS monthly publication *Australian Economic Indicators* may also be of interest:

IMPLICIT PRICE DEFULATOR (IPD)

**9** The quarterly implicit price deflators (IPDs) are derived by dividing seasonally adjusted and trend current price estimates by the corresponding constant price estimates.

Movements in IPDs can be greatly affected by changes in the physical composition of the aggregates and their components. For this reason, quarterly IPDs derived from seasonally adjusted or trend data are preferred to those using original data. The seasonal adjustment process itself is also a possible source of distortion. For further information see Appendix VI of *Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (5216.0).

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT:

GENERAL METHOD

**10** Data that are affected by seasonal factors are adjusted to remove the effects of these factors. The general methods for doing so are described in Appendix I of *Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (5216.0). Three important points should be noted here :

- The methods used in seasonal adjustment do not force the sum of the adjusted estimates for each quarter of a year to equal the original annual total.
- Where constant price estimates have no apparent seasonality in their implicit price deflators, the estimates are adjusted using the corresponding factors for current price estimates.
- Special methods have been used to adjust some components of gross farm product. These concern the adjustment of crop production where production/harvest only occurs in a couple of quarters each year. In these instances, the output for each financial year is distributed equally over the four quarters.

MEASURES OF GDP

GDP(I)

INCOME APPROACH

**11** GDP(I) is the sum of factor incomes, consumption of fixed capital (depreciation) and net indirect taxes. The preferred current price measure of GDP is GDP(I). It is the overall measure which is consistent with subsidiary measures such as national income and the other consolidated tables (such as the national income and outlay account). GDP(I) also provides the base year benchmarks for the constant price estimates of GDP(P). Constant price estimates of GDP(I) are derived by deflating current price estimates of GDP(I) by the implicit price deflator of GDP(E).

GDP(E)

EXPENDITURE APPROACH

**12** GDP(E) is the sum of all final expenditures, changes in stocks, and exports less imports. Constant price estimates of GDP(E)) are the sum of all these components at average 1989–90 prices.

GDP(P)

PRODUCTION APPROACH

**13** GDP(P) is calculated as the market value of goods and services produced by an industry (i.e. gross output) less the cost of goods and services used in the productive process (i.e. intermediate consumption). Constant price estimates of GDP(P) are the sum of constant price estimates (at average 1989–90 prices) for each industry.

\*\*\*\*\*  
MEASURES OF GDP (continued)

GDP(A) **14** While the three measures above are identical in concept, they can differ significantly in practice, especially in the short term, because of the different data sources used for each measure. Using the average of the three, GDP(A), smooths out these differences. GDP(A) is considered by the ABS to be the most satisfactory indicator of short-term seasonally adjusted or trend growth (see the Feature Article in the June quarter 1990 issue of *Australian National Accounts: National Income and Expenditure* (5206.0)).

ANALYSIS OF CONTRIBUTIONS  
TO GROWTH

**15** Tables 6 and 7 present analyses of the contribution provided by each major component to the percentage change in trend and seasonally adjusted estimates of constant price GDP(I). The figures in each table are additive within each quarter, unlike the percentage changes shown in other tables in this publication. The formula used to calculate the contribution of each aggregate to the growth in GDP is:

$$\frac{A(t) - A(t-1)}{GDP(t-1)} \times 100$$

where

$A(t)$  = value of aggregate A in quarter under consideration

$A(t-1)$  = value of aggregate A in preceding quarter

$GDP(t-1)$  = value of GDP in preceding quarter.

TERMS OF TRADE

**16** There are several ways of measuring the terms of trade. In this publication, the following index is used :

$$\frac{\text{Implicit price deflator for exports of goods and services}}{\text{Implicit price deflator for imports of goods and services}} \times 100$$

Estimates of the terms of trade are shown in Tables 11, 12, 18, 19, 68 and 69.

REAL GROSS DOMESTIC INCOME

**17** GDP at constant prices is a measure of the volume of goods and services produced in Australia. If the terms of trade change significantly over the period of comparison, then this measure of real GDP will not accurately reflect the change in real purchasing power of the income generated by domestic production. (See the *Technical Note* included in the September 1993 issue of this publication for a more detailed discussion.) A better measure of the real purchasing power of income generated by domestic production is GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices adjusted for the terms of trade effect, which is referred to as *real gross domestic income* (or real GDI). The following adjustment is made to GDP(I) at constant prices to obtain an estimate of real GDI:

- exports of goods and services at current prices are deflated by the implicit price deflator for imports of goods and services
- the actual constant price value of exports is then deducted from this value, and
- the resultant terms of trade adjustment is then added to GDP(I) at constant prices to give real GDI presented in Tables 68 and 69.

\*\*\*\*\*

GROSS PRODUCT PER UNIT  
OF LABOUR INPUT

**18** Indexes of constant price gross product per person employed and per hour worked are commonly referred to as measures of labour productivity. However, it should be noted that these indexes reflect not only the contribution of labour to changes in product per unit of labour, but also the contribution of capital and other factors (such as managerial efficiency, economies of scale, etc.).

**19** When analysing labour productivity indexes it is critical to note that they are subject to the vagaries of the growth (or business) cycle as well as the effects of any measurement error in either output or labour input. Differences in the amplitude and phase of the output and input cycles can result in labour productivity indexes deviating substantially from their longer-term trend. Analytical work undertaken within the ABS suggests that movements in employment and hours worked tend to lag movements in GDP. Over a 20 year period, the lag at turning points in the growth cycle varied between zero and four quarters, with the average being between two and three quarters. The implication is that, in the period of the growth cycle when the growth in output is declining, indexes of labour productivity are likely to decline, particularly if rapid growth in GDP is abruptly ended. Conversely, labour productivity indexes are likely to grow strongly when the economy comes out of a cyclical trough.

**20** A simple way to estimate the underlying trend in labour productivity is to compare the values of a labour productivity index spanning a growth cycle e.g. from the peak of one growth cycle to the peak of another. Note that such estimates rest on the assumption that labour is being utilised to the same degree at each growth cycle peak. Average annual growth rates, over growth cycles, of estimates of gross product per hour worked in the *market* and *non-farm market sectors* are shown in *Australian National Accounts: Multifactor Productivity* (5234.0).

MARKET AND NON-FARM  
MARKET SECTORS

**21** The estimates of gross product at constant prices for six industries: Finance and insurance; Property and business services; Government administration and defence; Education; Health and community services; and Personal and other services are derived either wholly or primarily by using either deflated input cost data or hours worked as indicators of output. As such, the estimates cannot adequately reflect changes in productivity. For the purpose of measuring changes in productivity, it is therefore preferable that these industries be excluded. The constant price product of a group of industries referred to as the *market sector* is defined to be GDP(P) *less* the above six industries, *less* Ownership of dwellings (for which capital stock is used as the indicator of output), *plus* the imputed bank service charge related to the 'non-market' industries.

**22** A second industry group, referred to as the *non-farm market sector*, comprises the market sector *less* Agriculture, forestry and fishing. Productivity estimates derived for this group are free of the effects caused by the volatility of agricultural production due to changing seasonal conditions.

INDEXES OF EMPLOYMENT AND  
HOURS WORKED

**23** The quarterly employment indexes used to derive the gross product per person employed indexes comprise all labour engaged in the production of goods and services and include not only civilian wage and salary earners but also employers; self-employed persons; persons working one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm; and members of the Australian defence forces. For details of how the employment and hours worked estimates are formed, refer to Section 23 of *Australian National Accounts: Concepts Sources and Methods* (5216.0), and also Section 4 of the Information Paper *Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989-90 Prices* (5243.0) which describes changes in methods introduced in conjunction with the rebase of constant price estimates to average 1989-90 prices.

\*\*\*\*\*  
PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS  
TO SALES RATIO

**24** The ratio is presented in Tables 68 and 69. The denominator of this ratio, in current price terms, is defined as :

- private final consumption expenditure on goods
- plus private gross fixed capital expenditure on dwellings, non-dwelling construction and equipment
- plus public gross fixed capital expenditure
- plus exports of non-rural goods.

IMPORTS TO SALES RATIO

**25** The ratio is merchandise imports (ie total imports of goods) to sales (as defined in paragraph 24 above). This ratio is presented in Tables 68 and 69.

HOUSEHOLD SAVING RATIO

**26** This is the ratio of household saving to household disposable income, where household saving is the difference between household disposable income and private final consumption expenditure. The ratio is a memorandum item in Tables 27 and 28 and is also shown in Table 67.

GDP(A) PER CAPITA

**27** This is the ratio of GDP(A) to an estimate of the resident Australian population. For all but the most recent quarters, the resident population data are drawn from *Australian Demographic Statistics* (3101.0). For the most recent quarters, estimates are made by extrapolating from the latest available data.

DATA ON FLOPPY DISK

**28** All quarterly series in this publication are available in spreadsheet format on floppy disk, *Australian National Accounts: Quarterly Data on Floppy Disk* (5228.0). These data generally run from September quarter 1959. An important exception is GDP(P) and its components which run from September quarter 1974.
