


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

December quarter 1993 compared with September quarter 1993 —

Excess of merchandise exports or imports


In the December quarter 1993 merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$144 million, a decrease of \$104 million on the deficit recorded for the previous quarter.

Merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports for a number of Australia's major trading partners, with surpluses recorded for:

- Japan, down \$46 million (5%) to \$971 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$160 million (22%) to \$555 million;
- Singapore, up \$54 million (17%) to \$367 million;
- New Zcaland, up \$84 million (53%) to \$244 million; and
- Taiwan, up \$105 million to \$115 million.

Deficits were recorded for USA, up \$155 million (8%) to \$2,184 million; UK, a turnaround (from a surplus) of \$511 million to \$384 million; and China, down \$46 million (18%) to \$208 million.


GRAPH 1: AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES Excess of exports(+) or imports(-)



Merchandise exports

Merchandise exports for December quarter 1993 were \$16,829 million, up \$685 million or 4 per cent on the previous quarter.

The commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous quarter were:

- food and live animals, up \$223 million (7%) to \$3,275 million (due mainly to increased exports of dairy products and cereals);
- machinery and transport equipment, up \$206 million (11%) to \$2,025 million (due mainly to increased exports of office machines, road vehicles, general industrial machinery and telecommunications equipment);
- crude materials, up \$173 million (5%) to \$3,384 million (due to increased exports of textile fibres; and
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$154 million (8%) to \$2,067 million (due mainly to increased exports of iron and steel, and non-ferrous metals).

The only decrease was recorded for *commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere*, down \$242 million (17%) to \$1,677 million (due to a fall of \$246 million in exports of non-monetary gold).

Australia's major export destinations were:


- Japan, down \$41 million (1%) to \$4,047 million;
- USA, down \$63 million (4%) to \$1,361 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$94 million (8%) to \$1,237 million;
- New Zealand, up \$92 million (10%) to \$1,060 million;
- Hong Kong, up \$216 million (36%) to \$821 million;
- Singapore, up \$101 million (14%) to \$813 million:

- Taiwan, up \$88 million (14%) to \$733 million; and
- China, up \$69 million (12%) to \$648 million.

Merchandise imports

Merchandise imports for December quarter 1993 were \$16,973 million, up \$581 million or 4% on the previous quarter.

The commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous quarter were:

- machinery and transport equipment, up \$746 million (11%) to \$7,794 million (due mainly to increased imports of road vehicles and other transport equipment; and telecommunications equipment); and
- food and live animals, up \$57 million (9%) to \$669 million (due mainly to increased imports of dairy products and vegetables and fruit).

Falls were recorded for most of the remaining commodity groups. The largest decreases were recorded for *crude materials*, down \$69 million (22%) to \$377 million (due to lower imports of cork and wood); and *commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere*, down \$61 million (29%) to \$270 million (due to a fall in non-monetary gold imports).

Australia's major imports sources were:

- USA, up \$93 million (3%) to \$3,546 million;
- Japan, up \$5 million to \$3,076 million;
- Germany, up \$170 million (19%) to \$1,054 million;
- UK, up \$28 million (3%) to \$965 million;
- China, up \$23 million (3%) to \$856 million;
- New Zealand, up \$8 million (1%) to \$816 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$254 million (59%) to \$682 million; and

Taiwan, down

Year ended December 1993 compared with year ended December 1992 —

Excess of merchandise exports or imports


For the year ended December 1993 merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$424 million, a decrease of \$2,477 million on the surplus recorded for the previous year.

Merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports for a number of Australia's major trading partners, with surpluses recorded for:

- Japan, down \$995 million (21%) to \$3,717 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$335 million (16%) to \$2,476 million;
- Singapore, down \$761 million (31%) to \$1,679 million;
- New Zealand, up \$96 million (17%) to \$648 million; and
- Taiwan, up \$9 million (2%) to \$480 million.

Deficits were recorded for USA, up \$885 million (12%) to \$8,130 million; UK, down \$301 million (30%) to \$706 million; and China, up \$192 million (43%) to \$634 million.

Merchandise exports

Merchandise exports for the year ended December 1993 were \$62,845 million, up \$4,436 million or 8 per cent on the previous year.


The commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous year were:

- food and live animals, up \$1,832 million (17%) to \$12,416 million (due mainly to increased exports of cereals, sugar and meat);
- machinery and transport equipment, up \$1,288 million (23%) to \$7,007 million (due mainly to increased exports of transport equipment, office machines, and electrical machinery);

- mineral fuels, up \$486 million (4%) to \$12,131 million (due mainly to increased coal exports);
 and
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$485 million (7%) to \$7,565 million (due mainly to increased exports of iron and steel, nonferrous metals and leather goods).

The only decrease was recorded in *crude materials*, down \$766 million (6%) to \$12,729 million (due to a fall of \$895 million in exports of textile fibres).


GRAPH 5: COMMODITY COMPOSITION OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations were:

- Japan, up \$849 million (6%) to \$15,598 million;
- USA, down \$71 million (1%) to \$5,063 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$682 million (19%) to \$4,342 million;
- New Zealand, up \$576 million (19%) to \$3,683 million:
- Singapore, down \$485 million (13%) to \$3,284 million;
- UK, up \$573 million (25%) to \$2,850 million;
- Taiwan, up \$209 million (8%) to \$2,771 million; and
- Hong Kong, up \$363 million (15%) to \$2,717 million.

Merchandise imports


Merchandise imports for the year ended December 1993 were \$62,421 million, up \$6,913 million or 12 per cent on the previous year.

The commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous year were:

- machinery and transport equiment, up \$3,758 million (16%) to \$27,494 million (due mainly to increased imports of road vehicles, electrical machinery, office machines, and general industrial machinery);
- miscellaneous manufactures, up \$904 million (11%) to \$9,417 million (due mainly to increased imports of miscellaneous manufactures, articles of apparel and clothing accessories, and professional instruments and apparatus);
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$701 million (8%) to \$9,139 million (due mainly to increased imports of iron and steel, textiles, metal manufactures, and rubber manufactures): and
- chemicals, up S623 million (10%) to \$6,845 million (due mainly to increased imports of organic chemicals, medical products and chemical materials and products nes).

The only decrease was recorded in commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere, down \$90 million (8%) to \$1,109 million (due to a fall of \$101 million in imports of non-monetary gold).

GRAPH 7: COMMODITY COMPOSITION OF IMPORTS




Australia's major import sources were:

- USA, up \$814 million (7%) to \$13,193 million;
- Japan, up \$1,844 million (18%) to \$11,881 million;
- Germany, up \$388 million (12%) to \$3,602 million;
- UK, up \$272 million (8%) to \$3,556 million;
- New Zealand, up S480 million (19%) to \$3,035 million;

- China, up \$608 million (26%) to \$2,925 million;
- Taiwan, up \$200 million (10%) to \$2,291 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$347 million (23%) to \$1,866 million.

BILATERAL MERCHANDISE TRADE STATISTICS RECONCILIATION: AUSTRALIA AND UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Introduction

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has recently completed a joint bilateral merchandise trade statistics reconciliation study with the United States Bureau of the Census (BOC) covering merchandise trade flows between Australia and the United States of America in 1991. The purpose of the study was to assist analysts of the statistics on these flows published by both agencies by quantifying the causes of data discrepancies and to identify any major coverage or quality deficiencies in the statistics produced by each agency, after adjusting for conceptual and methodological differences. This article presents the results of the study.

Source data

- 2. Detailed merchandise trade statistics, based on Custom's documentation, were exchanged between the ABS and BOC for the calendar year 1991. In addition, each agency provided details of the conceptual and practical bases for compiling its statistics, including a comparison with the international recommendations contained in the UN publication, *International Trade Statistics, Concepts and Definitions*, Statistical Papers, Series M, No. 52, Rev. 1.
- 3. The analysis in this article is presented in Australian dollars. United States data were converted to Australian dollars at \$US = \$A 1.2842, the average annual exchange rate for the calendar year 1991.

Data comparability

4. Imports data are classified on a country of origin basis by both countries, while each country's exports contain both domestic and foreign merchandise. Data for both countries are on a general trade basis which identifies all movements of goods, whether or not the goods enter for home consumption in the importing country. Although both countries generally follow the UN guidelines for international trade statistics, there are still definitional and conceptual differences between the two sets of imports and exports data. These differences are discussed in detail in paragraphs 15 to 38 of this article.

Broad findings

- 5. In 1991, Australia recorded imports of \$A11,897 million from the United States while the United States recorded exports to Australia totalling \$A10,792 million; a discrepancy of \$A1,105 million. In the same year, Australia recorded exports to the United States of \$A5,369 million while the United States recorded imports from Australia of \$A5,242 million; a discrepancy of \$A127 million.
- 6. If identical concepts and definitions (including country attribution principles) were applied by each country to both exports and imports, Australian imports from the United States should be identical to United States exports to Australia and vice versa. However, in practice the United States statistics are less than the Australian figures for both northbound trade (trade bound for the United States) and southbound trade (trade bound for Australia),

although the difference for southbound trade is noticeably larger than for northbound trade. For southbound trade, the difference between Australia's imports from the United States and the matching exports of the United States to Australia represented 9.3 per cent of Australia's imports from the United States. For northbound trade, the difference between Australia's exports to the United States and the matching imports of the United States from Australia represented 2.4 per cent of Australia's exports to the United States.

Data presentation

7. Table A on page 7 provides a reconciliation of northbound trade while Table B on page 8 provides a similar analysis for southbound trade. The study used standards agreed upon by both BOC and the ABS to tabulate reconciled values.

Scope

- 8. For the northbound trade (Table A), the reconciliation statement starts by comparing Australia's merchandise exports of both domestic and foreign origin that were consigned to the United States (\$A5,369m) with United States merchandise imports of Australian origin exported from both Australia and third countries and of United States origin re-exported from Australia (\$A5,242m). In principle, the only transactions common to the two sets of statistics are:
- shipments of Australian origin goods, consigned to the United States, loaded in Australia and unloaded in United States ports (\$A5,111m).
- 9. Australia's export statistics exceed this scope because they also include:
- Australia's re-exports of United States and third country origin (\$A361m).

United States import statistics also exceed this scope because they include:

- imports of Australian origin goods exported to the United States by third countries (\$A114m); and
- re-imports of United States origin goods (\$A243m).
- 10. For the southbound trade (Table B), the reconciliation statement starts by comparing Australia's merchandise imports of United States origin, exported from both the United States and third countries (\$A11,897m), with United States merchandise exports (of both domestic and foreign origin) that are consigned to Australia (\$A10,792m). The common ground in both sets of statistics is:
- shipments of United States origin goods consigned to Australia, loaded in the United States and unloaded in Australian ports (\$A11,036).
- 11. Australian import statistics exceed this scope as they include:

 imports of United States goods exported to Australia by third countries (\$A720m).

United States export statistics also exceed this scope because they include:

- United States re-exports of Australian and third country merchandise (\$A270m).
- 12. A further difference in scope relates to the domestic territory covered by the two sets of statistics. United States statistics indistinguishably include Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands as part of the United States, whereas Australian statistics record them as foreign countries separate from the United States. Positive adjustments (of \$A6 million to northbound trade and \$A241 million to southbound trade) have been made to Australian statistics for trade with the United States to include trade with these territories.
- 13. The adjustments shown in Tables A and B reflect these differences in scope, as well as the effect of other conceptual and definitional differences between each country's imports statistics, and the corresponding exports statistics.
- 14. It should be emphasised that the adjustments presented in the two tables do not represent revisions to the officially published statistics of either country and, in general, do not imply errors in either country's published statistics.

Causes of discrepancy

- 15. There are many reasons why merchandise trade statistics may not reconcile. In undertaking the study, the following possible reasons for discrepancies between the two sets of statistics, relating to differences in concepts, definitions and treatment, were investigated:
 - (a) coverage
 - (b) valuation
 - (c) country classification
 - (d) timing
 - (e) exchange rate
 - (f) commodity classification
 - (g) confidentiality
 - (h) data errors
- 16. Results from the reconciliation study show the largest sources of discrepancy are country classification, particularly in respect of indirect trade (including imports through intermediate countries and re-exports of third country merchandise), and timing differences. Each possible cause of discrepancy, including the adjustments made to transform Australian published imports and exports to the same basis as United States published data for exports and imports, respectively, are discussed in more detail below.

(a) Coverage

17. In principle, the coverage of merchandise trade by Australia and the United States is the same - all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the nation's stock of material resources are included.

In practice, both countries rely on data collected by their respective customs services as the source for their statistics.

- 18. In Australia's case, Customs data exclude:
- (i) For both imports and exports:
- certain materials under intergovernment agreements for defence and similar purposes;
- sales or acquisitions of certain ships, intended for use on international routes, exempted from lodging Customs documentation; and
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported and parcel post exports and imports of small value, for which Custom's entries are not required.
- (ii) For imports only:
- entries lodged on informal clearance documents for goods on which duty is payable, which are: imported by parcel post and valued up to \$A1,000; or imported for non-commercial purposes and valued up to \$A250; and
- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft.
- (iii) For exports only:
- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high sea by Australian ships; and
- consignments valued under \$A500.
- 19. By contrast, the United States Customs data <u>include</u>, for both imports and exports:
- all military sales;
- all trade on government account;
- all postal trade;
- · sales of marine vessels; and
- the value of repairs on goods re-exported after repair.
- 20. Investigations have indicated that the discrepancy due to these coverage differences, other than repairs, would be minimal and therefore no adjustments have been made to the published estimates on account of these differences. In respect of repairs, the United States includes the value of repairs in merchandise trade statistics whereas Australia excludes the value of repairs from these statistics. (Both countries exclude the value of the goods that are repaired from the statistics.) For southbound trade, the United States has estimated the value of repairs undertaken by the United States on Australian goods to be \$A59 million and therefore a positive adjustment of this amount to Australia's published imports figure is shown in Table B. For northbound trade, the United States estimates the value for repairs undertaken by Australia on United States goods to be minimal (\$A160,000) and therefore no adjustment for this difference is shown in Table

- 21. The United States Customs data exclude:
- fish and salvage sold to foreign vessels from national vessels; and
- export shipments valued under \$US2,501 or import shipments valued under \$US1,251 (\$US251 for some textile goods).
- 22. Although Australia includes sales of fish and salvage in principle, in practice these transactions are very unlikely to occur and have, therefore, been ignored as a source of discrepancy. In the case of low value shipments, the United States merchandise trade figures include estimates of the value of shipments below the thresholds using formulae based on historical data. The low value adjustment shown in Table B reflects the difference between the United States estimate and Australia's reported data for merchandise trade under the threshold. For southbound trade, the United States estimate was considerably below the Australian figure, resulting in a negative adjustment of \$A275m to Australia's published imports total in Table B. For northbound trade, the discrepancy was minimal and therefore no adjustment for this discrepancy is shown in Table A.

(b) Valuation

- 23. The United States records its exports at the transactions value at the 'free alongside ship' (fas) point of valuation. That is, the value includes all costs (including inland freight and insurance) incurred in placing the goods alongside the carrier at the United States port of exportation. For its imports, Australia uses the 'customs value' at the point of containerisation (most cases) or the point of shipment or the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first. Customs value is the 'free on board' (fob) transactions value adjusted for each transaction where the Australian Customs Service considers the fob transactions value to be an artificially low price relative to market value. In practice, there is generally little difference between the fob transactions value and the customs value.
- 24. The United States values its imports on a 'customs basis', which is generally equivalent to an fas transactions value basis, while Australia values its exports on a fob transactions value basis. The fob value exceeds the fas value by the cost of loading the merchandise onto the carrier. In practice, there is probably little difference between the two valuation methods for either northbound or southbound trade. Accordingly, no adjustments for valuation discrepancies have been made.

(c) Country classification

25. In accordance with UN recommendations, both the United States and Australia classify exports by country of final destination, which is the country in which the goods are to be consumed or further processed. When the country of final destination is not known at the time of exportation, however, the exporter declares the country of last shipment (country of consignment) in place of the country of final destination. The country of last shipment is the last country in which the goods will be unloaded as far as the exporter is aware at the time of shipment.

- 26. On the other hand, in line with UN recommendations, both countries classify imports by country according to the country of origin of the goods (i.e. the country in which the goods have been produced or manufactured). Therefore, in principle, export and import statistics will only match between the two countries when exports are shipped directly from the country of origin to the country of final destination. Discrepancies will occur when goods involve third countries, such as re-exports of third country merchandise and imports routed through third countries. Three cases where adjustments have been made in Tables A and B are discussed below.
- (i) Re-exports of merchandise.
- 27. Where a third country exports goods to Australia which then re-exports the goods to the United States, imports to the United States from Australia will not include Australia's re-exports to the United States. Hence, for data reconciliation purposes, the value of Australia's re-exports to the United States will need to be subtracted from Australia's export statistics. The same situation applies in the case of United States exports to Australia, i.e. Australia's imports from the United States will not include United States re-exports to Australia.
- 28. For southbound trade, United States re-exports of Australian and third country merchandise accounted for \$A270 million of the discrepancy and this amount was added to the Australian published imports figure. For northbound trade, Australia's re-exports of United States and third country merchandise accounted for \$A361 million of the discrepancy (consisting of \$A227 million for goods of United States origin and \$A134 million for goods of third country origin) and this amount was subtracted from the Australian published exports figure.
- (ii) Imports through intermediate countries.
- 29. Where Australian origin goods are exported to a third country from where the goods are re-exported (unbeknown to the Australian exporter) to the United States, the goods will be included in United States imports from Australia but will not be included in Australian exports to the United States. Hence, the Australian statistics will understate total exports to the United States. To compensate for this, the value of goods for which country of origin is Australia but port of loading is not Australia (i.e. they are shipped from a third country) needs to be added to the Australian exports total. A similar situation operates in reverse where Australia imports United States goods from a third country.
- 30. The study found that for southbound trade, the major reason for the trade flow imbalance was the \$A720 million of United States goods imported by Australia via third countries, unbeknown to the United States exporter at the time of shipment. This resulted in a downward adjustment of this magnitude to Australia's published imports figure. The equivalent northbound adjustment, representing Australia's exports to the United States via a third country, resulted in an upward adjustment of \$A114 million to the Australia's published exports figure.

(iii) Re-imports of merchandise.

31. For northbound trade, an upward adjustment of \$A243 million has been made to Australia's exports total to account for goods of United States origin that have

been re-imported into the United States from Australia. In principle, this adjustment - which is necessary to derive the value of Australian origin goods consigned to the United States that are loaded in Australia and unloaded in the United States - should exactly offset the downward adjustment to Australia's exports total to account for goods of United States origin that are re-exported by Australia to the United States (see paragraph 28). In practice, the latter adjustment (\$A227 million) which was calculated from Australian data is lower than the re-imports adjustment (\$A243 million) calculated from United States data, resulting in a net upward adjustment of \$A16 million to Australia's published exports total. No similar re-imports adjustment was required to Australia's published imports data for southbound trade as Australia does not include re-imports in its published figure for imports from the United States.

(d) Timing

- 32. Both Australia and the United States have presented their data on a calendar year basis for the purposes of this comparison. However, there is a time lag between a shipment departing from the United States and arriving in Australia and vice versa. For example, a shipment departing by sea from the United States in December 1990 would be recorded by United States Customs in December and be included in 1990 statistics for the United States. However, the shipment would be likely to arrive in Australia in January 1991 and be recorded in the January 1991 statistics for Australia. It takes about 12 to 33 days to ship goods by sea from various major United States ports to Sydney or Melbourne in Australia.
- 33. To compensate for this effect, a proportion of Australia's January imports for 1991 and 1992 have been deducted from each of these two years and added to the previous year. Similar timing adjustments have been made by the United States to their data. For northbound trade, a net positive adjustment of \$A97 million has been made to Australia's published exports figure. For southbound trade, a negative net adjustment of \$A423 million has been made to Australia's published imports figure.

(e) Exchange rate

34. For comparative purposes, both the United States (\$A1=\$US0.7787) and Australia (\$US1=\$A1.2842) used the same average annual exchange rate. The conversion of import and export values using an average annual exchange rate leads to a certain degree of error which cannot easily be quantified. It is assumed that the aggregate error is minor as the exchange rate between United States and Australian currency was relatively stable over the period analysed.

(f) Commodity classification

35. Both the United States and Australian data used in this analysis are classified under the Harmonised System. For particular commodities, the classifications used may differ between the two sets of data. As these differences do not affect the comparisons of total trade between the two countries, no adjustments were required.

(g) Confidentiality

36. Both countries protect confidential data by re-classifying the data from Chapters 1 to 98 of the Harmonized Commodity Classification System to a dump code. Con-

fidentiality does not, however, affect data comparability at the total trade level and therefore no adjustments are required.

(h) Data errors

37. Reporting and data entry errors and mistakes made during editing and processing of data are likely to occur with any merchandise trade statistics. While discrepancies at the commodity level were found in this study, their impact at the aggregate levels was believed to be relatively minor.

Other adjustments

38. The following further adjustments have been made to the southbound trade reconciliation:

Aircraft adjustments

- A positive adjustment to the published Australian imports figure for an aircraft valued at \$A35 million. The aircraft was operationally leased to the United States for 2 years and treated by Australia as non-merchandise trade and, therefore, excluded from Australia's published merchandise trade imports figure. The United States, however, treated the leased aircraft as merchandise trade in their published exports figure.
- An upward adjustment of \$A37 million to Australia's published imports figure to account for an aircraft recorded by the United States as an export to Australia which was actually leased to a third country.
- Due to their significance in international merchandise trade and the relatively small number of transactions involved, all aircraft transactions were analysed using monthly exchange rates rather than average annual exchange rates as discussed in paragraph 34. For southbound trade, this resulted in a \$A6 million upward adjustment to Australia's published imports figure.

Unreported United States exports

 An upward adjustment of \$A40 million has been made to the United States published exports figure representing the value of specific transactions not recorded in United States exports to Australia.

The residual discrepancy

- 39. The residual adjustments shown in Tables A and B represent the differences remaining after the application of the adjustments described above.
- 40. For both northbound and southbound trade flows, the residual adjustments are negative, indicating that the adjusted Australian figures are higher than the published United States figures. On northbound trade the residual adjustment is -\$A226 million, while for southbound trade the residual adjustment is -\$A295 million. Possible reasons for the residual discrepancies include: imports through third countries of United States origin goods not identified as such; exports to the United States of third country merchandise not identified as such; valuation differences; additional timing differences; minor coverage

differences; and, for the United States, non-filing of export documents.

Conclusion

- 41. The bilateral trade data reconciliation study for 1991 has demonstrated that a significant part of the 'asymmetry' in United States-Australian bilateral merchandise trade flows results from the conceptual factors underlying their compilation. Actual data errors in the compilation process proved to be relatively insignificant in comparison. As previously indicated, the adjustments presented in the reconciliation do not represent revisions to the officially published statistics of either country nor do they imply, in general, errors in either countries' published statistics.
- 42. The discrepancy on southbound trade narrowed after adjustment for identified differences, whereas the discrepancy on northbound trade widened. The understatement of United States' merchandise exports (or overstatement of Australia's merchandise imports) fell from \$A1,105 million to \$A295 million, representing a fall from 9.3 per cent to 2.5 per cent of Australia's published merchandise imports from the United States. The understatement of United States' merchandise imports (or overstatement of Australia's merchandise exports) increased from \$A127 million to \$A226 million, representing a rise from 2.4 per cent to 4.2 per cent of Australia's published merchandise exports to the United States.
- 43. The most significant factor contributing to the narrowing of the gap on southbound trade was the adjustment for United States origin goods imported by Australia via third countries. Also significant were timing differences and the underestimation of low value trade by the United States. For northbound trade, the largest contributors to the widening of the gap were the adjustments for timing and imports of Australian origin goods by the United States from third countries.
- 44. Further reconciliation studies for the two countries, using data for the calendar years 1992 and 1993, are planned. Results will be published in later issues of this publication.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.

2. The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The sections below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation.

Source of data

3. These statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS).

Scope

4. Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) Australia's stock of material resources.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.c. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- (b) ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- (c) non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (eg mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

Coverage

- 5. The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries the customs record will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- (a) certain materials under inter-governmental agreements for defence and similar projects;
- (b) migrants and passengers' effects exported or imported and parcel post exports and imports of small value, for which Customs entries are not required;
- (c) the sale or delivery of certain ships intended for use on overseas routes; and

For exports only:

(d) sales of aircraft (and parts or components) which were imported into Australia prior to 1 July 1987 for use on overseas routes; sales of aircraft (and parts or components) which were imported into Australia on or after 1 July 1987 for use on over-

- seas routes are included in recorded export statistics;
- (c) fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- (f) from 1 July 1986 export consignments where the value of the goods in each transaction is less than \$500. Prior to that date, the value level was \$250.

For imports only:

- (g) bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft;
- (h) prior to I July 1987 the delivery of certain aircraft (and parts and components) intended for use on overseas routes; and
- (i) entries lodged on informal clearance documents (ICDs) for values not exceeding \$250. From 21 October 1985 onwards, ICDs for postal articles valued between \$250 and \$1000 are excluded.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

Basis of compilation

- 6. The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- 7. Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- 8. Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged.

Statistical Period

- 9. Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- 10. Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calcular month in which the import entries are finalised by the ACS. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by ACS. Currently, approximately 85 per cent of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10 per cent reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5 per cent by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.

11. Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. When the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

Valuation

- 12. The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment and enter an approximate value must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- 13. The value of imports is the Australian Customs value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- 14. Changes in Customs valuation introduced from 1 July 1989 with the Customs and Excise Legislation Amendment Act 1989 are likely to have marginally raised Customs valuations. Data for periods from 1 July 1989 are therefore not fully comparable with data for previous periods. However, investigations of imports valuations, for years before and after the change have shown no measurable effect on the valuation of imports that can be attributed to the change in legislation. For details of the changes in legislation see the note 'Change in the Valuation of Imports' at the beginning of the Explanatory Notes of the 1989-90 issue of Foreign Trade, Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables (5410.0).

Country

- 15. For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with ACS provisions. External territories under Australian administration are treated as separate countries while self-governing territories and dependent territories under the administration of other countries may be treated as individual countries in Australian international merchandise trade statistics.
- 16. For exports, country refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. For imports, country refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of imports and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'.
- 17. Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to

- the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- 18. However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.
- 19. The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:
 - Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);
 - Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);
 - Developing Countries (DCs);
 - European Community (EC);
 - European Free Trade Association (EFTA); and
 - Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC).
- 20. A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in OPEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- 21. More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra (06) 252 5409.

Commodity classification

- 22. Commodity export and import statistics in Tables 6 and 7 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' Standard International Trade Classification (SITC Rev3) with the addition of dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.
- 23. Tables 14 and 15 of this publication are presented according to the second revision of SITC for 1980-81 to December 1987 and according to SITC Rev3 from January 1988 to 1992-93. See Appendix B of the 1988-89 issue of *Foreign Trade Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables* (5410.0) for details of Divisions significantly affected by this change.

Broad Economic Categories

24. Merchandise trade in Tables 10 and 11 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' classification, Broad Economic Categories (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification

(AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

Industry of origin

25. Exports and imports statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in Tables 8 and 9. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the main economic activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification, 1993 Edition (1292.0).

State

- 26. State information for exports presented in Table 12 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- 27. State information for imports presented in Table 13, refers to both the State in which import entries were lodged and the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under ACS control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by the ACS.

Confidentiality

28. Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. More details on the confidentiality process can be obtained from the *Confidentiality Manager* on Canberra (06) 252 5409.

Reliability

29. Statistics in this publication for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.

Relationship to balance of payments statistics

30. The basic source of balance of payments data on merchandise exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before foreign trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For

more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 9 of Balance of Payments, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5331.0).

The Catalogue and the Publications Advice are available from any ABS office.

Rounding

35. Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.


