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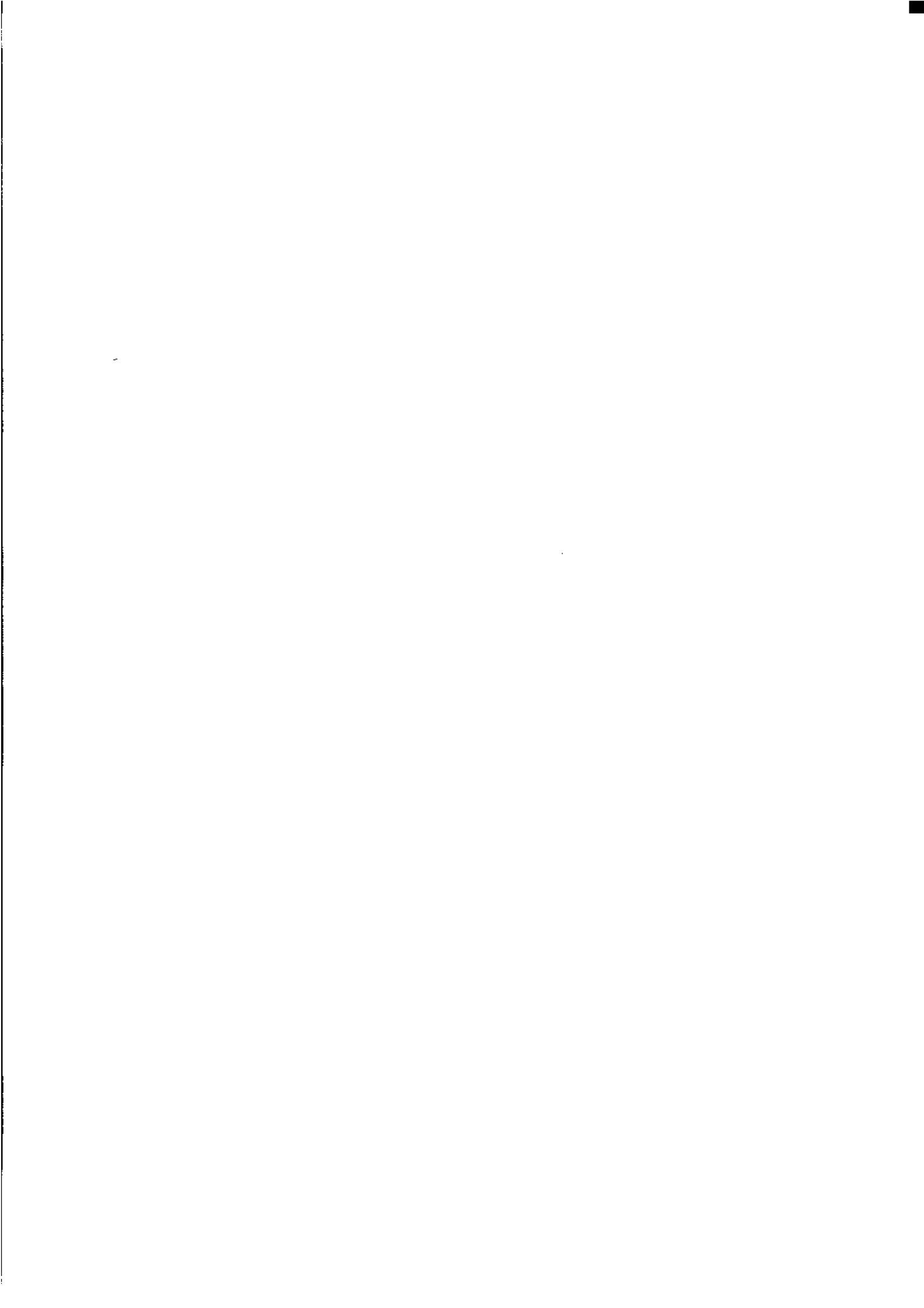

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## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

### OVERVIEW

An estimated 9,141,900 persons aged 15–69 years had worked at some time during the year ending February 1996. Some 91% of these persons were working in February 1996, with the balance either looking for work (4%) or not in the labour force (5%) (table 6).

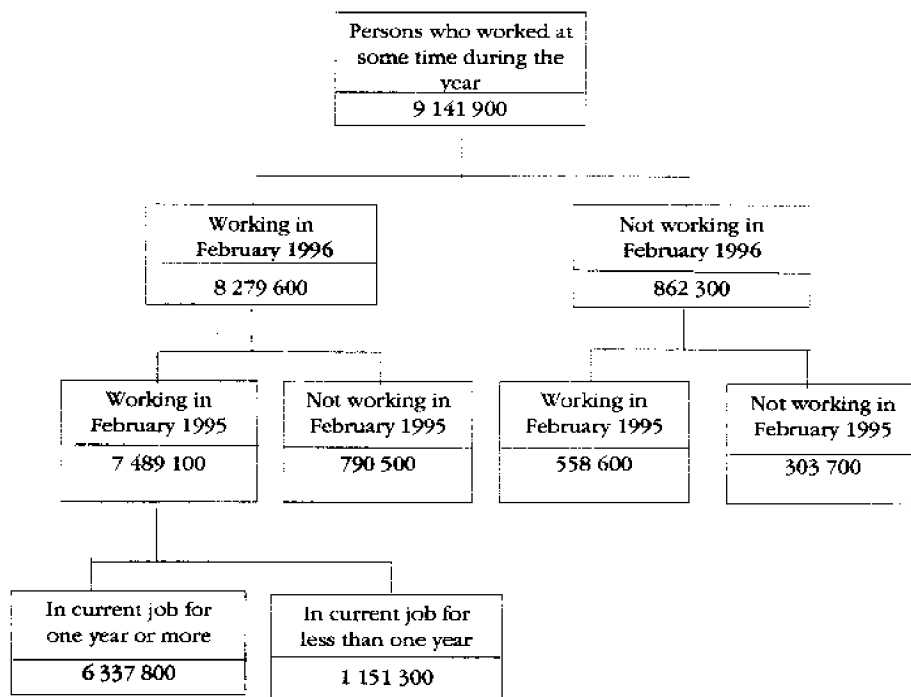
Of the 8,279,600 persons working in February 1996:

- 77% had been in their current job for the whole year;
- 15% had started their current job during the year and had a previous job during the year; and
- 9% had started their current job during the year and had no previous job during the year.

Some 1,241,900 persons working in February 1996 had a previous job during the year. Of these:

- 41% had changed industry from previous to current job; and
- 30% had changed occupation from previous to current job (table 1).

### 1 PERSONS WHO WORKED AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 1996

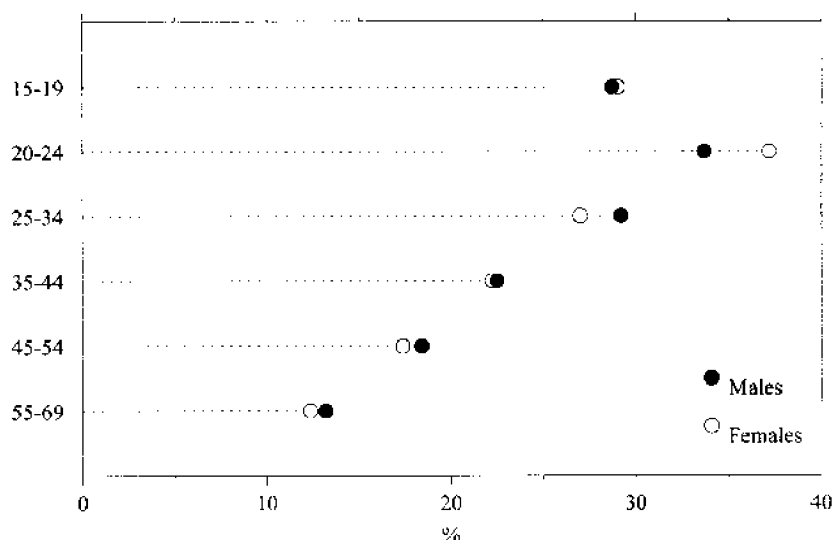

### JOB MOBILITY

Of the people who had worked at some time during the year ending February 1996, some 2,225,100 (24%) were job mobile, that is, they changed their job within the previous year. This represented a 2.2 percentage point increase on the level of job mobility during the year ended February 1994 (table 3).

Of the people who were job mobile during the year ending February 1996:

- 85% (1,889,600) changed their employer or business one or more times;
- 13% (287,200) changed locality one or more times while still working for the same employer or business; and
- 2% (48,300) changed both employer or business and locality one or more times.

Females who were job mobile were more likely to change their employer or business one or more times than males (86% compared with 84%).

Job mobility was greatest for persons aged 20–24 years (35% up from 31% in February 1994) and least for those aged 55–69 years (13% up from 9% in February 1994). Job mobility ratios for males and females were similar (24.2% and 24.5% respectively).

Family members tended to be less job mobile than non-family members (23% compared with 31%) and married persons were less job mobile than those who were not married (22% compared with 29%).

In married-couple families, 22% of husbands and 21% of wives were job mobile. In contrast, female lone parents were more likely to be job mobile than male lone parents (24% compared with 20%).

For persons who were not family members, job mobility was higher amongst those not living alone (35% of males and 39% of females) than amongst those living alone (26% of both males and females).

Job mobility amongst Australian-born persons (25%) was similar to that for those born overseas in main English speaking countries (26%). However, job mobility was markedly lower (at 17%) for those born in other countries.

Some 27% of persons with post-school qualifications were job mobile. Job mobility was lower amongst persons without post-school qualifications (23%) and persons still at school (17%).



INDUSTRY

Furthermore, of the people who did not have post-school qualifications, job mobility was considerably higher for those who had completed the highest level of secondary school (26%) compared with those who had not (21%).

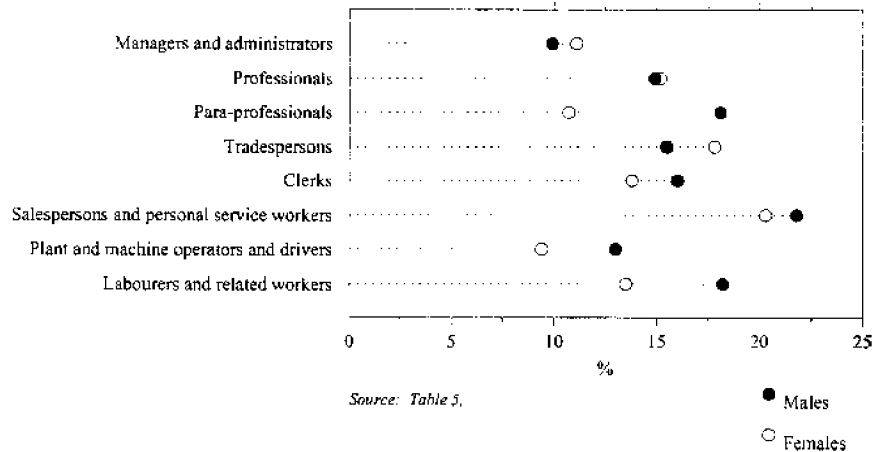
For people who had not completed the highest level of secondary school, the later they left school the more likely they were to be job mobile. For those who left school aged 14 years or less, only 15% were job mobile. In comparison, of those who left school aged 18 years or more, some 25% were job mobile (table 4).

Some 7,489,100 persons were working in February 1995 and February 1996. Of these, 85% had been in their current job for the entire year, 9% had changed to another job in the same industry and a further 7% had changed to a job in a different industry.

Of the persons who were working in both February 1995 and February 1996, the Agriculture, forestry and fishing industry had the highest proportion of persons staying in their current job for the full year (90%), while the Accommodation, cafes and restaurants industry had the lowest proportion (74%).

Of those who had changed jobs during the year, people in the Finance and insurance industry were the most likely to change to a job in the same industry (71%), while people employed in the Cultural and recreational services industry were the least likely (41%) (table 6).

OCCUPATION

Of the people who were working in both February 1995 and February 1996, 85% had remained in the same job for the whole year, 11% had changed their job but not their occupation (major group), and 4% had changed their job and their occupation (major group).

Managers and administrators were the most likely to have stayed in their current job for the full year (90%), while Salespersons and personal service workers were the least likely (79%).

Some 1,151,300 people changed jobs between February 1995 and February 1996. Of this group, Professionals were the least likely to change their occupation (major group) (14%), while Plant and machine operators and drivers were the most likely to change their occupation (major group) (45%).

Of the 28,900 Plant and machine operators and drivers who changed occupation, 13,400 (46%) became Labourers and related workers and 5,000 (17%) became Tradespersons (table 5).

STATE OF USUAL RESIDENCE

Some 138,400 persons who were working in both February 1995 and February 1996 had changed their State of usual residence.

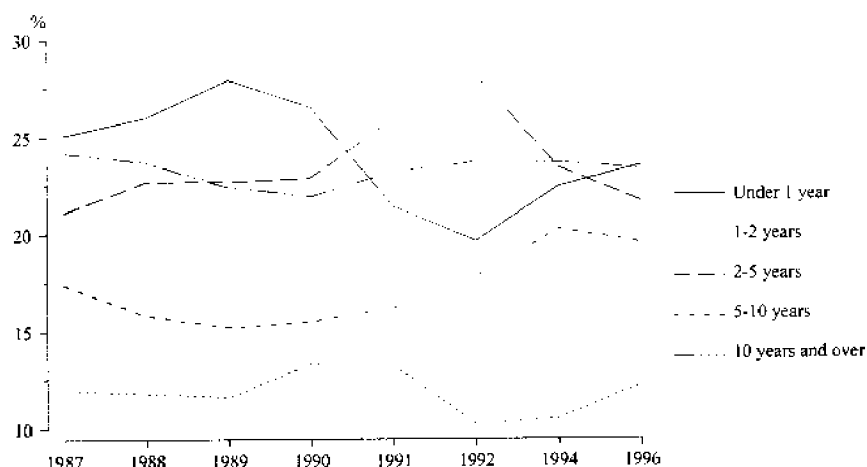
Of this group, 27% became usual residents of New South Wales, 22% became usual residents of Victoria and 22% became usual residents of Queensland (table 8).

FULL-TIME OR PART-TIME STATUS

Of the 7,489,100 persons who were working in both February 1995 and February 1996, 5,751,400 persons (77%) were working full time in both February 1995 and February 1996.

Of the people who had changed their job between February 1995 and February 1996, 82,600 (7%) had changed from a full-time job to a part-time job. A further 146,900 (13%) had changed from a part-time job to a full-time job (table 7).

DURATION OF CURRENT JOB

Of the people working at the time of the survey, the proportion who had been in their current job for less than one year increased from 20% in 1992, to 22% in 1994, and then to 24% in February 1996.

A higher proportion of males than females had been in their current job for 10 years or more (27% and 18% respectively) (table 2).

Some 1,941,800 persons who were working in February 1996 had been in their current job for less than one year. Of these persons:

- 19% worked in the Retail trade industry (table 11); and
- 23% were Salespersons and personal service workers and a further 20% were Labourers and related workers (table 10).

In contrast, of the 1,926,000 persons who were working in February 1996 and who had been in their current job for 10 years or more:

- 14% worked in the Manufacturing industry (table 11); and
- 20% were Managers and administrators and 16% were Professionals (table 10).

PERSONS WHO CEASED  
A JOB DURING THE YEAR

Of the 9,141,900 persons who had worked at some time during the year ending February 1996, 2,104,200 (23%) ceased a job during the year. Of those who had ceased a job, 1,371,900 (65%) were job leavers, while 732,300 (35%) were job losers. Over half of the job losers (57%) had been retrenched (compared with 68% in February 1992 and 62% in February 1994).

Some 51% of persons who had been retrenched in the year ending February 1996 had been in their last job for less than one year. Persons who had been in their last job for more than one but less than 10 years comprised a further 29% of retrenchments. Approximately two-thirds (66%) of retrenched persons were male.

Of the 1,371,900 job leavers, 215,100 (16%) had left their job due to unsatisfactory work conditions (compared with 125,300 (17%) in the year ending February 1992 and 171,900 (20%) in the year ending February 1994). Some 56% of these persons had worked in that job for less than 12 months (table 11).

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

### INTRODUCTION

**1** The monthly population survey (which is described in *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)), comprises the monthly Labour Force Survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the February 1996 Labour Force Survey conducted throughout Australia.

**2** Of the respondents to the Labour Force Survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked about their labour mobility for the 12 months up to the end of the week before the interview in February 1996.

### SCOPE

**3** The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the Labour Force Survey (described in full in *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)), except that it was restricted to persons who worked at some time during the year ending February 1996 and excluded persons aged 70 years or more, visitors to private dwellings, students who were boarding at school, patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of reformatories, gaols, etc.

**4** The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in February 1996. Because of emigration, deaths, etc. not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour mobility may relate to experience outside Australia.

### COVERAGE

**5** In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

### DEFINITIONS

**6** Definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

**7** Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.

### OTHER LABOUR MOBILITY DATA

**8** Results of similar surveys, conducted in November 1972, February 1975 and February 1976, annually from February 1979 to February 1992 and then in 1994, have been given in previous issues of this publication.

**9** This survey is scheduled to be conducted next in February 1998.

### UNPUBLISHED STATISTICS

**10** As well as the statistics included in this publication and related data services, the ABS may have other relevant unpublished data available. Inquiries should be made to the contact named in the Inquiries box on the Contents page.

### COMPARABILITY OF SERIES

**11** It is impracticable to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly Labour Force Survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference week. For the survey of labour mobility, a person is assigned to a labour force category on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms *working* and *looking for work* are used in this survey rather than the precisely defined terms *employed* and *unemployed* used in the monthly Labour Force Survey.



DISCONTINUITES IN THE SERIES

**12** The estimates from this survey are not strictly comparable with those obtained from all previous surveys. The scope of surveys run prior to February 1990 included persons aged 15 and over. From February 1990 the survey scope (see paragraph 3) was restricted to exclude all persons aged 70 and over. However the effect on the estimates is expected to be small.

SURVEY SAMPLE REDESIGN

**13** Prior to February 1990 this supplementary survey had been conducted on either 50% or 75% of the dwellings selected in the Labour Force Survey. From February 1990 to February 1994 this has been expanded to the full sample size. From February 1996 this supplementary survey has been restricted to seven-eighths of the full sample. As a result, the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to surveys conducted before February 1996.

CHANGES IN INDUSTRY CLASSIFICATIONS

**14** From August 1994, industry data are classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), a detailed description of which appears in the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (ANZSIC) (1292.0). Like the previous Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC), ANZSIC classifies businesses according to their economic activities, in a structure consisting of four levels; Division, Sub division, Group and Class. The lowest level to which persons are classified in the Labour Force Survey is the group level.

CHANGES IN FAMILY CLASSIFICATIONS

**15** The Relationship in household classification was previously referred to as 'Family Status'.

**16** Lone parents (previously referred to as Sole parents) now includes parents with non-dependent children (provided those children are without a spouse or children of their own).

**17** Dependent students (previously 'Full-time student aged 15-24') now comprises sons and daughters (of a couple or lone parent) aged 15-19 attending school or aged 15-24 attending a tertiary institution full time. Other related full-time students, who were previously classified as Full-time student aged 15-24 are now included in Other family persons.

**18** Non-dependent child now comprises the previous group Other child of married couple or family head.

**19** Other family persons now comprises the previous groups:

- Other family head (excluding those now counted as Lone parents);
- Other related full-time students (previously classified as Full-time students aged 15-24); and
- Other relative of married couple or family head.

For further details refer to *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

BENCHMARK REVISION

**20** From February 1994, the monthly Labour Force Survey and its supplementary surveys are based on population estimates from the 1991 Census of Population and Housing. While historical monthly labour force estimates were revised back to January 1989, results of supplementary surveys conducted before February 1994 were not revised and are based on population estimates from the 1986 Census of Population and Housing.

**21** The change to population estimates based on the 1991 Census of Population and Housing resulted in a downward revision to the size of the in-scope civilian population aged 15 and over (the January 1994 estimate of this population was revised from 13,960,400 to 13,860,400, a downward revision of 100,000 or approximately 1%).

**22** This change in the base population estimates should be considered when comparing the results of supplementary surveys conducted before February 1994 with results of those conducted after February 1994.

ESTIMATION PROCEDURE

**23** The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, sex and labour force status rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

**24** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For more information refer to the Technical Notes section.

## TECHNICAL NOTES

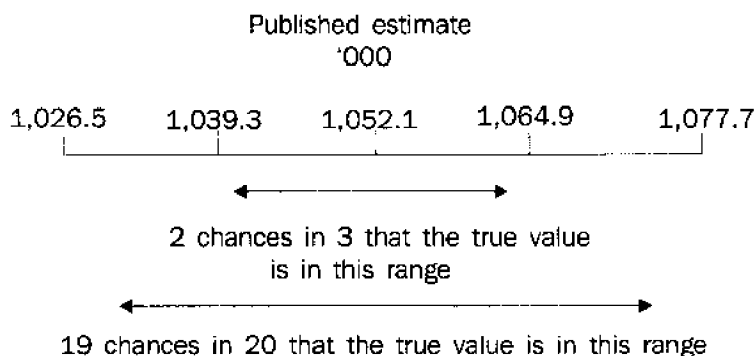
### INTRODUCTION

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on page 31. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics, these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

### CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 2 shows the estimated number of males who, in February 1996, had been in their current job for less than one year as 1,052,100. Since this estimate is between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 the table below shows that the standard error for Australia will be between 12,600 and 16,300 in the standard error table and can be approximated by interpolation as 12,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 1,039,300 to 1,064,900 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 1,026,500 to 1,077,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram:



As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In these tables only estimates with relative standard errors of 25% or less (and percentages based on such estimates) are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates and percentages with larger relative standard errors have been included, and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. \*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.

#### PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling error. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is:

$$RSE(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 + [RSE(y)]^2}$$

Considering the example from paragraph Calculation of Standard Error, 1,052,100 males represent 22.4% of the 4,698,900 males working in February 1996. The standard error of 4,698,900 is approximately 21,900, so the relative standard error is 0.5%. The relative standard error for 1,052,100 is 1.2%. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(1.2)^2 + (0.5)^2}$  or 1.1%, giving a standard error for the proportion (22.4%) of 0.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who had been in their current job for less than one year is between 22.2% and 22.6% and 19 chances in 20 the proportion is within the range 22.0% to 22.8%.

#### SAMPLING ERROR

Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is also subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in these tables.

#### NON-SAMPLING ERROR

The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce non-sampling errors to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

## GLOSSARY

<b>Ceased a job</b>	Refer to definitions of job leavers and job losers.
<b>Change of locality</b>	<p>In capital cities and major towns each suburb is considered to be a different locality. Where a person works at different sites for the same employer (for example, a construction worker), their base of operations (i.e. the employer's office, depot, yard, etc.) is considered to be their locality.</p> <p>The movement of an employer's operations to premises in a different locality would entail a change of locality for employees.</p>
<b>Current job</b>	The job in which the person worked in the week before the interview for an employer/business. Where the person worked in more than one job during this period, the main job, i.e. the job in which most hours were usually worked, was regarded as the current job.
<b>Duration of current job</b>	The period between the commencement of the current job up to the week before the interview.
<b>Duration of last job</b>	The period between the commencement of the last job up to the week the person ceased working in that job.
<b>Educational attainment</b>	Measures the highest qualification completed by the respondent, classified according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ).
<b>Family</b>	<p>Two or more related persons (comprises relationships by blood, marriage or adoption) usually resident in the same household at the time of the survey. A family comprises a married couple or a family head as defined, together with any persons having any of the following relationships to them:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>▪ sons or daughters of any age, if not married and with no children of their own present;</li><li>▪ other relatives if not accompanied by a spouse, sons or daughters, or parents of their own; or</li><li>▪ any children under 15 years of age who do not have a parent present.</li></ul> <p>Further details on the determination of family relationships are given in <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (6203.0).</p>
<b>Industry</b>	Unless otherwise specified, all occurrences of industry in these tables refer to Industry Division as defined by the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) 1993, and relate to main job. Unpublished industry data is available at Industry Group level.
<b>Job</b>	Employment as a wage or salary earner (or unpaid family helper) by particular employer, in a particular locality and self-employment (with or without employees) in a particular locality.

<b>Job leavers</b>	Persons who ceased their last job voluntarily, that is, because: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ of unsatisfactory work arrangements/pay/hours;</li> <li>▪ the job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they left that job to return to studies;</li> <li>▪ they retired, started a new business, got a better job, left for family or other reasons; or</li> <li>▪ changed locality but not employer/business for employment, personal or other reasons.</li> </ul>
<b>Job losers</b>	Persons who ceased their last job involuntarily, that is: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ they were retrenched or their business closed down because of financial difficulties;</li> <li>▪ their job was temporary or seasonal and they did not leave that job to return to studies; or</li> <li>▪ they left their job because of their own ill-health or injury.</li> </ul>
<b>Job mobile</b>	Defined as a change of job which may involve: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ a change of employer/business; or</li> <li>▪ a change of locality without a change of employer/business.</li> </ul>
<b>Last job</b>	The last job in which employment was ceased during the reference period.
<b>Looking for work</b>	Out of work and looking for a job.
<b>Main English speaking countries</b>	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, the United States of America, New Zealand and South Africa.
<b>Not in the labour force</b>	Not working and not looking for a job.
<b>Number of changes in locality during the year</b>	For persons currently working, it is the number of times they have changed locality with respect to their current employer or business. For persons not currently working, it is the number of times they have changed locality with respect to their last employer or business.
<b>Occupation</b>	Unless otherwise specified, all occurrences of occupation in this publication refer to Major Group as defined by the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) 1986.
<b>Previous job</b>	Refer to definition of last job.
<b>Reference period</b>	The 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview.
<b>Working</b>	Working or on leave.
