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### SURVEY OF LEAVERS FROM SCHOOLS, UNIVERSITIES OR OTHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS -FEBRUARY, 1964, 1965 AND 1966

This bulletin contains statistics which were obtained by means of surveys carried out in February, 1964, 1965 and 1966. The questions were designed to distinguish persons who had attended full-time at a school, university or other educational institution at some time in the previous year and, further, to distinguish among these persons, those who were intending to return to full-time education and those who were not returning to full-time education, the latter being described in this publication as "leavers".

2. On each occasion the survey was conducted by means of a multi-stage area sample. Estimates based on the survey relate to the total population of Australia within the age range 14 to 24 years, with the exception of members of the permanent armed forces, national servicemen enlisted in the Regular Army Supplement and certain diplomatic personnel, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations.

3. Persons who were patients in hospitals and sanatoria, or inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc., and for whom, for the purpose of the survey, the institution was regarded as their dwelling, although included in the survey, were not asked the particular questions on attendance at schools, etc. Persons who were reported as permanently unable to work were also not asked these questions. An estimate of the total number of such persons for whom no information on attendance, etc., can be given is shown in Table 1.

4. The "leavers", i.e. the persons who had attended full-time at a school, university, etc., at some time in the previous year and who were not returning to full-time education, were asked to indicate when they had ceased full-time education and these times of leaving are shown in Table 3(i).

5. All persons were asked questions about their occupational status and those in the work force were further questioned about occupation and industry. Occupational status is shown in Table 4 for "leavers", but not for persons returning to full-time education. Although many of these latter persons were in the work force at the time of the surveys, their numbers would not give a useful indication of the extent of vacation working, because of the timing of the surveys. The reference period to which the work force information refers, which is the week preceding the interview, extends from the last week in January to the third week in February. Hence, between the first and last weeks the level of school vacation jobholding would have decreased very substantially and that of university vacation jobholding might also have declined.

6. For the purposes of these surveys the occupational status of a person depends upon his activity during a specified week. The principal categories are the employed and unemployed, which together constitute the work force, and the remainder, who are not in the work force. Details of the classification are as follows:-

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- (i) Employed Persons: all those who, during the specified week
  - (a) did any work for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind, in a job or business, or on a farm (the category includes employees, employers and workers on own account), or
  - (b) worked 15 hours or more without pay in a family business (or farm), owned and operated by a member of the same household, or
  - (c) had a job, buziness or farm, but were not at work because of illness, accident, leave or holiday, industrial dispute or because of production hold-up due to bad weather, plant breakdown, etc.

Persons who had a job but were temporarily laid off by their employers for the whole week without pay are excluded, and are classified in the tables as unemployed. Persons who did some work during the week, however, before they either lost their jobs or were laid off, are classified as employed.

- (11) <u>Unemployed Persons</u>: all those who, during the specified week, did no work at all, and
  - (a) did not have a job or business and were looking for work (including those who stated that they would have looked for work had they not been temporarily ill, and those who would have looked for work had they not already made definite arrangements to start work in a new job after the specified week), or
  - (b) were laid off from their jobs without pay for the whole week.

Persons who either lost their jobs or were laid off <u>during</u> the specified week, but did some work during that week, are classified as employed.

- (iii) <u>The Work Force</u>: comprises all persons, who, during the specified week, were employed or unemployed as defined in (i) and (ii) above.
- (iv) <u>Persons Not in the Work Force</u>: those who, during the specified week, were not classified as employed or unemployed. This category therefore includes persons without a job, business or farm and not looking for work.

7. Since the survey estimates are based on a sample they are subject to sampling variability, that is, variations that might occur by chance because only a sample of the population is enumerated. Estimates of less than 5,000 are not published in the tables because they would be subject to sampling variability too high for most practical purposes. Although figures for these small components can, in some cases, be derived from the tables by deduction, undue significance should not be attached to them. Further information on variability of survey estimates is available on request.

NOTE. Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components are due to rounding.
