

The May 1993 edition of this publication incorporates a number of changes to the content of tables compared to the May 1992 edition. Some tables have been deleted, other tables have been amended and new tables inserted in the publication. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Because of methodological differences, estimates of average earnings from this survey vary slightly from the estimates obtained from the quarterly survey of Average Weekly Earnings (6302.0).

Key Findings

Between May 1992 and May 1993:

- Median earnings for full-time adult non-managerial males increased by 5.2 per cent and female median earnings increased by 2.7 per cent.
- Average weekly total earnings increased by 4.0 per cent for full-time adult non-managerial employees and median earnings increased by 4.9 per cent.
- Relative to male earnings, the average weekly ordinary time earnings of full-time adult nonmanagerial females fell from 91.9 per cent (in 1992) to 91.1 per cent.
- Relative to male earnings, the average weekly total earnings (including overtime) for full-time adult non-managerial females fell from 85.8 per cent in 1992 to 84.4 per cent in 1993.
- Average weekly overtime earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees increased by 15.5 per cent for males and 15.4 per cent for females.
- Overaward pay for full-time adult non-managerial females fell from \$7.00 to \$6.20 per week, and fell slightly for males from \$10.70 to \$10.50.
- The largest increases in average weekly total carnings for full-time adults were recorded by male Plant and machine operators, and drivers (7.0%) and female Tradespersons (6.7%).
- Payment by measured result, overaward pay and overtime accounted for 9.8 per cent of fultime adult non-managerial employees gross weekly earnings in 1993, compared to 9.3 per cent in 1992.

In May 1993:

- The average weekly total earnings was \$526.40 for all employees, and \$601.50 for full-time adult non-managerial employees.
- Full-time adult non-managerial employees were paid on average for 39.7 hours per week including paid overtime (37.8 hours excluding overtime).
- The major occupation groups to record the highest levels of overaward pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees were male Tradespersons (\$16.70) and male Plant and machine operators, and drivers (\$13.10).
- The percentage of female employees who were classified as full-time adult managerial employees (3.9% public sector, 7.4% private sector) was significantly lower than for males (11.8% public sector, 20.6% private sector) refer table 3.
- The industry with the highest average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was the Mining industry (males \$1,026.20, females \$715.10).
- Managers and administrators was the major occupation group with the highest average weekly total carnings for full-time adult employees (males \$929.20, females \$708.40).


Introduction

This publication presents information on the composition and distribution of the earnings of wage and salary earner employees in Australia at May 1993 obtained from the Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours (EEH Survey). It is estimated that there were 5,585,000 employees at May 1993. Of these, 3,276,400 were classified as full-time adult non-managerial employees.

There are a number of different groupings of employees for which composition and distribution of earnings data could be presented. The following analysis mainly presents information about full-time adult non-managerial employees, being a picture of earnings for a reasonably homogeneous grouping of employees. Some analysis is provided for other groupings of employees such as part-time non-managerial employees and earnings of females relative to males.

Diagram 1 illustrates the various categories of employees (managerial/non-managerial, adult/junior etc) that are collected in the EEH Survey. It also presents the approximate number of employees in each category and their percentage contribution to the total number of employees within scope of the EEH Survey. The Survey is not designed to specifically provide estimates of number of employees and therefore these figures should be regarded only as indicative measures of total employment in the categories indicated.




Distribution of earnings

Full-time adult non-managerial employees

As well as reporting averages, the Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours (EEH) shows how earnings are distributed among employees. Diagram 2 displays the shape of the distribution of weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees. The graph is skewed to the right because of the relatively small percentage of very high salary earners.

Average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial male and female employees in May 1993 were \$639.60 and \$540.00 respectively. This was a 4.7 per cent increase for males and a 3.0 per cent rise for females from May 1992 to May 1993.

The EEH Survey also provides measures of the spread or dispersion of earnings. Median earnings is the dollar amount that divides employees into two equal groups; one half earning amounts less than the median, and the other half earning more than the median. The median can be compared with the upper and lower deciles (or quartiles), ie the earnings levels which mark off the top and bottom 10 per cent (or 25 per cent) of employees.

The table on page 4 presents such comparisons. It shows that in May 1993 the median (50th percentile) level of total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was \$554.80 per week - lower than the average (or mean), as the latter was boosted by the relatively small number of people at the top end of the distribution. At the bottom of the distribution, a tenth of full-time adult non-managerial employees earned less than \$389.70 per week; at the top a tenth carned more than \$854.10.



The ratio between the upper and lower deciles - 2.2 in May 1993 - gives a measure of the spread or dispersion of weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees. The dispersion of weekly total earnings widened slightly (from 2.1 in May 1992 to 2.2 in May 1993), as weekly total earnings increased by 1.5 per cent at the bottom decile and by 3.7 per cent at the top.

The median (50th percentile) weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial male employees in May 1993 was \$589.50, a rise of 5.2 per cent on May 1992 (\$560.50). The median weekly total earnings for females rose by 2.7 per cent over the same period (to \$501.90).

Diagram 3 below shows all ten decile ranges of weekly total earnings in May 1993. For each of these it lists an occupation for which the average weekly total earnings (for males and females together) was within the decile range.



All Employees

For all employees, median weekly total earnings in May 1993 were \$574.10 for males and \$404.10 for females, increases of 4.7 per cent and 1.5 per cent respectively on May 1992. The concentration of females in the lower earnings ranges is because a large proportion of part-time employees are female (75.5%), managerial employees are predominantly male (74.3%), and females receive considerably less overtime, on average, than males.

Composition of earnings (Full-time adult non-managerial employees - refer table 11)

Award or base rate of pay

Between May 1992 and May 1993, the award or agreed base rate of pay component of average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees decreased by 0.9 percentage points for males (to 87.1%) but remained the same for females (96.0%). The decrease for males was caused by a greater contribution by overtime to average weekly earnings in May 1993.



For occupations, the lowest proportion for award or agreed base pay component was recorded for Plant and machine operators, and drivers (males 78.1%, females 89.5%). This group recorded relatively large amounts of overtime and payment by measured result. The highest base pay proportion was recorded for male and female Professionals, 95.8 per cent and 98.1 per cent respectively.

The proportion of total earnings accounted for by the award or agreed base pay component varied considerably between industries and sexes. For males in the Mining industry, base pay accounted for only 70.7 per cent, while payment by measured result (12.3%) and overtime (15.6%) were significant contributors to total earnings. This compares with females in Mining who reported a base pay component of 88.1 per cent. The highest proportions for the base pay component were recorded in the Community services industry (males 95.1%, females 98.4%).

Diagram 4 below illustrates the change over time of the 'award or agreed base rate of pay' component as a percentage of total weekly earnings. For males, the pattern of change between 1989 and 1993 largely reflects the variation in overtime worked.

Overtime


In May 1993, average weekly overtime earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees were \$61.80 for males and \$13.50 for females. This corresponded with average overtime hours of 2.7 for males and 0.7 for females. Between May 1992 and May 1993 average overtime earnings increased by 15.5 per cent for males and 15.4 per cent for females.

The major occupation group to record the highest level of weekly overtime earnings was Plant and machine operators, and drivers, where male and female overtime earnings were \$114.30 and \$31.80 respectively. The lowest overtime earnings were recorded for male Salespersons and personal service workers (\$19.20), and for female Professionals (\$8.90).

Overtime earnings increased, on average, by 14.9 per cent between 1992 and 1993. The largest percentage increases occurred in the Communication industry (43.4%), Finance, property and business services industry (24.5%), Construction industry (23.2%) and the Transport and storage industry (23.0%).

Males earned more overtime pay than females in all of the published industries - see Diagram 5 below and table 11. The highest overtime earnings recorded for full-time adult non-managerial males occurred in the Mining (\$160.40), Transport and storage (\$103.70) and Construction (\$99.00) industries. For females, the highest overtime payments were made in Transport and storage (\$33.90), Communication (\$30.80) and Mining (\$30.60) industries.

Taking into consideration only those employees who received overtime pay in the reference week (refer table 13), the industry to record the highest average weekly overtime earnings was Mining. Males in this industry received \$286.30 for an average of 11.6 hours overtime while females were paid \$131.00 for 6.7 hours.

Overtime, as a percentage of weekly total earnings, has increased slightly since 1992 for both male and female full-time adult non-managerial employees. In 1993, overtime earnings accounted for 9.7 per cent of average weekly total earnings for males (from 8.8 per cent in 1992), and 2.5 per cent of female average weekly total earnings (from 2.2 per cent in 1992).

Overaward pay

Average weekly overaward pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees decreased by 11.4 per cent for females and 1.9 per cent for males between May 1992 and May 1993. Females recorded an average of \$6.20, down from \$7.00 in May 1992, while males recorded \$10.50, down from \$10.70 in May 1992.


The major occupation groups to record the highest levels of overaward pay were male Tradespersons (\$16.70) and male Plant and machine operators, and drivers (\$13.10).

For males, major increases (in absolute \$ terms) in overaward pay between May 1992 and May 1993 were recorded in Mining, and Wholesale trade industries (up \$5.00 and \$3.80 respectively). The largest decreases occurred in the Construction and Finance, property and business services industries (down \$5.00 and \$4.60 respectively).

Overaward pay for females fell in Retail trade, Wholesale trade and Manufacturing industries (down \$4.90, \$4.00 and \$2.20 respectively). Overaward pay for females increased by \$2.00 in the Recreation, personal and other services industry.

Diagram 6 and table 11 show the average weekly overaward pay recorded for full-time adult non-managerial males and females, by industry of employer.

Earnings by occupation (Full-time adult employees)

In May 1993, the highest average weekly total earnings for full-time adult employees (refer table 2) were recorded in the following major occupation groups:


- Managers and administrators (males \$929.20, females \$708.40)
- Professionals (males \$866.20, females \$707.00)
- Para-professionals (males \$738.80, females \$666.60)

Across all occupation groups, increases in average weekly total earnings between May 1992 and May 1993 were relatively low (males 4.8%, females 2.7%). The largest increases in average weekly total earnings for full-time adults were recorded by male Plant and machine operators, and drivers (7.0%) and female Tradespersons (6.7%).

The smallest increases in average weekly total earnings for full-time adults occurred for female Managers and administrators (1.0%), and male Salespersons and personal service workers (0.8%).

Full-time adult males recorded larger percentage increases than females in average weekly total earnings for all major occupation groups except Tradespersons, and Salespersons and personal service workers (refer diagram 7 below).

Differences in the occupational distribution of employees can significantly affect earnings of males and females in the private and public sectors.

For all male employees in the private sector, average weekly total earnings was \$593.90, equivalent to 86.3 per cent of male earnings in the public sector (\$687.90). For females, the corresponding figure was \$373.40 in the private sector, equivalent to 72.2 per cent of female earnings in the public sector (\$517.10).

It is apparent that the gap in earnings between sectors is larger for females than for males. The main reasons for the difference are the large number of private sector females in the lower paid occupations including Salespersons and personal service workers, and the high number of public sector females in the Professional and Para-professional occupations. Another contributing factor is that the majority of part-time female employees are in the private sector.

Earnings by industry (Full-time adult non-managerial employees - refer table 11)

For full-time adult non-managerial employees, the highest average weekly total earnings were recorded in the following industries:

Males:

- Mining \$1,026.20
- Community services \$690.20
- Transport and storage \$685.30

Females:

- Mining \$715.10
- Community services \$602.60
- Communication \$578.40

Industries recording the lowest estimates of average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees were:

Males:

- Retail trade \$500.00
- Recreation, personal and other services \$568.90
- Wholesale trade \$577.20


Females:

- Retail trade \$423.00
- Construction \$472.40
- Recreation, personal and other services \$479.60

The largest percentage increases between May 1992 and May 1993 in average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees occurred in Recreation, personal and other services (males 9.1%, females 10.7%) and Mining (males 8.9%, females 10.7%) industries.

Diagram 8 shows the percentage change in major industries for average weekly total earnings between May 1992 and May 1993.

Earnings and hours by sector (Full-time adult non-managerial employees - refer tables 3, 10 and 11)

Full-time adult non-managerial employees, as shown in table 3, made up 72.1 per cent of all public sector employees, and 53.2 per cent of private sector employees.

Table 11 shows that weekly award or agreed base pay for public sector employees was, on average, \$107.30 more than that of the private sector. Average payments for overaward pay, overtime pay and payment by measured result increased the private sector average weekly total earnings by \$72.20 compared to an increase of \$35.50 for Public Sector. This reduced the difference between the average for the sectors to \$70.50.

Overaward pay was considerably higher in the private sector (males \$15.00, females \$9.60) compared to males and females in the public sector (\$2.00 and \$0.40 respectively). Between 1992 and 1993 overaward pay fell in the private sector (5.1% for males, 15.0% for females) and increased by 17.6 per cent for males in the public sector and stayed the same for females at \$0.40.

Average weekly overtime earnings of employees in the private sector (males \$69.50, females \$15.00) were considerably higher than employees in the public sector (males \$47.40, females \$10.80). Overtime pay increased between 1992 and 1993 at a slightly higher rate for the private sector compared to the public sector. Average overtime earnings per hour differed between sectors and sexes. In the private sector, males averaged \$21.70 per overtime hour and females \$18.80, compared to \$24.90 per overtime hour for males and \$27.00 for females in the public sector.

Average weekly total hours paid for, as shown in table 11, were higher for the private sector (40.4) than the public sector (38.5). Private sector employees were paid, on average, for 0.9 ordinary time hours and 1.0 overtime hours more than employees in the public sector.

The percentage of full-time adult non-managerial employees in the public sector who were paid for 35 hours and under 37 hours per week was 36.7 per cent compared to only 9.1 per cent of employees in the private sector. At the other end of the spectrum 9.6 per cent of full-time adult non-managerial private sector employees were paid for more than 48 hours per week, which was more than double the 4.3 per cent of employees in this category in the public sector. These figures have been calculated using table 10.

Earnings of females relative to males

Full-time adult non-managerial employees

Full-time adult non-managerial females earned 91.1 per cent of the male average weekly ordinary time earnings in 1993, compared to 91.9 per cent in 1992, a fall of 0.8 percentage points. In May 1993 females in the public sector earned 95.3 per cent of ordinary time male earnings, compared with 88.0 per cent in the private sector.

Female average weekly total earnings were 84.4 per cent of male weekly total earnings in May 1993 compared to 85.8 per cent of male earnings in May 1992. The increase in the gap between male and female total earnings (an increase of 1.4 percentage points) was mainly caused by a lower percentage increase between May 1992 and May 1993 in award or base rate of pay for females.

At the broad occupation level, the largest gap (in percentage terms) between male and female ordinary time earnings in May 1993 was for Plant and machine operators, and drivers where female earnings were 73.4 per cent of male earnings. Female clerks received, on average, 90.3 per cent of male ordinary time earnings in May 1992; this fell to 87.8 per cent in May 1993.

Overaward pay for females fell between 1992 and 1993 by \$0.80 (to \$6.20) and fell slightly for males from \$10.70 to \$10.50. Clerks was the only major occupation group where females earned more overaward pay, in 1993, than males. The largest percentage difference between male and female overaward pay was for Salespersons and personal service workers where females received 32.8 per cent of the male overaward pay (\$4.00 for females and \$12.20 for males).

Taking into consideration only those employees who received overtime pay, males earned, on average, \$85.60 more overtime than females (males \$182.40, females \$96.80). The industry (refer table 13) with the highest absolute difference between male and female paid overtime was Construction (\$185.60) and the industry with the lowest difference was Recreation, personal and other services (\$5.40).

The minor occupation group with the greatest difference between male and female average weekly total earnings was Specialist medical practitioners, where males earned \$662.10 more than females (refer table 12). The minor occupation group with the smallest difference between male and female earnings was Registered nurses (\$1.10 more for males). Examples of occupation groups where females recorded higher average weekly total earnings than males were Announcers (\$233.50 more), Authors and related professionals (\$193.90 more) and Kitchen hands (\$12.20 more).

At May 1993, 7.2 per cent of full-time adult non-managerial males earned \$1,000 or more per week, compared with 1.1 per cent of females. There were 8.8 per cent of males and 17.9 per cent of females who earned less than \$400 per week.

Average ordinary time hourly earnings (Non-managerial employees - refer table 7)


Adults

The average ordinary time hourly earnings for all full-time non-managerial adults was \$14.80. The percentage of all non-managerial adults who earned \$15 and over per hour was 36.9 per cent, while 9.2 per cent earned less than \$10 per hour.

Juniors

The average ordinary time hourly earnings for all full-time juniors was \$7.60. Only 0.6 per cent of full-time juniors earned \$15 and over per hour and 1.7 per cent earned less than \$4 per hour. Almost half (47.7%) of full-time juniors earned between \$6 and \$9 per hour.

Average weekly hours paid for (Full-time adult non-managerial employees - refer tables 10, 11 and 13)

In May 1993 the average weekly ordinary time hours for full-time adult non-managerial employees was 37.9 hours for males and 37.5 hours for females. Including overtime hours, the average total weekly hours paid for were 40.7 hours for males (39.2 hours in the public sector compared to 41.5 hours in the private sector), and 38.2 hours for females (37.4 hours in the public sector and 38.6 hours in the private sector).

An estimated 8.7 per cent of all full-time adult non-managerial males were paid for working 50 or more hours per week (including overtime) (10.9% of males in the private sector, and 4.5% of males in the public sector). This is an increase of 2.7 percentage points since May 1992. For females, 1.3% were paid for 50 hours or more (1.7% in the private sector and 0.7% in the public sector). The percentage of males who were paid for less than 38 hours in total was 23.3% (40.1% of males in the public sector and 14.5% in the private sector), and 39.7% of females were paid for less than 38 hours in total (58.8% of females in the public sector and 28.6% in the private sector).

The number of overtime hours paid for varies greatly between males and females, and between occupations, industries and States. The average weekly overtime hours given below refer to those full-time adult non-managerial employees who were paid overtime in the reference week (refer table 13).

The average weekly overtime hours for full-time adult non-managerial employees receiving overtime was 7.4 hours, with the difference between male and female overtime hours being 3.4 (8.1 hours overtime for males and 4.7 hours overtime for females).

Plant and machine operators and drivers was the major occupation group with the highest average weekly overtime hours (9.6 hours). The lowest average weekly overtime hours paid for was recorded by Salespersons and personal service workers (4.7 hours).

For both males and females the Mining industry recorded the highest average weekly overtime hours (11.6 hours and 6.7 hours respectively). The industry recording the lowest male overtime hours paid for was Recreation, personal and other services (4.7 hours). For females, the lowest overtime hours paid for were recorded in the Public administration and defence industry (3.5 hours).

Part-time employees


Of persons employed within the scope of the EEH Survey, approximately 25.3 per cent were part-time employees. Of all females employed, 41.5 per cent were part-time employees compared to 11.4 per cent of all males. In the private sector, 45.3 per cent of all female employees and 13.3 per cent of all male employees were classified as part-time. In comparison, 32.2 per cent of all females and 7.0 per cent of all males in the public sector were part-time employees. Females made up 75.7 per cent of part-time non-managerial employees and males 24.3 per cent.

Non-Managerial Adult / Junior Ordinary Time Hourly Earnings (Refer table 7)

At May 1993, part-time adult employees in non-managerial occupations recorded an average ordinary time hourly rate of \$14.20 while juniors earned \$8.30 per hour on average.

Part-time adult non-managerial males in each of the major occupation groups, with the exception of Para-professionals, recorded a higher average ordinary time hourly rate of pay than females (refer diagram 10 on page 13). For part-time non-managerial juniors, the female ordinary time hourly rate of pay exceeded the male rate for the major occupation group Labourers and related workers.

The proportion of part-time adults who earned \$20.00 or more per hour was 13.3 per cent. For part-time adults, 61.5 per cent earned less than \$14.00 per hour and 9.0 per cent received less than \$10.00 per hour. For part-time juniors, 63.6 per cent earned less than \$9.00 per hour with 48.4 per cent earning between \$6.00 and \$9.00. The ordinary time hourly rate for part-time adult females was equal to 96.6 per cent of the part-time adult male rate. Part-time junior females received 96.5 per cent of the junior male rate.

Non-managerial weekly total hours paid for (refer table 16)

The highest concentration (23.8%) of part-time non-managerial adult females were paid between 20 and 26 weekly hours compared to 17.2 per cent of males in the same hourly category. 46.9 per cent pf part-time adult male employees, and 33.6 per cent of females, worked less than 14 weekly total hours.

At May 1993, 63.4 per cent of part-time junior non-managerial employees were female. Approximately 50.8 per cent of junior females and 57.0 per cent of junior males were paid for less than 10 hours in the week.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains estimates obtained from a sample survey of employers conducted in May 1993. The survey is designed to provide statistics on the distribution of employees according to weekly earnings and hours, and on the composition of weekly earnings and hours for various categories of employees and principal occupations.

2. Preliminary estimates were published in Distribution and Composition of Employee Earnings and Hours, Australia, May 1993, Preliminary (6305.0) on 29 November 1993.

Scope of the survey

- 3. All wage and salary earners who received pay for the reference period are represented in the survey, except:
 - members of the Australian permanent defence forces;
 - employees of enterprises primarily engaged in agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting;
 - · employees in private households employing staff;
 - · employees of overseas embassies, consulates, etc.;
 - · employees based outside Australia; and
 - employees on workers' compensation who are not paid through the payroll.
- 4.. Also excluded are the following persons who are not regarded as employees for the purposes of this survey:
 - directors who are not paid a salary;
 - proprietors/partners of unincorporated businesses; and
 - self-employed persons such as subcontractors, owner/drivers, consultants and persons paid solely by commission without a retainer.

Survey design

5. A sample of approximately 8,200 employers is selected from the ABS register of businesses to ensure adequate State and industry representation. The statistical unit for the survey comprises all activities of an enterprise in a particular State or Territory. Each statistical unit is classified to an industry which reflects the predominant activity of the enterprise in the State or Territory. In a small number of cases where an enterprise has significant employment in more than one industry, a separate statistical unit is created for each industry. The statistical units are stratified by State, public/private sector, industry and size of employment, and a simple random sample is selected from each stratum.

- 6. Employers with fewer than 10 employees are required to complete details for every employee, while those with 10 or more employees are required to select a random sample of their employees in accordance with instructions supplied by the ABS. Data for approximately 75,000 employees was obtained in the survey.
- 7. Although the sample is not designed specifically to provide estimates of numbers of employees, it is estimated that 3,020,600 male and 2,564,400 female employees are within the scope of the survey. These and other estimates of numbers of employees included in this publication should be regarded only as indicative measures of total employment in the categories indicated

Industry classification

8. Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) 1983 Edition, Volume 1 — The Classification (1201.0). The following table shows details of the ASIC industries used in the publication (More detailed information may be available on request).

Standard Institutional Sector Classification of Australia (SISCA)

9. SISCA is a system for classifying institutional units by broad economic functions and is a key component of the general national accounting framework. For the purposes of these statistics the classification has been used to separate the public sector into public business enterprises (trading and financial) and general government enterprises. Certain public sector data have been classified by SISCA and are presented in Table 5.

Occupation

- 10. Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO), based on the title and description of the job.
- 11. Care should be taken when comparing survey estimates based on ASCO groups with estimates based on the managerial/non-managerial status of employees, which is determined and reported by the employer. Estimates for employees with manager status include employees classified to ASCO categories other than the ASCO major group 'Managers and Administrators'; e.g. employees classified as Professionals according to ASCO may be categorised by employers as having managerial status. Conversely, tables in this publication which contain estimates for non-managerial employees (as defined by employers) will include some employees who would be classified to the ASCO major group 'Managers and Administrators'.
- 12. Details of ASCO can be found in ASCO: Statistical Classification First Edition (1222.0), and an Information Paper: ASCO Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, April 1991 (1221.0).

Comparability of results

- 13. Because of the substantially improved coverage of employers provided by the ABS register of businesses and modifications to some definitions, results from surveys conducted after 1981 are not strictly comparable with those for surveys conducted between 1974 and 1981.
- 14. Care should be taken when comparing the results of this survey with the quarterly series Average Weekly Earnings, States and Australia (6302.0), as a different sample design and survey methodology are used. The Average Weekly Earnings survey collects information relating to total employment of organisations selected in the survey, whereas results from the Employee Earnings and Hours survey are obtained in relation to a sample of employees within the organisations selected. In addition, the size of the sample for the Employee Earnings and Hours survey is much larger than that for the Average Weekly Earnings survey.
- 15. Because of the two stage sampling methodology used for this survey to arrive at a sample of employees, it is not possible to ensure that the representation of all the subgroups of interest in the sample accurately reflect their representation in the population.
- 16. Considerable care is taken in questionnaire design and in the instructions given to employers on how to select samples of their employees. All survey returns are subjected to careful editing to detect reporting errors, inconsistencies and transcription errors. Ultimately, however, the quality of survey results depends on the quality of the information provided by survey respondents and adherence to specified procedures.
- 17. In the May 1993 Employee Earnings and Hours publications (6305.0 and 6306.0) payments resulting from enterprise bargaining awards and agreements have been included in 'Award or agreed base rate of pay'. The ABS collected these enterprise payments separately from award

pay in the May 1992 and May 1993 Surveys but a significant number of employers were not able to separately indentify them. Users comparing movements in overaward pay should note that overaward payments may be absorbed into the new wage rates paid under an enterprise award or agreement.

- 23. Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

Appendix A - Technical Note

Introduction

As the estimates in this publication are based on information relating to a sample of employers and employees, rather than a full enumeration, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from all employers and all employees. This difference, called sampling error, should not be confused with inaccuracy that may occur because of the imperfections in reporting by respondents or in processing by the ABS. Such inaccuracy is referred to as non-sampling error and may occur in any enumeration whether it be a full count or sample. Efforts have been made to reduce non-sampling error by careful design of questionnaires, detailed checking of returns and quality control of processing.

Reliability of Estimates

- 2. The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results. One measure of sampling error is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the degree to which an estimate may vary from the value that would have been obtained from a full enumeration (the 'true' figure). There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate differs from the true value by less than one standard error, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 3. Another measure of the sampling error is the *relative* standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers. The relative standard error is a useful measure in that it provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer also to the size of the estimate. As it is not practicable to include the standard errors of all estimates in this publication, the tables below have ben produced to give an indication of the magnitude of relative standard errors.
- 4. The figures in Table A provide an indication of magnitude of the standard error of estimates of numbers of persons (distribution of weekly earnings) shown in Table 1. An example of the use of Table A is as follows: the

- estimate for all male employees in the earnings range \$360 to \$380 is 2.0 per cent of the total number of male employees (see Table 1). This represents approximately 60,412 males. Table A shows the relative standard error of this estimate to be approximately 7.3 per cent or 4,410 employees. There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range 56,002 to 64,822 and about nincteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range 51,592 to 69,232.
- 5. Table B indicates the relative standard error of estimates of average weekly total earnings for various categories of employees by occupation, industry and State or Territory. An example of the use of Table B is as follows. Table 2 shows average total weekly earnings of full-time adult non-managerial male tradespersons (Australia) as \$616.20. Table B shows the relative standard error for this estimate to be 0.9 per cent (i.e. about \$5.50). There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range \$610.70 to \$621.70 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range of \$605.20 to \$627.20.
- 6. Table C indicates the relative standard error of estimates of averages (composition of average weekly earnings and hours) for full-time adult non-managerial employees in the private and public sectors. The use of the relative standard error from this table can be applied in the same way as in the example for Table B above.
- 7. An asterisk appears against estimates in the publications where the sampling variability is considered too high for most practical uses. Generally, this indicates a relative standard error equal to or greater that 25 per cent of the estimate; for estimates in Table 12, however, asterisks are displayed where the relative standard error is equal to, or greater than, 10 per cent.
- 8. Further information on the relative standard errors applicable to other estimates not covered by Tables A, B and C in this publication, may be obtained by contacting the ABS.

APPENDIX B

GLOSSARY

Adult employees are employees 21 years of age or over and those employees who, although under 21 years of age, are paid at the full adult rate for their occupation.

Award pay or agreed base rate of pay refers to the award pay or agreed rate of pay for ordinary time hours paid for. It includes payments from enterprise bargaining awards and agreements. For employees covered by an award it includes all allowances (dirt, height, tool, etc.) and penalty payments (e.g. shift loadings) specified in the award. It excludes overaward pay and service increments not specified in the award. For employees not covered by an award, agreed base rate of pay is the agreed wage for ordinary time hours paid for.

Commonwealth government employees. Persons employed by all departments, agencies and authorities created by or reporting to the Commonwealth Parliament, including trading bodies such as airlines and communications bodies. Those bodies run jointly by Commonwealth and State governments are classified to Commonwealth.

Employees refers to all wage and salary earners (as defined in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Explanatory Notes) who received pay for any part of the reference period.

Employer unit size. The size classification reflects total number of employees of an enterprise in a particular State/Territory and not necessarily the size of an enterprise Australia wide.

Enterprise bargaining pay refers to weekly payments (additional to prescribed award rates) resulting from enterprise bargaining awards and agreements.

Full-time employees are permanent, temporary and casual employees who normally work the agreed or award hours for a full-time employee in their occupation and received pay for any part of the reference period. If agreed or award hours do not apply, employees are regarded as full-time if they ordinarily work 35 hours or more per week.

Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (see Explanatory Notes paragraph 8).

Institutional sector. Institutional sector is classified according to the Standard Institutional Sector Classification of Australia (SISCA) 1987 Edition (1218.0).

Junior employees are those employees who are not adults as defined.

Local government employees. Persons employed by municipalities and shires and other local authorities created by or subject to the provisions of local government legislation, such as county councils in New South Wales.

Managerial employees are adult managerial, executive and professional staff, generally defined as those

employees who are ineligible to receive payment for overtime, or, although subject to payment for overtime, are in charge of a significant number of employees in a separate establishment.

Mean (or average) earnings or hours refers to the amount obtained by dividing the total earnings or hours of a group (e.g. full-time employees) by the number of employees in that group.

Median earnings or hours refers to the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups of employees, one half having amounts below the median and the other half having amounts above it.

Non-managerial employees are those who are not managerial employees as defined.

Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) (see Explanatory Notes paragraphs 9 to 11).

Ordinary time hours paid for refers to employees' award, standard or agreed hours of work. It includes stand-by or reporting time which are part of standard hours of work, and that part of annual leave, paid sick leave and long service leave taken during the reference period.

Overaward pay refers to amounts of ordinary time pay (regular or otherwise) that are over the award (e.g. attendance, good time-keeping, profit-sharing, etc.). It excludes payments in the form of a reimbursement for expenses incurred whilst carrying out the employer's business (e.g. payments from petty cash).

Overtime hours paid for refers to hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work.

Part-time employees are those who are not full-time employees as defined.

Payment by measured result refers to earnings which vary according to measured performance (e.g. piecework, production and task bonuses, and commission).

Percentiles refer to any of a hundred divisions of an earnings or hours series. For example, 25 per cent of employees earn less than or equal to the 25th percentile and 75 per cent of employees earn less than or equal to the 75th percentile.

Reference period for the survey refers to the last pay period ending on or before 21 May 1993.

Sector. Public sector includes local government authorities and all government departments, agencies and authorities created by, or reporting to, the Commonwealth and State Parliaments. All remaining employees are classified as private sector.

State government employees. Persons employed by all State government departments and authorities created by, or reporting to, State Parliaments, including organisations for which the Commonwealth has assumed financial responsibility, e.g. universities. Following self-government, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory administrations have been classified to 'State' governments. Employees of State governments employed interstate are included in the estimates of the State in which they are based.

Weekly ordinary time earnings of employees refers to one week's earnings for the reference period attributable to award, standard or agreed hours of work. It is calculated before taxation and any other deductions (e.g. superannuation, board and lodging) have been made. Included in ordinary time earnings are award payments, base rates of pay, overaward payments, enterprise bargaining payments, penalty payments, shift and other allowances; commissions and retainers; bonuses and similar payments related to the reference period; payments under incentive or piecework; payments under profit-sharing schemes normally paid each pay period; payments for leave taken during the reference period; all workers' compensation

payments made through the payroll; and salary payments made to directors. Excluded are overtime payments, retrospective pay, pay in advance, leave loadings, severance pay, termination and redundancy payments and other payments not related to the reference period.

Weekly overtime earnings of employees refers to payment for hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work.

Weekly total earnings of employees is equal to weekly ordinary time earnings plus weekly overtime earnings.

Weekly total hours paid for refers to the hours for which payment was made. It comprises ordinary time hours and overtime hours. For employees paid other than weekly, hours were converted to a weekly basis. For employees who began or ceased work, or were absent without pay for any reason during the reference period, only the hours actually paid for were included. Where agreed hours of work were less than award hours, hours were based on agreed hours. Hours of work were not reported for managerial employees.


