#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Because of methodological differences, estimates of average earnings from this survey vary slightly from the estimates obtained from the quarterly survey of Average Weekly Earnings contained in catalogues (6301.0 and 6302.0).

From the May 1994 Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours, industry data has been classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 1993 (ANZSIC), which replaces the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC). To provide users with a link to industry data published from previous surveys, Tables 4 and 14 in this publication have been compiled on an ASIC basis. For further information see paragraphs 8 to 13 in the Explanatory Notes.

# **Key Findings**

# Between May 1993 and 1994:

- Average weekly total earnings increased by 3.6 per cent for full-time adult non-managerial employees and median earnings increased by 3.3 per cent.
- Median earnings for full-time adult non-managerial males increased by 2.7 per cent and female median earnings increased by 4.4 per cent.
- Relative to male earnings, average weekly total earnings (including overtime) for full-time adult non-managerial females increased from 84.4 per cent in 1993 to 85.3 per cent in 1994.
- Average weekly overtime earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees increased by 4.4 per cent for males and 5.9 per cent for females.
- The largest increases in average weekly total earnings for full-time adults were recorded by male and female Plant and machine operators, and drivers (4.4% and 8.6% respectively).

## In May 1994:

- Average weekly total earnings was \$533.00 for all employees, and \$623.00 for full-time adult non-managerial employees.
- Full-time adult non-managerial employees were paid on average for 39.9 hours per week including paid overtime (37.9 hours excluding overtime).
- The major occupation groups to record the highest levels of overaward or overagreement pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees were male Tradespersons (\$15.80) and female Plant and machine operators, and drivers (\$12.40).
- The percentage of female employees who were classified as full-time adult managerial employees (3.5% public sector, 6.5% private sector) was significantly lower than for males (10.1% public sector, 18.7% private sector).
- The Northern Territory showed the highest average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees (\$682.60) and Tasmania the lowest (\$590.00).
- The industry with the highest average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was the Mining industry (males \$1,087.70, females \$744.80).


#### Introduction

This publication presents information of the composition and distribution of the earnings of wage and salary employees in Australia at May 1994 derived from the Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours (EEH Survey). It is estimated that there were 5,471,800 employees at May 1994. Of these, 3,191,400 were classified as full-time adult non-managerial employees.

There are a number of different groupings of employees for which composition and distribution of earnings data could be presented. The following analysis mainly presents information about full-time adult non-managerial employees, being a picture of earnings for a reasonably homogeneous grouping of employees. Some analysis is provided for other groupings of employees such as full-time adult employees, part-time non-managerial employees and earnings of females relative to males.

Diagram 1 illustrates the various categories of employees (managerial/non-managerial, adult/junior etc) that are identified in the EEH Survey. It also presents the approximate number of employees in each category and their percentage contribution to the total number of employees within scope of the EEH Survey. The survey is not designed to specifically provide estimates of employees and therefore these figures should be regarded only as indicative measures of total employment in the categories indicated.

# Distribution of earnings

## Full-time adult employees

As well as reporting averages, the Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours can show how employees are distributed across different levels of weekly earnings. Diagram 2 displays the shape of the distribution of full-time adult employees for the years 1990, 1992 and 1994 using the percentage of employees in each \$100 total earnings interval. Each distribution is skewed to the right because there is a small percentage of employees with earnings in each of the ranges above \$1,100. The distributions have shifted to the right since 1990 reflecting the increases in average weekly earnings for all employees. The modal class (the earnings range of the distribution containing the most number of employees) has remained at the \$400 to \$499 range for each distribution. However, the number of employees in the modal class has decreased in 1994 relative to 1990 and 1992 and there has been a relatively larger concentration of employees in the earnings ranges between \$700 to \$1,099 in 1994, slightly flattening the profile of the distribution for that year.




DIAGRAM 2: DISTRIBUTION OF FULL-TIME ADULT EMPLOYEES

Full-time adult non-managerial employees

Average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial male and female employees in May 1994 were \$660.20 and \$562.90 respectively. This was a 3.2 per cent increase for males and a 4.2 per cent rise for females from May 1993 to May 1994.

The EEH Survey also provides measures of the spread or dispersion of earnings. Median earnings is the dollar amount that divides employees into two equal groups; one half earning amounts less than the median and the other half earning more than the median. The median can be compared with the upper and lower deciles (or quartiles), ie the further the upper and lower quartiles, or the deciles, are from the median the greater the dispersion of earnings.

The table on page 4 presents such comparisons. It shows that in May 1994 the median (50th percentile) level of total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was \$573.10 per week - lower than the average (or mean) value of \$623.00, as the latter was boosted by the relatively small number of people at the top end of the distribution. At the bottom of the distribution, a tenth of full-time adult non-managerial employees earned less than \$402.50 per week; at the top, a tenth earned more than \$889.70.



The ratio between the upper and lower deciles (2.0) gives a measure of the spread or dispersion of weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial female employees. The ratio for males is 2.3 reflecting the greater dispersion in male total earnings.

The median (50th percentile) weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial male employees in May 1994 was \$605.20, a rise of 2.7 per cent on May 1993 (\$589.50). The median weekly total earnings for females rose by 4.4 per cent over the same period from \$501.90 to \$523.80.

Diagram 3 below shows all ten decile ranges of weekly total earnings in May 1994. For each of these it lists some typical occupations for which the average weekly total earnings (for males and females together) was within the decile range.



# All Employees

For all employees, median weekly total earnings in May 1994 were \$582.00 for males and \$412.30 for females, increases of 1.4 per cent and 2.0 per cent respectively on May 1993. The lower median earnings for females is a reflection of a number of factors - a large proportion of part-time employees are female (75.8%), managerial employees are predominantly male (72.7%), and females receive considerably less overtime, on average, than males.

# Composition of earnings

The table below shows the components of average weekly total earnings and their proportions relative to the total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees and all employees. Overaward and overagreement pay as a proportion of total earnings and the proportion of employees receiving overaward and overagreement pay has decreased from the 1993 levels for males and females in all categories. The decreases are likely to be caused by overaward pay for some employees being absorbed into the new wage rates paid under enterprise bargaining awards and agreements.




#### Base pay

For major occupation groups, the lowest proportion of the base pay component of total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees was recorded for Plant and machine operators, and drivers (males 77.0%, females 87.1%). This group recorded relatively large amounts of overtime in addition to a relatively high payment by measured result for males and overaward and overagreement pay for females. The highest base pay proportion was recorded for male and female Professionals, 96.7 per cent and 98.1 per cent respectively.

The proportion of total earnings accounted for by the base pay component varied considerably between industries and sexes. For full-time adult non-managerial males in the Mining industry, base pay accounted for only 72.5%, while overtime (13.4%) and payment by measured result (12.8%) were significant contributors to total earnings. This compares with females in Mining who reported a base pay component of 88.2 per cent. The highest proportions for the base pay component were recorded in the Education industry (males 98.8%, females 99.5%).

Diagram 4 below illustrates the change over time of the base pay component as a percentage of total weekly earnings. The difference between males and females and the pattern of change for males between 1990 and 1994 largely reflects the variation in overtime worked.





#### Overtime

In May 1994, average weekly overtime earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees were \$64.50 for males and \$14.30 for females. This corresponded with average overtime hours of 2.8 for males and 0.7 for females. Between May 1993 and May 1994 average overtime earnings increased by 4.4 per cent for males and 5.9 per cent for females.

The major occupation group to record the highest level of weekly overtime earnings was Plant and machine operators, and drivers, where male and female overtime earnings were \$126.20 and \$39.60 respectively. The major occupation group recording the lowest overtime earnings was Salespersons and personal service workers (\$20.40) for males and Professionals (\$9.40) for females.


Overtime earnings increased, on average, by 4.6 per cent between 1993 and 1994. On an industry basis (ASIC) the largest percentage increases occurred in Communication (32.9%), Manufacturing (19.8%), Recreation, personal and other services (7.1%) and Construction (6.3%).

Males earned more overtime pay than females in all industries (ANZSIC) - see Diagram 5 below. The highest overtime earnings recorded for full-time adult non-managerial males occurred in the Mining (\$146.40), Transport and storage (\$112.40) and Construction (\$105.00) industries. For females, the highest overtime payments were made in Mining (\$49.20<sup>(a)</sup>), Transport and storage (\$42.30) and Communication services (\$31.90).

Taking into consideration only those employees who received overtime pay in the reference week, the industry to record the highest average weekly overtime earnings was Mining. Males in this industry received \$307.40 for an average 11.2 hours overtime while females were paid \$236.60<sup>(a)</sup> for 11.8<sup>(a)</sup> hours.

Overtime, as a percentage of weekly total earnings, has increased only slightly since 1993 for male full-time adult non-managerial employees. In 1994, overtime earnings accounted for 9.8 per cent of average weekly total earnings for males, up from 9.7% in 1993.

#### Overaward and overagreement pay

Average weekly overaward or overagreement pay for full-time adult non-managerial employees decreased by 24.2 per cent for females and 18.1 per cent for males between May 1993 and May 1994. Females recorded an average of \$4.70, down from \$6.20 in May 1993, while males recorded \$8.60, down from \$10.50 in May 1993. These decreases in overaward or overagreement pay are likely to be caused by overaward pay for some employees being absorbed into enterprise bargaining awards and agreements (which are included under the base pay component of average weekly earnings).

The major occupation groups to record the highest levels of overaward or overagreement pay were male Tradespersons (\$15.80) and female Plant and machine operators, and drivers (\$12.40).

To enable industry comparisons with earlier periods, Table 14 shows the composition of average weekly total earnings, including overaward or overagreement pay, recorded for full-time adult non-managerial employees classified by the ASIC industry of the employer.

# Earnings by occupation

Full-time adult employees

In May 1994, the highest average weekly total earnings for full-time adult employees were recorded in the following major occupation groups:


- Managers and administrators (males \$933.30, females \$749.40)
- Professionals (males \$857.50, females \$732.80)
- Para-professionals (males \$757.40, females \$672.80)

Across all occupation groups, increases in average weekly total earnings between May 1993 and May 1994 were, 2.1% for males and 3.9% for females. The largest percentage increases in average weekly total earnings for full-time adults were recorded by female Plant and machine operators, and drivers (8.6%) and female Managers and administrators (5.8%).

Decreases in average weekly total earnings were recorded for full-time adult male Professionals (-1.0%) and male Clerks (-0.2%). These decreases reflect lower levels of base pay and overaward or overagreement earnings for these occupation groups in 1994 compared with 1993.

Full-time adult females recorded larger percentage increases than males in average weekly total earnings for all major occupation groups except Para-professionals, and Labourers and related workers (refer diagram 6 below).

# All employees

Differences in the occupational distribution of employees between the public and private sectors can significantly affect earnings of males and females in the two sectors.

For all male employees in the private sector, average weekly total earnings was \$600.10, equivalent to 84.7 per cent of male average earnings in the public sector (\$708.20). For females, the corresponding figure was \$379.60 in the private sector, equivalent to 71.1 per cent of female average earnings in the public sector (\$534.10).

It is apparent that the gap in earnings between sectors is larger for females than for males. The main reasons for the difference are the larger proportion of private sector females in the lower paid occupations, including Salespersons and personal service workers, and the higher proportion of public sector females in the Professional and Para-professional occupations. Another contributing factor is that a higher proportion of female employees in the private sector are part-time employees.

# Earnings by industry (Full-time adult non-managerial employees)

For full-time adult non-managerial employees, the highest average weekly total earnings were recorded in the following ANZSIC industries:

#### Males:

- Mining \$1,087.70
- Education \$775.60
- Communication services \$729.40

#### Females:

- Mining \$744.80
- Education \$663.90
- Cultural and recreational services \$629.70

Industries recording the lowest estimates of average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial employees were:

# Males:

- · Accommodation, cafes and restaurants \$494.60
- Retail trade \$498.10
- Wholesale trade \$578.80


## Females:

- Accommodation, cafes and restaurants \$453.80
- Retail trade \$455.10
- Manufacturing \$511.30 (and Wholesale trade \$511.60)

On an ASIC industry basis the largest percentage increases between May 1993 and May 1994 in average weekly total earnings for full-time adult non-managerial male employees occurred in Communication (7.9%), Mining and Community services (6.0% respectively). For female full-time adult non-managerial employees the largest increases were recorded in Construction (11.2%), Retail (7.9%) and Transport and storage (6.2%).

Diagram 7, on page 10, shows the percentage change in average weekly total ear nings between May 1993 and May 1994 for major ASIC industries.

# Earnings and hours by sector

# Full-time adult non-managerial employees

Weekly base pay for public sector employees was, on average, \$109.80 more than that of the private sector. Average payments for overaward or overagreement pay, overtime pay and payment by measured result added \$73.70 to the private sector average weekly total earnings compared to \$34.10 for the public sector. This reduced the difference between the average for the sectors to \$70.20.

Overaward or overagreement pay was considerably higher in the private sector (males \$12.00, females \$7.30) compared to males and females in the public sector (\$1.70 and \$0.50 respectively).

Average weekly overtime earnings of employees in the private sector (males \$73.00, females \$16.30) were considerably higher than employees in the public sector (males \$47.40, females \$10.80). Overtime pay increased between 1993 and 1994 by 6.3 per cent for the private sector compared to a decrease of 1.5 per cent for the public sector. Average overtime earnings per hour differed between sectors and sexes. In the private sector, males averaged \$22.10 per overtime hour and females \$20.40, compared with \$25.00 per overtime hour for males and \$27.00 for females in the public sector.

Average weekly total hours paid for were higher for the private sector (40.7) than the public sector (38.4). Private sector employees were paid, on average, for 1.2 more ordinary time hours and 1.1 more overtime hours than employees in the public sector.

The percentage of full-time adult non-managerial employees in the public sector who were paid for 35 hours and under 37 hours per week was 36.4 per cent compared to only 9.5 per cent of employees in the private sector. At the other end of the spectrum 10.6 per cent of full-time adult non-managerial private sector employees were paid for more than 48 hours (including overtime) per week, which was more than two and one half times greater than the 3.9 per cent of employees in this category in the public sector.

# Earnings of females relative to males

Full-time adult non-managerial employees

Full-time adult non-managerial females earned 92.1 per cent of the male average weekly ordinary time earnings in May 1994 compared to 91.1 per cent in 1993. In May 1994 females in the public sector earned 93.3 per cent of ordinary time male earnings, compared with 90.3 per cent in the private sector.

For average weekly total earnings female earnings were 85.3 per cent of male earnings in May 1994 compared with 84.4 per cent of male earnings in May 1993.

At the broad occupation level, the largest gap (in percentage terms) between male and female ordinary time earnings in May 1994 was for Plant and machine operators, and drivers where female earnings were 76.5 per cent of male ordinary time earnings. Between May 1993 and May 1994 the occupations to display the greatest narrowing of the gap were Plant and machine operators, and drivers (female ordinary time earnings were 73.4% of male ordinary time earnings in 1993 and 76.5% in 1994) and Tradespersons (80.8% in 1993 and 83.9% in 1994). Para-professionals continued to show the highest ratio of female to male ordinary time earnings (94.2% in 1994 compared with 95.6% in 1993)

Overaward or overagreement pay for females fell between 1993 and 1994 by \$1.50 (to \$4.70) and fell by \$1.90 for males from \$10.50 to \$8.60. Clerks and Plant and machine operators, and drivers were the only major occupation groups where females earned more overaward or overagreement pay, in 1994, than males. The largest percentage difference between male and female overaward or overagreement pay was for Tradespersons where females received 20.2 per cent of the male overaward or overagreement pay (\$3.20<sup>(a)</sup> for females and \$15.80 for males).

Taking into consideration only those employees who received overtime pay, males earned, on average, \$88.40 more overtime than females (males \$186.80, females \$98.40). The industry with the highest absolute difference between male and female paid overtime was Construction (\$154.40) and the industry with the lowest difference was Government administration and defence (\$15.70).

At May 1994, 8.2 per cent of full-time adult non-managerial males earned \$1,000 or more per week, compared with 1.7 per cent of females. There were 6.6 per cent of males and 12.6 per cent of females who earned less than \$400 per week.

# Average ordinary time hourly earnings


Full-time non-managerial employees - adults

The average ordinary time hourly earnings for full-time non-managerial adults was \$15.20. The percentage of full-time non-managerial adults who earned \$15 and over per hour was 41.5 per cent, while 6.5 per cent earned less than \$10 per hour.

# Full-time non-managerial employees - juniors

The average ordinary time hourly earnings for all full-time juniors was \$7.40. Only 0.4 per cent<sup>(a)</sup> of full-time juniors earned \$15 and over per hour and 2.0 per cent earned less than \$4 per hour. More than half (52.4%) of full-time juniors earned from \$6 to \$8.99 per hour.





## Average weekly hours paid for

#### Full-time adult non-managerial employees

In May 1994 the average weekly ordinary time hours for full-time adult non-managerial employees was 38.1 hours for males and 37.5 hours for females. Including overtime hours, the average total weekly hours paid for were 40.9 hours for males (39.1 hours in the public sector compared with 41.8 hours in the private sector) and 38.2 hours for females (37.3 hours in the public sector and 38.8 hours in the private sector).

An estimated 9.2 per cent of all full-time adult non-managerial males were paid for working 50 or more hours per week (including overtime), 11.7% of males in the private sector and 4.4% of males in the public sector. For females, 1.2% were paid for 50 hours or more (1.4% in the private sector and 1.1% in the public sector). The percentage of males who were paid for less than 38 hours in total was 23.8% (42.0% in the public sector and 15.0% in the private sector) and 40.5% of females were paid for less than 38 hours in total (57.4% in the public sector and 30.3% in the private sector).

The number of overtime hours paid for varies greatly between males and females, and between occupations, industries and States. The average weekly overtime hours given below refer to those full-time adult non-managerial employees who were paid overtime in the reference week.

The average weekly overtime hours for full-time adult non-managerial employees receiving overtime was 7.5 hours, with the difference between male and female overtime hours being 3.5 (8.2 hours overtime for males and 4.7 hours overtime for females).

Plant and machine operators, and drivers was the major occupation group with the highest average weekly overtime hours (9.9 hours). The lowest average weekly overtime hours paid for was recorded by Salespersons and personal service workers (4.7 hours).

The Mining industry recorded the highest average weekly overtime hours for females (11.8<sup>(a)</sup> hours) and Construction the highest overtime hours for males (also 11.8 hours). The industry recording the lowest overtime hours for females was Finance and insurance (3.1 hours) and for males, Accommodation, cafes and restaurants (4.1 hours) was the lowest.

# Part-time employees

# All employees

Part-time employees comprised 27.1 per cent of the total employed persons within scope of the EEH Survey (0.9 per cent managerial and 26.2 per cent non-managerial). Approximately 78.4 per cent of the part-time managerial employees and 75.7 per cent of the part-time non-managerial employees were female.


Of all females employed, 43.8 per cent were part-time employees compared to 12.3 per cent of all males. In the private sector, 48.4 per cent of all female employees and 14.1 per cent of all male employees were classified as part-time. In comparison, 31.9 per cent of all females and 7.6 per cent of all males in the public sector were part-time employees.

Non-managerial employees - Adult/Junior ordinary time hourly earnings

At May 1994, part-time adult employees in non-managerial occupations recorded an average ordinary time hourly rate of \$14.50 while part-time juniors earned \$8.40 per hour on average.

Part-time adult non-managerial males in each of the major occupation groups, with the exception of the Para-professionals, recorded a higher average ordinary time hourly rate of pay than females (refer diagram 9).

The proportion of part-time adults who earned \$20.00 or more per hour was 14.2 per cent. For part-time adults, 58.6 per cent earned less than \$14.00 per hour and 7.2 per cent received less than \$10.00 per hour. For part-time juniors, 65.3 per cent earned less than \$9.00 per hour with 51.9 per cent earning from \$6.00 to \$8.99 per hour. The ordinary time hourly rate for part-time adult females was equal to 95.4 per cent of the part-time adult male rate. Part-time junior males received 94.2 per cent of the junior female rate.

Non-managerial weekly total hours paid for

The highest concentration (21.9%) of part-time non-managerial adult females were paid for between 20 and 26 weekly hours compared with 14.6 per cent of males in the same hourly category. Approximately 47.6 per cent of part-time adult male employees and 33.9 per cent of females worked less than 14 weekly total hours.

At May 1994, 63.1 per cent of part-time junior non-managerial employees were female. Approximately 49.1 per cent of junior females and 51.9 per cent of junior males were paid for less than 10 hours in the week.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

- 1. This publication contains estimates obtained from a sample survey of employers conducted in May 1994. The survey is designed to provide statistics on the distribution of employees according to weekly earnings and hours, and on the composition of weekly earnings and hours for various categories of employees and principal occupations.
- 2. Preliminary estimates were published in Distribution and Composition of Employee Earnings and Hours, Australia, May 1994 (6305.0), released on 20 December 1994.

## Scope of the survey

- 3. All wage and salary earners who received pay for the reference period are represented in the survey, except:
  - members of the Australian permanent defence forces;
  - employees of enterprises primarily engaged in agriculture, forestry and fishing;
  - employees in private households employing staff;
  - employees of overseas embassies, consulates, etc:
  - · employees based outside Australia; and
  - employees on workers' compensation who are not paid through the payroll.
- 4. Also excluded are the following persons who are not regarded as employees for the purposes of this survey:
  - directors who are not paid a salary;
  - proprietors/partners of unincorporated businesses; and
  - self-employed persons such as subcontractors, owner-drivers, consultants and persons paid solely by commission without a retainer.

#### Survey design

5. A sample of approximately 8,500 employers is selected from the ABS register of businesses to ensure adequate State and industry representation. The statistical unit for the survey comprises all activities of an enterprise in a particular State or

- Territory. Each statistical unit is classified to an industry which reflects the predominant activity of the enterprise in the State or Territory. In a small number of cases where an enterprise has significant employment in more than one industry, a separate statistical unit is created for each industry. The statistical units are stratified by State, public/private sector, industry and size of employment and a simple random sample is selected from each stratum.
- 6. Employers with fewer than 10 employees are required to complete details for every employee, while those with 10 or more employees are required to select a random sample of their employees in accordance with instructions supplied by the ABS. Data for approximately 76,000 employees were obtained in the survey.
- 7. Although the sample is not designed specifically to provide estimates of numbers of employees, it is estimated that 2,908,200 male and 2,563,700 female employees are within the scope of the survey. These and other estimates of numbers of employees included in this publication should not be taken as measures of total employment in the categories indicated.

#### Industry classification

- 8. From May 1994, industry data from the Employee Earnings and Hours survey have been classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 1993 (ANZSIC), a detailed description of which appears in Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification, 1993, (1292.0). The ANZSIC replaces the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) 1983 previously used to classify industry data.
- 9. The ANZSIC, like the ASIC, is a classification which serves to identify groupings of businesses which carry out similar economic activities and which satisfy other conditions (like economic significance). These groups can be used to define an industry. An individual business can then be assigned to an industry on the basis of its predominant economic activity.
- 10. Employees selected in the Employee Earnings and Hours survey are classified to the industry of the business in which they are employed (see paragraph 5 above).
- 11. The ANZSIC reflects changes in the world economy during the last twenty years (not reflected in ASIC) and was developed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics and Statistics New Zealand for use in the production and analysis of industry statistics in both countries.

12. The ANZSIC, like the ASIC, has a structure consisting of categories at four levels: Divisions (the broadest level), Subdivisions, Groups and Classes. The following table shows details of the ANZSIC industries used in the publication (more detailed information may be available on request - see Appendix C).

- 13. Industry information classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification, (ASIC) 1983 (1201.0 and 1202.0), has been presented in Tables 4 and 14. These tables are provided to enable a link to be made between industry data from the 1994 survey with ASIC information from previous surveys. More detailed ASIC industry data from the May 1994 survey may be requested as a special data service (see Appendix C). From the May 1995 survey, industry data will only be available on an ANZSIC basis.

# Standard Institutional Sector Classification of Australia (SISCA)

14. SISCA is a system for classifying institutional units by broad economic functions and is a key component of the general national accounting framework. For the purposes of these statistics the classification has been used to separate the public sector into public business enterprises (trading and financial) and general government enterprises. Certain public sector data have been classified by SISCA and are presented in Table 7.

#### Occupation

15. Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO), based on the title and description of the job.

- 16. Care should be taken when comparing survey estimates based on ASCO groups with estimates based on the managerial/non-managerial status of employees, which is determined and reported by the employer. Estimates for employees with manager status include employees classified to ASCO categories other than the ASCO major group 'Managers and Administrators'; e.g. employees classified as Professionals according to ASCO may be categorised by employers as having managerial status. Conversely, tables in this publication which contain estimates for non-managerial employees (as defined by employers) will include some employees who would be classified to the ASCO major group 'Managers and Administrators'.
- 17. Details of ASCO can be found in ASCO: Statistical Classification First Edition (1222.0), and in Information Paper: ASCO Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, April 1991 (1221.0).

## Comparability of results

- 18. Some minor changes to the definition of managerial/non-managerial status of employees, as determined and reported by the employer, were introduced in the May 1994 survey. For example, the instruction "For government departments include employees above the level at which overtime is paid" was eliminated from the definition of managerial employees so as to ensure that public sector managerial employees continue to be included as managerial employees on a consistent basis with private sector managerial employees. The current definitions of managerial and non-managerial employees are listed in Appendix B. These changes are not expected to have any significant effect on average weekly earnings for these categories of employees.
- 19. Because of the substantially improved coverage of employers provided by the ABS register of businesses and modifications to some definitions, results from surveys conducted after 1981 are not strictly comparable with those for surveys conducted between 1974 and 1981.
- 20. Care should be taken when comparing the results of this survey with the quarterly series Average Weekly Earnings, States and Australia (6302.0), as a different sample design and survey methodology are used. The Average Weekly Earnings survey collects information relating to total employment of organisations selected in the survey, whereas results from the Employee Earnings and Hours survey are obtained in relation to a sample of employees within the organisations selected. In addition, the size of the sample for the Employee Earnings and Hours survey is much larger than that for the Average Weekly Earnings survey.

- 21. Because of the two stage sampling methodology used for this survey to arrive at a sample of employees, it is not possible to ensure that the representation of all the subgroups of interest in the sample accurately reflect their representation in the population.
- 22. Considerable care is taken in questionnaire design and in the instructions given to employers on how to select samples of their employees. All survey returns are subjected to careful editing to detect reporting errors, inconsistencies and transcription errors. Ultimately, however, the quality of survey results depends on the quality of the information provided by survey respondents and adherence to specified procedures.
- 23. From the May 1993 survey, payments resulting from workplace and enterprise bargaining awards and agreements have been included in *Base pay*. Similarly some payments previously defined as "overaward pay" may have been absorbed into *Base pay* now paid under a workplace/enterprise award or agreement.

#### Reliability of estimates

#### APPENDIX A

#### **TECHNICAL NOTES**

#### Introduction

As the estimates in this publication are based on information relating to a sample of employers and employees, rather than a full enumeration, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from all employers and all employees. This difference, called sampling error, should not be confused with inaccuracy that may occur because of the imperfections in reporting by respondents or in processing by the ABS. Such inaccuracy is referred to as non-sampling error and may occur in any enumeration whether it be a full count or sample. Efforts have been made to reduce non-sampling error by careful design of questionnaires, detailed checking of returns and quality control of processing.

# Reliability of Estimates

- 2. The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results. One measure of sampling error is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the degree to which an estimate may vary from the value that would have been obtained from a full enumeration (the 'true' figure). There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate differs from the true value by less than one standard error, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 3. Another measure of the sampling error is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers. The relative standard error is a useful measure in that it provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer also to the size of the estimate. As it is not practicable to include the standard errors of all estimates in this publication, the tables A to C on pages 72 to 76 have been produced to give an indication of the magnitude of relative standard errors.
- 4. The figures in Table A provide an indication of magnitude of the standard error of estimates of numbers of employees (distribution of weekly earnings) shown in Table 1. An example of the use of Table A is as follows: the estimate for all male employees in the earnings range \$660 to \$680 is 2.9

per cent of the total number of male employees (see Table 1). This represents approximately 84,338 males. Table A shows the relative standard error of this estimate lies between 6.1 per cent and 5.8 percent (ie approximately 6.0 per cent) or 5,060 employees. There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range 79,278 to 89,398 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range 74,218 to 94,458.

- 5. Table B indicates the relative standard error of estimates of average weekly total earnings for various categories of employees by occupation, industry, sector and State and Territory. An example of the use of Table B is as follows. Table 3 shows average total weekly earnings of full-time adult non-managerial male tradespersons (Australia) as \$629.80. Table B shows the approximate relative standard error for this estimate to be 0.8 per cent (ie approximately \$5.04). There are about two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range \$624.76 to \$634.84 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range of \$619.72 to \$639.88.
- 6. Table C indicates the relative standard error of estimates of averages (composition of average weekly earnings and hours by sector) for full-time non-managerial employees. The use of the relative standard error from this table can be applied in the same way as in the example for Table B above.
- 7. An asterisk appears against estimates in the publications where the sampling variability is considered too high for most practical uses. Generally, this indicates a relative standard error equal to or greater than 25 per cent of the estimate. For estimates in table 15, however, asterisks are displayed where the relative standard error is equal to, or greater than, 10 per cent.
- 8. Further information on the relative standard errors applicable to other estimates not covered by Tables A, B or C in this publication, may be obtained by contacting the ABS.

#### APPENDIX B

# **GLOSSARY**

Adult employees are those employees who are 21 years of age or over and employees under 21 who are paid at the adult rate for their occupation.

Average (mean) earnings or hours refers to the amount obtained by dividing the total earnings or hours of a group (e.g. full-time employees) by the number of employees in that group.

Base pay refers to the award pay or agreed rate of pay for ordinary time hours paid for. It includes ordinary time hours paid for under workplaceand enterprise bargaining awards or agreements. For employees covered by an award or workplace/enterprise agreement it includes all allowances (dirt, height, tool, etc.) and penalty payments (e.g. shift loadings) specified in the award or agreement. It excludes overaward and overagreement pay and service increments not specified in the award or agreement. For employees not covered by an award or agreement, base pay is the agreed wage for ordinary time hours paid for.

Commonwealth government employees. Persons employed by all departments, agencies and authorities created by or reporting to the Commonwealth Parliament, including trading bodies such as airlines and communications bodies. Those bodies run jointly by Commonwealth and State governments are classified to Commonwealth.

Employees refers to all wage and salary earners (as defined in paragraphs 3 and 4 of the Explanatory Notes) who received pay for any part of the reference period.

Employer unit size. The size classification reflects total number of employees of an enterprise in a particular State/Territory and not necessarily the size of an enterprise Australia wide.

Full-time employees are permanent, temporary and casual employees who normally work the agreed or award hours for a full-time employee in their occupation and received pay for any part of the reference period. If agreed or award hours do not apply, employees are regarded as full-time if they ordinarily work 35 hours or more per week.

Industry is classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 1993 (see Explanatory Notes paragraph 8 to 13).

Institutional sector. Institutional sector is classified according to the Standard Institutional Sector Classification of Australia (SISCA) 1987 Edition (1218.0)

Junior employees are those employees who are under 21 years of age and are not paid at the adult rate for their occupation.

Local government employees. Persons employed by municipalities and shires and other local authorities created by or subject to the provisions of local government legislation, such as county councils in New South Wales.

Managerial employees are managerial, executive and senior professional staff. Generally defined as those employees who are in charge of a significant number of employees or have significant responsibilities in the conduct or operations of the organisation and may not receive payment for overtime. Includes professionally qualified staff who primarily perform managerial tasks in conjunction with utilising their professional skills. Working proprietors and working directors of own incorporated businesses have been included as managerial employees

Mean earnings or hours. See Average (mean) earnings or hours above.

Median earnings or hours refers to the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups of employees, one half having amounts below the median and the other half having amounts above it.

Non-managerial employees are those who are not managerial employees as defined. Non-managerial includes supervisors, clerical staff, tradespersons non-managerial professionals, apprentices, trainees and cadets.

Occupation is classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) (see Explanatory Notes paragraphs 15 to 17).

Ordinary time hours paid for refers to employees' award, standard or agreed hours of work paid for at the ordinary rate. It includes stand-by or reporting time which are part of standard hours of work, and that part of annual leave, paid sick leave and long service leave taken during the reference period. (Note: Hours paid for was not reported for managerial employees.)

Overaward and overagreement pay refers to amounts of ordinary time pay (regular or otherwise) that are over the award or in excess of amounts specified in workplace/enterprise agreements (e.g. attendance, good time-keeping, profit-sharing, etc.). It excludes payments in the form of a reimbursement for expenses incurred whilst carrying out the employer's business (e.g. payments from petty cash).

Overtime hours paid for refers to hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work paid for and reported as overtime hours.

Part-time employees are those who are not full-time as defined.

Payment by measured result refers to earnings which vary according to measured performance (e.g. piecework, production and task bonuses, and commission).

Percentiles refer to any of a hundred divisions of an earnings or hours distribution. For example, 25 per cent of employees earn less than or equal to the 25th percentile and 75 per cent of employees earn less than or equal to the 75th percentile.

Reference period for the survey refers to the last pay period ending on or before 20 May 1994.

Sector. Public sector includes local government authorities and all government departments and agencies created by, or reporting to, the Commonwealth or State/Territory Parliaments. All remaining employees are classified as private sector.

State government employees. Persons employed by all State government departments and authorities created by, or reporting to, State Parliaments, including financial responsibility, e.g. universities. Following self-government, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory administrations have been classified to 'State' governments. Employees of State governments employed interstate are included in the estimates of the State in which they are based.

Weekly ordinary time earnings of employees refers to one week's earnings for the reference period attributable to award, standard or agreed hours of work. It is calculated before taxation and any other deductions (e.g. superannuation, board and lodging) have been made. Included in ordinary time earnings are award and workplace and enterprise bargaining payments and other agreed base rates of pay, overaward and overagreement payments, penalty payments, shift and other allowances, commissions and retainers, bonuses and similar payments related to the reference period, payments under incentive or piecework, payments under profit-sharing schemes normally paid each pay period, payments for leave taken during the reference period, all workers' compensation payments made through the payroll, and salary payments made to directors. Excluded are overtime payments, retrospective pay, pay in advance, leave loadings, severance pay, termination and redundancy payments, payments under salary packages attracting Fringe Benefit tax and other payments not related to the reference period.

Weekly overtime earnings of employees refers to payment for hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work which has been reported as overtime pay.

Weekly total earnings of employees is equal to weekly ordinary time earnings plus weekly overtime earnings.

Weekly total hours paid for refers to the hours for which payment was made. It comprises ordinary time hours and overtime hours. For employees paid other than weekly, hours were converted to a weekly basis. For employees who began or ceased work, or were absent without pay for any reason during the reference period, only the hours actually paid for were included. (Note: Hours of work were not reported for managerial employees.)


