Acting Australian Statistician

1. The CPI aeasures quarterly changes in the price of a 'basket of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditures by etropolitan wage and salary earner households. This 'basket' covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groupsi foodi elothing housing; household equipaent and operation! transpartation tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Each group is in turn divided into sub-groups. Index nubbers at the group and All Groups levels are published for each State capital city, Canberra, Darwin, and for the weighted average of aight capital cities. Index numbers for All Groups are also published for the weighted average of six State capital cities (see paragraphs 12 and 13 below). Subgroup index nuabers are published for the weighted average of eight capital cities.
2. It is important to note that the capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index ( 6440.0 ) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consuaer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

## Prices

4. Prices of goods and gervices included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some iaportant itens are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).
5. The bulk of iteas for which prices are collected quarterly are priced at the aiddle of the aid-month of the quarter (i.e. in Auqust, Novesber, February and May), but, to facilitate more even spread of the field collection workload, some goods and services are priced in the firgt and third months of each quarter. iteas priced in the third month are generally those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information is obtained of any changes in price during the quarter so that a weighted everage price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

## Weighting pattern

6. There are 105 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the tenth series CPl and each expenditure clasg has its own weight, or measure of relative impoptance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure clasges are combined using these weights.
7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been wade at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now coaprises ten series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series. The tenth series (that is, the current serites), which was introduced in the June quarter 1982, has a weighting pattern based, in general, on estimated household expenditure in 1979-80.

Index points and percentage changes
8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as percentage changes, or as changes in 'index points'. The difference between these two methods of describing movements in indexes is shown by the following examplet

The index number of 144.2 for Septeaber quarter 1985 indicates an increate of $44.2 \%$ since the reference base year (1980-81).

## Special tables and groupingg

9. Table 7 pravides detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movemente in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for abgroups and for some special series. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup aakes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy produce subgroup contributed 2.72 index points to the total All Groups index number of 144.2 for Septeaber quarter 1985. The final colusn shows contributions to the change in All Oroups index points by each group and subgroup.
10. The All Groups index includes the effects of changes in prices for hospital and medical services. To facilitate analysis of trends in retail prices without the effects of these changes, Table shows index numbers and percentage changes for a special series All Groups excluding honpital and medical eervices, and compares these with changes in the All Groups index.

State and local government charges
11. Information on the iapact of changes in selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tableb 3 and 7. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changas in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 7 shows index numbers for two special groupings 'Selected State and local governeent charges' and 'All Groups excluding selected State and local governaent charges'. For information on the derivation and limitations of these figures, see the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.

Index for weighted average of six State capital cities
12. It was foreshadowed at the coapletion of the last review and reweighting of the CPI in July 1982 that publication of index numbers for the weighted average of six State capital cities would be discontinued after a transitional period. It is intended that publication of this series will cease when the eleventh series CPI is releasedi this is currently scheduled to occur with the publication of the CPI for the Geptenber quarter 1986.
13. Index numbers for the weighted average of six state capital cities will continue to be ade available by the ABS on request after September quarter 1986. However users of this particular series aight consider it more convenient to ake arrangements to switch to using index numbers for the weighted average of eight capital cities.
