CONSUMER PRICE INDEX - MARCH QUARTER 1975

Variations in retail prices as measured by the Consumer Price Index for the six State capital cities and Canberra are shown herein.

- 2. Compared with the previous quarter, the All Groups Consumer Price Index for March quarter 1975 increased by 3.6% for the weighted average of the six State capital cities. Changes in individual cities were: Sydney +3.4%, Melbourne +3.8%, Brisbane +2.7%, Adelaide +4.4%, Perth +3.8%, Hobart +2.3%, Canberra +2.3%.
- 3. Recent quarterly changes in the All Groups index have been as follows:

- 6. The Consumer Price Index measures quarterly variations in prices of goods and services as affecting a high proportion of the expenditure of wage-earner households in the aggregate. Changes in the pattern of this expenditure since 1950 have been such as to render it necessary to construct the index with additional items and changes in weighting patterns at intervals (rather than on the basis of a list of items and set of weights which remained unchanged throughout the period). Eight series for short periods have therefore been constructed and linked to form a continuous retail price index series published herein as the Consumer Price Index. In each period between links the items and weighting have remained unchanged.
- 7. A detailed description of the Consumer Price Index is contained in Labour Report No. 57, 1972 (Reference No. 6.7). For periods after December quarter 1973, reference should be made to the appendix to the March quarter 1974 bulletin which describes the seventh series of the index. This series was introduced as from December quarter 1973 and is broadly based on the estimated pattern of consumption in 1971-72. The eighth series differs only because of the deletion of the item "radio and television licences" as from September quarter 1974.
- 8. The quarterly prices for food items used in the index are the averages of prices normally collected as at the middle of each of the three months of the quarter. However, for potatoes and for onions from December quarter 1968, weekly prices are averaged to arrive at monthly prices. Prices of all non-food items are collected at regular quarterly intervals (or at annual intervals with items such as local government rates and seasonal clothing) normally as at the middle of the mid-month of each quarter. However, for furniture, major household appliances and motoring items (other than motor car) the collection is made during the first month of each quarter to facilitate field collection arrangements.
- 9. The indexes measure price movements in each city individually. They do not provide a comparison of the retail price level in any city with the retail price level of any other city.
- 10. Table 1 on page 5 of this Bulletin shows Consumer Price Index numbers for each fiscal year from 1962-63 to 1973-74 and for each quarter from March quarter 1968. Table 2 on pages 6 and 7 shows Group Index numbers quarterly from March quarter 1971 to March quarter 1975.
- 11. Table 3 on page 8 shows monthly Food Group index numbers for each month from August 1971. In Table 4 information of contributions by the Food Group to the total index in terms of All Groups Index Points is shown for both December quarter 1974 and March quarter 1975 and each of the three months of this quarter, i.e. January, February and March 1975. A more detailed presentation of information on monthly food price movements can be found in the monthly bulletin Consumer Price Index, Food Group Index Numbers (Reference No. 9.11). Since the food group is the only group of the index for which prices are collected monthly, it is not possible to provide monthly indexes for other groups.
- 12. Table 5 on page 9 shows index numbers for December quarter 1974 and March quarter 1975 for groups and sub-groups of the index and for some special groupings. It also contains information of contributions by index sub-groups to the total index in terms of All Groups Index Points for these two quarters. Users of these figures should bear in mind that the Consumer Price Index is designed to measure the proportionate change in retail prices as combined in the five major groups and more particularly the total of the groups. For sub-groups or particular items, the index does not necessarily provide comprehensive and valid measures of price changes in those particular fields. Nor does it necessarily measure the relative influences of those classes of items in aggregate variations in prices. The Consumer Price Index is essentially a combination of selected items under various headings and not a dissection of total household expenditure into its component parts.

Movements of the indexes from one date to another are usually expressed as percentage changes rather than changes in the 'index points' because 'index point' changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percentage changes are not. In this bulletin details are given in terms of percentage changes in paragraphs 2-5. However, the analysis in paragraph 14 shows movements in terms of All Groups 'index points'. This analysis shows the contribution of selected items and of the five groups to movements in the total indexes. Table 5 on page 9 shows movements expressed as both percentage changes and changes in 'index points'. The following example illustrates the computation of 'index point' and percentage changes:

15. A summary of the various group indexes, together with the *main quarterly* price changes which affected the index between December quarter 1974 and March quarter 1975 is shown below:

Food Group. Changes in meat and potato prices are frequently the major cause of movements in the total index and of disparate movements between cities. Price falls for potatoes and meat were more than offset by increases in all other sections of the Food Group. Prices of bread, softdrinks, ice cream and confectionery increased in all cities and milk prices rose in all cities except Brisbane. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed an increase of 1.1% for the quarter.

Clothing and Drapery Group. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities increased by 1.4% for the quarter.

Housing Group. There were increases for all sections of the group except local government rates and charges. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed a quarterly increase of 3.2%.

Household Supplies and Equipment Group. There were increases in all sections of this group with the main increase being in electricity charges in Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities increased by 3.8%.

Miscellaneous Group. Most sections of this group showed significant increases. Petrol prices increased especially in Sydney and Adelaide. Prices of motoring services increased generally and those of motoring charges increased in Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Hobart. Motor car prices fell in all cities following reduction in sales tax. Cigarette and tobacco prices increased especially in Adelaide. Prices of medical services increased in all cities, and those of hospital services increased in Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Canberra reflecting increases in contribution rates to insurance funds first charged between the pricing dates for December and March quarters. Retrospective charges made by some funds in Sydney and Canberra for the period August to December 1974 are not included in the index. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities increased by 6.3%.
