

Lower petrol prices (down 15.4%) and mortgage interest charges (down 3.8%) had a substantial impact on the CPI this quarter. Falls in prices for overseas and domestic travel and accommodation (down 5.2%) and child care fees (down 14.7%) also contributed significantly to the overall decrease.

Increases in fresh fruit and vegetable prices (up 14.0%), education fees (up 10.3%), pharmaceutical costs (up 14.3%), entertainment charges (up 3.8%), consumer credit charges (up 2.5%) and charges for hospital and medical services (up 2.5%) served to significantly offset the above

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Overview.

The CPI fell by 0.2% between the December quarter 1990 and March quarter 1991. Falls in the CPI were last recorded in March quarter 1984 (-0.4%) and December quarter 1963 (-0.1%).

Main contributions to change.

The five groups which had the most significant influence on the change in the all groups index were Transportation, Food, Housing, Health and Personal Care and Recreation and Education.

Transportation: -4.6%

The transportation group is the largest contributor to change in the all groups index. This was mainly due to a 15.4% fall in petrol prices. Motor vehicle prices showed a net decrease of 0.7%. Significant discounting of some models was partly offset by increases for other models. The petrol and motor vehicle decreases were in part offset by price increases for motoring charges (+2.1%), vehicle servicing repairs and parts (+1.2%) and urban transport fares (+1.2%).

Food: +2.1%

The increase in the food group this quarter had the largest offsetting influence on the change in the all groups index. Significant increases in fresh vegetables prices (+21.1%) and fresh fruit prices (+11.2%) accounted for most of the increase. Price increases were also recorded for take away foods (+1.3%), soft drinks and cordials (+2.2%) and milk and cream (+2.1%).

Housing: -1.4%

Decreases were recorded for the housing group in all cities this quarter. These decreases were the result of falls in mortgage interest charges ranging from -4.1% in Sydney to -1.9% in Darwin.

Mortgage interest rates decreased for the fourth consecutive quarter, with mortgage debt continuing the recent trend of moderate increases.

Health and Personal Care: +3.5%

An increase in the cost of pharmaceuticals (+13.8%) contributed most to the increase this quarter. The cost of prescription drugs increased as a result of higher average charges for PBS prescriptions due to a decrease in the effect of the safety net provision. The cost of hospital and medical services also increased (+2.2%) mainly due to increases in health insurance premiums.

Recreation and Education: -0.3%

Increases in education fees (+10.3%) and entertainment charges (+3.8%) were more than offset by falls in both overseas and domestic holiday travel and accommodation costs (-5.2%) and child care fees (-14.7%).



(c) The All groups, services component comprises government charges comprise; government charges comprise; government charges comprise; government cowned dwelling rents; water and sewerage rates; council property rates and charges; all prices (Robbourne and Perth only); motor vehicle trief party insurance premiums (except Canberra and in Sydney and Brisbane); motor vehicle trief party insurance premiums (except Canberra and in Sydney and Darwin). The derivations and limitations of these figures was described in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Brief description of the CPI

The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a basket of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditure by the CPI population group (ie metropolitan wage and salary earner households). This basket covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing; housing; household equipment and operation; transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Pensioners and other social welfare recipients are not included in the CPI population group and the index does not reflect concessional prices paid by these people such as subsidised government dwelling rents, public transport fares and the like.

- 2. The capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
- 3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

Prices

- 4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some important items are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).
- 5. In order to facilitate a more even spread of field collection workload the bulk of the items for which prices are collected quarterly are priced in the first two months of each quarter (ie July/August, October/November, January/February, April/May). With a few exceptions items priced in the third month are those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information about any changes in price during the quarter is obtained so that an average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

Weighting pattern

- 6. There are 107 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the eleventh series CPI and each expenditure class has its own weight, or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights.
- 7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now comprises eleven series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series.

Analysis of CPI changes

8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as changes in *index points* or as percentage changes. The following example illustrates the method of calculating index points changes and percentage changes between any two periods:

All Groups CPI: Weighted average of eight capital cities Index numbers:

Dec quarter 1990: 214.5 (see Table 1) less: Sept quarter 1990: 208.9 (see Table 1) Change in index points: +5.6

Percentage change = $\frac{+5.6}{208.9}$ x 100 = +2.7%

- 9. In this publication, percentage changes are calculated to illustrate 3 different kinds of movements in index numbers:
 - movements between consecutive financial years (where the index numbers for financial years are simple averages of the quarterly index numbers),
 - movements between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, and
 - movements between consecutive quarters.
- 10. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for selected expenditure classes. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup makes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy products subgroup contributed 2.91 index points to the total All Groups index number of 197.0 for September quarter 1989. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.
- 11. Table 8 provides summary information about a range of Special series in a similar format to that provided in Table 7.
- 12. Information on the impact of changes in Selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 8. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 8 shows index numbers for two special series Selected State and local government charges and All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. An explanation of the derivation and limitations of these figures was published in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.


