

#### **SUMMARY OF FINDINGS**


#### Overview

The All groups CPI increased 0.5 per cent between the June and September quarters 1993, resulting in an annual increase (September quarter 1993 on September quarter 1992) of 2.2 per cent.

Contributing most to the overall increase this quarter were cigarette and tobacco prices (up 3.8%), motor vehicle prices (up 2.1%), lamb and mutton (up 8.6%), furniture (up 0.9%), the cost of hospital and medical services (up 0.9%), fresh vegetable prices (up 5.6%) and beer (up 0.9%).

Partially offsetting the above were falls in mortgage interest charges (down 1.3% - mainly due to falls in mortgage interest rates), consumer credit charges (down 2.3%) and the cost of pharmaceuticals (down 5.1%).

Contributing most to the annual increase in consumer prices were prices of cigarettes and tobacco (up 19.6%), food (up 2.6%) and selected State and local government charges (up 6.5%), with significant offsets being provided by mortgage interest and consumer credit charges (down 4.9%) and petrol (down 2.7%) (see Tables 7 and 8).

#### Main contributions to quarterly change

#### Tobacco and alcohol: +2.2%

Prices of cigarettes and tobacco increased 3.8 per cent nationally as a result of an increase in the Commonwealth excise on tobacco products combined with increases in State and Territory franchise fees in Perth, Hobart, and Darwin.

Over the 12 months to September quarter 1993, cigarette and tobacco prices have increased 19.6 per cent nationally.

#### Transportation: +1.0%

The increase in transportation costs this quarter results mainly from increases in motor vehicle prices (+2.1%), urban transport fares (+1.9%), vehicle insurance costs (+0.9%) and vehicle servicing, repairs and parts (+0.5%).

Motor vehicle prices increased relatively uniformly in all cities, ranging from 1.5 per cent in Brisbane to 3.3 per cent in Canberra. The 2.1 per cent overall increase this quarter follows a 1.7 per cent increase last quarter, delivering an annual increase (September quarter 1993 on September quarter 1992) of 7.3 per cent.

Urban transport fares increased in Perth (+7.9%), Canberra (+6.8%), Adelaide (+3.0%), Sydney (+2.1%), and Brisbane (+0.9%).

Petrol prices increased by 0.2 per cent this quarter as a result of increases in May (+0.1%) and June (+2.2%), falls in July (-1.2%) and August (-1.7%), followed by a further increase in September (+3.3%). Over the 12 months to September quarter 1993, the price of petrol has fallen by 2.7 per cent.

#### Food: +0.7%

Increases in prices of lamb and mutton (+8.6%), fresh vegetables (+5.6%), beef and veal (+2.2%) and confectionery (+0.9%) were partially offset by falls in prices of fresh fruit (-2.3%) and processed meat (-2.5%).

At the national level, the increase in fresh vegetable prices results from increases in prices of lettuce, onions, beans, and tomatoes, partially offset by a fall in prices of carrots. Falls in prices of strawberries, grapes, and bananas contributed most to the overall fall in fresh fruit prices.

#### Clothing: -0.9%

The fall in clothing prices this quarter is largely attributable to falls in prices of men's outer clothing (-2.8%), fabrics and knitting wool (-1.0%), men's shirts (-2.5%) and men's footwear (-2.5%).

#### Housing: -0.3%

The fall in housing costs results from a fall in mortgage interest charges (-1.3%) partially offset by increases in the cost of house repair and maintenance (+1.1%) and house insurance (+2.4%).

The fall in mortgage interest charges reflects a slight increase in the value of the debt outstanding (+1.4%) combined with a fall in interest rates (-2.8%).

#### Recreation and education: +0.3%

Increases in the cost of holiday travel and accommodation in Australia (+1.3%) and prices of books, newspapers, and magazines (+1.3%) were partially offset by a fall in the cost of holiday travel and accommodation overseas (-1.3%).

#### Household equipment and operation: +0.1%

Increases in furniture prices (+0.9%), household cleaning agents (+3.8%) and electricity charges (+1.1%) were partially offset by a fall in consumer credit charges (-2.3%).

The fall in consumer credit charges reflects a slight increase in the value of the debt outstanding (+0.5%) combined with a fall in interest rates (-2.8%).

#### Health and personal care: +0.1%


Increases in the cost of hospital and medical (+0.9%), optical (+3.2%), and dental (+1.1%) services were partially offset by a fall in the cost of pharmaceuticals (-5.1%), mainly due to the increased effect of the PBS safety net provisions).

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

### Brief description of the CPI

- The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a basket of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditure by the CPI population group (ie metropolitan wage and salary earner households). This basket covers a wide range of goods and services. arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing; housing; household equipment and operation: transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care: and recreation and education. Pensioners and other social welfare recipients are not included in the CPI population group and the index does not reflect concessional prices paid by these people such as subsidised government dwelling rents, public transport fares and the like.
- 2. The capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.
- 3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

#### **Prices**

- 4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some important items are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).
- 5. In order to facilitate a more even spread of field collection workload the bulk of the items for which prices are collected quarterly are priced in the first two months of each quarter (ie July/August, October/November, January/February, April/May). With a few exceptions items priced in the third month are those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information about any changes in price during the quarter is obtained so that an average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

#### Weighting pattern

6. There are 107 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the eleventh series CPI and each expenditure class has its own weight, or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights.

7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now comprises twelve series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series.

#### Analysis of CPI changes

- 8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as changes in *index points* or as percentage changes. The following example illustrates the method of calculating index points changes and percentage changes between any two periods:
- All Groups CPI: Weighted average of eight capital cities Index numbers:

Jun quarter 1993: 109.3 (see Table 1) less: Mar quarter 1993: 108.9 (see Table 1) Change in index points: 0.4

Percentage change =  $\frac{0.4}{108.9}$  x 100 = 0.4%

- 9. In this publication, percentage changes are calculated to illustrate 3 different kinds of movements in index numbers:
  - movements between consecutive financial years (where the index numbers for financial years are simple averages of the quarterly index numbers),
  - movements between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, and
  - movements between consecutive quarters.
- 10. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for selected expenditure classes. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup makes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy products subgroup contributed 1.63 index points to the total All Groups index number of 109.3 for June quarter 1993. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.
- 11. Table 8 provides summary information about a range of Special series in a similar format to that provided in Table 7.

12. Information on the impact of changes in Selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 8. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 8 shows index numbers for two special series Selected State and local government charges and All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. An explanation of the derivation and limitations of these figures was published in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.


