MAIN FEATURES

In November 1984 there were an estimated 2,897,400 children under the age of twelve in Australia.

In the week prior to interview:

358,300 children used formal child care

864,500 children used informal child care

For definitions of formal and informal child care see paragraphs 7(a) and (b).

Formal Child Care: Of the 358,300 children using formal child care

125,100 (35 per cent) reported the main reason for use was to prepare the child for school

148,300 (41 per cent) were in care 10 to 19 hours per week

122,400 (34 per cent) paid between \$1 to \$4 per week

Informal Child Care: Of the 864,500 children using informal child care

347,300 (40 per cent) reported the main reason for use was to allow the person responsible for the child to go to work

341,900 (40 per cent) were in care for less than 5 hours per week

703,800 (81 per cent) reported no cost for the child care used

1,801,900 children used other arrangements (for definition see paragraph 7(c)). Of these children, 1,710,400 (95 per cent) reported the persons responsible for the children were always able to look after them in the week prior to interview.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

A survey was conducted throughout Australia in November 1984 to obtain information on child care arrangements made by persons responsible for children under twelve years of age. The survey collected details on the social and economic characteristics of family units (e.g. marital status, labour force status, income, etc.), patterns of usage of child care, cost and main reason for using formal and informal child care, the level of met, partially met or unmet demand for child care services and the amount of care by the spouse. Details of child care arrangements were collected for each child in the survey.

2. This publication contains preliminary estimates of child care arrangements made by the person responsible for each child under the age of twelve and includes topics such as cost, hours, frequency of use and main reason for using formal and informal child care. The estimates are subject to revision. More detailed estimates will be released at a later date and will include information on the family.

Scope and coverage

3. The survey was conducted as part of the regular population survey which is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 33,000 houses, flats) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels) and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. Certain groups of persons such as occupants of non-private dwellings (e.g. hospitals, hotels), diplomatic personnel and persons from overseas touring or holidaying in Australia were excluded from the survey.

Survey method

4. The information about child care arrangements were obtained through interviews with the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age (see paragraph 6). If the person responsible for the children under twelve years of age was not available for interview, another responsible adult answered on his or her behalf. Interviews were carried out over a period of two weeks commencing 12 November 1984.

Definitions

5. Types of child care arrangements have been classified to three categories i.e. formal, informal and other. A child may use several care types in any or all of these categories. A measure of the multiplicity of child care usage within categories is shown in the tables as *total usage of child care*. No attempt has been made in this publication to measure multiplicity of child care usage across categories.

6. The *person responsible* for children under twelve years of age was taken to be the mother if she was a usual resident of the selected private dwelling. If the mother was not normally resident at that private dwelling or was not available then the information was sought from the person mainly responsible for the children under twelve years of age.

7. *Child care* relates to all arrangements made for the care of children under twelve years of age for Monday to Sunday of the week prior to interview. Child care is divided into the following categories:

- (a) *Formal child care* relates to all arrangements made for the care of children at a pre-school and/or a child care centre (such as a creche, playgroup, kindergarten or occasional care centre) and/or through a family day care scheme.
- (b) *Informal child care* includes any care arrangements where children were cared for by other children resident at the selected private dwelling and/or relatives or non-relatives both resident at the dwelling or elsewhere.
- (c) *Other* includes any care arrangements where the persons responsible for the children were always able to look after them in the week prior to interview. Also included in this category are arrangements where the children spent time at scouts, music lessons, sporting activities, hospital, etc. and/or where the children looked after themselves.

8. *Type of child care* used refers to any of the types of child care detailed in paragraphs 7(a), (b) and (c).

9. *Usage of child care* is the number of times a particular type of child care was used within a category of child care e.g. if a child used a pre-school and family day care it was counted as two arrangements of formal child care usage.

10. *Number of children using child care* refers to the number of children within a category of child care, regardless of the number of types of child care used e.g. if a child used a pre-school and family day care it was counted as one child using formal child care.

11. *Total children using child care* (Table 1) refers to the number of children using any type of child care, regardless of the number of types or categories of child care used e.g. if a child was included in both formal and informal child care categories it was counted as one child in the total.

12. *Cost of child care* is money paid for child care on a weekly basis or converted to a weekly equivalent and includes donations if they are considered to be a cost by the person responsible.

Interpretation of results

13. Formal child care

Names and addresses of the child care services used were supplied by the respondent and coded to type of formal child care from a list compiled in each State.

A child may have more than one arrangement of the same type of formal child care e.g. a child using two child care centres. These arrangements have been combined and details aggregated in this publication for the child care type.

14. Informal child care

Informal child care was coded according to the response by the person responsible for the child.

No attempt was made to collect individual information where there was more than one care giver within a type of child care i.e. if a child was looked after by more than one relative at different times in the survey week, the data collected were the total care by those relatives.

15. Other

Other arrangements were coded according to the response by the person responsible for the child

A child shown in the tables as being looked after only by the person responsible in the week prior to interview may also have been cared for by his/her spouse. The final publication will show details of spouse care. Note however that the data will only be available for the family unit i.e. not for individual children within the family.

As arrangements such as scouts, music lessons etc. would not always have been considered by the respondent as a form of child care, the response to this type was significantly under stated. It is also very likely that the count of children looking after themselves was under stated because some respondents may have been reluctant to tell an interviewer that they left their children on their own.

16. The carer's place of residence is not intended to indicate where the child care took place e.g. care by relative resident in the dwelling may have taken place at another person's residence.

17. In some tables (tables 2 to 6 and tables 8 to 10) there are two 'total' columns shown. One refers to the *total usage of child care* while the other refers to the *number of children using child care*. Because children can use more than one type of child care it is possible that the usage figures are greater than the number of children figures. However, in tables 4 to 6 and tables 9 and 10, there is another factor that needs to be taken into account when interpreting the difference between the two totals. For these tables the children can also be counted in a different row in the body of the table from where they are counted in the total number of children column. For example, in table 4 a child who attended pre-school for 3 hours and child care centre for 5 hours was counted in the total usage column in both the less than 5 hours and 5 to 9 hours classifications. In the number of children total, the child was counted once in the classification for the aggregated number of hours used i.e. 5 to 9. Cost of child care was treated in a similar manner to this example.

18. A slightly different treatment was used for tables that relate to frequency of use of child care and days on which child care was used. For example, in table 5 a child who attended pre-school on a daily basis and a child care centre at least once a week was counted in the total usage column in both the daily and at least once a week classifications. In the number of children total, the child was counted once in the classification for most frequently used care i.e. daily.

Reliability of estimates

19. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability, that is they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included in the survey. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will

differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate, and this is known as the *relative standard error*.

20. Tables following these notes show estimated standard errors and standard error percentages for numbers of children under twelve years of age. Thus, an estimate for Australia of 5,000 children has a standard error of 1,050 children or a relative standard error of 21.3 per cent. This means there are about two chances in three that the true figure is within the range 3,950 to 6,050 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the true figure is between 2,900 and 7,100.

21. Estimates with relative standard errors greater than 30 per cent have not been shown and although figures for these components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

22. The imprecision due to sampling variability should not be confused with inaccuracies that may have occurred because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
