It includes data from a variety of ABS and non-ABS sources. Broad indicators include Estimated Resident Population, some Census data, Births and Deaths, Unemployment, Income Support Customers, Taxable Income, Building Approvals, Motor Vehicle Sales and Agriculture. Western Australia had an estimated population of 2 050 884 in June 2006. This accounts for less than 10% of Australia's population, although Western Australia has the largest land area (2 532 400sq km) of any Australian State or Territory.

Western Australia has a coastline of 12 500km, accounting for 34% of Australia's total coastline.

The State capital is Perth, founded on 12 August 1829. In June 2006 the estimated population of the Perth Statistical Division was 1 507 949.

This brochure provides a snapshot of Western Australia; more detail can be found in the variety of publications released by the ABS.
