# NSW OVERVIEW

EMPLOYMENT	
	The number of employed persons in NSW was 2,835,400 in seasonally adjusted terms in May 1998, a fall of 0.5% since April. National employment was almost unchanged in May.
UNEMPLOYMENT	
	Unemployment in NSW rose by 5.2% in May 1998 to a seasonally adjusted figure of 231,900. The unemployment rate rose from 7.2% in April to 7.6% in May in NSW and from 7.9% to 8.1% nationally.
JOB VACANCIES	
	There were 20,500 job vacancies in NSW in May 1998, a fall of 12.7% since February. National job vacancies fell by 3.0% in the same period.
BUILDING APPROVALS	
	The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in April 1998 increased by 15.8% from the previous month to 5,191.
RETAIL	
	In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in April 1998 was \$3,957.9 million, a decrease of 0.3% compared to the previous month.
NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRA	TIONS
	In seasonally adjusted terms, new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in April 1998 rose by 10.0% from the previous month to 22,791.
FINANCE	
	The value of housing finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in April 1998 was \$1,908.1 million. This represented a 1.3% decrease from March 1998 and a 1.3% decrease from April 1997.
INVESTMENT	
	The March quarter 1998 trend estimate of total private new capital expenditure (at current prices) for NSW was \$3,777 million, a rise of 3.3 % over the previous quarter.

# MAIN FEATURES

#### BUILDING APPROVALS

The seasonally adjusted number of new houses approved for NSW in April 1998 rose by 4.0% over the previous month to 2,615. This was an increase of 5.9% on the figure a year ago. The number of total dwelling units approved was 5,191, representing an increase of 15.8% and 20.0% respectively over the same periods. At the national level, total dwelling units approved was 14,882, a rise of 8.3% on the previous month and up 19.5% on the figure a year ago. Private sector house approvals in NSW increased by 4.6% from the previous month. However, the trend figure, which had been rising since July 1996, fell by 0.5% in April.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the value of new residential building approved for NSW in April 1998 increased substantially by 38.2% on the previous month to \$669.6 million. In comparison to the 1997 figure for the same month there was a 32.4% increase. Nationally, the figure was \$1,668.5 million, a rise of 15.1% on the previous month and up 32.4% on the previous year. It should be noted that the national annual movement was identical to that for NSW. The value of alterations and additions to dwellings for NSW in April 1998 was \$154.5 million, reflecting strong growth (up 69.4%) compared to the figure a year ago. The national increase was 41.3% over the same period.

In original terms, the value of all building approved in NSW for April 1998 increased by 27.7% over the previous month to \$1,263.2 million. The national figure rose by 15.5% over the same period to \$3,082.4 million. Both NSW and Australia showed increases on the previous year, these being 49.1% and 35.3% respectively. All original and seasonally adjusted building approval data items for April 1998 presented in this publication showed increases both from the previous month and from the previous year.

#### INVESTMENT

For total private new capital expenditure (at current prices) the March quarter 1998 trend estimate for NSW was \$3,777 million. This represented a rise of \$120 million over the previous quarter. The NSW increase of 3.3% over this period compared with an increase of 1.7% for Australia.

The trend estimates for expenditure on buildings and structures for NSW rose by 2.0% to \$1,033 million. This expenditure has been relatively stable — between \$999 million and \$1,100 million — since the June quarter 1996. The trend estimates for expenditure on equipment, plant and machinery for NSW rose by \$100 million (3.8%) to \$2,744 million. This expenditure has been steadily rising over the past four quarters and is now 18.7% higher than in the March quarter 1997.
