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### CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

For Table 1, data for the Estimated Resident Population has been replaced for this issue only by data showing the latest financial year information for various sectors of the economy. Also shown with the latest financial year data is the proportion of each sector to the Australian totals for each sector.

GENERAL

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. This smoothing technique does result in revisions to the most recent estimates as additional observations become available. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators* (Cat. no. 1308.0).

### STANDARD ERRORS OF ESTIMATES

One measure of the variability which occurs as a result of surveying only samples of the total business population is the standard error. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE). For detailed explanatory notes and definitions for the items shown in this publication, readers are referred to the specific ABS publications.

### NSW OVERVIEW

#### **EMPLOYMENT**

Employment in NSW increased by 13,400 (0.5%) in July 1999 to 2,942,500 in seasonally adjusted terms. This was the third consecutive monthly increase in employment in NSW. National employment rose by 0.2% in July.

### UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment in NSW fell by 4.4% to a seasonally adjusted figure of 191,300 in July 1999. This was the fourth consecutive monthly fall in unemployment, now 13.0% below the level of March. The unemployment rate fell from 6.4% in June to 6.1% in July, the lowest rate since March 1990. The national unemployment rate was 7.0% in July, down 0.2 percentage points over the month.

### AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS

Average weekly earnings in NSW in May 1999 were \$791.80 per week (full-time adult ordinary time earnings, seasonally adjusted). This was a rise of 1.1% over the quarter and 5.7% over the past year. The corresponding national increases were 1.1% and 3.3%

### **BUILDING APPROVALS**

The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in June 1999 rose by 7.0% from the previous month to 4,548.

### RETAIL

In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in June 1999 was 4,205.8m. For May 1999, the figure was 4,215.6m.

### NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

New motor vehicle registrations for NSW in seasonally adjusted terms in June 1999 rose 6.9% from the previous month to 23,432.

### FINANCE

The seasonally adjusted value of housing finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in June 1999 was \$2,545m. This represented an increase of 5.7% on the previous month and an increase of 24.9% since June 1998.

#### **BUILDING APPROVALS**

In seasonally adjusted terms, the number of new dwelling units approved in NSW for June 1999 was 4,548 (including 2,464 houses). This represented an increase of 7.0% on the previous month but was down 11.1% on June 1998. Nationally, the figure was 13,772 (including 9,374 houses), a rise of 6.9% on May 1999 but 3.3% lower than the figure a year ago.

The value of new residential building for NSW in June 1999 was 605.4m, a rise of 14.9% on the previous month and 6.3% up on the figure a year ago. Nationally, there were increases of 14.6% and 9.0% respectively over the same periods.

In original terms, the value of total building in NSW was \$1,171.2m, a rise of 2.6% from May 1999. Nationally, the figure was \$2,831.1m, representing a slight fall over the same period.

The trend for the value of total building for NSW has been reversed and is now showing increases totalling 16.7% since October 1998.

### LABOUR MARKET

Three consecutive monthly rises in employment since April brought the July 1999 estimate of employment in NSW to 2,942,500 in seasonally adjusted terms. This was 1.4% (or 41,500) higher than in April. Full-time employment increased by 47,800 over this period while there was a fall of 6,300 in part-time employment. The employment level in July 1999 was the highest seasonally adjusted monthly estimate recorded in the past 20 years.

Four consecutive monthly falls have seen the seasonally adjusted estimate of unemployment in NSW drop to 191,300 in July 1999. This was the lowest level recorded since October 1990. Associated with the fall in unemployment was a sharp fall in the unemployment rate from 7.0% in March this year to 6.1% in July, the lowest seasonally adjusted rate in over nine years (since March 1990).

The participation rate was 61.7% in July 1999. The rate has been fairly steady since last November.


