DATA NOTES

ABS statistical series are being impacted to varying degrees as a result of The New Tax System (TNTS), introduced in Australia from 1 July 2000. TNTS included the removal of Wholesale Sales Tax and the introduction of a Goods and Services Tax (GST), and as a result, a wide range of ABS data series will reflect significant immediate and subsequent impacts. For further information see Australian Economic Indicators, July 2000 (Cat. no. 1350.0).

GENERAL

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication Seasonally Adjusted Indicators (Cat. no. 1308.0).

NSW OVERVIEW

FMPLOYMENT Employment in NSW rose by 0.3% in December 2000 to a seasonally

adjusted figure of 3,023,900. National employment in December 2000

was 9,086,700.

UNEMPLOYMENT Unemployment in NSW was a seasonally adjusted figure of 192,500 in

December 2000. The unemployment rate was 6.0%, an increase of

0.2 percentage points from November 2000. The national unemployment

rate remained steady at 6.6% in December 2000.

INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES In NSW in October 2000 there were 5,300 working days lost due to

> industrial disputes, a decrease of 36.1% on the working days lost in the previous month. Nationally there were 29,300 working days lost due to

industrial disputes in October 2000.

JOB VACANCIES There were 40,400 job vacancies in NSW in November 2000, a decrease

of 8.0% on the previous period. Nationally there were 118,200 vacancies.

BUILDING APPROVALS The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW

> in November 2000 decreased by 14.4% from the previous month to 3,057 dwelling units. This was a decrease of 29.9% on the corresponding month of the previous year. Nationally, there were 9,919 new dwelling

units, an increase of 2.8% from the previous month.

RETAIL In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in November 2000

was \$4,361.5 million. This was a decrease of 2.4% on the previous

month.

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE

REGISTRATIONS

New motor vehicle registrations for NSW in seasonally adjusted terms in December 2000 increased by 11.3% compared to the previous month to

25,229 registrations.

CPI The Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the December Quarter 2000 for

Sydney was 132.2, an increase of 0.5% since the September Quarter and

an increase of 6.0% since the December Quarter 1999.

FINANCE The seasonally adjusted value of housing finance commitments for owner

occupation in NSW in November 2000 was \$2,241 million, an increase of

9.3% on the previous month and a decrease of 20.4% on November 1999.

GOVERNMENT FINANCE

STATISTICS (GFS)

The underlying General Government operating surplus for the

five months ended 30 November 2000 was \$944 million. The General

Government Net Lending result for the five months ended

30 November 2000 was \$977 million.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS The customs value of imports into NSW during November 2000 was

> \$4,943 million, an increase of 1.6% on October 2000. The value of exports (FOB) from NSW in November 2000 was \$1,957 million, a

decrease of 4.0% over the same period.

MAIN FEATURES

BUILDING APPROVALS

There has been a decrease in the number of new houses approved in the month of November. The number of new houses (seasonally adjusted) was 1,557 in NSW, a decrease of 10.2% on the previous month and a decrease of 45.2% from the corresponding period of the previous year. The number of new dwelling units (seasonally adjusted) in November 2000 was 3,057, a decrease of 14.4% on October 2000 and a decrease of 29.9% from November 1999. Nationally, the number of new dwelling units was 9,919, an increase of 2.8% from October 2000 but a decrease of 34.6% from November 1999.

From July 2000, value data for both residential and non-residential building approved is on a GST inclusive basis.

For NSW in November 2000 the seasonally adjusted value of new residential building was \$409.9 million, a decrease of 10.5% from October 2000 and a decrease of 22.1% from November 1999. The value (seasonally adjusted) of alterations and additions to residential building in November 2000 decreased 28.7% from the previous month to \$82.4 million.

The value (in original terms) of non-residential building in NSW decreased 29.2% from October 2000 to \$269.6 million and decreased 2.4% from November 1999. The value of all building (in original terms) in NSW was \$855.1 million, a decrease of 8.9% from October 2000. Nationally, the value of all building was \$2,678 million which represented an increase of 4.7% on October 2000 but a decrease of 18.5% on the corresponding period of the previous year.

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

In NSW in December 2000 the seasonally adjusted number of new motor vehicle registrations (excluding motor cycles) was 25,229, an increase of 11.3% on the previous month and an increase of 8.5% from the corresponding period last year. Nationally the number of registrations (seasonally adjusted) was 75,259, an increase of 15.4% from November 2000 and 19.1% from December 1999.

Passenger vehicle registrations in NSW increased to 21,804 (seasonally adjusted) in December 2000, an increase of 11.2% on the previous month and 14.7% on December 1999. Passenger vehicles increased to 64,322 nationally which is an increase of 25% from December 1999 and a 15.5% increase from November 2000.

Other vehicle (excluding motor cycles) registrations also rose 11.2% from the previous month to 3,425, however fell 19% from the corresponding period last year. Nationally other vehicles rose by 15.3% from November 2000 but fell 6.7% from the corresponding period last year.

In November 2000 all figures in the seasonally adjusted series were revised as a result of the annual re-estimation of seasonal factors.

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






