PREFACE

This publication was previously published under ABS Catalogue no. 1314.3. From the year 2000, all Australian regional statistics compendiums will be published under ABS Catalogue no. 1362, but maintaining the appropriate State/Territory trailing character.

Regional Statistics, Queensland presents a statistical summary of key social and economic information for the State of Queensland. This publication presents the latest available data (at the time of preparation), as well as an historical time series, for a selected range of Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) and some non-ABS data items.

The data presented are derived from a number of statistical sources which are updated at differing periods of regularity. Hence, the time period or date of the latest available data will differ between individual statistical series. Care should be taken when analysing the data from ABS and non-ABS sources as time periods, definitions, scope, coverage and methodologies may differ.

Data in this publication are presented for local government areas (LGA), statistical districts, statistical divisions and Queensland. The LGA is the smallest type of spatial unit of the Australian Standard Geographic Classification (ASGC) shown in this publication.

Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

To gain an understanding of the methods and definitions applicable to the selected data items, reading the explanatory notes at the rear of this publication is recommended. More detailed information can be obtained from the relevant source publications which are listed in the Bibliography at the back of this publication.



TIME SERIES INDICATORS—STATISTICAL DIVISIONS



For the purpose of presenting the principal series of official statistics for the State, Queensland is divided into a number of geographical areas. These areas consist, for the most part, of aggregations of local government areas.

The primary division of the State is into 11 statistical divisions. These are intended to represent as far as possible 'regions' of the State which are characterised by discernible social and/or economic links between the inhabitants and economic units within them, under the unifying influence of one or more major cities or towns. The boundaries of the divisions have accordingly been delineated on the basic criterion that the degree of economic and/or social content and interaction within each division should be maximised. It should be emphasised that the boundaries of the divisions cannot be regarded as sharp lines of demarcation—they may, of necessity, be positioned within peripheral zones in which the influence of two or more 'focal' cities or towns overlap in varying degrees.

Part 1 of this publication provides an overview of selected characteristics for Queensland and each statistical division.

The statistical information is presented as a set of time series indicators that should assist in analysing the changes that have occurred over the last 5 years as well as understanding the composition and structure of each region.



BRISBANE AND MORETON STATISTICAL DIVISIONS



Brisbane Statistical Division (BSD) extends from Caboolture in the north to Ormeau in the south, east to Moreton Bay and west to Ipswich. It contains only 0.3% of Queensland's total area, but 45.6% of the estimated resident population at 30 June 1999. Despite being predominantly urbanised, BSD produces a wide range of fruit and vegetables and has the second largest area of plant nurseries in Queensland.

Moreton Statistical Division (MSD) surrounds the BSD, taking in the Gold and Sunshine Coasts, encompassing 1.0% of Queensland's total area, with 19.2% of the estimated resident population. The population grew 2.9% in 1999, the fastest growth in Queensland. In 1997-98, MSD produced most of Queensland's vegetables for human consumption.

The south-east corner of Queensland is a major tourist destination, with 42.8% of the State's accommodation establishments located in the combined Brisbane and Moreton Statistical Divisions.

The Statistical Divisions of Brisbane and Moreton have been combined for the following table, as a number of LGAs have portions in both divisions.

WIDE BAY-BURNETT STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Wide Bay-Burnett Statistical Division covers 52,283 square kilometres, 3.0% of the total area of Queensland. The division had an estimated resident population of 232,987 persons at 30 June 1999 which represented 6.6% of the total Queensland population. Wide Bay-Burnett Statistical Division is centred on Bundaberg, approximately 368 kilometres north of Brisbane. The next most significant population centres are Hervey Bay, Maryborough, Gympie and Kingaroy.

There is a diversity of agricultural activities in the area, as well as the major crop of sugar cane. In 1997-98, the Wide Bay-Burnett Statistical Division was the largest producer of peanuts in Australia. The region is also Queensland's largest producer of a wide range of vegetables, including marrows, squash, zucchinis, garlic and sweet potatoes. Wide Bay-Burnett Statistical Division grows 100% of Australia's aloe vera crop and has the highest number of deer and the second highest number of pigs in Queensland.

DARLING DOWNS STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Darling Downs Statistical Division covers 90,080 square kilometres, or 5.2% of the State. Its estimated resident population of 201,446 at 30 June 1999 represented 5.7% of the State's population.

This rich pastoral and agricultural region is bounded in the north-east by the Great Dividing Range. Toowoomba City is the hub of commercial and industrial activity and higher education. Other major population centres are Warwick, Stanthorpe and Dalby.

Although this division has one of the smallest areas for agriculture, it has the greatest number of agricultural establishments (6,827) and in 1997-98 accounted for 20.5% of the gross value of the State's production. The area is Queensland's largest producer of wheat, oats, barley, grain sorghum, maize, millet, mung beans, cotton, cauliflower, celery, leeks, rhubarb and stone fruit. The division leads the State in the production of eggs, honey and beeswax, ostrich and pig farming, and cultivates the largest area for cut flowers.



SOUTH-WEST STATISTICAL DIVISION




The South-West Statistical Division covers 322,655 square kilometres, and is the second largest in the State, accounting for 18.6% of Queensland's total area. This division had an estimated resident population at 30 June 1999 of 25,711 persons or just 0.7% of the State's total population. There has been a decline in the estimated resident population of –0.7% from the 1998 figure. The division is situated on the South Australian and New South Wales border with the western part being desert receiving less than 150 millimetres of rain per annum. The main population centres are Roma, Charleville, St George and Cunnamulla.

Key activities in the region include wool growing and meat cattle grazing as well as cotton and grain growing. The region recorded the highest number of sheep and lambs—4,704,011 or 42.8% of Queensland's total in 1997–98. This region contributes significantly to the State's oil and gas production (2,574.5 million kilolitres in 1999), and opal mining is also an important activity in the west of the division.

FITZROY STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Fitzroy Statistical Division covers 123,354 square kilometres (7.1% of Queensland's total area), with an estimated resident population of 181,202 at 30 June 1999, representing 5.2% of the Queensland population.

Rockhampton is the main city in this division, other significant centres of population are Gladstone, Blackwater, Emerald and Biloela. Gladstone is Queensland's largest multi-cargo trading port as well as being one of the world's largest coal ports. The alumina refinery at Gladstone is the world's largest with a capacity for 3.65m tonnes a year and the aluminium smelter at Boyne Island has an annual production capacity close to 495,000 tonnes of aluminium a year.



CENTRAL-WEST STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Central-West Statistical Division covers 370,089 square kilometres (21.4% of Queensland's total area). The division is Queensland's least populated and had an estimated resident population of 12,255 at 30 June 1999, representing only 0.3% of Queensland's population. The largest population centre in the area is Longreach (site of the Stockman's Hall of Fame), approximately 700 kilometres west of Rockhampton. Blackall, Barcaldine and Winton are other major population centres in the region.

In 1997-98, the Central-West Statistical Division had the highest area of agricultural holdings in Queensland (31,056,164 ha) or 21% of the State's total, despite accounting for only 2.3% of all holdings. Key agricultural industries include meat cattle and wool growing.



MACKAY STATISTICAL DIVISION





Other major population centres are Moranbah, Dysart, Sarina, Proserpine and Clermont.

The main economic bases of this division are sugar cane growing and processing, coal mining, cattle grazing and hospitality. In 1997-98, the region was Queensland's second largest producer of sugar cane cut for crushing.

NORTHERN STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Northern Statistical Division covers 100,951 square kilometres (5.8% of total Queensland) and had an estimated resident population of 197,302 at 30 June 1999 (5.6% of Queensland's total population). The Northern Statistical Division is bordered to the east by the Great Barrier Reef and to the west by the Great Dividing Range. The population is centred in Townsville-Thuringowa, the hub of commercial and industrial activity in the division. Other significant population centres in the division are Charters Towers, Ayr, Bowen and Ingham.


The largest Queensland coal deposits are located in the Bowen Basin, and the Mount Leyshon mine in the Charters Towers region is the largest gold producer in the State.

Queensland is the major grower of sugar cane in Australia (93%). The Northern Statistical Division, well known for its spectacular cane burning, is the State's largest producer of sugar cane cut for crushing, accounting for 34.6% (12.7m tonnes) of the total in 1997-98. It is Queensland's largest producer of a number of vegetables and fruits, including beans (French and runner), capsicums, chillies and peppers, cucumbers, rockmelons, watermelons, tomatoes and mangoes.

FAR NORTH STATISTICAL DIVISION



The Far North Statistical Division covers 268,306 square kilometres, 15.5% of Queensland's total area. The division's population at 30 June 1999 of 222,451 was 6.3% of the State's total.

Cairns, the largest population centre, is also the focus for much of the hospitality industry activity in the area. Other major population centres include Mareeba, Innisfail, Atherton, Port Douglas and Gordonvale. The region had 153 accommodation establishments, being 16.3% of the State's total in 1999, recording the second highest takings from accommodation, and accounted for 22.2% of the takings in the December quarter 1999.

Other significant industries include mining and agriculture. The region is the largest fruit growing area in Queensland accounting for 95.2% of bananas and 98% of tobacco produced in Queensland in 1997-98. It grows 100% of Australia's tea crop and 95.7% of its coffee crop. Bauxite and kaolin are mined at Weipa.



NORTH-WEST STATISTICAL DIVISION



The North-West Statistical Division covers 311,286 square kilometres, 18.0% of total Queensland. The division had an estimated resident population at 30 June 1999 of 35,683 persons which was 1% of the State's population. The division is bounded by the Northern Territory in the west and the Gulf of Carpentaria to the north. The major population centre is Mt Isa which is home to 61.4% of the division's population. Other significant population centres are Cloncurry, Hughenden and Normanton.

The key industries in the region are mining, beef cattle grazing and wool growing. Mt Isa is well known as a mining town and the soaring poppet heads make a dramatic sight on the horizon. In recent years there have been eight major new discoveries in the Mount Isa region. Collectively, these equal all of the copper, lead and zinc mined in the State's history.

Mt Isa is considered the largest city in the world as the boundaries of the city extend to include Camooweal, some 188km from the mine, as part of the Mt Isa City Council.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1 This publication brings together a range of existing ABS and non-ABS data to provide users of regional statistics with information on key social and economic variables for the local government areas of Queensland. Historical data, as well as the latest available data (at the time of preparation) enable comparison over time and between regions.
- **2** The data presented are sourced from a wide variety of collections, both ABS and non-ABS. When analysing the data, care needs to be taken as time periods, definitions, methodologies, scope and coverage may differ. Some main data concepts and definitions are included below. For more detailed information, including technical notes, please refer to the relevant source publications that are listed in the Bibliography.

REFERENCE PERIODS

3 The data presented relate to the period 1994–95 to 1998–99. As the data are referenced from a wide variety of sources, the reference periods relating to many of the indicators differ. For simplicity only a single calendar year number has been used in row and column headings. This calendar year number refers to the latter year for those data items collected over two years. For example, data for the financial year 1994–95 are shown under the heading '1995' while data collected for the year ended 31 March 1996 are shown under the heading '1996'.

REGIONS

- 4 The regions specified are local government areas as defined in *Australian Standard Geographical Classification*, 1998 (Cat. no. 1216.0). Legal local government areas (LGAs), are spatial units which represent the geographical areas of incorporated local government councils, such as cities (C), towns (T) and shires (S). Statistical divisions, which are groupings of whole or partial LGAs, are designed to be relatively homogeneous regions characterised by identifiable social and economic units within the region. The Statistical Division of North-West includes unincorporated islands.
- **5** All data presented have been calculated on local government area boundaries at 30 June 1998 (i.e. 1995 data are shown for the boundary current at 30 June 1998). Where boundary changes have occurred or data have been collected for different spatial areas such as postcodes, concordances have been used to 'convert' the data to the specified region's boundary at 30 June 1998.
- **6** While care was taken in producing the concordances, they are not an official ABS product and the ABS will not guarantee the accuracy of concorded data. No liability will be accepted by the ABS for any damages arising from decisions or actions based upon the data.
- 7 In applying the concordances it is assumed that the particular characteristics of any data item are uniformly distributed across the spatial area.

SELECTED DATA ITEMS

Population estimates

This publication contains final estimates of the resident population for local government areas in Queensland for each year as at 30 June from 1995 to 1998. The estimates are based on results of the 1996 Census of Population and Housing, and were calculated for post-census dates by a linear regression model using independent indicators of population change such as dwelling approvals, licensed drivers and Medicare enrolments. Figures are shown to the nearest unit without rounding, but accuracy to the last digit is not claimed and should not be assumed.

Social security welfare recipients

- The figures shown under the heading 'Social security welfare recipients' have been compiled by the Commonwealth Department of Family and Community Services (Centrelink). The social security system in Australia provides, subject to eligibility criteria, income support for people who are retired, have a disability or medical condition which prevents them from working, are unemployed, have children in their care or are not in a position to provide for themselves because of special circumstances. It also provides a framework to support access to employment for those with the ability to participate in the workforce.
- 10 The statistics compiled by Centrelink on Australia's welfare recipients are classified according to the postcode district in the postal address held on departmental records. The figures shown in this publication have been converted from postcode areas to local government areas using geographic concordances based on 1998 estimated resident population data. Further information can be obtained in the publications Commonwealth Department of Family and Community Services, Customers—a statistical overview and Commonwealth Department of Family and Community Services, Customers by Postcode (Cat. no. 109.06)

Building approvals

- **11** Statistics of building work approved are compiled from:
- permits issued by local government authorities;
- permits issued by licensed building surveyors;
- contracts let or day labour work organised by Commonwealth, State, semi-government and local government authorities;
- major building activity in areas not subject to normal administrative approval e.g. building on remote mine sites.
- **12** The statistics in this publication include:
- all approved new residential building valued at \$10,000 or more
- all approved non-residential building jobs valued at \$50,000 or more.
- 13 Excluded from the statistics is construction activity not defined as building (e.g. construction of roads, bridges, railways, earthworks, etc.)

Manufacturing

- 14 A manufacturing collection is conducted on an annual basis, however data for small areas such as local government areas are not available every year. The statistics shown in this publication for statistical subdivisions were compiled from the census of manufacturing establishments conducted in 1996–97. The data have been concorded to align with 1998 LGA boundaries using geographic concordances based on September 1998 manufacturing employment data obtained from the ABS Business Register.
- **15** Manufacturing, as specified in Division C of the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (Cat. no. 1292.0), broadly relates to the physical or chemical transformation of materials or components into new products, whether the work is performed by power-driven machines or by hand.
- 16 The main unit for which statistics are reported in the manufacturing census is the establishment. A manufacturing establishment is one predominantly engaged in manufacturing activities, but the data collected cover all activities of the establishment, including non-manufacturing activities.

Agriculture

- 17 Data prior to 1998 was collected from the Agricultural Census. From 1998 onwards data has been collected from the Agricultural Commodities Survey. The data presented have been concorded to align with 1998 agricultural business location counts obtained from the ABS Business Register.
- **18** The value of agricultural commodities produced is derived by multiplying quantity data by price (or unit value) data. The quantity data are collected in the agricultural census, other ABS collections and in some cases from external sources. All price information is obtained from non-ABS sources.

Tourist accommodation

19 From 1997–98 onwards, data include licensed hotels, motels and guest houses with facilities and serviced apartments with 15 or more rooms or units. For 1996–97 and prior, the data included licensed hotels, motels and guest houses with facilities with 5 or more rooms. Due to this significant change in the survey scope, data before and after the change are not directly comparable. For further explanation, refer to the March Quarter 1998 issue of *Tourist Accommodation, Australia* (Cat. no. 8635.0).

Motor vehicle registrations

- 20 New motor vehicle registration statistics are obtained monthly from the State's motor vehicle registration authority and reflect the information recorded in registration documents. The figures shown in this publication have been derived by converting postcode areas to local government areas using geographic concordances based on 1998 estimated resident population data.
- 21 The types of motor vehicles included are passenger vehicles, light commercial vehicles, rigid trucks, articulated trucks, non-freight carrying trucks and buses.
- **22** Motor vehicles data exclude Commonwealth Government owned vehicles.

Income

23 The taxable income data has been sourced from the annual Australian Taxation Office publication and CD-ROM Taxation Statistics, (Cat. no. 96 0552 5). The statistics are compiled from individual tax return forms and are presented in aggregate form for the residential postcode address of the taxpayers. The figures shown in this publication have been derived by converting the postcode areas to local government areas using geographic concordances bases on 1998 estimated resident population data.

Crime

- 24 The statistics contained in this publication were obtained from the Queensland Police Service at the Police Division level. These data were then converted into LGAs by the Office of Economic and Statistical Research, Queensland Treasury. The numbers and rates of offences and offenders presented are therefore not official Queensland Police Service statistics and should be treated as estimates only.
- **25** Estimated resident population (1998) data produced by the ABS was used in the calculation of crime rates. This methodology does not take into consideration other factors, such as socio-economic influences, when allocating crime to local government areas. Therefore the statistics should be considered estimates only and treated with caution.

Schools

26 Some Ipswich schools are located in the Moreton Statistical Division and some are located in the Brisbane Statistical Division. Non-government schools data received from Department of Training and Youth Affairs could not be allocated to the appropriate statistical division, therefore non-government schools data for Ipswich has been allocated to Brisbane Statistical Division.

GLOSSARY

Estimated resident population

The estimated resident population (ERP) of an area is the estimate of the number of persons who usually reside in that area irrespective of where they were on the date of the estimate. The ERP is the official ABS population figure and is based on adjusting the results of the latest population census.

Individual taxable income

Taxable income is the amount remaining after deducting from assessable income all deductions allowed under the Income Tax Assessment Act. Taxable income is the amount to which tax rates are applied. Average taxable income in an area is calculated by dividing the total taxable income by the total number of taxable taxpayers.

Labour market allowance recipients

The total number of persons receiving either Newstart, Youth Training or Mature Age allowances.

Local government areas

Local government areas are spatial units which represent the geographical areas of incorporated local government councils. In Queensland these include cities, towns and shires. Local government areas are made up of one or more statistical local areas.

Mature age allowance

A FACS payment that provides assistance to older, long term unemployed males aged 60 years and over, but below the Age Pension age. Also included under this category is the Mature Age Partner allowance, a FACS payment to women below the Age Pension age and who are partners of people receiving the Mature Age allowance.

Newstart allowance

A FACS payment, for working-aged persons who are unemployed, aimed at ensuring recipients participate in activities designed to help their employment prospects.

Room occupancy rate

Occupancy rates represent occupancy expressed as a percentage of total capacity available during the survey period, e.g. for the period.

Room occupancy rate (%) = $\frac{\text{Room nights occupied}}{\text{(Guest rooms) x (no. of days in period)}}$ x100

Please note that, for establishments closing (other than for seasonal reasons) or opening during the survey period, the denominator of the above expression includes only operating periods.

Social security welfare recipients

For the purpose of this publication the term total social security recipients is defined as the total number of persons receiving income support from Department of Family and Community Services. This list was developed in conjunction with Centrelink. It provides a measure of total customers which, although not absolutely precise, overcomes the difficulty that some people receive more than one payment type. Payment types are listed below:

- Age pension;
- Disability support pension;
- Wives pension, Widows B pension;
- Carers payment;
- Mature age allowance, Mature age partner allowance;
- Youth allowance, Newstart allowance, Sickness allowance;
- Special Benefit;
- Widow allowance;
- Partner allowance;
- Farm family restart;
- Exceptional circumstances relief payment;
- Family allowance (minimum and workforce);
- Parenting payment (single); and
- Austudy.

Labour market allowance customers equals the total number of persons receiving either Newstart, Youth (Other) Allowance and Mature Age allowance.

Newstart allowance—a FaCS payment to provide income support for persons aged 21 years or over and under Age pension age who are unemployed, registered with Centrelink and participate in activities designed to assist their employment prospects.

Youth (Other) allowance-FaCS payment to provide income support for persons aged over 18 years and under 21 years who are looking for work.

Mature Age allowance—FaCS payment to provide income to persons aged 60 and over, but below the Age pension age who are disadvantaged in the labour market. Includes Mature Age Partner allowance, a payment to persons below the Age pension age who are partners of people receiving the Mature Age allowance.

Statistical districts Statistical districts have been defined around selected urban areas to

> provide comparable statistics over a period of time. These districts, which are intended to contain the anticipated urban spread for at least 20 years, are generally defined as having a population of 25,000 or more and

experiencing urban growth beyond the LGA boundaries

Statistical divisions Statistical divisions consist of one or more statistical subdivisions and

form the largest and most stable spatial unit for the presentation of data.

Statistical local areas The statistical local area is a general purpose spatial unit. It is the base

spatial unit used by the ABS to collect and disseminate statistics other

than those collected from the population census.

Statistical subdivisions Statistical subdivisions consist of one or more statistical local areas and

form the intermediate size spatial unit for the presentation of regional

data.

Tourism establishments From the March quarter 1998, the scope of the Survey of Tourist

Accommodation has included licensed hotels, motels and guest houses

with facilities and serviced apartments with 15 or more rooms or units.

Value of agricultural The value of agricultural commodities produced is the gross value placed commodities produced on recorded production at wholesale prices realised in the market place.

Agricultural commodity production is mainly taken from the ABS agricultural census and in general the statistics relate to the season

ended 31 March each year.

Youth training allowance A FACS payment for persons aged under 18 years who are looking for

work and participating in education, training or work experience

activities. This payment was introduced from 1 January 1995.
