ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This issue contains revised estimates of the resident population of Australian States and Territories as at 30 June 2000 and preliminary estimates as at 30 June 2001. These are based on the 1996 Census of Population and Housing with updates from births and deaths registrations, overseas migration and interstate migration.

In commentary based on the statistics in this publication, it is recommended that the relevant statistics be rounded. All data are affected by errors in reporting and processing. No reliance should be placed on statistics with small values.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

INTRODUCTION

In the 12 months to June 2001, the Australian resident population increased by 229,500, reaching 19,387,000 in total. The population of all States and Territories increased over this period, except Tasmania which remained relatively stable. Population growth was fastest in Queensland (a growth rate of 1.7%), followed by Western Australia (1.4%) and Victoria (1.3%), all of which exceeded the national growth rate (1.2%). Slower increases were recorded in New South Wales and the Northern Territory (1.1% each), the Australian Capital Territory (1.0%) and South Australia (0.3%).


AGEING POPULATION

The median age of the Australian population, the age at which half the population is older and half is younger, has increased by 5.8 years in the last 20 years, from 29.6 years in June 1981 to 35.4 years in June 2001. Australia's population is ageing because of a sustained low level of fertility, which has resulted in proportionally fewer children in the population, and increased life expectancy.

South Australia has the oldest population

As at June 2001, South Australia had the highest median age of all States and Territories (37.4 years). Tasmania had the second highest median age (37.0 years) followed by New South Wales (35.7 years), Victoria (35.5 years), Queensland (34.9 years), Western Australia (34.5 years), the Australian Capital Territory (32.9 years) and the Northern Territory (29.3 years). Tasmania has experienced the largest increase in median age over the last twenty years, increasing by 8.2 years from 28.8 years in 1981.

MEDIAN AGE




AGE STRUCTURE

Since June 1981 there has been very slow growth in the number of children (aged 0–14 years) in the population (5%). Conversely, the number of persons aged 15–64 years has increased by 34% while those aged 65 years and over have increased by 65%, and those aged 85 years and over increased by 156%. This disparate growth pattern is a result of a shift in the age structure of the total population, commensurate with gradual population ageing.


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POPULATION CHANGE, By age group—1981–2001



Whereas children comprised 25% of the total population in 1981, this has declined to 20% in 2001. Over the same period, the proportion of the population aged 15–64 years and the proportion aged 65 years and over each rose by two and three percentage points respectively, comprising 67% and 12% of the total population in 2001.

International comparison

The trend toward population ageing is established in many countries worldwide. In countries such as Italy, Japan and Greece, the number of persons aged 65 years and over already exceeds the number of children aged 0–14. Population ageing in these countries has been influenced by sustained low fertility rates, coupled with relatively high life expectancy. In Australia, the number of people aged 65 years and over is not projected to exceed the number of children aged 0–14 years until around 2020¹.

International comparison *continued*

Between 1995 and 2000, all of the countries selected for analysis experienced a decrease in the proportion of the population who were aged 0–14 years. In the majority of these countries, this decrease was balanced by increases in both the proportion of persons aged 15–64 years and those aged 65 years and over. In Australia, the proportion of children in the population declined by one percentage point (from 21.5% in 1995 to 20.5% in 2000), while the proportion aged 15–64 years and those aged 65 years and over each rose by around half a percentage point (from 66.6% to 67.2%, and 11.9% to 12.3%, respectively). In addition to the declining proportion of children within their populations, some countries, such as Italy, Japan, Greece, France and Singapore also experienced a decrease in the proportion of the population aged 15–64 years. These countries experienced larger proportional increases in the population aged 65 years and over than other countries.

In 2000, the age structure of Australia's population was closest to that of Canada and the United States. Generally, the European countries, Japan and Hong Kong had smaller proportions of children and, with the exception of Hong Kong, higher proportions of older people than Australia. In contrast, countries from the Asian regions tended to have proportionally more children and far fewer older people, generally reflecting considerably higher fertility rates and lower life expectancy than achieved in Australia.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

CHILDREN

Nationally, the number of children aged 0–14 years remained relatively unchanged in the 12 months to June 2001, increasing by just 1,000 (0.03%). Increases in the number of children aged 10–14 years (10,700 children) were largely offset by a decrease in the number of children aged 0–4 years (−6,500 children) and 5–9 years (−3,100), reflecting Australia's declining fertility (from 1.91 babies per woman in 1990 to 1.75 in 2000). Queensland had the fastest growth rate in the number of children aged 0–14 years (0.8%), followed by the Northern Territory (0.5%) and New South Wales (0.1%). The other States and Territories experienced a decline in the number of children, with Tasmania and South Australia (−1.0% each) having the fastest decrease, followed by Western Australia (−0.3%), the Australian Capital Territory (−0.2%) and Victoria (−0.1%).

ADULTS

Overall, growth in the adult population (persons aged 15 years and over) far outweighed that of Australia's child population, with an increase of 1.5% (228,500 persons) in the 12 months to June 2001. However, this growth was not evenly distributed throughout the adult population. The growth rate for those aged 15–44 years (0.7%) was approximately half, and for those aged 45 years and over (2.5%) was almost double, the growth rate for the total population aged 15 years and over.

Aged 15–64 years

The number of persons aged 15–64 years grew by 1.4% during the 12 months to June 2001. For this age group, Queensland (1.8%), Western Australia (1.7%) and Victoria (1.6%) all experienced growth rates above the national average. The remaining States and Territories all experienced increases below the national average (1.3% in New South Wales, 1.1% in the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory, 0.6% in South Australia and 0.1% in Tasmania).

Aged 65 years and over

In the 12 months to June 2001, the number of persons aged 65 years and over increased by 1.8%, to just over 2.4 million in total. The Northern Territory (6.3%), the Australian Capital Territory (3.5%), Queensland (2.7%) and Western Australia (2.6%) all experienced growth above the national level in this age group. However, each of these regions still had a relatively small older population. As at June 2001, persons aged 65 years and over comprised 11.5% of the total population in Queensland, 10.8% in Western Australia, 8.5% in the Australian Capital Territory and 3.6% in the Northern Territory, compared with the national level of 12.4%.

The increase in Victoria (1.8%) was comparable to the national increase (1.8%), while Tasmania (1.2%), New South Wales (1.4%) and South Australia (1.0%) recorded increases below that for Australia as a whole. Despite relatively low growth rates over the preceding 12 months, as at June 2001 each of these regions had an older population which was proportionally larger than that for Australia as a whole. Persons aged 65 years and over comprised 12.9% of the total population in both New South Wales, 12.8% in Victoria, 13.8% in Tasmania, and 14.6% in South Australia.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS *continued*

Aged 85 years and over

Proportionally, the greatest population increase in the 12 months to June 2001 occurred among persons aged 85 years and over. During this period, the number of people in this age group increased from 248,500 to 262,700, a growth rate of 5.7%. This continues the trend of a rapid increase in the elderly population, which has grown by 156% over the last twenty years, compared to a total population growth of 30% over the same period. Increased life expectancy for both men and women has contributed to the rise. Reflecting the greater life expectancy of women, there were more than twice as many females (180,400) as males (82,200) in this age group.

In the 12 months to June 2001, the fastest increases in the number of persons aged 85 years and over occurred in the Northern Territory (12.7% increase), the Australian Capital Territory (12.1%), Queensland and Western Australia (6.3% each) and Tasmania (6.1%), although these high percentage gains are a reflection of the small numbers of people in this age group in these regions. These States and Territories also experienced faster growth in the number of elderly people than did Australia as a whole (5.7%). South Australia (4.9%) had the smallest percentage increase in this age group of all the States and Territories followed by Victoria (5.3%) and New South Wales (5.6%).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1** This publication contains revised estimates of the resident populations by age and sex, of Australian States and Territories, as at 30 June 2000 and preliminary estimates as at 30 June 2001. Mean ages, median ages and sex ratios for the States, Territories and Australia are also included.
- 2** Following the 1992 amendment to the *Acts Interpretation Act* to include the Indian Ocean Territories of Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands as part of geographic Australia, population estimates commencing September quarter 1993 include estimates for these two territories. To reflect this change, another category of the State/Territory level has been created, known as Other Territories. Other Territories include Jervis Bay Territory, previously included with the Australian Capital Territory, as well as Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands, previously excluded from population estimates for Australia. Data for Other Territories, while not detailed separately, are included in tables where specifically noted.

RESIDENT POPULATION ESTIMATES SERIES

- 3** Australia's population statistics for the period from 1971 are compiled according to the place of usual residence of the population. An explanation of the place of usual residence conceptual basis for population estimates is given in *Demographic Estimates and Projections: Concepts, Sources and Methods, Statistical Concepts Library*, ABS website: <www.abs.gov.au>.

METHOD OF ESTIMATION

- 4** The estimates by age of the population of Australia and the States and Territories at the date of the Census are derived from the Census Counts and Place of Usual Residence, by adjusting for under-enumeration and adding the number of Australian residents estimated to have been temporarily overseas at the time of the Census.
- 5** Post-censal population estimates are obtained by advancing the previous year's estimates to the next year by subtracting deaths and adding births and net estimated interstate and overseas migration. After each census, estimates for the preceding intercensal period are revised by incorporating an additional adjustment (intercensal discrepancy) to ensure that the total intercensal increase at each age agrees with the difference between the estimated resident populations at the two respective census dates.

Net overseas migration

- 6** Estimates of overseas migration are based on net permanent and long-term overseas movements with State and Territory not stated allocated pro rata. The estimates from July 1976 onwards include an adjustment for the net effect of category jumping. This adjustment is necessary because net permanent and long-term migration figures can be affected by changes in travel intentions from short-term to permanent/long-term or vice versa. For example, an Australian resident departing for a short-term visit overseas (stating that he/she intends to stay abroad for less than 12 months) in fact stays more than 12 months, thereby changing his/her travel category from short-term to long-term. Prior to December quarter 1989, adjustments for category jumping were only made to final population estimates. These adjustments are now also included in preliminary estimates. EXPLANATORY NOTES *continued*

Net interstate migration

7 Estimates of interstate migration since June 1986 have been derived from latest census data on interstate movement in the preceding one year and unidentified information on interstate changes of addresses advised to the Health Insurance Commission in the process of administering Medicare.

DEFINITIONS

8 *Sex ratio*: the sex ratio relates to the number of males per 100 females.

9 *Median age*: the age at which half the population is older and half is younger.

10 *Mean age*: The average age of the population.

AVERAGE ANNUAL RATE OF GROWTH

11 The average annual rate of population growth, r , is calculated as a percentage using the formula below, where P_0 is the population at the start of the period, P_n is the population at the end of the period and n is the length of the period between P_n and P_0 in years.

$$\left[\left(\frac{P_n}{P_0} \right)^{\frac{1}{n}} - 1 \right] \times 100$$

ACCURACY/RELIABILITY

12 It should be noted that while the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) seeks to produce the most accurate estimates of the population possible, the accuracy of the estimates depends on the quality of the source data used. The major source of potential error is considered to be the estimates of interstate migration based on Medicare transfer data.

13 Single year age estimates are not shown for persons aged 85 years or older. The reliability of age estimates decreases as older ages are reached. However, estimates for each age up to 99 have been calculated and are available on request.

14 In recognition of the inherent accuracy involved in population estimation, population figures over 1,000 in the text are rounded to the nearest hundred, and figures less than 1,000 are rounded to the nearest ten. While unrounded figures are provided in tables, accuracy to the last digit is not claimed and should not be assumed.
