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CHAPTER **1**

MAIN FEATURES

MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE TRENDS	In 1999 there were 114,300 marriages registered in Australia, an increase of 3,700 marriages when compared with 1998, but 2,900 below the number registered in 1989. Marriage rates for the unmarried population (aged 15 years and over) remained at 35 per 1,000 unmarried men, and 33 per 1,000 unmarried women in 1999, declining from 45 and 43 respectively in 1989.
	The number of divorces (52,600) also increased slightly in 1999 compared with 1998, by just over 2%. The divorce rate for the married population stood at 12.7 men and women per 1,000 married population, up slightly from 1998 (12.4 for both men and women).
	The crude marriage rate in Australia of 6.0 marriages per 1,000 population in 1999, was lower than in the United States of America (8.8 per 1,000 in 1996) and above that in Canada and the United Kingdom (each 5.5 per 1,000 in 1995). The crude divorce rate in Australia of 2.8 per 1,000 population was lower than in the United States of America (4.3 in 1996) and about the same as in Canada and the United Kingdom (2.6 and 2.9, respectively, in 1995).
LIKELIHOOD TO MARRY AND DIVORCE	The proportion of people who will ever marry is declining. If recent trends continue into the future it is estimated that 28% of men and 23% of women will never marry, while the corresponding proportions based on 1985–1987 trends were 21% and 14%, respectively.
	Overall 46% of marriages are likely to end in divorce. Age at marriage is associated with the likelihood to divorce. Highest divorce rates are likely to occur among people who marry at ages under 20 years. For further information on likelihood to divorce refer to the Special Article page 121.
AGE AT MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE	The trend towards older age at marriage continued in 1999, with the median age at marriage for men exceeding 30 years for the first time. For men, the median age at marriage was 30.1 years, increasing from 28.0 years in 1989. For women the median age at marriage in 1999 was 27.9 years, increasing from 25.7 years in 1989.
	As marriages are occurring later in life so are divorces. The median age at divorce rose by 2.9 years for men and 3.1 years for women from 1989 to 40.9 years and 38.2 years, respectively in 1999.
FIRST MARRIAGES AND REMARRIAGES	Marriages in which neither party had been previously married comprised 67% of marriages in 1999. A further 19% were first marriages for one partner, and 14% were marriages in which both partners had been previously married.
	The age at marriage for first time brides and grooms continued to increase in 1999. For men, the median age at first marriage was 28.2 years, increasing from 26.3 in 1989. For women, the median age at first marriage was 26.4, increasing from 24.2 in 1989.

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CHAPTER 1 • MAIN FEATURES

DURATION OF MARRIAGE TO DIVORCE	Between 1989 and 1999 the median duration of marriage for divorcing couples increased from 10.2 years to 11.3 years. Of the couples who divorced in 1999, 36% were separated within the first five years of marriage and a further 23% were separated in the next five years.
CHILDREN OF MARRYING PARTNERS	In 1999, 15% of all marriages (16,900) involved children aged under 16 years of previous marriages. Of these marriages, 7,300 (43%) involved only one child. Over one-third of women and men who were remarrying in 1999 had children aged under 16 years from previous marriages.
CHILDREN OF DIVORCING PARTNERS	Between 1989 and 1999 the proportion of divorces where children were involved has fallen from 55% to 54%. However the number of children involved in divorce has increased from 0.95 to 1.13 children per 100 children aged under 18 years in the population. In nearly two-thirds of the divorces that involved children the age of the youngest child was under 10 years.
CATEGORY OF CELEBRANT	In 1999, for the first time, marriages performed by civil celebrants outnumbered marriages performed by ministers of religion. Civil ceremonies accounted for 51.3% of marriages in 1999, continuing the upward trend in civil marriages that has been evident throughout the 20th century, from 2.4% in 1909.
	In 1999, New South Wales and Victoria were the only States or Territories in which marriages performed by ministers of religion outnumbered those by civil celebrants (52.3% and 50.4% respectively).
APPLICANT FOR DIVORCE	As in previous years more women (50%) than men (31%) were the main applicants for divorce, while 19% were joint applications. However, the proportion of female applicants for divorce declined as the length of their marriage increased, while the proportion of male applicants increased with the length of their marriage.
DIVORCES BY COUNTRY OF BIRTH	Throughout the 1990s, over half of divorces have occurred to couples where both partners were born in Australia, one-third to couples where partners were born in different countries and around 13% to couples where both partners were born in the same overseas country. High divorce rates were experienced by couples where both husband and wife were born in China (26 per 1,000 couples), Viet Nam (23) and New Zealand (20). Low divorce rates were experienced by couples where both husband and wife were born in Italy (3 per 1,000 couples), Greece (4) and Malaysia (5). When both partners were Australian-born the divorce rate was 14 per 1,000 couples. For further information on divorce rates by country of birth refer to the Special Article page 113.
COHABITATION PRIOR TO MARRIAGE	In 1999, the proportion of people choosing to cohabit prior to entering a registered marriage has continued to rise. This continues the long-term trend that has been evident over the past 20 years. In 1999, 69% of all registered marriages were preceded by cohabitation compared with around 23% in 1979.
	While the highest proportion of people choosing to cohabit in 1999 were aged under 35 years (68% of men and 77% of women) and never previously married (around 74%) older people also chose to cohabit before entering marriage. For example, 17% of men

COHABITATION PRIOR TO MARRIAGE continued	and 13% of women who cohabited before marriage were aged between 40 and 59 years with just over 75% being previously divorced.							
	People who cohabited prior to marriage were more likely to have a civil celebrant (61%) officiate at their marriage than a minister of religion (39%). For people who did not cohabit the reverse was the case with only 29% choosing civil celebrants and 71% choosing a minister of religion. This applied to all States and the ACT. In the Northern Territory, however, civil celebrants were the preferred choice of both cohabitors (70%) and non cohabitors (58%).							
MARITAL STATUS OF THE POPULATION	In 1999 there were 15 million people aged 15 years and over in the population, a rise of 15% on 1989—4.8 million were never married, 8.3 million were married, 930,200 were widowed and 1.1 million were divorced. The largest proportional increase over the past ten years was in the divorced population, increasing by 63% between 1989 and 1999.							
	At the 1996 Census of Population and Housing, 49% of the population aged 15 years and over was in a registered marriage with a further 5% in a de facto marriage. This proportion of de facto married, combined with the 1999 population estimates, indicates that around 861,800 people could be living in de facto marriages at June 1999. The majority of these people would have never been previously married (570,700 or 66%) while a further 214,100 would have been previously divorced (25%).							

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The ageing of the population has meant that between 1989 and 1999 the median age of the population has increased. This ageing population is the inevitable result of fertility remaining at low levels over a long period, associated with increasing life expectancy. Of the population age 15 years and over, the never married population aged by around two years for both men and women (to 24.8 and 23.5 years, respectively). For the other marital status groups the increase in the median age has ranged between three and four years, with the median age for divorced men increasing by 3.7 years (to 48.8 years) and divorced women increasing by 4.2 years (to 47.9 years).


MARRIAGES AND DIVORCES IN CONTEXT

INTRODUCTION

There were 52,600 divorces granted in 1999 and 114,300 marriages registered. The 52,600 divorces occurred from the accumulated stock of all marriages contracted over the years and not from the 114,300 marriages registered in the year. For example, in 1999 there were 8.3 million married persons or just over 4 million married couples. The 52,600 divorces represent about 12.7 divorces out of every 1,000 married couples.

In 1999 the crude divorce rate (the number of divorces per 1,000 population) was 2.8, compared with 2.7 in 1998 and 2.5 ten years ago. The highest divorce rate during the 20th century was recorded in 1976 (4.5 per 1,000 population). This was the year the Family Law Act was introduced. Prior to this the crude divorce rate in Australia was below 1.9 divorces per 1,000 population. There were 52,600 divorces granted in 1999. While this was a small increase on the number recorded in 1998 (51,400) it was 27% higher than the 1989 figure (41,400).

CRUDE MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE RATES(a)



Marriage rates for the unmarried population (per 1,000 not currently married men or women aged 15 years and over) remained steady in 1999, at 35 per 1,000 unmarried men and 33 per 1,000 unmarried women. However the long-term trend has been one of decline, from 63 per 1,000 men and 61 per 1,000 women in 1976.

In 1999 the crude marriage rate (the number of marriages per 1,000 population) was 6.0 per 1,000. The 1999 rate was marginally higher than the crude rate for 1998 (5.9), but was lower than rates recorded a decade ago (7.0). The lowest rate of 5.8 per 1,000 was recorded in both 1996 and 1997, while the highest rate was 12.0 per 1,000 recorded in 1942. There were 114,300 marriages registered in Australia in 1999, an increase on the number registered in 1998 (110,600) but below the number registered a decade ago (117,200).

Unlike births, deaths and migration which directly measure change in population size, marriage and divorce influence the population composition. Changes in marriage and

INTRODUCTION continued	divorce rates however affect population growth indirectly. Marriage unites, while divorce dissolves, the family which is the structural unit primarily responsible for births throughout the world. In Australia almost three quarters of the births registered in 1998 occurred to mothers in a registered marriage. Statistics on marriage and divorce therefore shed light on family formation, family composition and fertility.
	Marriage and divorce statistics have important economic and social implications. The Andrews' Report (1998) concluded that marriage and family breakdown costs the Australian nation at least \$3 billion each year. When all indirect costs (e.g. health, absenteeism and low productivity), which are difficult to measure, are included the Andrews' Report states that the \$3 billion could possibly double. Changes in family composition, through both marriage and divorce, also influence service and housing requirements, consumer behaviour and labour supply (Shyrock et. al., 1973).
INTERNATIONAL COMPARISON OF MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE RATES	The United Nations indicates that there is much variation in international marriage and divorce rates (see table 2.1), as marriages and divorces are legal events and are defined in terms of the laws of individual countries or areas. This has implications for international comparability of statistics. Marriage laws vary throughout the world. Comparison of marriage statistics is further limited due to some countries or areas compiling statistics only for civil marriages, although religious marriages may also be legally recognised; in others, the only available records are church registers and, therefore, the statistics do not include civil marriages.

Divorce laws also vary throughout the world, some countries having no legal provision for divorce at all. The propensity to divorce is affected by: the relative ease or difficulty of obtaining a divorce according to the laws of individual countries or areas; the ability of individuals to meet financial and other costs of court procedures; and the religious beliefs and social customs of individual countries or areas.

International comparisons of crude marriage rates and crude divorce rates are also affected by the age distributions of the populations. As well as these age distribution effects, marriages are also influenced by the proportions of people not currently married, while divorces are influenced by the proportions of people married.

Of the countries selected for comparison (see table 2.1), the United States of America had the highest crude marriage rate in the mid-1990s (8.8 marriages per 1,000 population), followed by Thailand (7.9) and Turkey (7.8). The lowest crude marriage rate was recorded by Sweden (3.8 marriages per 1,000 population), followed by Ireland (4.3) and Greece (4.5). The crude marriage rate for Australia was 6.0 marriages per 1,000 population.

The highest crude divorce rate in the mid-1990s was recorded by the United States of America (4.3 divorces per 1,000 population), followed by the United Kingdom (2.9) and Australia and New Zealand (each 2.8). Chile had the lowest crude divorce rate (0.4 divorces per 1,000 population), followed by Italy and Turkey (each 0.5).

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DIFFERENT MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE DATA

Marriages registered	Most analysis of marriages data in this publication (see Chapter 3) is based on the number of marriages which were registered in a given year. Because there can be a lag between when a marriage ceremony occurs and when the marriage is registered, some marriages registered in a given year actually occurred in earlier years.								
Marriages (occurrence basis)	Using marriage registration statistics, but compiling them on a year-of-occurrence basis gives an estimate of the number of marriages that occurred in a given year. However, as marriages that occur in a given year may be registered in later years, statistics on this concept are never finalised and are always subject to revision.								
Comparison	In Australia the difference between marriages registered and marriages occurring in a given year is small. Throughout the last decade, over 94% of marriages registered in a given year occurred in that same year, with the majority of remaining marriages registered in the subsequent year.

Divorces	Divorce statistics in Australia are compiled from divorces granted by the Family Court of Australia. Divorce data are based on the date the decree became absolute. In the interpretation of data it is important to bear in mind that the availability of judges and the complexity of the cases before them can affect the number of decrees made absolute or granted in any one year.								
DIFFERENT MARITAL STATUS DATA	Two separate concepts of marital status are measured by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). These are registered marital status and social marital status. In the main, registered marital status is used in this publication.								
Registered marital status	Registered marital status is a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she has, or has had, a registered marriage with another person with whom he or she holds, or held, a valid marriage certificate. Accordingly, people are classified as either 'never married', 'married', 'separated', 'divorced' or 'widowed'. For estimated resident population (ERP) data the category 'separated' is included with 'married'.								

DIFFERENT MARITALIn 1999 there were 15.0 million people aged 15 years and over in the population, a riseSTATUS DATA continuedof 15% on 1989 (13.1 million). Of the 15.0 million, 4.8 million were never married,
8.3 million were married, 930,000 were widowed and 1.1 million were divorced.
Compared with ten years ago the largest proportional increase was 63% in the number
of divorced persons. Never married persons increased by 22%, widowed by 12% and
married by 7%.

Social marital status Social marital status identifies a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she forms a couple relationship with another person based on his/her current living arrangements. A couple relationship is based on a consensual union, and is defined as two people usually residing in the same household who share a social, economic and emotional bond usually associated with marriage, and who consider their relationship to be a marriage or marriage-like union. Under social marital status, a person is classified as either 'married' or 'not married', with further disaggregation of 'married' to distinguish 'registered married' from 'de facto married' persons. At a finer level again, social marital status classifies opposite-sex and same-sex couples as subcategories of the de facto married group.

The fall in registered marriages or the increase in divorces granted therefore does not necessarily mean that couple relationships are decreasing. Many people are choosing instead to enter into de facto marriages.

CENSUS DATA

The 1996 Census of Population and Housing counted 13.9 million people aged 15 years and over. Of these people around 55% (7.6 million) lived in couple relationships—49% in registered marriages and 5% in de facto marriages. Assuming the proportions evident from the 1996 Census, it is estimated that of the estimated resident population aged 15 years and over in 1999 (15.0 million) around 861,800 people would have formed de facto marriages. Of this estimated de facto married population around 66% (570,700) would have been never married, 7% (61,900) married or separated, 2% (15,000) widowed and 25% (214,100) divorced.

LABOUR FORCE DATA

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The June 1999 Labour Force Survey estimated that 8.4 million persons aged 15 years and over (56% of the civilian population aged 15 years and over) had a social marital status of 'married', an increase of less than 1% on June 1998. *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0) does not further disaggregate social marital status to distinguish between 'registered married' and 'de facto married'.

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

REGISTERED MARRIAGES


In 1999, for the third consecutive year, there was an increase in the number of marriages registered in Australia. The 114,300 marriages registered in 1999 was 3% higher than the number registered in 1998, and was the largest number recorded since 1992 (114,800). Over the last 20 years the number of marriages registered has fluctuated from a low of 104,400 in 1979 to a high of 117,300 in 1982. Similar fluctuations were experienced by all States and Territories.

MARRIAGE TRENDS

Marriage rates for the unmarried population (per 1,000 not currently married men or women aged 15 years and over) remained steady in 1999, however, the long-term trend since these rates first became available in 1976 has been a decline. The marriage rate for men was 63 per 1,000 in 1976 while the rate for women was 61 per 1,000. In 1999 these rates fell to 35 and 33 respectively.




MARRIAGE RATES(a), Unmarried Population

MARRIAGE TRENDS continued	The crude marriage rate in 1999 was 6.0 per 1,000 population. The crude marriage rate is the number of registered marriages per 1,000 population. The rate for 1999 was marginally higher than the crude marriage rate for 1998 (5.9), but was lower than the rate recorded a decade ago (7.0).						
	The crude marriage rate trend has been declining since 1970. This decline in the marriage rate can be attributed to the changes in attitude to marriage and living arrangements that have occurred over this period. According to the Andrews' Report (1998, p.9), the factors shaping 'modern marriage' are the certainty of contraception and careful planning of births; the new preparation pathway to marriage via multiple relationships and prolonged autonomy as an individual earner; a growing realisation on the part of women that they cannot and ought not to rely upon or be dependents of men; and a legal framework progressively enacting equal opportunity, human rights and joint responsibility for men and women in fulfilling the obligations of marriage and parenthood.						
States and Territories	New South Wales and Queensland had the highest crude marriage rate of all States and Territories in 1999 (6.4 per 1,000 population, 7% above the national rate), each experiencing an increase of 3% over 1998. For more than 20 years, the Northern Territory has consistently recorded the lowest crude marriage rate in Australia. In 1999 the rate was 4.6 per 1,000 population, 23% below the rate for Australia. The age-standardised marriage rate for the Northern Territory has also been the lowest among the States and Territories. Of the States and Territories, Western Australia and Tasmania were the only States to show a decline in the marriage rate between 1998 and 1999 (declining 5% and 4% respectively).						
LIKELIHOOD TO MARRY	The proportion of people who will ever marry is declining. This can be estimated from the first marriage rates by age for never married persons for a given year. The calculations are based on net nuptiality tables, which are calculated on the principles of the life tables commonly used for the analysis of mortality data.						
	According to the net nuptiality tables, the likelihood to marry is estimated at 72% for men and 77% for women, if the 1995–1997 first marriage rates prevail in the future. The corresponding proportions ever marrying, based on the 1985–1987 first marriage rates, are 79% for men and 86% for women, indicating a decline in total first marriages over time.						
	Conversely, the proportions of men and women unlikely to marry, based on the 1995–1997 experience, are 28% and 23% respectively, higher than the proportions based on the 1985–1987 first marriage rates (21% and 14% respectively).						
MARRIAGE AGE	An increasing proportion of men are choosing to marry after their thirtieth birthday, with the median age at marriage exceeding 30 years for the first time in 1999. The median age at marriage is the age at which there are as many marrying above the age as there are marrying below it. For men, the median age at marriage in 1999 was 30.1 years, increasing from 25.6 years in 1979. Women are also marrying later in life, with a median age at marriage of 27.9 years in 1999, compared to 22.9 years in 1979.


Although the median age at marriage for both men and women has increased over time, the difference between the median age of brides and grooms has decreased. In 1999 the median age for all grooms was 2.2 years higher than for all brides, compared to 2.7 years in 1979.



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FIRST MARRIAGES



Women have also experienced a long-term decline in first marriage rates across all age groups. While the peak age group for men remained the same over this period, for women the peak age group moved from 20–24 years in 1976 (188 per 1,000 never married females) to 25–29 years in 1999 (94 per 1,000). Over this period, the age group with the second highest first marriage rate also changed, from 25–29 years to 30–34 years.


Trends in first marriage

The Total First Marriage Rate (TFMR) is an index used to summarise the prevalence of first marriages in a given year. It is estimated from the number of men or women in each age group who marry for the first time in that year, and the estimated resident population of all men and women in each age group at the mid-point of the year. The trend over time in the value of the TFMR shows a decline in the incidence of first marriages in Australia, from 655 per 1,000 men and 663 per 1,000 women in 1979, to 597 per 1,000 men and 620 per 1,000 women in 1999.

International comparison of TFMR

The decline in the incidence of first marriages is also evident in other countries. TFMRs experienced in Europe, Canada, the United States of America and New Zealand are also in decline. In most of these countries the decline since 1975 has been greater than that observed in Australia.

REMARRIAGES


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There were 21,400 (19%) marriages in 1999 in which one party had been previously married and 16,500 (14%) in which both partners were remarrying. Between 1976 and 1999 (1979 data are not available) remarriage rates for both men and women fell in all age groups. For the majority of age groups the falls were in excess of 50% between 1976 and 1999. Remarriage rates are the number of remarriages of men or women, of a certain age, per 1,000 widowed and divorced men or women of the same age.

Between 1976 and 1999 the peak age group for men remarrying changed from 25-29 years to 30-34 years. For women the peak age group changed from 20-24 years in 1976 to 25-29 years in 1999.



(a) The number of women remarrying per 1,000 widowed and divorced women in the population.


Interval to remarriage Overall, grooms had a shorter interval between previous and current marriage than brides, with a median interval to remarriage of 3.4 years for grooms, compared to 3.9 years for brides. The median interval to remarriage varied by marital status of the bride and groom. Previously widowed grooms and brides had a longer interval to remarriage (4.3 and 6.1 years respectively) than previously divorced grooms and brides (3.3 and 3.6 years respectively).


Children of previousIn 1999, 15% of all marriages (16,900) involved children of previous marriages, of one ormarriagesboth partners, aged under 16 years. Of these marriages, 7,300 (43%) involved only one
child.

Around 27,600 marriages (24%) involved previously married grooms and 26,700 (23%) involved previously married brides. Over one-third of women (37%) and men (36%) remarrying in 1999 had children aged under 16 years from previous marriages.

MONTH OF MARRIAGEIn 1999 the most popular month for marriages was October, with 14,600 (13%)
marriages celebrated in this month. November followed, with 12,100 (11%) marriages.
June was the least popular month with 5,500 (5%) marriages occurring.

The most popular months for marriage varied across the States and Territories, possibly due to climatic conditions. For example, the most popular month for marriage in the Northern Territory was July (15%), while July was the least popular month in Victoria (4%), Tasmania (3%) and the ACT (3%).

CATEGORY OF CELEBRANT In 1999, for the first time, marriages performed by civil celebrants outnumbered marriages performed by ministers of religion. Civil ceremonies accounted for 51.3% of marriages in 1999, an increase of 1.8 percentage points on 1998. This increase continues the upward trend in civil marriages that has been evident throughout the 20th century. During the first half of the century, under 10% of all marriages were performed by civil celebrants. By the mid-1970s the proportion had increased to around 30%.

In 1999, New South Wales and Victoria were the only States in which marriages performed by ministers of religion outnumbered those by civil celebrants (52.3% and 50.4% respectively).



Of the 55,700 marriages performed by ministers of religion in 1999, the most common rites were Catholic and Anglican. Marriages performed by Catholic priests comprised 17% of all marriages in 1999 and those by Anglican ministers 11%. A further 6% were performed by Uniting Church ministers and 3% within the Orthodox Churches.

The proportion of marriages performed under different rites shows variation across the States and Territories. For example, the Northern Territory has proportionally more marriages performed by civil celebrants (68%) than Australia-wide (51%), while New South Wales and Tasmania had proportionally more Anglican ceremonies (13% and 12%) compared with 11% Australia-wide, and South Australia more marriages performed by the Uniting Churches (11% compared with 6%).

MARRIAGE RITES



In 1999, 85% of men and 87% of women married by a minister of religion were marrying for the first time. In comparison, 67% of men and women married by civil celebrants were first time brides and grooms.

BIRTHPLACE OF PARTIES MARRYING

In 1999, 63% of the marriages registered in Australia were marriages where both parties were born in Australia, 9% were marriages between men and women born in the same overseas country and 28% were marriages between couples born in different countries. Of this last group 39% were Australian-born men marrying overseas-born women, while a further 42% were Australian-born women marrying overseas-born men. The remainder (19%) were overseas-born men and women marrying partners from different overseas countries. Over the past twenty years these proportions have changed little.

Marriage rates	 In 1999, marriage rates varied between Australian-born and the overseas-born (see tables 3.11 and 3.12). It should be remembered when comparing these rates and other details that the total number of marriages in Australia for persons born in some selected countries is small and that the age structure of birthplace groups varies. Factors such as migration flow, period of residence, age, religion and language can all contribute to the opportunity for people to marry within their own country of birth group, or choose a partner from another (see 'Cultural diversity within marriages', <i>Australian Social Trends, 2000</i>, (Cat. no. 4102.0)). Of the major overseas-born communities selected for comparison, Australian residents who had been born in the United States of America (22.2 men per 1,000) and the Philippines (24.7 women per 1,000) had the highest marriage rates in 1999. The lowest rates were recorded for Greek-born men and women residents, 4.4 and 2.8 per
	1,000 men and women in the population, respectively. The rate for both Australian-born men and women who married in 1999 (per 1,000 men or women) was 11.8.
Birthplace relationship	Among grooms, those born in Viet Nam and the Republic of Korea (South) had the highest proportion of marriages involving partners from the same birthplace (86% each). For wives, those born in Australia (84%) and Viet Nam (79%) had the highest proportion of marriages involving partners from the same birthplace. Among those countries selected for comparison, both brides and grooms born in Spain had the highest proportion of marriages to partners born in a different country (97% and 98% respectively).





CHAPTER 4

COHABITATION BEFORE REGISTERED MARRIAGE

INTRODUCTION

The number of couples living together, both before and as a substitute for marriage, has increased substantially in recent decades. The 1996 Census of Population and Housing found that 7.6 million men and women lived in couple relationships. Of these people 10% lived in de facto marriages, up from 8% in 1991 and 6% in 1986.

The reasons that couples choose to live together can vary greatly. Macklin (Andrews' Report, 1998, p.76) has identified at least five different patterns:

- a temporary, casual convenience with minimum emotional or physical involvement and limited commitment. The motivation may be more economic or protective than romantic.
- an extension of an affectionate, steady relationship, which generally includes being sexually intimate. It is likely to continue as long as the couple enjoy being together.
- a trial marriage for couples who are contemplating making their relationship permanent and want to test it out. In this sense, living together becomes part of courtship.
- a temporary alternative to marriage for people who determined to marry. They simply live together until it is professionally or economically feasible to marry.
- a permanent or semipermanent alternative to marriage. For some people, such as elderly persons, living together permanently is determined by economic factors. For others, this decision may include negative views on the institution of marriage or the desire to keep love alive by avoiding the security of marriage.

COHABITATION BEFORE REGISTERED MARRIAGE

From 1997 the usual residence of parties at the time of lodgement of the Notice of Intended Marriage has been coded by the ABS as an indicator as to whether or not the parties had cohabited prior to the registered marriage taking place. If the address was the same, cohabitation was assumed to have occurred. While 1997 was the first year that this indicator was coded for registered marriages, comparison with cohabitation data from the 1992 Family Survey supports the results of the indicator.

Of all marriages registered in 1999 (114,300) about 69% of couples (78,800) cohabited prior to entering a registered marriage. According to the 1992 Family Survey, ten years ago the comparative proportion was 44% while twenty years ago the proportion was 23%.

There is a widespread belief that cohabitation prior to marriage can benefit couples. The Andrews' Report (1998, p.78) cites Montgomery who stated in 1973 that 'Couples who live together during courtship will probably make fewer mistakes in selecting marriage partners. Their marriage, in all probability, will be more reasoned and there will be fewer illusions about the person with whom marriage is to take place'. The report also refers to the 1988–89 *National Social Science Survey* in which about half the respondents reported that they would recommend that couples live together and then marry.

Not all opinion supports pre-marriage cohabitation as a precursor for longevity of marriage. For example, the Australian Institute of Family Studies (AIFS) *Family Formation Project* (Andrews' Report, 1998, p.78) found that after five years of marriage, 13% of those who had cohabited would divorce, compared to 6% of those who had not cohabited. Ten years later, the proportions were 26% and 14%, respectively and after twenty years the proportions were 56% and 27%, respectively.

Further evidence from Canada (Le Bourdais et al, 2000) supports the findings of the AIFS. The Canadian Study (2000), which looked at women in a conjugal relationship (both marital or common-law), found that starting life in a common-law relationship, as opposed to a marriage, sharply increased the probability of this first union ending in separation. Whether the common-law partners eventually married or not made little difference to the risk of separation. In the 30–39 years age group, for example, almost two-thirds (63%) of those women whose first relationship was common-law had separated by 1995, compared with one-third (33%) of women who had married first.

The Andrews' Report (1998, p.80) states that professionals have pondered the reasons for the greater chance of marital dissolution amongst couples who cohabited prior to marriage. Reasons cited include:

- Kerry James, a Sydney marriage counsellor 'People who do decide not to get married and live together may be unsure of their commitment in the first place.
 After marriage the lack of certainty about the commitment continues and that is why marriages break down.'
- Helen Glezer, a senior research fellow at the Australian Institute of Family Studies 'Men are more likely than women to believe cohabiting allows them to keep their independence. They perceive it as having economic advantages. It is seen as involving less commitment than marriage and men are more likely to view cohabiting as trial marriage. This suggests that women will be either more romantic or emotionally dependent in de facto relationship than men.'
- Rev Jim Pilmer, former Director of Anglican Marriage Education and Counselling Services, Melbourne — '...many couples get married to make poor relationships work, thinking that when they marry everything will be right — it isn't, it gets worse.'

partiesThe majority of couples who cohabited prior to marriage in 1999 were couples where
both parties had not previously been married (49,800 or 63%). Of the remaining couples
who cohabited prior to marriage in 1999, the major combinations were couples where
one party was divorced and one party was never previously in a registered marriage
(20%) and couples where both parties had been previously divorced (13%).

Age of parties

Men and women who cohabited prior to marriage in 1999 had an older median age at marriage (30.7 years and 28.5 years, respectively) than did men and women who did not cohabit (28.6 years and 26.7 years, respectively). While this held true for the never married group, previously widowed men and women who cohabited were about six years younger than their non cohabiting counterparts. Cohabiting divorced men and women were also younger than non cohabiting previously divorced, by around one year.




Of the 78,800 marriages between people who had cohabited before their marriage in 1999, 68% of men and 77% of women were aged between 16 and 34 years.

For many couples in the total population, cohabitation is a precursor or alternative to first marriage or remarriage. Therefore, it is not only younger or previously never married people who are choosing to cohabit before marriage. Cohabitation prior to marriage also occurs among older and previously married people. For instance, in 1999, 17% of men and 13% of women who cohabited prior to marriage were aged between 40 and 59 years. Around 76% of these men and 78% of these women had been previously divorced.









Interval to remarriageFor men and women who had cohabited and were remarrying in 1999, men were more
likely to have a shorter interval to remarriage than were women. Around 63% of men and
59% of women remarrying, did so within five years of their previous marriage ending.
Within this five year period divorced men (64%) and women (61%) were the most likely
to remarry. For widowed men and women, widowed men (52%) were far more likely to
remarry, within five years, than were widowed women (39%). For those who remarried
in 1999, 84% of men and 82% of women remarried within ten years.

For men who cohabited and were remarrying the median interval to remarriage was 3.4 years while for women the median interval was 3.8 years. The pattern was the same for men and women remarrying who did not cohabit, although the interval was a little longer. The median intervals for men and women who did not cohabit were 3.5 and 4.0 years, respectively. Widowed men and women waited longer to remarry than did previously divorced people.

Country of birth

The incidence of cohabitation prior to marriage differs by birthplace of parties. For example, for the marriages registered in 1999, men and women from North-West Europe had the highest level of cohabitation prior to marriage when compared with other birthplace groups, (78% and 80% respectively). In contrast, men and women from North Africa and the Middle East had the lowest level of cohabitation before marriage (47% and 45%, respectively). For Australian-born marrying, around 70% of both men and women had cohabited prior to marriage.

Mostly, the proportion of men and women from particular regions who indicated cohabitation with partners from the same or other regions was similar. However, the proportion of men born in North-East Asia who cohabited with Australian-born women (58%) was lower than the proportion of North-East Asian–born women (71%) who cohabited with Australian-born men. This was mainly due to Chinese-born and Japanese-born men being unlikely to cohabit with Australian-born women while Chinese-born and Japanese-born women were more inclined to cohabit with Australian-born men.

Category of celebrantOf the 78,800 marriages in 1999 which were preceded by cohabitation 61% were
performed by civil celebrants. For non cohabiting marriages (35,500) only 29% were
performed by civil celebrants. The Northern Territory had the highest proportion of
marriages performed by civil celebrants in both cases (70% for cohabitation and 58% for
non cohabitation).

Of those marriages performed by civil celebrants (58,600), 82% cohabited prior to marriage. For those married by ministers of religion (55,700), 55% cohabited. At the individual denomination level, marriages performed by Uniting Church ministers had the highest level of pre-marriage cohabitation (70%), while marriages performed by Orthodox Church ministers had the lowest level of cohabitation (25%). Ministers of the Catholic Church performed the highest number of total marriages (19,200 or 17%), with less than half (48%) cohabiting prior to marriage.

Children of previous marriages

In 1999, around 37% of men and women who had cohabited prior to remarriage had children, aged under 16 years, from prior marriages. Of these marriages, half the men and women had one child while just over a third had two children.

Men who had children aged under 16 years from previous marriages, were more likely to have cohabited (38%) than to have not cohabited (30%). However, the incidence of cohabitation or non cohabitation for women with children was the same (37%).

Men and women who were divorced and had children where more likely to have cohabited than to have not cohabited prior to remarriage. For widowed men and women the reverse was the case. Previously widowed men and women with children had a lower proportion cohabiting than not cohabiting. This could reflect the older age at marriage for widowed men and women and their offspring having already reached 16 years and over. The median age at marriage for previously widowed men in all marriages was around 20 years higher than for previously divorced men. For women the difference was around 15 years.



CHAPTER 5

DIVORCES

INTRODUCTION

There were 52,600 divorces granted in Australia in 1999, representing a small increase on the number of divorces granted in 1998 (slightly more than 2%), but an increase of 27% on the number granted 10 years ago. This compares with a 7% increase between 1989 and 1999 in the married population (the population at risk of divorce).

DIVORCES GRANTED



DIVORCE TRENDS

The divorce rate for the currently married population rose in 1999 to 12.7 men and women per 1,000 currently married men and women. While this was the first rise observed since 1996, the 1999 rates were higher than those recorded a decade ago (10.8 for men and 10.7 for women).


The crude divorce rate (the number of divorces per 1,000 population) in 1999 was 2.8 per 1,000. This is a slight increase on the rate recorded in 1998 (2.7 per 1,000), but a higher rate than in 1989 when the crude divorce rate was 2.5 per 1,000 population.

DIVORCE TRENDS continued	 Studies have indicated that the reasons for divorce have changed over time. Gigy and Kelly (1992, p186) observe: 'Whereas before, divorce was a solution more often limited to such stark and specific circumstances as desertion or chronic alcoholism, in the mid-80s, divorce appears to be most commonly sought because of a more general dissatisfaction with the emotional or affective deficiencies and tenor of the marital relationship'.
	The Australian Institute of Family Studies (1999) studied the main reason perceived by divorced men and women to be the cause of their marriage breakdown. The study found that affective issues, such as communication problems, incompatability/drifted apart', and 'you or former spouse had an affair', were the main reasons given. The only noted difference between men and women was that women were more likely to report abusive behaviours as the main reason for divorce. The study also found that the perceived main reasons for divorce mentioned by respondents did not appear to be strongly associated with the selected demographic variables examined, such as education, employment, and age at marriage. Rather these variables were seen to have an indirect or mediating, rather than direct, effect on marital distress which could lead to divorce.
LIKELIHOOD TO DIVORCE	Using data up to and including 1999, it was found that overall 46% of marriages are likely to end in divorce over all years of marriage. Age at marriage was found to be associated with the likelihood to divorce, with the highest divorce rates likely among people who marry under 20 years (see Special Article 'Divorce in the Nineties' p. 121 in this issue).
AGE AT DIVORCE	The median age at divorce (the age at which there are as many divorcing above the age as there are below it) for both men and women rose slightly in 1999. The median age at divorce for men was 40.9 years and for women 38.2 years. This was a rise of 0.4 for both men and women, from 40.5 years for men and 37.8 years for women in 1998. The rise in the median age at divorce is probably associated with the increase in the age at marriage

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Age-specific divorce rates per married population increased in all the age groups for men and women over the ten-year period 1989–1999.


Between 1989 and 1999 the peak age group for divorce rates for men changed from 25–29 years to 30–34 years. The age-specific divorce rates for men in the peak age


groups increased from 19.0 per 1,000 to 21.5 per 1,000 married men for the age group 25–29 years, and 18.1 per 1,000 to 22.8 per 1,000 married men for the age group 30–34 years.

The peak age group for divorce rates for women remained unchanged from 1989 (25–29 years), however an increase in the rate was observed from 19.8 per 1,000 to 23.8 per 1,000 married women.

DURATION OF MARRIAGE

Duration of marriage is the interval between the date of marriage and the date the divorce was made absolute. Of the divorces occurring in 1999, the median duration of marriage was 11.3 years. Between 1989 and 1999 the median duration of marriage increased consistently, from 10.2 years to 11.3 years. Similarly the median duration of marriage to the time the parties separated has also increased over this ten-year period, from 7.3 years in 1989 to 7.9 years in 1999. The time interval between final separation and the date the divorce was made absolute has also increased from 2.9 years in 1989 to 3.4 years in 1999.

Of the couples who divorced in 1999, 36% were separated within the first five years of marriage and a further 23% were separated in the next five years. The most common single interval between marriage and separation was between two and three years (9%). Just over 18% of couples had divorced within the first five years of marriage, while a



DURATION OF MARRIAGEfurther 26% had divorced in the following five-year period. The most common singlecontinuedinterval between marriage and divorce was between four and five years (6%).

Males born in Southern and Eastern Europe had the longest median duration of marriage to divorce (15 years) and the longest median duration to separation (11 years). For females these median durations were 15 years and 12 years, respectively. Males born in North-East Asia had the shortest median duration of marriage to divorce (6 years) and the shortest median duration to separation (3 years). Corresponding median durations for females born in North-East Asia were 6 and 4 years, respectively.

APPLICANT FOR DIVORCEIn 1999 more women (50%) than men (31%) lodged applications for divorce. This is
consistent with patterns shown in previous years. The proportion of couples lodging
joint applications remained steady at 19%.

The proportion of female applicants for divorce declined as length of marriage increased, while the proportion of male applicants increased with length of marriage.

CHILDREN OF DIVORCING PARTNERS

Between 1989 and 1999 the proportion of divorces where children were involved has fallen. In 1989, 55% of divorces involved children under 18 years. By 1999 this proportion was 54%, which reflects the post 1970 decline in fertility.

However, because the number of divorces has increased over this ten-year period (by 27%), the actual number of children (under 18 years) involved in divorce has increased. In 1989 there were 43,300 children involved in divorce, by 1999 this number had increased to 53,400 children. In 1989, 0.95 children per 100 children aged under 18 years in the total population were involved in divorce in Australia. By 1999 this proportion had increased to 1.13 per 100.

Of divorces granted where children under 18 years were involved, couples married for 15–19 years had the highest average number of children (2.2) in both 1989 and 1999. The average number of children, for all those divorces where children under 18 years were involved, was 1.89 in both years (1989 and 1999).

In 36% of the 28,300 divorces that involved children, the age of youngest child was 5–9 years. In nearly two-thirds of the divorces involving children, the age of youngest child was under 10 years.

BIRTHPLACE OF PARTIESOf the divorces granted in Australia in 1999, 58% were divorces where both parties were
born in Australia (59% in 1989), 13% were divorces among couples born in the same
overseas country (12% in 1989) and 29% were divorces between men and women who
had chosen partners from a different country (29% in 1989). Of this last group, 44% were
overseas-born men divorcing Australian-born women, and 35% were overseas-born
women divorcing Australian-born men (46% and 35% respectively in 1989).

MARITAL STATUS OF THE POPULATION

INTRODUCTION

Two separate concepts of marital status are measured by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). These are registered marital status and social marital status. In the main, registered marital status is used in this publication.

Registered marital status refers to formally registered marriages and divorces for which the partners hold a certificate. Registered marital status is a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she has, or has had, a registered marriage with another person with whom he or she holds, or held, a valid marriage certificate. Accordingly, people are classified as either 'never married', 'married', 'separated', 'divorced' or 'widowed'. For estimated resident population (ERP) data the category 'separated' is included with 'married'.

Social marital status identifies a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she forms a couple relationship with another person based on his/her current living arrangements. A couple relationship is based on a consensual union, and is defined as two people usually residing in the same household who share a social, economic and emotional bond usually associated with marriage, and who consider their relationship to be a marriage or marriage-like union. Under social marital status, a person is classified as either 'married' or 'not married', with further disaggregation of 'married' to distinguish 'registered married' from 'de facto married' persons. At finer levels again, social marital status classifies opposite-sex and same-sex couples as subcategories of the de facto married group.

Registered marital status was used in the past to infer characteristics of people's living arrangements. Generally, only people who were 'married' were considered to live in couple relationships, while those who were 'never married', 'separated', 'divorced' or 'widowed' were assumed not to do so. The rise of de facto partnering in the 1970s and 1980s meant that registered marital status became increasingly inadequate for describing living arrangements. Some people who had never married or were previously married, together with those who were currently married, were living in couple relationships.

A more complete picture of the living arrangements of the Australian population is gained when information on registered marital status and social marital status (identified via living arrangements as detailed at the 1996 Census) are combined. Despite changes in partnering, registered marital status remains an important classification for enhancing living arrangement data by introducing life-course characteristics (such as being widowed). Further, the relationship between registered marital status and de facto partnering observed in the Census can be used in post-censal years to provide indicative estimates of the likely number of people in de facto marriages.

REGISTERED MARITAL STATUS (AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER) — ERP

The population aged 15 years and over (that is, the population used in marital status estimates) at June 1999 was 15,044,700 people. It was comprised of 4,751,300 never married, 8,279,700 currently married, 930,200 widowed and 1,083,500 divorced people.

The ageing of the population has meant that between 1989 and 1999 the median age of population, has increased. This ageing population is the inevitable result of fertility remaining at low levels over a long period of time associated with increasing life expectancy. Of the population aged 15 years and over, the never married population aged by around two years for both men and women. For the other marital status groups the increase in the median age has ranged between three and four years, with the median age for divorced men increasing by 3.7 years and divorced women increasing by 4.2 years.


increased from 25% (2,602,900) in 1976 to 32% (4,751,300) in 1999. Contributors to this increase included the increasing incidence of de facto marriages and the delayed age at first marriage. The 1996 Census of Population and Housing showed that about 5.3% of the population was living in de facto marriages and of these people around 65% had never previously been married while a further 24% had previously been divorced. The comparative de facto population at the 1991 Census was 4.5%. The age at first marriage has increased by around 4.6 years for men and 5.2 years for women over the period 1976 to 1999.

For both men and women the increase in the proportion never married between 1976 and 1999, was in the younger ages. For men, the increase was most evident in the 25–29 years age group, which rose from 27% to 67% between 1976 and 1999 followed by the age group 20–24 (67% to 94%, respectively).


For women, the rise was most evident in the 20–24 years age group having risen from 40% in 1976 to 86% in 1999. The next largest increase was in the age group 25–29 years (up from 13% in 1976 to 51% in 1999).

Between 1976 and 1999, the proportion of never married males and females decreased in each age group after age 50. The largest decreases were in the age groups 75–79 and 80–84 years for males (3 percentage points) and the age group 70–74 years for females (6 percentage points).









Currently married

Between 1976 and 1999 the proportion of the population aged 15 years and over who were currently married declined from 65% to 55%. This decline accompanied the increase in the never married population.


For men, the decline was most apparent in the 25–29 years age group, falling from 72% in 1976 to 31% in 1999. The next largest decline was in the age group 30–34 years falling from 84% to 56%.

The largest decrease for women was in the age group 20–24 years which fell from 59% in 1976 to 13% in 1999 followed by the age group 25–29 years falling from 84% to 45%.


The proportion of men and women who were married increased in the older age groups. For men the increase was evident for all age groups from age 70 years while for women the increase was evident for all age groups from 60 years.

While it is reasonable to expect that the number of married men and married women would be equal this is not the case. At June 1999 there were an estimated 17,100 more married men than married women. Misreporting of marital status at the Census (and the consequent flow on effect on postcensal estimates) may be a cause, for some residents their spouse may be overseas on a long-term basis, and in the case of recently arrived migrants their spouse may not have accompanied them to Australia.

MARRIED ERP, Males-Percentage distribution








Widowed

At June 1999 the proportion of men and women, aged 15 years and over, who were widowed was slightly less than at June 1976 having fallen from 6.9% to 6.2%. The most


REGISTERED MARITAL STATUS (AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER) — ERP *continued* significant change occurred in the older age groups, where improvements in life expectancy over the past two decades led to reductions in the proportions widowed with a corresponding increase in the proportions married. The proportion of widowed men decreased slightly, from 2.6% in 1976 to 2.4% in 1999, while for women the decrease was larger, falling from 11.2% to 9.9% over the same period.

The proportional decreases in the widowed population were evident in all age groups from the age 25 years for males and 20 years for females, with the exception of females in the age group 85 years and over. In nearly all instances, the older the age group the larger the decrease. When 1976 and 1999 were compared men in the 85 years and over age group fell from 51% to 41% followed by the 80–84 years age group (35% to 26%, respectively). For women the largest decrease was in the age group 70–74 years, falling from 48% in 1976 to 37% in 1999 followed by the age group 65–69 years which fell from 35% to 24%, respectively.

Divorced

Between 1976 and 1999 the number of divorced people in the population, aged 15 years and over, increased from 233,400 persons (2.3%) to 1,083,500 (7.2%).


The number of divorced men increased from 104,700 to 483,800. This represents an increase in the proportion of divorced men from 2.1% in 1976 to 6.5% in 1999. Similarly, the number of divorced women increased, rising from 128,800 (2.5%) in 1976 to 599,700 (7.9%) in 1999.

REGISTERED MARITAL STATUS (AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER) — ERP continued The highest proportion of divorced men and women were in the age groups 45–49 years, (each 16%) followed by the age groups 40–44 and 50–54 (each 15%).


Between 1976 and 1999 the proportion of divorced people increased in all age groups, except the age groups 20–24 years and 25–29 years for men and 15–19 and 20–24 years for women. For these younger age groups, this corresponds to the increase in the proportion who were never married and the decline in the proportion married, i.e. those eligible to divorce.

The largest proportional increases for men were in the age groups 45–49 years and 50–54 years, each group increasing from 3% in 1976 to 12% in 1999. For women the largest proportional increases were in the same age groups as for men (45–49 years and 50–54 years). However, the increases were a little greater, each group increasing from 4% in 1976 to 15% in 1999.

SOCIAL MARITAL STATUS (AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER) — 1996 CENSUS The 1996 Census of Population and Housing counted 13,916,100 persons aged 15 years and over. Of these people around 55% (7,618,200) lived in couple relationships; 49% in registered marriages and 5% in de facto marriages. Additionally, a further 9% were not able to be allocated a social marital status. Not all of those who stated they were 'married' were living with a partner, with 92% having reported themselves as 'married' and living with a partner while the remaining 8% indicated they were 'married' but not living with a partner.

SOCIAL MARITAL STATUS (AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER) — 1996 CENSUS continued

Nearly 744,100 people lived in a de facto marriages. The likelihood of being in a de facto marriage varied with registered marital status. The highest proportion of de facto partners was 20% among people who were 'divorced', followed by 11% among those who were 'never married' and 10% among those who were 'separated'. There were inconsistencies reported with a small proportion, less than half a per cent, reporting their living arrangements as 'de facto' and their registered marital status as 'married'.

INTERPRETING 1999 ERP BY MARITAL STATUS

In each census year, population estimates by registered marital status are based on census counts of usual residents adjusted to include Australian residents temporarily overseas and people missed in the Census. Where registered marital status is not reported it is imputed. In each postcensal year, the population estimates are updated by incorporating ongoing marriage, divorce and death registrations and net overseas migration. These estimates combine the categories 'married' and 'separated' into a single category 'married' to reflect the lack of data on separations.

Data from the 1991 and 1996 Censuses indicate a slight shift away from traditional forms of partnering to accommodate a growing variety of relationships, i.e. the proportion of registered married couples in couple relationships has decreased while the proportion of de facto married couples has increased. De facto marriages are an increasingly popular choice among young couples as a precursor/alternative to marriage and for older couples as an alternative to a hurried remarriage. De facto couple marriages increased from 8% of all couple relationships at the 1991 Census to 10% at the 1996 Census. It is therefore reasonable to assume that the number of people in de facto marriages in 1999 would have increased.

Assuming the proportions evident from the 1996 Census, it is estimated that of the ERP aged 15 years and over in 1999 (15,044,700 people), around 861,800 people would have formed de facto marriages.

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
CHAPTER 7

SPECIAL ARTICLE: DIVORCES BY COUNTRY OF BIRTH

INTRODUCTIONThroughout the twentieth century the incidence of divorce increased substantially, with the
annual divorce rate rising from 0.1 divorces per 1,000 population in the early 1900s, to around 2.7
per 1,000 population in the 1990s. Previous research indicates that a number of
sociodemographic variables, such as age at marriage, age left school, religion and country of birth
of each partner are related to the risk of divorce (Carmichael, 1988; Jones, 1994; Roden, 1989)

This article examines the country of birth specific divorce rates of major birthplace groups within Australia. Divorces for 1996, by the countries of birth of the parties involved, are examined in relation to the number of couples in Australia, by birthplace of the partners. In this way, divorce rates by country of birth of the applicants are calculated using the population 'at risk' of experiencing those divorces.

TRENDS INPrior to 1976 the divorce rate rose gradually, marked by a temporary rise around 1947 attributedDIVORCEto the failure of hasty marriages entered into just before and during World War 2 (Roden, 1989).
The Family Law Act 1975 recognised the irretrievable breakdown of marriage as the single
ground for divorce, eliminating all concepts of marital wrong doing. A large increase in the
divorce rate in 1976 reflected the introduction of this Act. Over the past 20 years the divorce rate
fluctuated, generally showing a slight upwards trend.



Divorce rates for the currently married population compare the number of divorces granted with the population 'at risk' of experiencing divorce, that is, men and women currently in a registered marriage. The divorce rates for the currently married population have declined since the peak in 1976, but in 1999 remained higher than rates recorded a decade ago.

BIRTHPLACE OF PARTIES DIVORCING

In 1996, 52,500 divorces were registered in Australia. Of these, 56% were couples where both parties were born in Australia, 14% were couples where both partners were born in the same overseas country and 30% were couples where partners were born in a different country. Of all divorces, 6% involved partners born in different overseas countries. Relatively more divorces (13%) occurred when the wife was Australian-born and the husband overseas-born, compared with divorces where the husband was Australian-born and the wife overseas-born (11%). These proportions have remained relatively steady throughout the 1990s.

Nearly 68% (71,300) of people divorcing in 1996 were born in Australia, 9% (9,600) were born in the United Kingdom, and 3% (2,700) were born in New Zealand. The divorce rates for these country of birth groups depend upon the number of married couples from these countries within the total Australian population.



MARRIED COUPLES

The 1996 Census indicated that there were 3,506,800 married couples usually resident in Australia. Of these, the birthplaces of both husband and wife were stated for 3,307,400 couples. The major birthplaces of married partners were Australia (69% of partners), the United Kingdom (9%), Italy (2%), New Zealand (2%) and Greece (1%).

Adjustment for The census count is an underestimate of the resident population of Australia. It requires underestimation adjustment for factors such as Census underenumeration, visitors in Australia on Census night and Australian residents temporarily overseas. By comparing the 1996 Census count of people by country of birth with the estimated resident population at June 1996, the percentage population underestimate (including adjustment for the Census counts being on 6 August) was calculated for each major birthplace group.

> The census counts of registered married couples were then inflated by the birthplace specific underestimates. As underestimates of specific birthplace combinations are not available, counts of married couples were inflated according to the birthplace of the partners. For example, the Census count of couples with Greek-born husbands was inflated by the percentage underestimate of the Greek-born adult population, regardless of the country of birth of the wife. In a separate matrix, the Census count of couples with Greek-born wives was inflated by the same percentage underestimate, regardless of the country of birth of the husband. This inflation method is an approximation as it assumes that the underestimate of population for each country of birth applies to both partners within couple families. Also, some categories of couples (such as couples in which one or both partners' country of birth were not stated) were excluded from the base population.

> Adjustment factors were calculated for both the population aged 15 years and over and the population most likely to experience divorce (aged 15-64 years). As these were very similar, only results using the adjustment to population aged 15 years and over are presented here.

DIVORCES RATES By relating the number of divorces registered in 1996 with the estimated number of married couples in June 1996, divorce rates were calculated for major birthplace groups within Australia. Generally, divorce rates were lower among couples in which both partners were born in the same country, than couples in which partners were born in different countries.

Overall, 15 per 1,000 married couples were granted divorce in Australia in 1996. The divorce rate varied according to whether both partners were born in the same overseas country (11), either or both partners were born in Australia (15), or partners were born in different overseas countries (21). Divorce rates varied considerably for the birthplace groups within each of these three groups of divorcing couples. Couples where at least one partner was born in China, Viet Nam, New Zealand or the Philippines had higher divorce rates than couples in which one or both partners were born in other countries. For each country of birth the highest and the lowest divorce rates occurred for the following combination of partners:




Of the countries selected, high divorce rates were experienced among couples in which both husband and wife were born in China (26 per 1,000 couples), Viet Nam (23) and New Zealand (20). Low divorce rates were experienced by couples in which both husband and wife were born in Italy (3), Greece (4) and Malaysia (5). These differences may be due to 'ethnic group norms about the legitimacy of divorce as a response to marital disharmony' (Jones, 1994).

Partners born in different overseas countries Among couples with partners born in different overseas countries, highest divorce rates were among Philippines and Vietnamese-born husbands married to wives from another overseas country (56 and 48 per 1,000 married couples respectively), and Chinese-born wives married to husbands from another overseas country (40).

Lowest divorce rates were among Greek and German-born wives married to husbands from another overseas country (11 and 12 respectively) and Italian-born husbands married to wives from another overseas country (13).



While overall overseas-born people married to Australian-born partners had a lower divorce rate than overseas-born people married to partners born in a different overseas country, this differed by birthplace. For example, husbands born in Italy, Greece and Germany had lower divorce rates if their wife was Australian-born than if their wife was born in another country different to themselves. On the other hand, husbands born in China, India and Malaysia had higher divorce rates if their wife was Australian-born.

For wives, those born in New Zealand, Italy, and Vietnam had lower divorce rates if their husband was Australian-born than if their husband was born in a different overseas country. Those born in China, Greece, Germany and Malaysia had higher rates if their husband was Australian-born.

Among a number of the selected birthplace groups, large differences in the divorce rate were evident depending on the sex of the Australian-born partner. Philippines-born men married to Australian-born women had a divorce rate of 41 per 1,000 couples, while Philippines-born women married to Australian-born men had a divorce rate of 22. Similarly, the divorce rate was higher among Indian-born men married to Australian-born women (27) than Indian-born women married to Australian-born men (15). The reverse was true for Chinese–Australian couples. Chinese-born men married to Australian-born women had a divorce rate of 32, while Chinese-born women married to Australian-born men had a divorce rate of 51.

LIMITATIONS

The analysis in this article is restricted to 1996 divorces due to the availability of 'couples' data from the 1996 Census, which formed the denominator of the rates presented. No such estimates are available for post-censal years.

This analysis does not include explicit analysis of couples' age and duration of residence in Australia, which may be influencing factors for divorce. Also, the analysis is confined to first generation migrants. Research indicates that the marriage patterns of first, second and third generation migrants differ (see 'Cultural diversity within marriages' *Australian Social Trends, 2000* (Cat. no. 4102.0)), and corresponding differences in divorce patterns are also possible.

CHAPTER 8

SPECIAL ARTICLE: DIVORCE IN THE NINETIES

INTRODUCTION

Over the past 20 years, the annual number of divorces in Australia has varied between around 40,000 and 50,000. Divorces, which peaked dramatically in the years immediately following the *Family Law Act 1975*, soon stabilised once the backlog of applications was processed under the new 'no fault' legislation. A gradual upward trend in divorce has been evident since the mid-1980s.

Divorce trends in Australia from the 1960s to the mid-1990s were analysed in an earlier issue of this publication (see 'How Many Marriages End in Divorce?' in *Marriages and Divorces, Australia, 1994* (Cat. no. 3310.0)). This article updates the previous article with more recent data and focuses on divorce trends by age at marriage (see section below on Measuring Divorce for the method used).

This article examines divorces from registered marriages. In 1999, it is estimated that around 61% (9 million) of the Australian population, aged 15 years and over, lived in a social marriage. About 55% lived in a registered marriage and 6% lived in a de facto marriage. While important, the analysis of trends in separations from de facto marriages cannot be undertaken due to the lack of available data.

DIVORCE TRENDS Assuming 1999 divorce rates hold in the future, around 9% of all marriages would end in divorce by five years of marriage, 20% by ten years, 35% by twenty years and 42% by thirty years. In total, 46% of marriages would end in divorce over all years of marriage.

Expected rates of divorce have shown a gradual upward trend since the late 1970s. In 1979, 36% of marriages were expected to end in divorce by thirty years of marriage compared with 42% according to divorces in 1999 (see section on Divorce Expectations below).



Divorce rates experienced by couples who married in the same year (marriage cohorts) closely align with these divorce expectations although they also reflect the effects of the gradual rise in divorce rates over time.

For people who married in 1975–76, divorce rates had reached 7% by five years of marriage (compared with 9% expected rates for 1999 divorces). They had reached 17% by ten years of marriage and 28% by twenty years of marriage (compared with 1999 expected rates of 20% and 35%, respectively).

Divorce rates among people who married from the mid-1980s onward have risen even closer to or already reached 1999 expectations. Divorce rates of 20% by ten years of marriage have been recorded for marriage cohorts since 1988–89 (see section on Observed Divorce Rates below).




DIVORCE EXPECTATIONS AND OBSERVED DIVORCE RATES, Cumulative Rates for Total Marriages


DIVORCE EXPECTATIONS

The proportion of marriages likely to end in divorce during the first five years of marriage rose from 7% in 1979 to 9% in 1999. Over the same period, the proportion of marriages likely to end in divorce during 5–9 years of marriage rose from 9% to 12% and during 10–19 years of marriage it rose from 12% to 14%. The likelihood of divorce at 20–29 years of marriage remained constant at around 8%.

Divorce expectations (synthetic divorce rates) answer the question, 'What proportion of marriages are likely to end in divorce?' They are calculated from divorces recorded in a particular year. They refer, however, to the expectation of divorce across the whole duration of marriage. In a similar way the total fertility rate is calculated from births recorded in one year to provide a measure of the number of births a woman could expect to have during her lifetime.

DIVORCE EXPECTATIONS continued





In general, people who marry at young ages are likely to have higher rates of divorce than those who marry at older ages. Men are more likely to divorce than women who marry at the same age.

The highest rates of divorce are likely among people who marry aged under 20 years (where over 70% of men and 50% of women are likely to divorce by ten years of marriage) followed by those who marry aged 20–24 years (where around 25% of men and women are likely to divorce by ten years of marriage).

Divorce among people married aged under 25 years has a significant impact on divorce rates overall. The likelihood that people who marry aged 25 years and over will divorce is lower across nearly all years of marriage than the corresponding rates for total marriages.

Compared to rates for people who marry in their late twenties or early thirties, there are slight rises in the likelihood of divorce for people who marry aged between 35 and 50 years. The likelihood of divorce by ten years of marriage for men who marry aged 45–49 years was 20% compared with 17% for men who marry aged 30–34 years. A similar pattern was evident for women.

Previous studies have shown that divorce rates among people who remarry following divorce are higher than among those who marry for the first time (Carmichael, et al, 1996). Unfortunately, data to analyse the different patterns of divorce among first and subsequent marriages are no longer available. The Family Court of Australia ceased collecting this information from 1995.

OBSERVED DIVORCE RATES

Observed divorce rates answer the question 'What proportion of marriages from a particular year have already ended in divorce?' Observed divorce rates are calculated from the progressive record of divorce from the group of people who married in the same year. Each of these marriage cohorts¹ reached a different length of marriage in 1999. People who married in the early 1970s reached almost thirty years of marriage while those who married in the early 1990s have yet to reach ten years of marriage.

Rates of divorce among these groups reflect the gradual upward trend in divorce over the last 25 years. The proportion of people who had divorced by five years of marriage rose from 7% of those who married in 1975–76 to 9% of those who married in 1993–94. The proportion of people who had divorced by ten years of marriage rose from 17% of people who married in 1975–76 to 20% of people who married in 1989–90.

¹ The 'marriage cohort' reflects marriages that were registered in Australia, whereas the divorces are to people some of whom may or may not have been married in Australia.

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

Rises in divorce rates were observed for each age group at marriage, with strong rises for both men and women aged 15–19 and 20–24 years at marriage.


There were also quite significant rises in divorce rates for people aged 50 and over at marriage. By ten years of marriage, 10% of men and 9% of women who married at this age in 1975–76 had divorced. For people who married in 1989–90, the corresponding rates had risen to 16% and 13%, respectively.




MALES, Observed Divorce Rates at 10 Years of Marriage—Marriage Cohorts

MEASURING DIVORCE

Reduced events analysis was used to obtain the estimates in this article. It has been a standard technique for investigating divorce in Australia since the mid-1980s. The analysis presented above was based on marriage registrations from 1920 to 1999 and divorce registrations from 1977 to 1999. Marriage cohorts by age at marriage were adjusted annually to account for overseas migration and deaths, but not for depletion due to divorce. Divorce proportions were calculated by comparing divorces (by duration of marriage and age at marriage) with the adjusted marriage cohort. Synthetic cumulative divorce rates were derived by summing divorce proportions for a given year of divorce. The corresponding real rates were obtained by summing the relevant proportions across time for a given marriage cohort. (For further details see 'Divorce Rates by Length of Marriage, 1977–1994', Demography Working Paper No. 1, 1995.)

This method yields higher rates of divorce than those based on multi-dimensional nuptiality tables (see, for example, Krishnamoorthy, 1982). An experimental estimate, based on applying multi-dimensional nuptiality tables to 1995–97 divorces, indicates that only around 32% of marriages will end in divorce over all years of marriage compared with 46% of marriages based on 1999 rates using reduced events analysis.

DIVORCES

8 The *Family Law Act 1975* came into operation throughout Australia on 5 January 1976, repealing the Matrimonial Causes legislation which had been operative since 1961. Under Family Law legislation the irretrievable breakdown of marriage is the only ground on which a divorce is granted. This ground is established by the husband and wife having lived apart for 12 months or more and there being no reasonable likelihood of reconciliation. Applications for nullity of marriage under Family Law legislation must be on the ground that the marriage is void because of failure to meet a legal requirement such as that neither party be already lawfully married to another person. There is no provision for judicial separation under Family Law legislation.

9 Successful applicants for a divorce under Family Law legislation are initially granted a decree nisi. This becomes absolute after one month unless it is rescinded, appealed against, or the Court has not declared its satisfaction as to proper arrangements having been made for the welfare of children involved.

10 At the time of the introduction of the Family Law Act there were applications pending for divorce which had been previously filed under the Matrimonial Causes legislation. Family Law legislation provided that these cases could be continued under the superseded legislation or transferred and heard under the Family Law legislation. The ABS publication *Divorces, Australia, 1976* (Cat. no. 3307.0) differentiated between those cases in which a divorce was granted under Matrimonial Causes legislation. Such differentiation is not made for subsequent years.

11 The Family Court of Australia introduced new divorce application forms in February 1995. With the introduction of these forms some data items that had been collected ceased to be available. The data items that are no longer available are:

- characteristics of the divorce
 - postcode and State of separation
 - rite of marriage
 - number of children aged over 18 years
- characteristics of the husband and wife
 - previous marital status
 - number of previous marriages
 - occupation at separation
 - date of first arrival in Australia
 - duration of residence

Statistics

12 The divorce statistics shown in this publication relate to calendar years and are compiled by the ABS from information supplied by Family Court Registries in respect of each application which resulted in a decree absolute being granted. Data for finalised divorces are provided to the ABS by the Family Court.

13 In the interpretation of data it is important to bear in mind that the availability of judges and the complexity of the cases brought before them can affect the number of decrees made absolute or granted in any one year. A rise in numbers in one year may be due wholly or in part to the clearing of a backlog of cases from an earlier period. In addition, legislative changes and the expectation of new legislation, rules and practices may affect the number of applications.

14 Details of divorce on a State or Territory of usual residence at separation basis are considered to be a more accurate reflection of divorce for States and Territories in Australia than are those provided on a State or Territory of registration basis. These details are, however, only available for 1993 and 1994. State or Territory of usual residence takes into account that some Family Courts have responsibility for hearing divorce cases relating to other States or Territories. The Family Courts most affected are Brisbane and the Australian Capital Territory. The Brisbane Family Court hears divorce cases from areas surrounding Lismore and Coffs Harbour in New South Wales, while the Australian Capital Territory Family Court hears cases from much of south-eastern New South Wales and part of Victoria. Another factor influencing the difference between State or Territory of usual residence and State or Territory of registration is that many applications are lodged at the nearest Family Court rather than the court in their State or Territory of usual residence at separation.

15 Divorces of persons usually resident in Jervis Bay Territory cannot be identified separately from those divorces of persons usually resident in the area covered by the Jervis Bay postcode. Hence divorces of persons usually resident in Jervis Bay Territory have been included in New South Wales.

16 The State classification used in tables 5.14, 5.15 and 5.16 of this publication relates to State of registration which is based on the location of the Family Court where the divorce was granted and registered. These figures can give a biased view of divorces in States and Territories, as explained in the preceding paragraphs. Due to the large number of divorces granted in the Australian Capital Territory to usual residents of another State, the rates for the Australian Capital Territory are not representative of the Australian Capital Territory population.

17 This publication contains preliminary estimates of the resident population of Australia by marital status, age and sex at 30 June 1999, based on the 1996 Census of Population and Housing. These estimates are preliminary and will be revised when more accurate data for deaths, marriages, divorces and category jumping by marital status become available.

18 The ERP is the official population estimates series compiled according to the place of usual residence of the population.

Method of estimation	20 The estimates of the population of Australia and the States and Territories at the date of the Census of Population and Housing are census counts based on place of usual residence, adjusted for underenumeration and the number of Australian residents estimated to have been temporarily overseas at the time of the Census.
	21 Post-censal estimates of the Australian population are obtained by adding to the population at the beginning of each period components of natural increase (on a usual residence basis) and net overseas migration. For the States and Territories, account is also taken of estimated interstate movements involving a change of usual residence. After each census, estimates are made for the preceding intercensal period by incorporating an additional quarterly adjustment (intercensal discrepancy) to ensure that the total intercensal increase agrees with the difference between the ERP at the two respective census dates.
	22 For marital status estimates, persons aged 14 years and under are automatically classified as never married.
	23 From July 1998, data on the marital status of overseas arrivals and departures is derived from visa applications (only for certain visa classes) and is therefore not available for Australian or New Zealand citizens. Marital status estimates for New Zealand arrivals and departures are therefore based on the pre July 1998 experience.
Reliability of estimates	24 To meet the conflicting demand for accuracy and timeliness there are three estimates of ERP. At the national and State/Territory levels preliminary estimates are available six months after the reference date, revised estimates are available 15 months after the end of the financial year and final estimates after the following census. The estimates in this publication are preliminary for 1999, revised for 1997 and 1998 and final for years prior to 1997.
	25 Single year age estimates are not shown for persons aged 85 years or older. Estimates for each age up to 99 have, however, been calculated and are available on request.

Reliability of estimates	26 Statistics are shown in units without being rounded. However, accuracy down to the last unit is not claimed and should not be assumed. This is particularly the case for single year of age data.
States and Territories	27 As a result of an amendment, made in 1992, to the <i>Acts Interpretation Act</i> , the Indian Ocean Territories of Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands have been included as part of geographic Australia, hence another category of the State and Territory classification has been created. This category, known as Other Territories, includes Christmas Island, the Cocos (Keeling) Islands and Jervis Bay Territory.

GLOSSARY

Age-specific divorce rates	 Because of the different purposes to which they are put, two different populations may be used in the calculation of age-specific divorce rates: Per 1,000 population—this relates the number of divorces recorded in the calendar year, by age at decree made absolute, to the estimated resident population of the same age at 30 June. Males under 18 and females under 16 are excluded from the population—this relates the number of divorces recorded in a calendar year, by age at decree made absolute, to the married population of the same age at 30 June. This relates the number of divorces recorded in a calendar year, by age at decree made absolute, to the married population of the same age at 30 June. Those classified as permanently separated are included in the married population. Males and females under 15 are excluded from the population. Wherever used, the definition adopted is indicated.
Age-specific first marriage rates	 Because of the different purposes to which they are put, two different populations may be used in the calculation of age-specific first marriage rates: Per 1,000 population—this relates the number of first time marriages of men or women registered in the calendar year, by age at marriage, to the estimated resident population in the same age at 30 June. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population—this relates the number of first time marriages of men or women registered in a calendar year, by age at marriage, to the never married population—this relates the number of first time marriages of men or women registered in a calendar year, by age at marriage, to the never married population of men or women of the same age at 30 June. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.
Age-specific marriage rates	 Wherever used, the definition adopted is indicated. Because of the different purposes to which they are put, two different populations may be used in the calculation of age-specific marriage rates: Per 1,000 population—this relates the number of marriages of men or women registered in a calendar year, by age at marriage, to the estimated resident population in the same age. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population. Per 1,000 not currently married population—this relates the number of marriages of men or women registered in a calendar year, by age at marriage, to the not currently married population of men or women of the same age at 30 June. Males and females aged under 15 are excluded from the population.
Age-specific remarriage rates	Age-specific remarriage rates are the number of remarrying men or women registered in the calendar year, by age at marriage, per 1,000 widowed and divorced estimated resident population of the same sex and age at 30 June. Males and females aged under 15 years are excluded from the population.
Children (divorce collection)	Children in the divorce collection are unmarried children of the marriage who were aged under 18 years at the time of application for divorce. Under the <i>Family Law Act 1975</i> (Cwlth) these may include (in certain cases) adopted and ex-nuptial children and children from a former marriage. Children who are married or aged 18 years or more are not subject to custody and guardianship orders and are excluded.

Cohabiting couples	Cohabiting couples refer to males and females, both aged at least 15 years, who
conabiling couples	are in a registered or de facto marriage and are usually resident in the same household.
Crude divorce rate	The crude divorce rate is the number of decrees absolute granted during the calendar year per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June. For years prior to 1992, the crude divorce rate was based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year. In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is unmarried or is below the minimum age of marriage.
Crude marriage rate	The crude marriage rate is the number of marriages registered during the calendar year per 1,000 estimated resident population at 30 June. For years prior to 1992, the crude marriage rate was based on the mean estimated resident population for the calendar year. In the interpretation of this rate, it must be kept in mind that a large and varying proportion of the population used in the denominator is below the minimum age of marriage or is already married.
Date of final separation	The date of final separation is the date, given on the application for divorce, from which the period of living apart is calculated for the purpose of establishing grounds for divorce. In determining the date of final separation, a single period of resumed cohabitation of less than three months may be ignored, provided the periods of living apart before and after resumed cohabitation amount to a total of 12 months or more.
Divorce	Decree absolute of dissolution of marriage.
Duration of marriage	Duration of marriage is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date of divorce.
Duration of marriage until separation	Duration of marriage until separation is the interval measured in completed years between the date of marriage and the date of separation.
Estimated resident population (ERP)	Estimated resident population (ERP) are estimates of the Australian population obtained by adding to the estimated population at the beginning of each period the components of natural increase (on a usual residence basis) and net overseas migration. For the States and Territories, account is also taken of estimated interstate movements involving a change of usual residence.
	Estimates of the resident population are based on adjusted (for underenumeration) census counts by place of usual residence, to which are added the number of Australian residents estimated to have been temporarily overseas at the time of the Census. Overseas visitors in Australia are excluded from this calculation.
	After each census, estimates for the preceding intercensal period are revised by incorporating an additional adjustment (intercensal discrepancy) to ensure that the total intercensal increase agrees with the difference between the ERPs at the two respective census dates.
	The concept of ERP links people to a place of usual residence within Australia. Usual residence is that place where each person has lived or intends to live for six months or more from the reference date for data collection.
First marriage rates	First marriage rates are the number of men or women marrying for the first time during the calendar year, per 1,000 population of never married men or women aged 15 years and over at 30 June.
Marital status	Two separate concepts of marital status are measured by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. These are registered marital status and social marital status.
	Social marital status identifies a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she forms a couple relationship with another person based on his/her

Marital status continued	current living arrangements. A couple relationship is based on a consensual union, and is defined as two people usually residing in the same household who share a social, economic and emotional bond usually associated with marriage, and who consider their relationship to be a marriage or a marriage-like union. Under social marital status, a person is classified as either 'married' or 'not married', with further disaggregation of 'married' to distinguish 'registered married' from 'de facto married' persons.
	Registered marital status refers to formally registered marriages and divorces for which the partners hold a certificate. Registered marital status is a person's relationship status in terms of whether he or she has, or has had, a registered marriage with another person with whom he or she holds, or held, a valid marriage certificate. Accordingly, people are classified as either 'never married', 'married', 'widowed' or 'divorced'.
Marriage	Under the <i>Marriage Act 1961</i> (Cwlth), a marriage may be celebrated by a minister of religion registered as an authorised celebrant, by a district registrar or by other persons authorised by the Attorney-General. Notice of the intended marriage must be given to the celebrant at least one calendar month but within six calendar months before the marriage. A celebrant must transmit an official certificate of the marriage for registration in the State or Territory in which the marriage took place.
Median value	For any distribution, the median value (age, duration, interval) is that value which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, half falling below the value, and half exceeding it. Where the value for a particular record has not been stated, that record is excluded from the calculation.
Remarriage rates	Remarriage rates are the number of remarrying men or women per 1,000 population of widowed and divorced men or women of the same age at 30 June. The rates are separately calculated for widowed or divorced men or women by appropriately adjusting the numerator and denominator of the rates.
State or Territory of registration	State or Territory of registration refers to the State or Territory in which the marriage was registered or the divorce was granted. (For further information about how this affects divorce statistics see paragraphs 14–16 of the Explanatory Notes.)
State or Territory of usual residence	State or Territory of usual residence refers to the State or Territory of usual residence of the population for estimated resident population.
Total first marriage rate	The total first marriage rate is obtained by summing age-specific first marriage rates (calculated by using total population) and indicates the number of males or females who will ever marry per 1,000 males or females in the population. The population aged under 15 years is excluded from this calculation.
Year of occurrence	Data presented on year of occurrence basis relate to the date the event occurred.
Year of registration	Data presented on year of registration basis relate to the date the event was registered.

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
