NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

There have been some changes made to the contents of the 2002 publication compared to the 2001 edition. Tables have been re-ordered and table 1 now includes non-government affiliation. New tables are: table 9 on full-time students by year of school education and non-government affiliation, and tables 16 and 17 on full-time equivalent (FTE) student estimates. The table on student/teaching staff ratios (table 21) is now based on FTE students rather than full-time students. As a result of a change in the method of rounding, some FTE teaching staff estimates for 2001 in tables 22 and 23 differ slightly from figures previously published in the 2001 edition of this publication. Minor revisions have been made to a small number of estimates for 2000 and 2001 in tables 1, 2, 6, 11, 14, 22 and 23.

A more extensive range of statistics on schools, students and staff is available from Data Cubes (previously called Companion Data) in Excel spreadsheet format on the ABS web site at <URL:http://www.abs.gov.au>. These Data Cubes for 2002 include two new tables (48b and 49b) which show the number and FTE of part-time primary school students.

Statistics on the number of schools over time should be used with caution. Refer to paragraph 15 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

SCOPE

The statistics in this publication relate to government and non-government schools, students and school staff, and were collected through the National Schools Statistics Collection (NSSC), which was established through the work of the Ministerial Council on Education, Employment, Training and Youth Affairs.

USAGE

Because estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

MAIN FEATURES

SCHOOLS

In August 2002, there were 9,632 schools in Australia, of which 6,969 (72.4%) were government schools and 2,663 (27.6%) were non-government schools.

During the decade from 1992 to 2002 the total number of schools fell by 3.3%. Government school numbers declined by 6.4%, whereas the number of non-government schools rose by 6.1%.

The number of combined primary/secondary schools has grown from 837 in 1992 to 1,085 in 2002 (an increase of 29.6%), with combined schools now representing 11.3% of all schools.

STUDENTS

In 2002 there were $3,\!301,\!776$ full-time school students, 68.4% of whom attended government schools.

Over the period 1992 to 2002, the number of full-time students attending government schools grew by 1.0%, while the number attending non-government schools increased by 20.8%. Compared to 2001, the number of full-time students attending government schools in 2002 increased by 9,118 (0.4%), while non-government school student numbers increased by 24,517 or 2.4%.


There were 29,450 part-time school students in 2002, an increase of 3.6% since 2001, and 5.6% higher than in 1997. Tasmania (Tas.) had the highest proportion of part-time students (3.4%), followed by South Australia (SA) (3.0%) and the Northern Territory (NT) with 2.9%.

In 2002 there were 121,647 Indigenous full-time school students, a 5.4% increase over the number reported in 2001. Approximately 57% of Indigenous students attended schools in New South Wales (NSW) or Queensland (Qld).

AGE PARTICIPATION RATES

At the Australian level, the age participation rates for full-time school students in 2002 were 92.5% for 15 year olds, 80.9% for 16 year olds and 62.3% for 17 year olds, the latter rising from 60.3% in 1992.

APPARENT RETENTION RATES

In 2002 the apparent retention rate of full-time school students from Year 7/8 to Year 12 was 75.1% compared to 73.4% in 2001 and 77.1% in 1992. As in previous years, the apparent retention rate for females (80.7%) was significantly higher than the rate for males (69.8%).

APPARENT RETENTION RATES continued

Over the last decade the apparent retention rate from Year 10 to Year 12 decreased slightly from 78.6% in 1992 to 77.0% in 2002, with the rate for females in 2002 again being considerably higher than that for males (81.7% and 72.4% respectively).

Apparent retention rates for full-time Indigenous school students, from Year 7/8 to both Year 10 and Year 12, have continued to rise over the last five years — the rate to Year 10 increased from 80.6% in 1997 to 86.4% in 2002, and the rate to Year 12 increased from 30.9% to 38.0%.

STAFF

There were 225,353 full-time equivalent (FTE) teaching staff in 2002, 152,982 at government schools and 72,371 at non-government schools. This was an overall increase of 1.4% from the previous year.

The number of FTE teaching staff in government schools increased by 5.1% since 1997 compared to a 17.6% growth in the non-government sector. In the year to 2002, government FTE school teacher numbers increased by 0.3% and non-government FTE school teacher numbers grew by 3.7%.

The proportion of FTE teaching staff who are female continues to rise — in 2002, 67.3% of all FTE teachers were female. The figure was 79.1% in primary schools and 55.1% in secondary schools. The comparable figures in 1997 were 65.0%, 76.9% and 53.1% respectively.

Overall, the average number of FTE primary school students per FTE teacher was 16.9. In the government sector the average was 16.7 and in non-government schools it was 17.3. The equivalent figure for secondary schools was 12.5, with an average of 12.6 in government schools and 12.3 in non-government schools.



EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains statistics of government and non-government schools, students and staff as at August 2002.
- **2** The National Schools Statistics Collection (NSSC) is a collaborative arrangement between state, territory and Commonwealth education authorities and the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). The NSSC uses a set of concepts, definitions and classifications developed jointly by these agencies.

SCOPE AND COVERAGE

- **3** The statistics in this publication relate to establishments which have, as their major activity, the administration and/or provision of full-time day primary, secondary or special education, or primary or secondary distance education. Major activity is based on the activity of students or, where this is not appropriate, for example in administrative offices, on the activity of staff. Therefore, the statistics presented do not include establishments, students or staff engaged in school level education conducted by other institutions, in particular Technical and Further Education (TAFE) establishments.
- 4 Statistics for the government series relate to all establishments administered by the Department of Education under the Director-General of Education (or equivalent) in each state and territory, students attending those establishments, and all staff engaged in the administration or provision of government school education at those establishments. Statistics for the non-government series relate to all establishments not administered by the Department of Education.
- The Education Department of Western Australia has advised that Pre-year 1 (called Pre-primary in Western Australia (WA)) students are attending five days a week from 2002 and are therefore within scope of the NSSC. This is one of two changes that have had an impact on student numbers in WA in 2002. The other is a change in the age at which children may commence Pre-year 1. This follows on from the change made to starting ages in Kindergarten (pre Pre-year 1) in 2001. Prior to 2001, children were eligible to attend Pre-year 1 in WA if they turned five any time during the year and kindergarten if they turned four. In 2001 the entry age for kindergarten was changed (to those who were four by 30 June 2001), resulting in a half cohort entering the system. This same half cohort entered Pre-year 1 in 2002. In 2003 a full cohort will be attending Pre-year 1 and the half cohort moves to year one. The half cohort will exit the system in 2014.
- **6** Emergency and casual relief teaching staff employed on a casual basis are not included in this collection, as they replace permanent teaching staff absent for short periods of time. These permanent teaching staff are already counted in this collection.
- **7** Education services in Jervis Bay Territory are provided by the Australian Capital Territory Department of Education, Youth and Family Services, through Commonwealth Government funding. For the purposes of the NSSC, figures for Jervis Bay Territory are included in statistics for the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). As at August 2002, there was one government primary school in Jervis Bay Territory with 80 students (none part-time), 7.6 FTE teaching staff and 5.6 FTE non-teaching staff.
- **8** Table 15 shows part-time secondary students by year of school education and state/territory. Part-time secondary student data was included in the publication for the first time in 1995. Information about part-time primary school students was included in this publication for the first time in 2001.
- **9** The census date for the collection for all states and territories is the first Friday in August each year. For 2002 this was 2 August. The age reference date was 1 July for all states and territories.

METHODOLOGY

- **10** The statistics were compiled from collections conducted in cooperation with the Ministerial Council on Education, Employment, Training and Youth Affairs, by the state and territory Departments of Education (government series), and the Commonwealth Department of Education, Science and Training (non-government series).
- **11** The methodologies employed in compiling the government sector aggregates on which the statistics in this publication are based vary between the different state and territory Departments of Education. They range from manipulation of central administrative records to direct collection of data from establishments.
- **12** The Commonwealth Department of Education, Science and Training collects data directly from establishments in the non-government sector for all states and territories. The non-government sector statistics in this publication are a summary of results from that collection.

INTERPRETATION OF RESULTS

- 13 The ABS has published school education statistics for many years. However, prior to the implementation of the NSSC, the data were not necessarily comparable between states and territories. With the implementation of the NSSC concepts, the definitions, classifications and coverage were revised. The new government series was implemented in 1981 and the non-government series in 1984. Therefore, particular care should be exercised when comparing data in this publication with that prior to 1981 and 1984 for the government and non-government series respectively, and between the two series from 1981 to 1983. In interpreting the figures in this publication, users should be aware that comparability of statistics between states and territories and between government and non-government schools in any one state or territory is affected by differences in the organisation of grades, policy on student intake and advancement, flows from secondary to vocational education, and the recruitment and employment of teachers.
- 14 There is no Australia-wide standard method of allocating students and classes to a certain year of school education (grade). A number of schools (other than special schools) do not maintain a formal grade structure. Students at these schools have been allocated to equivalent grades where possible, but otherwise appear against the ungraded category in either the primary or secondary level of school education.
- **15** Tables 1, 2, 4 and 5 include counts of the number of schools in a time series format. The number of schools in a particular year can be affected by structural change in the composition of schooling rather than necessarily a change in the number of sites delivering full-time school education. For example, if several schools amalgamated into one large and complex multi-campus school or if a primary school and a secondary school combined into one school, the statistics would show a decrease in the number of schools.

APPARENT RETENTION RATES

- **16** To calculate the apparent retention rate at the Australia level (as shown in table 11), the total number of full-time students in Year 12 in 2002 is divided by the number of full-time students in the base year, which is Year 7 in NSW, Victoria (Vic.), Tas. and the ACT in 1997 and Year 8 in Qld, SA, WA and the NT in 1998 (since those years represent the commencement of the secondary school system in the respective state or territory). The resultant figure is converted to a percentage. In tables 12 and 13 the base year becomes Year 10 and the retention year remains at Year 12. In table 14 the base year is Year 7/8 but the retention years are Years 9, 10, 11 and 12.
- **17** Care should be exercised in the interpretation of apparent retention rates as the method of calculation does not take into account a range of factors. At the Australia level these include students repeating a year of education, migration and other net changes to the school population. At lower levels of disaggregation, additional factors affecting the data, such as enrolment policies (which contribute to different age/grade structures between states and territories), inter-sector transfer and interstate movements of

students, have not been taken into account. Particularly in small jurisdictions, relatively small changes in student numbers can create apparently large movements in retention rates. Part-time students are currently excluded from apparent retention rates; the effect of this exclusion varies between states and territories.

FTE STUDENT/TEACHING STAFF RATIOS **18** FTE student/teaching staff ratios are included in this publication for the first time. FTE student/teaching staff ratios are calculated by dividing the number of FTE students by the number of FTE teaching staff. Student/teaching staff ratios should not be used as a measure of class size.

DISCONTINUITIES IN THE SERIES

- **19** Since 1989, staff have been categorised in the collection according to their major function. This means that some staff who were previously included in teaching staff are now not included. Users are advised to be aware of this when comparing teaching staff figures published prior to 1989 with those for later years. Also, executive staff have been included in non-school staff since 1989.
- **20** Since 1990, students attending special schools have not been identified separately, and have been allocated to either the primary or secondary level of school education. From 1990, staff in special schools have also not been identified separately, and have been allocated to either the primary or secondary level of school education.
- **21** The Tasmanian Department of Education has advised that a change in the Early Childhood Admission Policy, commencing in 1993, has resulted in a change in the enrolment pattern of students in Preparatory and Year 1. Also, commencing in 1996, the definition of the load of a full-time secondary student attending Years 11 and 12 has changed from 450 annual student contact hours to 600. The Department has further advised that, commencing in 1999, students previously identified as ungraded are being included in the normal school grade structure. This may affect apparent retention rates, however the impact is expected to be negligible given the small number of students involved.
- 22 The Northern Territory Department of Employment, Education and Training has advised that, commencing in 1995, students identified as secondary-aged in remote Aboriginal schools have been reclassified to the ungraded secondary category, as these students cannot be readily classified into the normal urban secondary grade structure. The removal of these students from the calculation of apparent retention rates is partially responsible for the apparent increase in these rates from 1997 (for the Year 10 to Year 12 rate), and from 1999 (for the Year 8 to Year 12 rate).
- **23** As a result of changed reporting methodology in 1995, non-government school staff who are not based at a particular school, but who are mainly active in schools, are now included in the published figures.
- **24** The New South Wales Department of Education and Training reviewed its educational establishments in 2002 and identified a number of special schools, previously out of scope, that now satisfied the scope requirements for inclusion in the NSSC. Some of these schools were deemed in scope for 2000 and 2001 and therefore some minor revisions have been made to the data for these two years. Additionally, eleven new Behaviour Disorder schools which were opened in 2002 are in scope of the NSSC.

GENERAL ACKNOWLEDGMENT

25 This publication draws extensively on information provided freely by education organisations. Their continued cooperation is very much appreciated: without it, the wide range of education statistics published by the ABS would not be available. Information received by the ABS is treated in strict confidence as required by the *Census and Statistics Act, 1905*.

APPENDIX STRUCTURE OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS

CURRENT STRUCTURE OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLING

The structure of primary and secondary schooling in Australia varies between states and territories. There are three basic patterns evident, as illustrated below:

- in NSW, Vic., Tas. and the ACT primary education comprises a Pre-year 1 grade followed by Years 1 to 6. In NSW and the ACT, Pre-year 1 is called Kindergarten, and in Vic. and Tas. it is called Preparatory. Secondary education comprises Years 7 to 12
- in SA, WA and the NT primary education comprises a Pre-year 1 grade followed by Years 1 to 7. In SA, Pre-year 1 is called Reception, in WA it is called Pre-primary and in the NT it is called Transition. For the first time in 2002, Pre-year 1 students in WA are attending 5 days a week and are in scope of the NSSC. Secondary education comprises Years 8 to 12
- in Qld primary education comprises Years 1 to 7 and secondary education Years 8 to 12.

Each state and territory also has a preschool sector which is separate from primary and secondary schooling. Data on preschool education within schools have been excluded from primary enrolments in this publication.

Variations to the structure of schooling also occur over time. See paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Notes regarding the inclusion (in 2002) of Pre-year 1 students in WA.

GLOSSARY

Affiliation of non-government schools

Affiliation refers to the link between the individual non-government schools and the systems that administer their operation. In Australia the largest non-government affiliated group is the Catholic school system. Other schools have loose associations with religious or secular bodies or are entirely independent. In this publication non-government schools are only reported at the level of Catholic or other non-government (independent).

Apparent retention rate

This is the number of full-time school students in a designated level/year of education expressed as a percentage of their respective cohort group (which is either at the commencement of their secondary schooling or Year 10). In this publication, apparent retention rates are generally calculated for full-time school students who continued to Year 12 of secondary schooling. A separate comparison has been included for retention rates for Indigenous and non-Indigenous school students who continued to Years 9, 10, 11 or 12. See Explanatory Notes, paragraph 16 for details of how apparent retention rates are calculated.

Category of school

This is the classification of schools to the government or non-government sector for the purposes of this collection.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) teaching staff

This is a measure of the total level of teaching staff resources used. The FTE of a full-time teaching staff member (i.e. employed full-time and engaged solely on activities which fall within the scope of this collection) is equal to 1.0.

The calculation of FTE for part-time teaching staff is as follows:

- the FTE of part-time teaching staff performing some activities which fall outside the scope of this collection (e.g. preschool or TAFE) is calculated on the basis of the proportion of time spent on in-scope activities compared with that spent by a full-time teaching staff member solely occupied by in-scope activities
- the FTE of part-time teaching staff performing activities which fall solely within the scope of this collection is calculated on the basis of time worked compared with that worked by full-time teaching staff performing similar duties.

Some states and territories are not able to calculate FTE on a time-spent basis for all teaching staff functions but use wages paid as a fraction of full-time rate, or a resource allocation based formula. Some also use a pro rata formula based on student or teacher numbers to estimate aggregate FTE for some categories of teaching staff.

Indigenous student

An Indigenous student is a student of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin. Note that, at present, the way in which Indigenous status is determined varies across states and territories.

Level and Year of education

Level of education is split into primary and secondary school education. Year of education comprises Pre-year 1 through to Year 12, plus ungraded primary and ungraded secondary.

Other education establishment

Other establishments within the scope of these statistics, but not defined as schools include:

- administrative offices which have as their major activity the administration of primary, secondary or special education
- teacher resource centres operated by a state or territory Director-General of Education (or equivalent).

Primary education

Primary education typically commences at around age five and lasts for seven to eight years. It does not include sessional education such as preschool education. In NSW, Vic., Tas. and the ACT, primary education may extend from Pre-year 1 to Year 6 (or equivalent). In SA, WA (from 2002) and the NT it may extend from Pre-year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent). In Qld it may extend from Year 1 to Year 7 (or equivalent).

School

A school (other than a special school) must satisfy the following criteria:

 its major activity is the provision of full-time day primary or secondary education or the provision of primary or secondary distance education

School continued

- it is headed by a principal (or equivalent) responsible for its internal operation
- it is possible for students to enrol for a minimum of four continuous weeks, excluding breaks for school vacations.

The term 'school' in this publication includes schools in institutions and hospitals, mission schools and similar establishments. The term excludes preschools, kindergarten centres, pre-primary schools or pre-primary classes in or attached to non-special schools, senior technical and agricultural colleges, evening schools, continuation classes and institutions such as business or coaching colleges.

School age participation rate

The school age participation rate is the number of full-time school students of a particular age expressed as a proportion of the Estimated Resident Population of the same age at June (published in cat. no. 3201.0). It indicates the proportion of the resident population who are at school. Whereas apparent retention rates rely on students having to progress year by year through the school education system, participation rates relate to the resident population as a whole. In the ACT some rates exceed 100%. This is mainly due to the enrolment of secondary school students in ACT secondary schools who are not residents of the ACT, but live in surrounding NSW regions.

Secondary education

Secondary education typically commences after completion of primary education, at around age 12, and lasts for five or six years. In NSW, Vic., Tas. and the ACT, secondary education may extend from Year 7 to Year 12 (or equivalent). In Qld, SA, WA, and the NT it may extend from Year 8 to Year 12 (or equivalent). Part-time secondary student estimates vary considerably between states and territories, as each education authority has different policy and organisational arrangements. The number of part-time courses available also varies considerably between states and territories. Age level data for part-time students are not published as not all states and territories collect the age of part-time students.

Special school

A special school provides special instruction for physically and/or mentally disabled or impaired students, or those with social problems. Students must exhibit one or more of the following characteristics before enrolment is allowed:

- mental or physical disability or impairment
- slow learning ability
- social or emotional problems and/or
- in custody, on remand or in hospital.

Student

A student is a person who is formally enrolled in a school and active in a course of study other than preschool or TAFE courses. Students not present at school on the National Schools Statistics Collection census date were included if they were expected to be absent for less than four continuous weeks (excluding school vacations) and were excluded if they had left the school or had been absent without explanation for four continuous weeks (excluding school vacations) prior to the census date.

A full-time student is one who undertakes a workload equivalent to, or greater than, that prescribed for a full-time student of that year level. This may vary between states and territories and from year to year.

A part-time student is one who undertakes a workload less than that specified as full-time.

The FTE of part-time students has been calculated by dividing the student's workload into that which is considered to be a full workload by that state or territory. To calculate the FTE of all students the FTE of part-time students is added to the number of full-time students.

GLOSSARY continued

Teaching staff

Teaching staff are staff who spend the majority of their time in contact with students. They support students either by direct class contact or on an individual basis, and have teaching duties, that is, are engaged to impart school curriculum. For the purposes of this collection, teaching staff includes principals, deputy principals and senior teachers mainly involved in administration.

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
