



CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

There are no changes in this issue.

REVISIONS

Revisions since the last issue of this publication have:

- decreased total exports for the June quarter 1999 by \$19 million, and increased total exports for the year ended June 1999 by \$17 million;
- decreased total imports for the June quarter 1999 by \$6 million, and decreased total imports for the year ended June 1999 by \$10 million; and
- increased the merchandise trade deficit for the June quarter 1999 by \$14 million, and decreased the merchandise trade deficit for the year ended June 1999 by \$27 million.

These revisions resulted from generally small changes to a large number of commodities and countries, with no significant contributor.

QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the September quarter 1999 merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$4,180 million, an \$856 million increase from the merchandise trade deficit recorded in the June quarter 1999.


Australias's trade with its major trading partners produced deficits with:

- USA, up \$316 million (11%) to \$3,297 million;
- Germany, down \$20 million (2%) to \$1,085 million;
- China, up \$469 million (120%) to \$860 million; and
- United Kingdom, up \$69 million (13%) to \$615 million.

Surpluses were recorded with:

- Japan, up \$379 million (84%) to \$828 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$96 million (15%) to \$537 million;
- New Zealand, up \$13 million (3%) to \$521 million; and
- Taiwan, down \$60 million (19%) to \$248 million.


AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES, Excess of exports (+) or imports (-)



MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for September quarter 1999 were \$21,895 million, up \$1,598 million or 8% on the previous quarter.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

The export commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous quarter were:

- commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC, up \$557 million (30%) to \$2,384 million (due mainly to increased exports of confidential items; and non-monetary gold);
- mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$544 million (17%) to \$3,752 million (due mainly to increased exports of petroleum);
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$179 million (7%) to \$2,736 million (due mainly to increased exports of non-ferrous metals and non-metallic mineral manufactures); and
- food and live animals, up \$113 million (3%) to \$3,922 million (due mainly to increased exports of meat; and vegetables and fruit).

The only commodity groups to record a decrease were chemical and related products, n.e.s., down \$18 million (2%) to \$952 million, and animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes, down \$8 million (10%) to \$70 million.


In the September quarrter 1999 the major export destinations for Australia's goods were:

- Japan, up \$553 million (15%) to \$4,350 million;
- USA, up \$214 million (11%) to \$2,236 million;
- New Zealand, up \$95 million (6%) to \$1,593 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$136 million (9%) to \$1,412 million;
- Singapore, up \$147 million (14%) to \$1,208 million;
- China, up \$116 million (12%) to \$1,048 million;
- Taiwan, down \$5 million to \$1,014 million; and
- United Kingdom, up \$74 million (10%) to \$800 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for September quarter 1999 were \$26,076 million, up \$2,456 million or 10% on the previous quarter.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS continued

The import commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous quarter were:

- *miscellaneous manufactured articles*, up \$828 million (26%) to \$4,031 million (due partly to increased imports of apparel and footwear);
- machinery and transport equipment, up \$696 million (6%) to \$12,124 million (due mainly to increased imports of machinery specialised for particular industries; and road vehicles);
- manufactured good classified chiefly by material, up \$380 million (13%) to \$3,387 million (due mainly to increased imports of textile yarn and fabrics; and paper); and
- *mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials*, up \$248 million (19%) to \$1,553 million (due mainly to increased imports of petroleum).

The only commodity group to record a decrease was *animal and vegetable oils, fats and waxes*, down \$14 million (17%) to \$67 million.

In the September quarter 1999 the major sources for Australian imports were:

- USA, up \$531 million (11%) to \$5,533 million;
- Japan, up \$175 million (5%) to \$3,523 million;
- China, up \$585 million (44%) to \$1,908 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$143 million (11%) to \$1,415 million;
- Germany, down \$52 million (4%) to \$1,374 million;
- New Zealand, up \$81 million (8%) to \$1,071 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$40 million (4%) to \$875 million; and
- Singapore, down \$74 million (9%) to \$788 million.

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the year ended September 1999 merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$13,016 million, an increase of \$7,638 million from the deficit recorded for the previous year.


Australia's trade with its major trading partners produced deficits with:

- USA, up \$393 million (3%) to \$12,855 million;
- Germany, up \$360 million (9%) to \$4,569 million;
- China, up \$372 million (20%) to \$2,237 million; and
- United Kingdom, down \$113 million (6%) to \$1,713 million.

Surpluses were recorded with:

- Japan, down \$1,809 million (39%) to \$2,827 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$500 million (25%) to \$2,498 million;
- New Zealand, up \$27 million (1%) to \$1,931 million; and
- Taiwan, down \$199 million (14%) to \$1,189 million.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the year ended September 1999 were \$85,078 million, down \$4,002 million or 4% on the previous year.


The exports commodity groups recording significant decreases on the previous year were:

- mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, down \$1,515 million (10%) to \$13,961 million (with all categories contributing to the decrease, coal being the most significant);
- commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC, down \$1,216 million (12%) to \$9,229 million (due mainly to decreased exports of non-monetary gold);
- crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$1,051 million (6%) to \$16,859
 million (due mainly to decreased exports of textile fibres); and
- manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$472 million (4%) to \$10,170 million (due mainly to decreased exports of iron and steel).

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

The most significant increase was recorded for chemical and related products n.e.s., up \$295 million (9%) to \$3,643 million (due mainly to the increased exports of medicinal and pharmaceutical products). Increases were also recorded for miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$227 million (7%) to \$3,473 million; and beverages and tobacco, up \$216 million (19%) to \$1,327 million.


COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations for the year ended September 1999 were:

- Japan, down \$1,162 million (7%) to \$16,480 million;
- USA, down \$104 million (1%) to \$8,085 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$23 million to \$6,127 million;
- New Zealand, up \$282 million (5%) to \$5,950 million;
- Taiwan, down \$134 million (3%) to \$4,142 million;
- China, up \$284 million (8%) to \$4,052 million;
- Singapore, up \$602 million (18%) to \$3,997 million; and
- United Kingdom, down \$263 million (7%) to \$3,689 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS


Merchandise imports for the year ended September 1999 were \$98,094 million, up \$3,636 million or 4% on the previous year.

The imports commodity groups recording significant increases on the previous year were:

- machinery and transport equipment, up \$2,429 million (6%) to \$45,896 million (due mainly to increased imports of telecommunications and sound recording and reproducing apparatus and equipment; and road vehicles);
- *chemical and related products n.e.s.*, up \$924 million (9%) to \$11,576 million (due mainly to increased imports of medicinal and pharmaceutical products; and organic chemicals); and
- *mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials*, up \$764 million (18%) to \$5,096 million (due mainly to increased imports of petroleum).

The only significant decrease was recorded for *commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC*, down \$834 million (29%) to \$2,069 million (due mainly to decreased imports of non-monetary gold).

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS




Australia's major import sources for the year ended September 1999 were:

- USA, up \$289 million (1%) to \$20,940 million;
- Japan, up \$647 million (5%) to \$13,653 million;
- China, up \$656 million (12%) to \$6,289 million;
- Germany, up \$323 million (6%) to \$5,894 million;
- United Kingdom, down \$376 million (7%) to \$5,402 million;
- New Zealand, up \$255 million (7%) to \$4,019 million;
- Republic of Korea, down \$477 million (12%) to \$3,629 million; and
- Singapore, up \$407 million (15%) to \$3,069 million.

AUSTRALIA'S MERCHANDISE TRADE WITH THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA

INTRODUCTION

This article examines the growth in merchandise trade between Australia and the Republic of Korea (subsequently referred to as Korea) over the period July 1989 to June 1999. It analyses the trade flows between Australia and Korea and the importance of this trade for Australia in terms of the various commodities exported and imported. An update on performance in the September quarter 1999 is also included.

The statistics are presented on an international trade basis (rather than a balance of payments basis) and are classified according to the Standard International Trade Classification Rev. 3 (SITC).

TOTAL TRADE FLOWS BETWEEN AUSTRALIA AND KOREA

Tables A (exports) and B (imports) show the value of Australia's trade flows with Korea by broad commodity for the 10 years to June 1999. Table C shows the proportion of Australia's world wide exports and imports that are traded with Korea, and the excess of exports over imports (the balance of merchandise trade) for each of the 10 years. Data are shown on a financial year basis.



TOTAL TRADE FLOWS BETWEEN AUSTRALIA AND KOREA continued


Over the past 10 years Korea's importance to Australia as an export destination has increased marginally from 6% to 7% of Australia's global merchandise exports, although the share has fallen off in the past two years. Over the same period its share of Australia's imports doubled from 2% to 4% (see Table C).

Between 1989–90 and 1998–99 the value of Australia's total trade (exports plus imports) with Korea increased by 158% from \$3,954 million to \$10,214 million, and Korea's share of Australia's total trade rose from 4% to 6%. Australia's total exports increased by 75% over the period while our exports to Korea increased by 134%. Similarly, while total Australian imports increased by 90%, imports from Korea increased by 211% (see Graphs 1 and 2).




GRAPH 1: AUSTRALIA'S TOTAL MERCHANDISE TRADE






TOTAL TRADE FLOWS BETWEEN AUSTRALIA AND KOREA continued

Korea was Australia's third most important export destination behind Japan and the United States for most of the ten year period, except during the period 1994–95 to 1996–97 when exports to Korea exceeded exports to the United States (see Graph 3).

Over the last ten financial years, Korea increased in importance as an import supplier to Australia. It peaked as Australia's sixth largest import supplier in 1997–98 before declining to seventh position in 1998–99 (see Graph 4).




GRAPH 4: MAJOR AUSTRALIAN IMPORT SOURCES, Share of total Australian merchandise imports - 1998-99

From Korea's perspective, Australia is more important as an import source than an export destination. In 1998–99, Australia was the destination for only 2% of Korea's exports and the source of 5% of Korea's imports - a small increase over the corresponding percentages for 1989–90 of 1% and 4% respectively. $^{\rm 1}$

AUSTRALIA'S BALANCE OF TRADE WITH KOREA


Australia has recorded merchandise trade surpluses with Korea in each of the last 10 financial years. The surplus grew progressively from \$1,446 million in 1989–90 to \$4,584 million in 1996–97 before declining to \$2,426 million in 1998–99, due largely to reduced exports of non-monetary gold from Australia (see Graph 5).

As a proportion of the value of total merchandise trade (exports plus imports) between Australia and Korea, the trade surplus with Korea increased from 37% in 1989–90 to 47% in 1991–92, before declining to 40% in 1992–93. The surplus subsequently peaked at 49% in 1995–96, but then declined to 24% in 1998–99 (see Graph 6).



The continuing trade surplus with Korea contrasts with Australia's persistent trade deficit with the rest of the world since 1994–95 (see Graph 5). Expanding trade deficits with the United States of America and the European Union have been only partially offset by surpluses with Korea and Japan (see Graph 7).


GRAPH 7: AUSTRALIA'S BALANCE OF TRADE BY MAJOR TRADING PARTNERS



SEPTEMBER QUARTER 1999 UPDATE

In the September quarter 1999, Australia's merchandise trade surplus with Korea was \$537 million, a decrease on the surplus of \$633 million recorded in the June quarter 1999 and an increase on the surplus of \$465 million recorded for the corresponding quarter in 1998. The fall in the surplus since the June quarter 1999 is the result of a decline in Australia's total merchandise exports to Korea (mainly non-monetary gold, coal and metal ores). Between the September quarter 1998 and September quarter 1999, exports to Korea declined by 12% - from \$1,606 million to \$1,412 million, while imports from Korea decreased by 23% - from \$1,141 million to \$875 million (see Graph 8).

COMMODITY ANALYSIS OF TRADE WITH KOREA


COMMODITY ANALYSIS OF TRADE WITH KOREA continued

EXPORTS

Some of the data in Tables D and E are affected by confidentiality restrictions. In making comparisons at the commodity level it should be noted that, in Australia's international trade statistics, confidential commodity data are not reported against the commodity, but rather are classified to *combined confidential items of trade* (SITC 98). While confidentiality restrictions do not affect total import and export statistics, they do affect data comparability at the commodity level. In particular it should be noted that Australia's export commodity statistics with Korea are affected by confidentiality restrictions.

In 1998–99 *non-monetary gold* (SITC 97) was the largest commodity by value exported to Korea. Australia's exports of non-monetary gold to Korea grew steadily for most of the period from 1989–90, so that by 1996–97 the value of exports had reached \$2,502 million (see Graph 9), at which time Korea became our most important destination for this commodity. Much of the growth occurred "in response to restrictions on foreign exchange trading laws in South Korea which have encouraged arbitragers to re-export gold to profit from the difference between South Korean interest rates and international borrowing costs"². This continued at a reduced level into 1997–98 (see imports commodity analysis for more details) but by 1998–99 "moves in South Korea to disallow such schemes, and the heightened risk of foreign exchange losses (with the large depreciation of the won)"³ had significantly affected demand for gold with Australian exports declining to \$1,097 million.




In 1989–90 and 1998–99 *crude materials* (SITC 2) was the largest group of commodities by value exported from Australia to Korea. In 1998–99 exports of crude materials accounted for \$1.4 billion (22%) of Australia's exports to Korea - up 79% on the \$789 million (29%) in 1989–90, but down on the approximately 30% share achieved in the early 1990's.

The largest component of SITC 2 is *iron ore and concentrates* (SITC 281). The value of Australia's iron ore exports to Korea rose from 1989–90 to 1992–93 but fell between 2% and 6% over the following three years due to lower global iron ore prices. While exports of iron ore to Korea increased slightly in 1996-97, these exports rose 13% to \$480 million in 1997–98 and a further 17% to \$561 million in 1998–99 (see Graph 10). For most of the period Korea was the third most important destination for Australia's iron ore exports, behind Japan and China. While export statistics for iron ore are affected by confidentiality restrictions during the years 1989–90 and 1990–91, the data for the years from 1991–92 include the value of iron ore exports to Korea.

Ores and concentrates of base metal (SITC 287) were the next largest export to Korea in the crude materials group, having increased from \$190 million in 1989–90 to \$293 million in 1998–99. While the value of exports of base metal ores dropped below \$190 million for all years until 1998-99, some ores (principally manganese, rutile, ilmenite, leucoxene and zirconium) which would otherwise be classified to SITC 287 are included in combined confidential items of trade (SITC 98) for some or all of the period.


The next largest export to Korea within the SITC 28 group is *copper ores and concentrates* (SITC 283) with exports rising from \$0.4 million in 1989–90 to \$126 million in 1998–99. Korea increased its market share of Australia's exports of copper ores from 0.2% in 1989–90 to 13% in 1998–99 at which time it ranked fourth behind Japan, India and China as an export destination for these goods.


The second major category of Australian exports to Korea is *mineral fuels and lubricants* (SITC 3) which increased in value in each successive year from \$526 million in 1989–90 to \$1,420 million in 1996–97 but declined to \$1,333 million in 1998–99. In 1989–90 these exports made up 19% of total Australian exports to Korea, while by 1998–99 they had grown to 21% of Australia's exports to Korea. Korea's importance as a market for exports of Australian *mineral fuels and lubricants* (SITC 3) grew over the ten year period. In 1989–90, 6% of total Australian exports of this commodity were to Korea and in 1998–99 the percentage share had increased to 9%.

Coal, not agglomerated (SITC 321) has been the main export under mineral fuels and lubricants (SITC 3) throughout the ten year period. The value of coal exports to Korea climbed steadily from \$489 million in 1989–90 to \$930 million in 1993–94. In subsequent years the value fluctuated due to variations in \$US contract prices while the quantity increased progressively until 1998–99. In 1998–99 the value and volume of coal exported to Korea fell due to reduced demand for Australian coal, as a result of the Asian economic crisis (see Graph 11). However it should be noted that since July 1995 exports of semi-soft coking metallurgical coal to Korea have been subject to confidentiality restrictions and are now included in combined confidential items of trade (SITC 98). In 1994–95 metallurgical coal exports to Korea were valued at \$176 million.

Throughout the ten years Korea has been the second largest market behind Japan for Australian coal. Australian exports of coal to Korea accounted for 11% of our world wide exports of these goods in 1998–99, up from 8% in 1989–90.



Another important export to Korea within SITC 3 is *crude petroleum oil* (SITC 333) with exports rising strongly from \$23 million in 1989–90 to \$246 million in 1998–99 (see Graph 12). This represents 4% of Australia's exports to Korea and 15% of Australia's worldwide exports of crude petroleum. By the end of the decade Korea was the fourth most important export destination for this commodity behind United States, Taiwan and Japan.



Exports of *machinery and transport equipment* (SITC 7) to Korea increased in each year to 1997–98 before declining in 1998–99. The major commodity in this group is *internal combustion piston engines* (SITC 713) with Korea being Australia's principal market. In 1989–90 exports of these engines were worth \$4 million, representing less than 1% of Australia's exports to Korea. By 1997–98 exports of internal combustion piston engines had risen to a high of \$269 million before declining to \$129 million in 1998–99, representing 4% and 2% respectively, of Australia's exports to Korea (see Graph 13). The decrease in exports of engines during 1998–99 was largely due to a decline in automotive production in Korea as a result of the Asian economic crisis.

The value of exports of *food and live animals* (SITC 0) to Korea is affected by confidentiality restrictions over the ten years to 1998–99. Exports of sugar, wheat and lupins which would otherwise be classified to SITC 0, are included in *commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere* (SITC 9) for part of the ten year period. Wheat exports to Korea (which amounted to \$149 million in 1990–91) are excluded from SITC 0 from December 1991 onwards, and exports of lupins (which amounted to \$17 million in 1992–93) are excluded from July 1993 onwards. Sugar exports are excluded up until January 1996, and again from August 1997. The \$483 million recorded for SITC 0 for 1996-97 includes sugar exports of \$243 million.

Since 1992–93 the largest group of commodities by value imported into Australia from Korea is *machinery and transport equipment* (SITC 7). Imports of these goods accounted for 47% of Australia's total imports from Korea in 1998–99, having grown from 29% in 1989–90. Korea was the sixth most important source of Australia's total imports of machinery and transport equipment in 1998–99. The largest single component of this group is *road vehicles* (SITC 78).


Between the years 1992–93 and 1997–98 there was a dramatic increase in the value of imports of road vehicles from Korea. In 1997–98 imports were \$977 million representing 26% of Australian imports from Korea, a thirteen fold increase on the 1989–90 level of \$69 million (or 6% of imports from Korea). As a source of Australia's worldwide imports of road vehicles, Korea's share increased from 1% in 1989–90 to 9% in 1997–98.

Within the road vehicle group, imports of *passenger motor vehicles* (SITC 781) are the most significant single component. Imports of passenger motor vehicles grew between 1992–93 and 1997–98, before declining to \$641 million the following year. The increase can be attributed to: imported passenger motor vehicles replacing locally manufactured vehicles (from 1990 the number of car models manufactured in Australia decreased from eight to five)⁴; growth in demand for smaller, cheaper cars such as those manufactured in Korea and Japan; and aggressive marketing by Korean companies which led to an increase in Korea's share of Australia's passenger motor vehicle market. The decline in 1998–99 can be attributed to both the economic crisis in Korea and an oversupply of Korean made passenger motor vehicles in Australia (see Graph 14).



In 1998–99, passenger motor vehicles accounted for 16% of Australia's total imports from Korea (down from 32% and 25% in 1996–97 and 1997–98 respectively). Korea accounted for 10% of total Australian passenger motor vehicle imports in 1998–99 (down from 17% and 15% in the 2 previous financial years) (see Graph 15).






Imports of *telecommunications and sound apparatus* (SITC 76) from Korea rose by 271% over the ten year period, from \$130 million in 1989–90 to \$482 million in 1998–99. Imports of these goods from Korea increased from 10% of our total Korean imports in 1989–90 to 12% in 1998–99.

An increasingly important component of *telecommunications and sound apparatus* (SITC 76) over the ten year period was *telecommunications equipment not elsewhere specified* (SITC 764), mainly cellular mobile telephones. Since 1994–95 imports of this equipment have contributed more than half of the value to imports of *telecommunications and sound apparatus* (SITC 76). By 1998–99 imports of *telecommunications equipment not elsewhere specified* (SITC 764) had increased to \$375 million, a fourteen fold increase on the value in 1989–90. Korea is now the third most important import supplier of these products after Japan and the United States (see Graph 16).


IMPORTS continued





Australia's imports from Korea of goods in the category *commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere* (SITC 9) have shown the most dramatic increase over the ten year period. Most of the growth occurred in 1997–98 and 1998–99 and was largely driven by imports of *non-monetary gold* (SITC 97), which increased from only \$31 million in 1996–97, to \$678 million in 1997–98 and \$859 million in 1998–99 (see Graph 17).

Much of the increase is due to gold that was initially exported from Australia to Korea, rolled into plate in Korea, and returned to Australia for processing into bullion and subsequent export. This situation arose out of attempts by Korean authorities to control arbitrage driven gold import-export schemes, previously undertaken by Korean trading houses, by requiring gold to be value added when shipped through Korea.⁵

Non-monetary gold (SITC 97) imports grew from a negligible share of total Australian imports from Korea and total gold imports in 1989–90, to 22% and 37% respectively in 1998–99. Korea was the major source of Australian non-monetary gold imports for 1997–98 and 1998–99.

CONCLUSION

Over the ten financial years to 1998–99, Korea became increasingly more important as a trading partner for Australia. Korea's share of Australian exports of non-monetary gold, coal, petroleum and internal combustion piston engines all increased over the period, with the largest percentage increase being in internal combustion piston engines. In terms of Australia's imports from Korea, the main increases were in passenger motor vehicles, telecommunications equipment and non-monetary gold, with non-monetary gold showing the largest percentage increase. While Australia has maintained a trade surplus with Korea for the entire period, the surplus fell from 1997–98 due largely to the impact of the Asian economic crisis on Australia's exports to Korea.

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation.

RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

3 The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

4 International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

5 Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2 000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1 000.

For exports only:

- sales of aircraft (and parts or components) which were imported into Australia prior to 1 July 1987 for use on overseas routes;
- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- from 1 July 1986 individual transaction lines (within an export consignment) where the value of the goods is less than \$500. Prior to that date, the value level was \$250.

COVERAGE continued

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft;
- prior to 1 July 1987 the delivery of certain ships and aircraft (and parts and components) intended for use on overseas routes; and
- consignments screened free or entered on informal clearance documents
 (ICDs) for values not exceeding \$250 are excluded. From July 1998 individual
 transactions lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the
 value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded
 from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

BASIS OF COMPILATION

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in Table 25.

STATISTICAL PERIOD

- **10** From January 1988, exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia. Prior to January 1988, exports are recorded in the month in which the entries were processed by the Customs. For further details on the impact of the changed compilation basis on the merchandise export series refer to the article 'Changed timing basis for compilation of merchandise exports statistics' in the June 1992 issue of this publication.
- **11** Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 85% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. When the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

VALUATION

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment and enter an approximate value must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** Changes in Customs valuation introduced from 1 July 1989 with the *Customs and Excise Legislation Amendment Act 1989* are likely to have marginally raised Customs valuations. Data for periods from 1 July 1989 are therefore not fully comparable with data for previous periods. However, investigations of imports valuations, for years before and after the change have shown no measurable effect on the valuation of imports that can be attributed to the change in legislation. For details of the changes in legislation see the note 'Change in the Valuation of Imports' at the beginning of the Explanatory Notes of the 1989–1990 issue of *Foreign Trade, Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables* (Cat. no. 5410.0).
- **16** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions. External territories under Australian administration are treated as separate countries while self-governing territories and dependent territories under the administration of other countries may be treated as individual countries in Australian international merchandise trade statistics.
- **17** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **18** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **19** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **20** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

COUNTRY

COUNTRY continued

- **21** The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:
- Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);
- Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);
- Developing Countries (DCs);
- European Union (EU).
- **22** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- **23** More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra (02) 6252 5409.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

- **24** Commodity export and import statistics in Tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) with the addition of dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.
- **25** Tables 31 and 32 of this publication are presented according to the second revision of SITC up to December 1987 and according to SITC Rev3 from January 1988. See Appendix B of the 1988–1989 issue of *Foreign Trade Australia: Comparative and Summary Tables* (5410.0) for details of Divisions significantly affected by this change.

STATE

- **26** State information for exports presented in Table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **27** State information for imports presented in Table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

28 Exports and imports statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in Tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the main economic activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification*, *1993 Edition* (Cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

29 Merchandise trade in Tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

30 Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. More details on the confidentiality process can be obtained from the *Confidentiality Manager* on Canberra (02) 6252 5409.

RELIABILITY

31 Statistics in this publication for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
