



CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

This issue contains two feature articles. The first, *Experimental statistics on Australia's exporters and importers*, analyses the characteristics and international trading activities of Australia's exporters and importers, based on the Australian Business Number (ABN). The second, *The effect of Customs changes on export statistics*, discusses the changes introduced by Customs on 1 July 2002 to the export entry threshold and their impact on export statistics.

REVISIONS

Revisions since the last issue of this publication have:

- decreased total merchandise exports for the March quarter 2002 by \$3 million and increased them for the December quarter 2001 by \$8 million. These revisions led to an increase in total merchandise exports for the year ended March 2002 of \$5 million.
- decreased total merchandise imports for the March quarter 2002 by \$8 million and for the December quarter 2001 by \$3 million. This has led to a decrease in total merchandise imports for the year ended March 2002 of \$11 million.

These revisions combined to increase the merchandise trade surplus for the March quarter 2002 by \$4 million and to decrease the trade merchandise deficit for the December quarter 2001 by \$9 million. These revisions resulted in an increase in the merchandise trade surplus for the year ended March 2002 of \$16 million.

QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the June quarter 2002, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$330 million, or 1.1% of the value of exports. This followed a surplus of \$201 million in the March quarter 2002. The change to a deficit reflects merchandise imports rising 4.7% while merchandise exports rose 2.9%.

Australia's trade position improved with most of its major trading partners:


- USA, the deficit decreased by \$213 million (8%) to \$2,524 million;
- China, the deficit decreased by \$178 million (20%) to \$731 million;
- United Kingdom moved from a deficit of \$329 million to a surplus of \$234 million;
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by \$54 million (8%) to \$755 million; and,
- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by \$23 million (2%) to \$1,355 million.

However, Australia's trade position worsened with:

- Japan, the surplus decreased by \$869 million (43%) to \$1,145 million;
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased by \$139 million (30%) to \$328 million; and,
- Singapore, the surplus decreased by \$54 million (26%) to \$151 million.

Australia's overall trade position with its other trading partners worsened.

AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES, Excess of exports (+) or imports (-)




MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the June quarter 2002 were \$29,606 million, up \$822 million (2.9%) from the March quarter 2002. While merchandise exports typically increase in the June quarter, the increase this year was lower than the average increase experienced over the previous 6 years (8%).

The increase in merchandise exports occurred despite a decrease in the average prices received for exports. The Export Price Index fell by 2% during the June quarter 2002, mainly due to falls in *Food and live animals* (SITC group 1) and *Miscellaneous and manufactured articles* (SITC group 8). Over the year the Export Price Index decreased by 5%. For more information on the Export Price Index, see *International Trade Price Indexes*, *Australia* (Cat. no. 6457.0). Estimates of chain volume measures for exports and seasonally adjusted data will be published in the June quarter 2002 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position*, *Australia* (Cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 28 August 2002.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



Most export commodity groups recorded increases during the June quarter 2002. The most significant increases occurred in:

- *Crude materials, inedible, except fuels*, up \$368 million (7%) to \$5,531 million, due mainly to increases in Cotton (SITC 263), up \$180 million (97%), Iron ore and concentrates (SITC 281), up \$69 million (6%), and Nickel ores and concentrates (SITC 284), up \$63 million (71%). These increases were partially offset by a decrease in Oil seeds and oleaginous fruits (SITC 222), down \$192 million (52%);
- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$273 million (8%) to \$3,507 million.
 There were increases in Ships (SITC 793), up \$138 million (151%) and Internal combustion engines (SITC 713), up \$45 million (54%);
- Beverages and tobacco, up \$195 million (39%) to \$688 million. Increases in
 Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112), up \$193 million (41%) and Manufactured tobacco
 (SITC 122), up \$2 million (14%) were the main contributors; and,
- Food and live animals, up \$150 million (3%) to \$5,181 million.


The largest decrease was in *Mineral fuels, lubricants and other materials*, down \$205 million (3%) due mainly to decreases in Coal (SITC 321), down \$335 million (10%) and Natural gas (SITC 343), down \$118 million (20%).

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports increased to \$29,935 million in the June quarter 2002, up \$1,353 million (4.7%) on the March quarter 2002. As with merchandise exports, there is normally an increase in the June quarter. The increase this year was close to the average of the last 6 years (5%).

The increase in merchandise imports occurred despite a decrease in average prices received for imports. The Import Price Index fell 2% during the June quarter 2002 with a large price decrease in *Chemicals and related products* (SITC group 5). The Import Price Index fell by 7% between the June quarter 2001 and the June quarter 2002. MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



The import commodities recording significant increases on the previous quarter included:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$1,365 million (11%) to \$13,807 million, due mainly to increases in Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), up \$409 million (52%), Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up \$389 million (19%), Motor vehicles for the transportation of goods (SITC 782), up \$178 million (32%), and Automatic data processing machines (SITC 752), up \$145 million (12%). These increases were partially offset by a decrease in Aircraft (SITC 792), down \$181 million (17%);
- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$102 million (5%) to \$2,173 million. This increase was mainly attributable to Crude petroleum (SITC 333), up \$108 million (7%); and,
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$99 million (3%) to \$3,718 million with the largest increase in Textiles yarn (SITC 657) up \$56 million (47%).

Decreases occurred in Food and live animals, down \$106 million (9%), and Chemicals and related products, nes, down \$93 million (3%).

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the year ended June 2002, merchandise exports exceeded merchandise imports by \$1,495 million, or 1.2% of the value of imports. This was an increase on the surplus recorded for the year ended June 2001 (up \$273 million or 22%).


Australia's trading position improved with:

- USA, the deficit decreased by \$1,194 million (11%) to \$9,505 million;
- United Kingdom, the deficit decreased by \$645 million (39%) to \$1,023 million;
- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by \$638 million (14%) to \$5,135 million;
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by \$579 million (25%) to \$2,897 million.

However, Australia's trading position worsened with:

- Singapore, the surplus decreased by \$1,148 million (54%) to \$962 million;
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased by \$857 million (33%) to \$1,710 million;
- Japan, the surplus decreased by \$827 million (10%) to \$7,298 million; and,
- China, the deficit increased by \$456 million (15%) to \$3,496 million.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the year ended June 2002 were \$121,176 million, an increase of \$1,637 million (1.4%) over exports for the year ended June 2001.

The export commodity groups recording significant increases over this period were:


- Food and live animals, up \$948 million (5%) to \$21,707 million. This was due mainly to increases in Wheat (SITC 041), up \$393 million (10%), Live animals (SITC 001), up \$240 million (28%), and Meat and edible meat offal (SITC 012), up \$232 million (15%);
- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$701 million (5%) to \$14,140 million.
 There was a large increase in Aircraft (SITC 792), up \$708 million (116%), and a rise in Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up \$264 million (10%); and
- Beverages and tobacco, up \$362 million (18%) to \$2,355 million due mainly to an increase in Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112) of \$354 million (19%).

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

The most significant decreases were recorded for the following commodity groups:

- *Crude materials, inedible, except fuels,* down \$1,100 million (5%) to \$22,443 million, due mainly to decreases in Ores and concentrates of base metal (SITC 287), down \$504 million (26%), Cotton (SITC 263), down \$413 million (21%), and Aluminium ores and concentrates (SITC 285), down \$361 million (8%); and,
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$471 million (3%) to \$13,557 million.


COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations for the year ended June 2002 were:

- Japan, down \$726 million (3%) to \$22,769 million;
- USA, up \$340 million (3%) to \$11,992 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$650 million (7%) to \$9,856 million;
- China, up \$940 million (14%) to \$7,781 million;
- New Zealand, up \$755 million (11%) to \$7,637 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$543 million (12%) to \$5,197 million;
- Singapore, down \$1,073 million (18%) to \$4,936 million; and
- Taiwan, down \$1,051 million (18%) to \$4,843 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the year ended June 2002 were \$119,681 million, an increase of \$1,364 million (1.2%) over imports for the year ended June 2001.


The import commodity groups which recorded the largest increases were:

- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$770 million (5%) to \$14,821 million. There was an increase of \$162 million (38%) in Steel tubes and pipes (SITC 679) and a \$135 million (15%) increase in Rubber tyres (SITC 625);
- Commodities and transactions not elsewhere classified in the SITC, up \$685 million (36%) to \$2,574 million;
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$623 million (4%) to \$17,421 million.
 There were increases of \$167 million (10%) in Measuring instruments (SITC 874) and \$131 million (10%) in Baby carriages and toys (SITC 894);
- *Chemicals and related products, nes*, up \$440 million (3%) to \$14,637 million due mainly to a large increase in Medicaments (SITC 542), up \$494 million (14%).

The following commodity groups recorded decreases for the year ended June 2002:

- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, down \$1,514 million (14%) to
 \$9,033 million. There was a large decrease in Crude petroleum (SITC 333), down
 \$1,469 million (18%), as well as a fall in Liquefied propane and butane (SITC 342), down
 \$43 million (27%); and,
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$160 million (8%) to \$1,756 million, due mainly to falls in Pulp and waste paper (SITC 251), down \$102 million (31%) and Oil seeds (SITC 223), down \$55 million (93%).

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS




MERCHANDISE IMPORTS continued

Australia's major import sources for the year ended June 2002 were:

- USA, down \$854 million (4%) to \$21,497 million;
- Japan, up \$101 million (1%) to \$15,471 million;
- China, up \$1,397 million (14%) to \$11,278 million;
- Germany, up \$560 million (9%) to \$6,732 million;
- United Kingdom, down \$102 million (2%) to \$6,219 million;
- New Zealand, up \$175 million (4%) to \$4,740 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$12 million to \$4,721 million; and,
- Indonesia, up \$677 million (20%) to \$4,007 million.

INTRODUCTION

This article presents some experimental statistics on Australia's exporters and importers. Estimates for merchandise exporters and importers (businesses that trade in goods) are compiled from data sourced from the Australian Customs Service (Customs) and from the Australian Taxation Office Australian Business Register. Where appropriate, estimates for service exporters and importers compiled from the ABS Survey of International Trade in Services are also included.

The results of this study complement the data in *A Portrait of Australian Exporters: A Report Based on the Business Longitudinal Survey* (Cat. no. 8154.0), published in August 2000. The results summarised in this article are not strictly comparable with that survey due to scope and business unit differences between the collections.

The statistics on goods exporters and importers included in this article are considered experimental because they are subject to limitations in terms of the data available and methodology applied (which is described in the Appendix).

Data included in this article are for the reference period 1 July 2001 to 31 December 2001. While Australian Business Number (ABN) reporting for Customs import and export entries has been required from 1 July 2000, it took time for the proportion of entries with an ABN to reach a level sufficient for this analysis.

The ABS invites comments from users on the usefulness of these experimental statistics and the methodology applied. The ABS plans to make greater use of these techniques to add value to statistical datasets without imposing additional reporting load on businesses. CONCEPTS

GOODS Users should be aware that:

- a. the owner of the goods is not necessarily the same business or in the same industry that produced the goods e.g. agricultural products are often exported by commodity marketing authorities classified to the wholesaling industry; and businesses solely engaged in importing goods for resale are also classified as wholesalers:
- b. the larger, more complex, business groups may have a number of ABN registrations and more than one of these businesses may report merchandise exports or imports to Customs;
- c. some businesses may only have a small number of export or import entries and
 these may be insignificant in value. Businesses that had exports or imports of
 less than \$10,000 for the reference period have been excluded from the counts
 of number of exporters and importers; and
- d. some exports and imports are undertaken by entities that do not operate as businesses within Australia and so are not required to have an ABN. It is not feasible to distinguish these from businesses which did not quote an ABN to Customs, or from households which import / export goods. However, their overall contribution (by value) is estimated to be negligible.

SERVICES Information on service exporters and importers is available from the Survey of International Trade in Services (SITS). The ABS uses a wide range of information sources to maintain and update its record of businesses engaged in international trade in services. Users should be aware that:

- a. smaller and / or occasional exporters / importers of services will not come to ABS notice and will not be reflected in the statistics;
- b. information on the large number of businesses in Australia which supply goods and services to overseas tourists while in Australia (such as hotels, restaurants, retail, hairdressers, theatres, tourist facilities, transport, etc, - possibly hundreds of thousands of businesses) are not reported in this article, though they contribute to Australia's export performance. The ABS uses data sources other than the SITS to estimate the value of these services;
- c. conversely, the consumption by Australian tourists (households) overseas of goods and services provided by businesses overseas, which is included in Australia's imports, is not included in this analysis; and
- d. Australian-owned businesses located overseas and supplying goods / services in the country in which they are located (usually called foreign affiliates trade) are not included in these estimates because their trade does not directly contribute to Australia's exports of goods and services, though the conditions under which they might be established and operate are subject to World Trade Organisation negotiations.

The current SITS population frame includes about 3,500 businesses. Analysis shows that about 1,000 (29%) of these only export services; 1,200 (34%) both export and import services; and 1,300 (37%) only import services. Some of these businesses also export and / or import goods.

ESTIMATES

Estimates in the following tables for goods exporters and importers have been derived using the methodology described in the Appendix. Data on the number of Customs entries refer to the number of single line entries on Customs records for goods that have been exported from Australia or imported into Australia after clearance by Customs. A line entry is typically completed for each commodity and destination in a single shipment.

The number of businesses excludes those with exports or imports below \$10,000 in the six month reference period.

EXPORTERS

Number

The number of businesses exporting *goods*, in the reference period 1 July 2001 to 31 December 2001, was estimated to be 22,581, as shown in table F1. This excludes businesses or households whose exports were less than \$10,000 in this period. The estimate of the number of exporters is subject to sampling error because of the methodology used. The standard error on the estimate is 641 i.e. there is one chance in twenty that the true value falls outside the range from 21,299 to 23,863.

Analysis of the SITS population indicated that there were approximately 2,200 service exporters for this period (1,000 that export only and 1,200 that both export and import). Using the ABNs, the SITS population was matched against the Customs goods exporter population. Around 35% (770) of businesses that engaged in service exports were also exporters of goods.

EXPORTERS continued

By eliminating the double counting, it was estimated that the total number of businesses that exported goods and services in this reference period was 24,011 (22,581 plus 2,200 less 770). Users should note that this estimate is subject to sampling error and a range of non-sampling errors. More accurate estimates will be possible when ABN reporting for goods exporters is further improved. Importantly, users should also note that this estimate generally does not include the large number of businesses that supply goods and services to overseas visitors in Australia.

Australia's goods exports were dominated by a relatively small number of exporters. There were 109 businesses with goods exports of \$100m or more, accounting for almost 60% of the value of goods exports during the reference period. The 2,746 largest goods exporters, with exports valued at \$1m or more, accounted for 94% of the value of goods exports. There were almost 7,000 businesses exporting between \$100,000 and \$1m (accounting for 3.5% of the value of all goods exports).

There were about 13,000 businesses with exports valued between \$10,000 and \$100,000, representing 57% of the number of goods exporters, and 0.8% of the value of goods exports. These businesses averaged five Customs entries each during the reference period.

Industry

The objective of an industrial classification is to identify groups of businesses which carry out similar economic activities. Each such grouping constitutes an industry and the activities which characterise the businesses are defined as the primary activities of that industry. A business can then be assigned to a particular industry based on its predominant activities. Businesses have been coded to industry based on the description they provided when applying for an Australian Business Number.

The above standard concept of an industry is referred to as industry of exporter or importer in the tables. Until the ABN was introduced, it was not possible to produce trade data on the standard industry basis. Instead, data have previously been classified by industry of origin i.e. commodities traded were allocated to the industry most likely to have produced the good (see Tables 27 and 28 in this publication).

At the present time it is not possible to include service exporters or importers classified by industry, but this is expected to change in the future. The industry tables in this article are therefore restricted to goods exporters and importers.

Readers are reminded that it is the owner of the good at the time of export / import that is being classified here, not the producer of the good. The most significant exporting industries (of the owning business) were manufacturing (38% of the value of goods exports), mining (29%) and wholesale trade (23%), as shown in table F2. These three industries accounted for \$56.6b of the \$62.8b of goods exported from Australia in the second half of 2001. The next most significant industry was agriculture, forestry and fishing, with 3% or \$1.7b. The low values for agriculture, forestry and fishing reflect that most exports of agricultural commodities are made by commodity marketing authorities, which are classified as wholesalers.

The finance and insurance industry accounted for just over 2% of merchandise exports. At first glance this may be unexpected as these industries generally produce services rather than goods. Sometimes the holding company of a diverse business group was the exporter of the goods produced by that group (holding companies are generally classified to the finance industry). In addition, the finance industry had large exports of gold.

Another 1% of exports was attributed to the transport and storage industry, but this appears to be an overstatement due to misreporting. The ABN of the transporter of the goods, or the Customs agent, was sometimes reported on the Customs entries rather than the ABN of the actual owner of the goods. Where this occurred, the ABS was able to resolve the ownership of the largest value exports, but the correct owner information of the smaller value exports was not sought.

EXPORTERS continued Table F3 compares the industry of the exporter with the industry of origin of the commodity. This shows that mining commodities had the highest proportion of exports (80%) by the industry that generally produced them i.e. the mining industry. By comparison, only 15% of Australia's \$6.6b of agricultural, forestry and fishing commodity exports were exported directly by the agriculture, forestry and fishing industries. Most were exported by wholesalers (76%).

> Exports of manufactured goods were \$37.5b, of which \$22.2b (59%) were exported by the manufacturing industry, \$7.2b (19%) by the wholesale trade industry and \$4.4b (12%) by the mining industry. In regard to mining, users should note that semi-processed materials (e.g. alumina) are considered manufactures.

State Of Origin Of Commodity

In the second half of 2001, 26% of Australia's goods exports came from Western Australia, followed by Queensland with 20%. These two States accounted for 74% (\$13.7b) of exports by the mining industry. New South Wales and Victoria each accounted for 18% of Australia's exports, most of which were by the manufacturing industry.

IMPORTERS

Number

The number of businesses importing goods, in the reference period 1 July 2001 to 31 December 2001, was estimated to be 41,110. This excludes businesses whose imports were less than \$10,000 in this period.

The 70 largest goods importers accounted for \$21.9b (36%) of Australia's goods imports. There were 5,328 businesses that imported goods worth \$1m or more, together accounting for \$55.8b (91%) of goods imports.

Analysis of the SITS population indicated that there were approximately 2,500 service importers for this period (1,200 that both export and import and 1,300 that import only). Users should note that some businesses import both goods and services, but no estimate of the total number of importers of goods and / or services, eliminating duplicates, has yet been made.

Industry Most goods imports were by the wholesale trade (44% by value) and manufacturing (37%) industries. Together these accounted for \$49.4b (81%) of Australia's \$61.2b goods imports during the second half of 2001. The next most significant industry was retail trade with \$3.7b (6%) of goods imports. Imports by machinery and equipment manufacturers, and machinery and motor vehicle wholesalers, were significant, together accounting for \$22.5b (37%) of Australia's goods imports.

FUTURE WORK

The ABS would appreciate feedback on the usefulness of these experimental estimates and how frequently such estimates should be compiled. It does not expect to commence regular publication of any additional data series until it is able to apply a similar methodology to match Customs records with the ABS business register. Planned developments within Customs and the ABS are expected to improve the quality of the input data, the efficiency of the processes involved, and the comparability of the estimates produced with other data sources.

APPENDIX: Methods Used In Compiling The Goods Statistics

INTRODUCTION

The introduction of the Australian Business Number (ABN), in July 2000, provides the opportunity to expand the range of data available on the international trading activities of Australian businesses, by linking records in different administrative data sources.

There is considerable interest in the characteristics of Australian businesses that trade internationally, particularly those that export. Prior to the introduction of the ABN, it was not generally possible to bring together from Customs systems all the import or export transactions relating to a single business. Similarly, there was no effective means of linking this information with other information held on that business.

Supply of customs and taxation information to the ABS for statistical purposes is provided for, both by the Commonwealth legislation relating to the requirements for these records to be lodged, and the *Census and Statistics Act 1905*. Data supplied to the ABS are protected by the secrecy provisions of Section 19 of the Act which protects the rights of data providers.

Some information on exporters has been available from ABS surveys, such as the longitudinal survey of businesses conducted during the period 1994 to 1998 which collected information from a sample of exporters.

Surveys are expensive to run and place a significant load on data providers. Linking of existing datasets allows new statistics to be created, without placing any additional reporting load on businesses.

The statistics on goods exporters and importers included in this article are considered experimental because they are subject to limitations in terms of the data available and methodology applied.

Data included in this article are for the reference period 1 July 2001 to 31 December 2001. While ABN reporting for Customs import and export entries has been required from 1 July 2000, it took time for the proportion of entries with an ABN to reach a level sufficient for this analysis. To enhance the analysis in the chosen reference period, steps were taken by the ABS to improve ABN accuracy and coverage in the data supplied.

METHODOLOGY

To determine some of the characteristics of Australia's exporters and importers of goods, information in respect of businesses identified from Customs records was extracted from the Australian Business Register. The statistics on goods exporters and importers published in this article have been produced by applying the following steps.

Step 1: Exports and imports of goods were each aggregated by individual ABN. For large value exports / imports that did not provide an ABN of the owner, the exporter's / importer's name on the Customs entries was used to clerically identify the relevant ABN from the ABR. This increased the proportion of Customs entries covered by an ABN to 89.5% of export entries (95.6% by value of exports) and 96.3% of import entries (98.9% by value of imports).

Step 2: The industry, classified to the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification*, *1993* (ANZSIC), of each business was extracted from the Australian Business Register. For the largest value exporters and importers, the industry code assigned by the ATO was checked against the ABS business register and any differences resolved. The industry is coded by the ATO from the description supplied when the business applied for an ABN.

Step 3: Merge trade and Australian Business Register industry data by ABN.

Step 4: Where businesses exported or imported less than \$10,000 in goods during the reference period, they were excluded from the business counts in the tables. Most of these very small importers / exporters had only one transaction during the period.

Step 5: For exporters / importers for which no ABN was known, the business characteristics could not be determined. In these cases, the value data were distributed according to the patterns observed for businesses with an ABN that exported / imported the same commodities (at the *Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification* (AHECC) / *Harmonized Tariff Item Statistical Code* (HTISC) 4-digit level).

The number of businesses covered by those Customs entries without a recorded ABN was estimated. A random sample of the exporter names with no ABN was taken. ABNs were identified clerically for the sampled businesses. ABNs in the sample were then matched against the businesses with ABNs. The number of additional exporters identified from the sample was used to estimate the number of unique exporters for which there was no ABN.

The total number of goods importers was derived in a more straightforward fashion. All goods importers must be registered with Customs and are allocated a unique 'Owner number'. The number of import Owner numbers has a close relationship to the number of ABNs. The number of Owner numbers without an associated ABN was simply added to the number of importers with an ABN to obtain the overall estimate.

Step 6: As required by ABS legislation, data were actively confidentialised, i.e. confidential cells of data are not published. The normal treatment of international merchandise trade data is covered by special legislative confidentiality rules, whereby confidential commodities are placed in a separate category 'Combined confidential items of trade and commodities'. The different methods result in slightly different aggregated output for State and Industry of origin data.

THE EFFECT OF CUSTOMS CHANGES ON EXPORT STATISTICS

INTRODUCTION

On 1 July 2002 new Customs legislation to modernise the administration of Australia's international trade came into effect. The legislation underpins the Customs Cargo Management Re-engineering (CMR) program, which will have significant implications for Australia's importers and exporters.

One change made is the introduction of a new export threshold, the level below which Customs entries are not required, which will affect Australia's export statistics. Details of the change in export threshold were included in Australian Customs Notice No 2002/19: *New reporting requirements for export cargo*. This can be found on the Customs web site http://www.customs.gov.au under Customs Notices.

The threshold for the reporting of an export entry was raised to \$2,000 per consignment, from the previous \$500 per line entry. In addition, all goods that require a permit, regardless of the value of the goods, must be reported to Customs using an export entry. A consignment covers goods exported by a single owner in a single shipment, and consists of one or more line entries. Each line entry represents a unique combination of the fields reported that cannot be aggregated e.g. commodity, destination, state of origin, etc.

The new export threshold will affect export data included in future issues of this publication. The purpose of this article is to detail the changes involved, explain how the ABS will deal with them, and to assess their impact on future merchandise export statistics. For most users and uses of the data, the changes are not expected to have a significant effect.

CUSTOMS CHANGES

Customs records lodged by importers and exporters are the data source used to compile Australia's international merchandise trade statistics. Prior to the recent change, an export entry was required by Customs for goods exported via sea or air with a value of \$500 or more, with the threshold applied to each line within a consignment.

From 1 July 2002, the reporting threshold was raised to \$2,000 per consignment. The new threshold applies to the consignment as a whole, rather than to each line within a consignment. If the total value of a consignment is \$2,000 or greater, a Customs entry is now required regardless of the number of individual lines in the consignment. The export threshold change brings the air and sea cargo reporting thresholds into alignment with the \$2,000 reporting threshold for postal consignments, which is unchanged.

A further change in export reporting requirements was that, from 1 July 2002, all goods that require an export permit must be reported to Customs via an export entry, regardless of the consignment value. Export permits are required for a range of goods. Examples include certain fruits, animals, cultural heritage items, drugs, arms and publications.

Previously only permitable goods over the \$500 threshold required an export entry. These new permit reporting requirements are being implemented to assist Customs and the Permit Issuing Authorities (PIAs) enforce export controls.

Under the new system, some export entries required previously will no longer be lodged with Customs e.g. a single entry consignment valued at \$1,000 does not now require a Customs entry (unless the export is a permitable good). However, a consignment consisting of five entry lines, each valued at \$450, giving a consignment value of \$2,250, will now require an export entry, whereas none was needed previously as each line was below the previous \$500 threshold.

THE EFFECT OF CUSTOMS CHANGES ON EXPORT STATISTICS continued

ABS TREATMENT

With the previous threshold, the ABS excluded from its merchandise export statistics all transaction lines under \$500. For consignments with multiple line entries, each individual transaction line under \$500 was excluded. While such records were not required by Customs, some exporters continued to lodge them. The ABS action was taken to ensure a clear and consistent coverage in merchandise export statistics across all types of goods and over different time periods.

From 1 July 2002, the ABS will exclude all consignments below the \$2,000 threshold from its merchandise export statistics. It will therefore exclude permitable goods below the \$2,000 threshold and any other records below the threshold that are lodged. The reason is, again, to ensure consistent coverage over time and for all goods. The value of the goods so excluded is not expected to be significant and their exclusion will reduce processing costs.

STATISTICAL IMPACTS

The ABS estimates that approximately \$327 million of exports per annum (0.27% of total exports) will be excluded from its merchandise trade statistics as a result of applying the new threshold. This figure has been derived by analysing export consignments lodged with Customs during 2001-02. It takes no account of any changes that might occur in the way exporters form consignments in the future as a result of the Customs changes.

These figures slightly overstate the trade lost, because under the previous threshold rules, the ABS discarded all lines under \$500 during processing. No information on these lines was stored and therefore cannot be included in this analysis. There would be some instances of consignment totals calculated as being under \$2,000, which would have been over the threshold, if discarded lines under \$500 had been included.

Export commodities are shown classified by SITC Division in this publication. Table F2 shows the SITC Divisions most affected by the export threshold changes. There are 15 SITC Divisions where the value of trade lost is over \$5m. In only two of these Divisions (SITC 89 and SITC 84) is the percentage of trade lost greater than 2%.

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5489.0). RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

3 The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

4 International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

5 Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2,000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1,000.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- individual transaction lines (within an export consignment) where the value of the goods is less than \$500.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

BASIS OF COMPILATION

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.
- **10** Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- **11** Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 90% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 5% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

STATISTICAL PERIOD

VALUATION

COUNTRY

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.
- **16** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **17** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **18** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **19** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

20 The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);

Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);

Developing Countries (DCs);

European Union (EU).

- **21** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- **22** More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra 02 6252 5409.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

23 Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

STATE

- **24** State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **25** State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

26 Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, *1993 Edition* (Cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

27 Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

28 Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on *Data Confidentiality* in the December 1999 issue.

RELIABILITY

30 Statistics for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
