

2008 LABOUR STATISTICS IN BRIEF



OVERVIEW

Labour statistics are of interest from both economic and social perspectives. This pamphlet provides a brief overview of data available from the ABS, relating to Australian labour statistics. Comparisons of data over a 20-year period are given for labour force participation, employment and unemployment, hours worked, industrial disputes, earnings and job vacancies. Also included are recent data on labour force underutilisation, education and work, first job starters, people not in the labour force, methods of setting pay, and an international comparison of population and standardised unemployment rates.

The quarterly publication *Australian Labour Market Statistics* (cat. no. 6105.0) provides regular updates on a range of labour statistics to provide an overall picture of the labour market. 



PART-TIME EMPLOYMENT AS A PROPORTION OF TOTAL EMPLOYMENT: TREND ESTIMATES








