NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the labour force experience of the civilian population aged 15–69 years during the year ending February 2001. It presents information about time spent in labour force activities, including episodes of working or looking for work, and time spent out of the labour force.

For this publication, labour force activity over a 12-month period was determined from a more limited set of questions than is used in the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). For this reason, the terms *worked* and *looked for work* are used, rather than the more precisely defined terms *employed* and *unemployed*, as used in the LFS.

ABOUT THIS SURVEY

Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Labour Force Experience Survey conducted throughout Australia in February 2001 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly LFS.

Labour force experience relates to a person's labour force activities over a 12-month period. Labour force activity consists of either working or looking for work.

The survey measured the number of weeks persons were engaged in these labour force activities during the year, the number of spells of looking for work during the year and the main activity of persons when not in the labour force.

ROUNDING

As estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.



CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

The following diagram illustrates the conceptual framework for the Labour Force Experience Survey. Persons aged 15–69 years were classified according to their labour force activity over a 12-month period, that is, whether working or looking for work.

The framework firstly differentiates between persons who worked the whole year, part of the year or did not work during the year. Persons who worked part of the year or did not work during the year were asked whether they looked for work during the year. Persons who looked for work were also asked about the time they spent looking for work.



SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

In this publication the terms *worked* and *looked for work* have been used to describe labour force activity throughout the year. Note that these terms are not the same as the more precisely defined terms *employed* and *unemployed*, which are used in the monthly Labour Force Survey to describe current labour force status.

ALL PERSONS AGED 15 TO 69 YEARS

There were 13,413,900 civilian Australians aged 15 to 69 years in February 2001.

During the year ending February 2001:

- 9,892,700 persons worked at some time during the year, of whom 6,561,500 spent the whole year working;
- 1,730,600 persons looked for work at some time during the year, of whom 188,300 spent the whole year looking for work; and
- 6,003,500 persons were not in the labour force at some time during the year, of whom 2,946,800 spent no time in the labour force.


Participation in the labour force

10,467,100 persons aged 15 to 69 years were in the labour force at some time during the year ending February 2001. That is, 78% of Australians aged 15 to 69 years either worked or looked for work at some time during the year.

Some 85% of males aged 15 to 69 years participated in the labour force at some time in the 12 months to February 2001. This figure has remained relatively steady since 1991. For females, the proportion participating over the same period has steadily increased from 67% in 1991 to 71% in 2001.

By age group, the highest participation in the labour force in the year ending February 2001 was for persons aged 20 to 24 years (91%). Labour force participation fell to 44% for persons aged 55 to 69 years. Males participated at higher rates than females in all age groups except for persons aged 15 to 19 years in which females participated at a slightly higher rate (75%) than males (74%).

LABOUR FORCE PARTICIPATION IN YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 2001.



The majority of people participating in the labour force spent all or most of the year in the labour force. Of the persons who were in the labour force at some time during the year, 71% spent the whole year in the labour force and 15% spent 39 to 51 weeks in the labour force.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS continued

PERSONS WHO WORKED AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR

There were 9,892,700 persons who worked at some time during the year ending February 2001. Of these, 5,446,700 (55%) were male and 4,446,000 (45%) were female. Some 70% of these males worked for the entire 52 weeks, compared to 62% of females.

The proportion of males who worked at some time during the year (81%) has remained relatively stable since 1991. The proportion of females who worked at some time has steadily risen throughout that period from 63% in 1991 to 66% in 2001.

Of those persons who worked at some time during the year ending February 2001:


- 79% of males and 49% of females worked full-time only;
- 12% of males and 40% of females worked part-time only; and
- 9% of males and 11% of females worked a combination of full-time and part-time, a slight increase from 1999 (8% and 10% respectively).

For the 12 months ending February 2001, 53% of persons who worked at some time during the year had post-school qualifications, while 45% were without post-school qualifications.

PERSONS WHO LOOKED FOR WORK AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR During the year ending February 2001, 963,100 males and 767,600 females spent some time looking for work. The majority of persons looking for work were aged 15 to 34 years (60% for males and 62% for females).

The proportion of males who looked for work at some time during the year has steadily decreased, from 20% in 1993 to 14% in February 2001. Similarly, the proportion of females has decreased from 14% in 1993 to 11% for the 12 months ending February 2001.

PERSONS WHO LOOKED FOR WORK AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR



Of the 1,730,600 persons who looked for work at some time during the year ending February 2001:

- 53% looked for work for between 1 and 12 weeks;
- 28% looked for work for between 13 and 38 weeks;
- 8% looked for work for between 39 and 51 weeks; and
- 11% looked for work for the whole year, down from 15% in 1999.

Two-thirds (67%) of persons looking for work during the year had also worked during the year, up from 63% in 1999.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS continued

PERSONS WHO WERE NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE AT SOME TIME DURING THE YEAR 6,003,500 persons were not in the labour force at some time during the year ending February 2001. Of these, 2,364,900 were male and 3,638,600 were female. Almost half (49%) of the people in this group spent no time in the labour force during the year.

The main activities while not in the labour force most commonly reported by males were 'holiday, travel, or leisure activities' (26%), 'attended an educational institution' (26%), and 'retired or voluntarily inactive' (20%). For females, the most commonly reported main activities were 'home duties, or childcare' (50%) and 'attended an educational institution' (17%).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- 1 The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Labour Force Experience Survey conducted throughout Australia in February 2001 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
- **2** The publication *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing which are relevant to both the monthly LFS and supplementary surveys.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

3 The conceptual framework used in Australia's Labour Force Survey aligns closely with the standards and guidelines set out in Resolutions of the International Conference of Labour Statisticians. Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of Australia's labour force statistics, and the sources and methods used in compiling these estimates, are presented in *Labour Statistics: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (Cat. no. 6102.0) which is also available on the ABS website <www.abs.gov.au> (Statistics-Statistical Concepts Library).

4 The scope of the LFS was restricted to persons aged 15 years and over and excluded the following persons:

- members of the permanent defence forces;
- certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- overseas residents in Australia;
- members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants).
- **5** Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for persons with handicaps), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.
- 6 The survey was conducted in both urban and rural areas in all States and Territories, but excluded approximately 80,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia who would otherwise have been within the scope of the survey. The exclusion of these persons will have only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates that are produced for individual States and Territories, except the Northern Territory where such persons account for over 20% of the population.
- **7** In addition to those already excluded from the LFS, persons aged 70 years and over and visitors to private dwellings are excluded from this survey.
- **8** The estimates in this publication relate to persons covered by the survey in February 2001. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey (see *Labour Force, Australia* Cat. no. 6203.0).

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

COVERAGE

- **9** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors:
 - Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information on sampling error, refer to the Technical notes.

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES continued

Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED

- **10** The educational attainment data in this survey has been classified according to *ABS Classification of Qualifications* (ABSCQ). For more detailed information see *ABSCQ ABS Classification of Qualifications* (Cat. no. 1262.0).
- **11** Occupation data are classified according to the second edition of the *Australian Standard Classification of Occupations* (ASCO). For more detailed information see *ASCO Australian Standard Classification of Occupations*, *Second Edition* (Cat. no. 1220.0).
- **12** Industry data are classified according to the *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (ANZSIC), a more detailed description of which appears in *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (ANZSIC), 1993 (Cat. no. 1292.0).

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES

- **13** Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 1999 to take account of the results of the 1996 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 1999 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.
- **14** Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample. Therefore the reduction in sample size means that the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to previous surveys.

COMPARABILITY WITH
MONTHLY LFS STATISTICS

15 Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and that of the LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to some small variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS.

PREVIOUS SURVEYS

16 Results of similar surveys, conducted in February 1969, 1973, 1975, 1976, 1977, annually from February 1979 to February 1989, annually from March 1990 to March 1994, and in February 1995, 1997 and 1999 have been given in previous issues of the publication *Labour Force Experience, Australia* (Cat. no. 6206.0) and the Standard Data Service *Labour Force Experience on Hardcopy, Australia* (Cat. no. 6209.0.40.001).

ACKNOWLEDGMENT

17 ABS surveys draw extensively on information provided by individuals, businesses, governments and other organisations. Their continued cooperation is very much appreciated: without it, the wide range of statistics published by the ABS would not be available. INTRODUCTION

- 1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.
- 2 Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the 'SE model', which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

3 • An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 1 shows that the estimated number of persons in the labour force for part of the year was 3,056,700. Since this estimate is between 2,000,000 and 5,000,000, table T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 15,250 and 23,400 and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general formula:


SE of estimate =

$$lower SE + \left(\left(\frac{size\ of\ estimate - lower\ estimate}{upper\ estimate - lower\ estimate}\right)\right) \times (upper\ SE - lower\ SE)$$

$$= 15,250 + \left(\left(\frac{3,056,700 - 2,000,000}{5,000,000 - 2,000,000}\right)\right) \times (23,400 - 15,250)$$

$$= 18,100 (rounded\ to\ the\ nearest\ 100)$$

4 Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 3,038,600 to 3,074,800 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 3,020,500 to 3,092,900. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.



5 In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs so that their value for most practical

purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g. **0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of 25% or less.

MEANS AND MEDIANS

6 The RSEs of estimates of mean duration of time spent looking for work and median duration of time spent looking for work are obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the mean or median (see Table T1) and then multiplying the resulting number by the following factors:

mean duration of unemployment: 1.48 and median duration of unemployment: 1.73

- The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use of a factor is required. Table 10 shows that the estimated number of males looking for work was 963,100 with a median duration of time spent looking for work of 12 weeks. The SE of 963,100 can be calculated from table T1 (by interpolation) as 11,300. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 11,300/963,100 = 1.2%.
- 8 The RSE of the estimate of median duration of time spent looking for work for males is calculated by multiplying this number (1.2%) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 1.73): $1.2 \times 1.73 = 2.1\%$. The approximate SE of this estimate of median duration of time spent looking for work for males is therefore 2.1% of 12, i.e. about 0.3 weeks. Therefore, there are two chances in three that the median duration of time spent looking for work for males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 12.7 weeks to 13.3 weeks, and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 12.4 weeks to 13.6 weeks.

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

9 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

$$RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$$

10 Considering the example from the previous page, of the 3,056,700 persons in the labour force for part of the year only, 495,600, or 16.2%, looked for work at some time in the year. The SE of 495,600 may be calculated by interpolation as 8,800. To convert this to a RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, so the RSE is 8,800/495,600 = 1.8%. The SE for 3,056,700 was calculated previously as 18,100, which converted to a RSE is 18,100/3,056,700 = 0.6%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is:

$$RSE = \sqrt{(1.8)^2 - (0.6)^2} = 1.7\%$$

11 Therefore the SE for the proportion (16.2%) is 0.3 percentage points (=(16.2/100)*1.7). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of persons in the labour force for part of the year only who looked for work at some time is between 15.9% and 16.5% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 15.6% to 16.8%.

DIFFERENCES

12 Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

13 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

Full-time status of weeks worked during the year	Any weeks of the year that a person perceived that they had worked full-time.
Industry	Classified according to the <i>Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) 1993</i> (Cat. no. 1292.0). In this publication, industry relates to the main job and is shown at the ANZSIC Division level.
In the labour force at some time during the year	Persons who had worked or looked for work for one week or more during the year.
In the labour force during the whole year	Persons who had worked or looked for work every week during the year.
In the labour force for part of the year only	Persons who had either worked or looked for work for some weeks during the year, but had some weeks when neither activity was undertaken.
Looked for work at some time during the year	Persons who looked for work for one week or more during the year.
Main English-speaking countries	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Mean duration of time spent looking for work	Obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been looking for work by the number of persons in that group.
Median duration of time spent looking for work	The duration which divides persons who looked for work into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose time spent looking for work during the year is above the median, and the other, persons whose time spent looking is below it.
Not in the labour force at some time during the year	Persons who had neither worked nor looked for work for one week or more during the year.
Number of employers/businesses during the year	The number of employers/businesses a person worked for during the year.
Number of spells of looking for work during the year	The number of different periods, including the current period, during which a person was not working but looking for a job.
Occupation	Classified according to the <i>Australian Standard Classification of Occupation</i> , <i>Second Edition</i> , 1997 (Cat. no. 1220.0). In this publication, occupation relates to main job and is shown at the Major Group level.
Part-time status of weeks worked during the year	Any weeks of the year that a person perceived they had worked part-time.
Time in the labour force during the year	The total number of weeks a person reported as having either worked or looked for work.
Time not in the labour force during the year	The total number of weeks a person reported as having neither worked nor looked for work.

Time spent looking for work during the year	The total number of weeks a person reported looking for a job.
Time worked during the year	The total number of weeks a person reported as having either worked or been on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are not classified as time worked.
Worked at some time during the year	Persons who reported having worked and/or been on paid leave for one week or more during the year.
Worked part of the year	Persons who reported having worked and/or been on paid leave for part of the year.
Working at February 2001	Persons who were working (or on paid leave) at February 2001.

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
