## NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION	This publication presents information about persons who are not in the labour force: that is, neither employed nor unemployed. The data measure the potential supply of labour not reflected in employment and unemployment statistics.										
	Many people not in the labour force can be considered strongly attached to the labour force. They would like to work, but for a variety of reasons are not actively looking for work or are not currently available to start a job. There is an expectation that many of these people will move into the labour force in the short term, or could do so if labour market conditions changed.										
	The conceptual framework which follows separates persons not in the labour force into more detailed categories, depending on the strength of their attachment to the labour force.										
	Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey, conducted throughout Australia in September 2000 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics monthly Labour Force Survey.										
	This survey provides information about persons aged 15–69 years who were not in the labour force. The survey collected details about whether they wanted to work, about reasons why they were not actively looking for work, about their availability for work, and about their main activity while not in the labour force.

## CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

#### PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE

The civilian population can be split into two mutually exclusive groups: the labour force (employed and unemployed persons) and persons not in the labour force.

Marginal attachment to the labour force is determined by firstly establishing whether a person not in the labour force has a desire to work, and then by whether they have been actively seeking work or are available to start work within a short period of time.


Persons who are marginally attached may satisfy some, but not all, of the criteria required to be classified as unemployed.

Persons not in the labour force are considered to be marginally attached to the labour force if they:

- want to work and are actively looking for work but not available to start work in the reference week; or
- want to work and are not actively looking for work but are available to start work within four weeks.

Persons not in the labour force are not marginally attached if they:

- do not want to work; or
- want to work but are not actively looking for work and are not available to start work within four weeks.




#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

OVERVIEW

In September 2000, there were 3,684,600 persons aged 15–69 years who were not in the labour force. This represented 27% of the civilian population in this age group. Of those not in the labour force, two-thirds were female.

Between September 1999 and September 2000, the number of males not in the labour force rose by 20,900, while the number of females not in the labour force fell by 48,700. The net fall of 27,800 persons represents a drop of just under 1%, and follows a 2% increase between September 1998 and 1999. The number of persons with marginal attachment to the labour force decreased by 7% between September 1999 and September 2000, and follows on from a 4% decrease in the corresponding previous twelve month period.

The proportion of persons not in the labour force varied according to age. In the 15–19 years age group, where there are high levels of educational participation, the proportion was just under 40% for both males and females. In all other age groups, there were more females than males not in the labour force. The proportion of females not in the labour force remained steady at around 28% for those aged 25 to 54 years, before increasing sharply. For males, the proportion progressively increased after the 35–44 years old range.

#### MARGINAL ATTACHMENT

Of the 823,900 persons who had a marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2000, 93% were not actively looking for work but were available to start work within four weeks. The remainder were actively looking for work but not available to start work in the reference week.

Some 24% of females and 20% of males not in the labour force had a marginal attachment to the labour force. The proportion with marginal attachment decreased for both males and females (by 1 percentage point) since September 1999.

Two-thirds (68%) of females marginally attached to the labour force would have preferred part-time work, while 15% preferred full-time work. Males in this group were more evenly distributed, with 41% preferring part-time work and 39% preferring full-time work. The remainder had no preference, or were undecided.



Females made up 70% of all discouraged jobseekers, 41% of whom were aged 35–54 years. Of those females who previously had a job (68,300), 42% had not had a job during the last 10 years.

The proportion of female discouraged job seekers rose from 65% in 1999 to 70% in 2000, while the male equivalent decreased by 5 percentage points over the same period. Male discouraged jobseekers tended to be older, with 53% aged 55–69 years. The ratio of discouraged jobseekers to the number of persons unemployed was 9% for males, almost unchanged from 1999, and 28% for females, an increase of 6 percentage points from 1999.

#### DISCOURAGED JOBSEEKERS



The main reasons for not actively looking for work reported by discouraged jobseekers were 'considered too young or too old by employers' (45%), and 'lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience' (23%).

PERSONS WITHOUT MARGINAL ATTACHMENT

Of the 2,860,700 persons who were without marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2000, the majority (84%) were persons who did not want to work, while a further 4% were permanently unable to work. Of those persons who did not want to work, 39% said their main activity was 'home duties or childcare', 26% said 'retired or voluntarily inactive', and 18% said 'attending an educational institution'.

There were 335,500 persons (12% of those without marginal attachment) who wanted to work but were neither actively looking for work nor available to start work within four weeks. Forty one per cent reported that their main activity was 'home duties or childcare', while 27% reported that they had a job less than 12 months ago. Of these 335,500 persons, almost two-thirds were females.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION	<b>1</b> The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in September 2000 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.

#### TECHNICAL NOTE DATA QUALITY

#### INTRODUCTION

**1** Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.

**2** Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the "SE model", which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.


CALCULATION OF STANDARD3An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of<br/>persons is as follows. Table 3 shows that the estimated number of persons in<br/>Australia who were discouraged jobseekers was 106,500. Since this estimate is<br/>between 100,000 and 150,000, table T1 shows the SE for Australia will be<br/>between 5,300 and 6,150, and can be approximated by interpolation using the<br/>following general formula:

= 5,400 (rounded to the nearest 100)

**4** Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 101,100 to 111,900, and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 95,700 to 117,300. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.

#### CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERRORS continued

**5** In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs so that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. \*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g. \*\*0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of 25% or less.

 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are

 also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y

 $RSE(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$ 

**7** Considering the example above, of the 106,500 persons who were discouraged jobseekers, 32,400 or 30.4% were males. The SE of 32,400 may be calculated by interpolation as 3,400. To convert this to a RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 3,400/32,400 = 10.5%. The SE for 106,500 was calculated previously as 5,400, which converted to a RSE is 5,400/106,500 = 5.1%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is

 $RSE = \sqrt{(10.5)^2 - (5.1)^2} = 9.2\%$ 

**8** Therefore, the SE for the proportion of males who were discouraged jobseekers is 2.8 percentage points (=(30.4/100)x9.2). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who were discouraged jobseekers is between 27.6% and 33.2% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 24.8% to 36.0%.

**9** Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

 $SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$ 

**10** While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

**11** SEs contained in table T1 are applicable to all estimates from this survey.

## GLOSSARY

Actively looking for work	<ul> <li>Those persons who were taking active steps to find work. Active steps comprise:</li> <li>registering with Centrelink as a jobseeker;</li> <li>contacting an employment agency;</li> <li>contacting prospective employers;</li> <li>answering a newspaper advertisement for a job;</li> <li>checking Centrelink touch screens;</li> <li>checking factory noticeboards;</li> <li>advertising or tendering for work; and</li> <li>contacting friends or relatives.</li> </ul>
Available to start work within four weeks	Those persons who were available to start work within four weeks or, for persons with children aged 12 years or under, could start work within four weeks if suitable child care was available.
Discouraged jobseekers	<ul> <li>Persons with marginal attachment to the labour force who wanted to work and were available to start work within the next four weeks but whose main reason for not actively looking for work was that they believed they would not find a job for any of the following reasons:</li> <li>considered to be too young or too old by employers; or</li> <li>lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience; or</li> <li>difficulties with language or ethnic background; or</li> <li>no jobs in their locality or line of work; or</li> <li>no jobs available at all.</li> </ul>
Employed	<ul> <li>Persons aged 15–69 years who, during the reference week:</li> <li>worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and own account workers); or</li> <li>worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or</li> <li>were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; on strike or locked out; on workers compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or</li> <li>were employers, own account workers or contributing family workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.</li> </ul>
Family reasons for not actively looking for work	Includes ill health of a family member, child care and other family considerations.
Full-time work	Work involving 35 or more hours a week.
Had a job to go to	Includes persons who had a job but, up to the end of the reference week, had been away from work without pay for four weeks or longer and had not been actively looking for work. Also includes persons who had a job but had not yet started that job.
Job	Any employment, full-time or part-time, lasting two weeks or more.
Job leavers	Persons who voluntarily ceased their last job.
Job losers	Persons who involuntarily ceased their last job.
Main English-speaking countries	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Marginal attachment to the labour force	Persons who were not in the labour force in the reference week, wanted to work and:

Marginal attachment to the labour force <i>continued</i>	<ul> <li>were actively looking for work but did not meet the availability criteria to be classified as unemployed; or</li> <li>were not actively looking for work but were available to start work within four weeks or could start work within four weeks if child care was available.</li> </ul>
	The criteria determining those in the labour force are based on activity (i.e. working or looking for work) and availability to start work during the reference week. The criteria associated with marginal attachment to the labour force, in particular the concepts of wanting to work and reasons for not actively looking for work, are more subjective. Hence, the measurement against these criteria is affected by the respondent's own interpretation of the concepts used. An individual respondent's interpretation may be affected by their work aspirations, as well as family, economic and other commitments.
Occupation of last job	All occurrences of occupation in this publication refer to Major Group as defined by ASCO — <i>Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition</i> (Cat. no. 1220.0).
Part-time work	Work involving less than 35 hours a week.
Personal reasons for not actively looking for work	Includes own ill health or physical disability, pregnancy, attending an educational institution, had no need to work, to give others a chance, welfare payments or pension may be affected, moved house or on holidays.
Persons in institutions	Includes persons in general and other hospitals, convalescent homes, homes for the aged, retirement homes, homes for the handicapped, orphanages, boarding schools and prisons.
Persons in the labour force	Persons aged 15–69 years who met the criteria to be classified as being in the labour force, that is, either employed or unemployed.
Persons not in the labour force	Persons aged 15–69 years who do not meet the criteria to be classified as employed or unemployed.
Persons not in the labour force for child care reasons who wanted to work	<ul> <li>Persons who wanted to work and:</li> <li>were not actively looking for work due to child care reasons, but were available to start work within four weeks; or</li> <li>were not actively looking for work and were not available to start work within four weeks for child care reasons.</li> </ul>
Relationship in household	<ul> <li>Two or more related persons (relationship includes relationships by blood, marriage or adoption) usually resident in the same household at the time of the survey. A family comprises a married couple or a family head as defined in <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0), together with any persons having any of the following relationships to them:</li> <li>sons or daughters of any age, if not married and with no children of their own present; or</li> <li>other relatives if not accompanied by a spouse, sons or daughters, or parents of their own; or</li> <li>any children under 15 years of age who do not have a parent present.</li> </ul>
Time since last job	The elapsed time since ceasing their last job.
Unemployed	<ul> <li>Persons aged 15–69 years who were not employed during the reference week and:</li> <li>had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week and:</li> <li>were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the reference week); or</li> </ul>

Unemployed continued	<ul> <li>were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then; or</li> <li>were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (including the whole of the reference week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.</li> </ul>
Wanted to work	Persons who did not meet the criteria to be classified as employed or unemployed and who answered 'yes' or 'maybe' when asked if they would like a job.

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
