# NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION	This publication presents information about persons aged 15–69 years who are not in the labour force: that is, neither employed nor unemployed. The data measure the potential supply of labour not reflected in employment and unemployment statistics.
	Many people not in the labour force could be considered to have some attachment to the labour force. They would like to work, but for a variety of reasons are not actively looking for work or are not currently available to start a job. There is an expectation that many of these people will move into the labour force in the short term, or could do so if labour market conditions changed.
	The conceptual framework which follows separates persons not in the labour force into more detailed categories, depending on the strength of their attachment to the labour force.
	Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey, conducted throughout Australia in September 2003 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey.
	This survey provides information about persons aged 15–69 years who were not in the labour force. The survey collected details about whether they wanted to work, about reasons why they were not actively looking for work, about their availability for work, and about their main activity while not in the labour force.

# PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE

The civilian population aged 15–69 years can be split into two mutually exclusive groups: the labour force (employed and unemployed persons) and persons not in the labour force.


Persons not in the labour force can be divided into those who are marginally attached to the labour force, and those who are not. Persons who are marginally attached to the labour force may satisfy some, but not all, of the criteria required to be classified as unemployed.

Persons not in the labour force are considered to be marginally attached to the labour force if they:

- want to work and are actively looking for work but are not available to start work in the reference week, or
- want to work and are not actively looking for work but are available to start work within four weeks.

Persons not in the labour force are not marginally attached to the labour force if they:

- do not want to work, or
- want to work but are not actively looking for work and are not available to start work within four weeks.




#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

OVERVIEW

In September 2003, there were 3,862,600 persons aged 15–69 years who were not in the labour force. This represented 28% of the civilian population, a proportion which has remained steady over the last few years. Just under one-third (31%) of persons not in the labour force wanted to work and almost two-thirds (64%) of persons not in the labour force were female.

The proportion of persons who were not in the labour force varied according to age. In the 15–19 years age group, where there are high levels of participation in education, the proportion was 41% for both males and females. In all other age groups, there were more females than males not in the labour force. The proportion of females who were not in the labour force remained steady at around 27% for those aged 25–54 years, before increasing sharply to 48% for those aged 55–59 years. For males, the proportion ranged from 8% to 12% for those aged 25–54 years, increasing to 25% for those aged 55–59 years.

MARGINAL ATTACHMENT

Of the 834,600 persons with marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2003, 775,500 or 93% were not actively looking for work but were available to start work within four weeks. The remainder were actively looking for work but were not available to start work in the reference week.

Some 23% of females and 19% of males not in the labour force were marginally attached to the labour force. Over two-thirds (68%) of females with marginal attachment to the labour force would have preferred part-time work, while 18% preferred full-time work. Males in this group were more evenly distributed, with 46% preferring part-time work and 37% preferring full-time work. The remainder had no preference, or were undecided.

Main reason for notThe reasons for not actively looking for work most commonly reported by males wereactively looking for work'attending an educational institution' (33%) and 'own ill health or physical disability'<br/>(19%). The most commonly reported reasons for females in this group were 'childcare'<br/>(30%) and 'attending an educational institution' (16%).

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
Discouraged jobseekers	<ul> <li>At September 2003 there were 79,800 discouraged jobseekers. Characteristics of discouraged jobseekers in September 2003 include:</li> <li>67% were female</li> <li>43% of male and 28% of female discouraged jobseekers had looked for work in the previous 13 weeks</li> <li>78% of male and 67% of female discouraged jobseekers intended to enter the labour force in the next 12 months</li> <li>86% of discouraged jobseekers had worked before, with almost a third (30%) of males and 14% of females having had a job in the previous 12 months.</li> <li>The main reasons reported by discouraged jobseekers for not actively looking for work were 'considered too young or too old by employers' (33%), 'no jobs in locality or line of work' (27%) and 'lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience' (23%). For female discouraged jobseekers, 26% gave the reason 'lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience', compared to 17% of males. Thirty-two per cent of males gave the reason 'no jobs in locality or line or work', compared to 25% of females.</li> <li>Forty per cent of males gave the reason 'considered too young or too old by employers' compared with 30% of females.</li> </ul>
PERSONS WITHOUT MARGINAL ATTACHMENT	Of the 3,028,000 persons who were without marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2003, the majority (81%) were persons who did not want to work, while a further 7% were permanently unable to work. Of those persons who did not want to work, 33% reported their main activity as 'home duties or childcare', 28% as 'retired or voluntarily inactive', and 19% as 'attending an educational institution'. There were 378,400 persons who wanted to work but were neither actively looking for work nor available to start work within four weeks, and two-thirds (67%) of these were female. Forty-three per cent reported their main activity as 'home duties or childcare' and 28% as 'attending an educational institution'. Twenty-seven per cent of persons who wanted to work but were neither actively looking for work nor available to start work

within four weeks reported that they had a job less than 12 months ago.

INTRODUCTION	<ol> <li>The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in September 2003 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.</li> </ol>
	<b>2</b> The publication <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (cat. no. 6202.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing relevant to both the LFS and supplementary surveys.
	<b>3</b> From April 2001 the LFS has been conducted using a redesigned questionnaire containing additional questions and some minor definitional changes. These changes also affect the supplementary surveys. For further details, see <i>Information Paper</i> : <i>Implementing the Redesigned Labour Force Survey Questionnaire</i> (cat. no. 6295.0) and <i>Information Paper: Questionnaires Used in the Labour Force Survey</i> (cat. no. 6232.0).
CONCEPTS SOURCES AND METHODS	<b>4</b> The conceptual framework used in Australia's Labour Force Survey aligns closely with the standards and guidelines set out in Resolutions of the International Conference of Labour Statisticians. SCOPE	<ul> <li>5 The scope of the LFS is restricted to persons aged 15 years and over and excludes the following persons:</li> <li>members of the permanent defence forces</li> <li>certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations</li> <li>overseas residents in Australia</li> <li>members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants).</li> </ul>
	<b>6</b> Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for persons with disabilities), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED	<b>12</b> Occupation data are classified according to the <i>ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition, 1997</i> (cat. no. 1220.0).
	<b>13</b> Country of birth data are classified according to the <i>Standard Australian Classification of Countries (SACC), 1998</i> (cat. no. 1269.0).
REVISION TO HISTORICAL DATA	<b>14</b> Historical estimates of the civilian population for reference periods 1996 to 1999 were revised in the 2000 publication to exclude institutionalised persons, sparsely settled and remote parts of Australia.
COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES	<b>15</b> Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The 2003 Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey estimates have been compiled using benchmarks based on the 1996 Census of Population and Housing.
	<b>16</b> Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample. Since it was introduced, this survey has been conducted on various proportional samples. Therefore, sampling errors associated with previous surveys may vary from the sampling error for this survey.
	<b>17</b> Persons Not in the Labour Force Surveys conducted up to and including September 1987 included all persons aged 15 years and over. From September 1988, the survey excluded all persons aged 70 years and over.
	<ul> <li>18 Comparability of 2001 to 2003 estimates with previous years, for persons who wanted to work, including discouraged jobseekers, may have been affected by the following:</li> <li>As part of the LFS redesigned questionnaire, implemented in April 2001, persons aged 65 and over can specify that they are permanently not intending to work, and as a result were not asked for details about wanting to work and looking for work in the 2001, 2002 and 2003 Persons Not in the Labour Force surveys. It is likely that, if they had answered these questions, some of these persons may have been classified as persons who wanted work, and also as discouraged jobseekers.</li> <li>A further change in the redesigned LFS questionnaire is that it more accurately identifies 'future starters'; that is, persons waiting to start, within four weeks of the end of the reference week, a new job that they have already obtained (and could have started in the reference week if the job had been available then). Under International Labour Organisation (ILO) guidelines these persons do not have to be actively looking for work to be classified as unemployed, and therefore are not asked questions related to job search activities. If they had been asked why they were not looking for work, it is possible that some may have given reasons other than 'had a job to go to', and as a result could have been classified as wanting to work, and also as discouraged jobseekers.</li> <li>Persons who are permanently unable to work have been classified as a separate group within Persons Not in the Labour Force Surveys for many years. ## TECHNICAL NOTE DATA QUALITY

INTRODUCTION	<b>1</b> Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been							
	included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard							
	error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance							
	because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would							
	have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%)							
	that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is							
	the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.							
	<b>2</b> Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the 'SE model', which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.							
CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERRORS	<b>3</b> An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 4 shows that the estimated number of persons in Australia who were discouraged jobseekers was 79,800. Since this estimate is between 50,000 and 100,000, table T1 shows the SE for Australia will be between 4,050 and 5,300, and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general formula:

	<b>4</b> Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 75,000 to 84,600, and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 70,200 to 89,400. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.

	<b>5</b> In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases.							

Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an asterisk (e.g.\*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g.\*\*0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use

# CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERRORS continued

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of 25% or less.

**6** Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

 $RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$ 

**7** Considering the example above, of the 79,800 persons who were discouraged jobseekers, 26,600 or 33.3% were males. The SE of 26,600 may be calculated by interpolation as 3,100. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 3,100/26,600 = 11.7%. The SE for 79,800 was calculated previously as 4,800, which converted to an RSE is 4,800/79,800 = 6.0%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is

 $RSE = \sqrt{(11.7)^2 - (6.0)^2} = 10.0\%$ 

**8** Therefore, the SE for the proportion of males who were discouraged jobseekers is 3.3 percentage points (=(33.3/100)x10.0). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who were discouraged jobseekers is between 30.0% and 36.6% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 26.7% to 39.9%.

DIFFERENCES

**9** Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:  $SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$ 

**10** While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

**11** SEs contained in table T1 are applicable to all estimates from this survey.

Discouraged jobseekers	<ul> <li>Persons with marginal attachment to the labour force who wanted to work and were available to start work within the next four weeks but whose main reason for not actively looking for work was that they believed they would not find a job for any of the following reasons:</li> <li>considered to be too young/too old by employers</li> <li>lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience</li> <li>difficulties because of language or ethnic background</li> <li>no jobs in their locality or line of work</li> <li>no jobs available at all.</li> </ul>

Some households will, therefore, contain more than one family.

	The criteria for determining those in the labour force are based on activity (i.e. working or looking for work) and availability to start work during the reference week. The criteria associated with marginal attachment to the labour force, in particular the concepts of wanting to work and reasons for not actively looking for work, are more subjective. Hence, the measurement against these criteria is affected by the respondent's own interpretation of the concepts used. An individual respondent's interpretation may be affected by their work aspirations, as well as family, economic and other commitments.
