NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the job search experience of unemployed persons, in terms of the steps they have taken to find work and the difficulties they have encountered in finding work. Demographic information is provided about these persons along with information about their previous employment.

JOB SEARCH EXPERIENCE OF UNEMPLOYED PERSONS SURVEY

The statistics in this publication are compiled from data collected in the Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in July 2000 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS).

Data from the survey relate to persons who were unemployed in July 2000, except for those unemployed persons who were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been stood down. All tables in this publication, with the exception of table 1, exclude this group of unemployed persons.

As estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UNEMPLOYED PERSONS

In July 2000, there were 544,300 unemployed persons excluding those who were stood down, an 8% decrease since July 1999. Three in four (76%) unemployed persons were looking for full-time work. This is similar to the level recorded 12 months earlier (77%). Most males (84%) were seeking full-time work, as were the majority of females (65%).


JOB SEARCH EXPERIENCE

In July 2000, 61% of unemployed persons were registered as a job seeker with Centrelink. This is a decrease of 4 percentage points since July 1999.

The majority (94%) of unemployed persons had contacted prospective employers in their endeavours to find work. Of this group, 62% were registered with Centrelink.

Unemployed persons looking for full-time work were more likely to be registered with Centrelink than those looking for part-time work. Of those looking for full-time work, almost three in four (72%) were registered with Centrelink. Of those looking for part-time work, the most common active step taken was contacting prospective employers without having registered with Centrelink (69%).

ACTIVE STEPS TAKEN TO FIND WORK





The most commonly reported main difficulties in finding work for unemployed persons were:

- considered too young or too old by employers (13%);
- too many applicants for available jobs (13%);
- lacked necessary skills/education (12%);
- lacktriangleright insufficient work experience (10%); and
- no vacancies at all (8%).

Unemployed persons whose main difficulty in finding work was 'own ill health or disability' had the highest median duration of unemployment (52 weeks).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

In July 2000, 61% of unemployed persons did not have post-school qualifications. Of this group, 69% had not completed the highest level of secondary school available.

Almost one-third (30%) of unemployed persons had post-school qualifications. More than half (57%) of this group had a skilled or basic vocational qualification as their highest qualification, another 26% had a bachelor degree or higher and a further 17% had an undergraduate or associate diploma.

YOUNG UNEMPLOYED

Over a third (36%) of unemployed persons were aged between 15 and 24 years. There has been a steady decrease in the number of young unemployed persons over the last four years from a high of 268,800 in July 1997 to 197,600 in July 2000. However, as a proportion of all unemployed persons, they remain at a similar level (about 36% to 37%).

More than half (51%) of unemployed persons aged 15–19 years and 81% of those aged 20–24 years were seeking full-time work. More young males (69%) were looking for full-time work than young females (59%).

The main difficulty in gaining employment that young unemployed persons reported was 'insufficient work experience' (17% of unemployed persons aged 15–19 years and 14% of those aged 20–24 years). Other difficulties experienced were 'too many applicants for available jobs' (15% each); and 'lacked the necessary skills/education' (9% and 17%).

THE LONG-TERM UNEMPLOYED

In July 2000, 157,500 persons were considered long-term unemployed, that is, they had been unemployed for twelve months or longer. This represented 29% of all unemployed persons. Of those long-term unemployed persons, the majority (86%) were seeking full-time work and most (88%) reported they had not received any offers of employment during their current period of unemployment.

Being 'too young or too old' was an obstacle to finding work for almost one quarter (23%) of long-term unemployed persons. A 'lack of the necessary skills or education' sought by employers (13%) and their 'own ill health or disability' (12%) were other commonly reported difficulties.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- **1** The statistics in this publication are compiled from data collected in the *Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons Survey* that was conducted throughout Australia in July 2000 as a supplement to the monthly *Labour Force Survey* (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
- **2** The publication *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing relevant to both the LFS and supplementary surveys.

SCOPE

- **3** In addition to persons excluded from the LFS, there were approximately 80,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia who were out of scope of this survey. The exclusion of these persons has only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates produced for individual States and Territories, except the Northern Territory. Further details can be obtained by contacting the person listed on the front cover of this publication.
- **4** Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for persons with handicaps), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.
- **5** The number of unemployed persons in this publication (from table 2 onwards) differs from that published in *Labour Force*, *Australia*, *July 2000* (Cat. no. 6203.0) because persons who were stood down were excluded from this survey, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.
- **6** The estimates in this publication relate to persons covered by the survey in July 2000. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey.

RELIABILITY OF THE

COVERAGE

ESTIMATES

- **7** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors:
 - Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information on sampling error, see the Technical Notes.
 - Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.

SEASONAL FACTORS

8 The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES

9 Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 1999 to take account of the results of the *1996 Census of Population and Housing*. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 1999 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.

EXPLANATORY NOTES continued

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES continued

10 Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample. The reduction in sample size means that the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to previous surveys.

NOTES ON ESTIMATES

- **11** The Government made significant changes to the manner in which it provided employment services to the community between September 1997 and May 1998. As a result, the nature of job search activity undertaken by jobseekers changed.
- **12** Prior to the change in employment service arrangements, the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) provided jobseekers with access to labour market assistance and offices of the then Department of Social Security (DSS) provided jobseekers with access to income support.
- **13** Centrelink progressively replaced the CES and DSS shopfronts from September 1997. A competitive employment services market, the Job Network, was launched on 1 May 1998. The Job Network consists of private, community and government organisations on contract to the government to provide employment services to the community. As from that date, jobseekers register with Centrelink for job search assistance and can choose to go to any of the Job Network employment agencies. The agency then attempts to match jobseekers with jobs that are registered with them by employers.
- **14** During the transition to the new employment services market, Centrelink performed a similar role to the CES. Jobseekers registered at either a CES or Centrelink office, depending on which was operating in their area, for income support and/or job search assistance.
- **15** Due to the changes in the nature of employment services, caution should be used in comparing results for periods prior to the introduction of the changes with results from surveys conducted after the changes occured.

LAST JOB DETAILS

16 Details of the last full-time job of unemployed persons (industry, occupation, duration and reasons for ceasing) are not available from the July 2000 survey. This information was not collected due to the conduct of a statistical impact study on the proposed new LFS questionnaire. For further information see *Information Paper: Labour Force Survey Questionnaire Redesign*, 2000 (Cat no. 6294.0).

PREVIOUS SURVEYS

17 Results of similar surveys on job search experience conducted in July 1984, July 1985, June 1986, July 1988, July 1990, June 1991, and annually from July 1992 were published in previous issues of *Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons, Australia* (Cat. no. 6222.0).

NEXT SURVEY

18 The ABS plans to conduct this survey again in July 2001.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT

INTRODUCTION

- 1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.
- Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the "SE model", which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

3 • An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 4 shows the estimated number of unemployed males in Australia who were looking for full-time work was 270,200. Since this estimate is between 200,000 and 300,000, table T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 6,800 and 7,950 and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general formula:


SE of estimate (est.)

=
$$lowerSE + \left(\left(\frac{(size\ of\ est.\ -\ lower\ est.)}{(upper\ est.\ -\ lower\ est.)} \right) \times (upper\ SE -\ lower\ SE) \right)$$

= $6,800 + \left(\left(\frac{(270,200-200,000)}{(300,000-200,000)} \right) \times (7,950-6,800) \right)$

= 7,600 (rounded to the nearest 100)

4 Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 262,600 to 277,800 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 255,000 to 285,400. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.



CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR continued

5 In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs so that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an aterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g. **0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of less than 25%.

AVERAGES AND MEDIANS

- 6 The RSEs of estimates of average duration of unemployment and median duration of unemployment are obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the average or median (see table T1) and then multiplying the resulting number by the following factors:
 - average duration of unemployment: 1.3
 - median duration of unemployment: 2.0
- The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use of a factor is required. Table 5 shows that the estimated median duration of unemployment for unemployed males in Australia was 25 weeks and shows that the number of males was estimated as 321,100. The SE of 321,100 can be calculated from table T1 (by interpolation) as 8,100. To convert this to a RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate or 8,100/321,100 = 2.5%. The RSE of the estimate of median duration of unemployment is calculated by multiplying this number (2.5%) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 2.0): $2.5 \times 2.0 = 5.0\%$. The SE of this estimate of median duration of unemployment is therefore 5.0% of 25, i.e. about 1 week. Therefore, there are two chances in three that the median duration of unemployment for males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 24-26 weeks, and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 23-27 weeks.
- **8** Estimates of averages and medians produced from population estimates smaller than the values provided in table T2 have RSEs larger than 25% and should be used with caution. Table T2 also indicates the size of population estimates that would produce averages and medians with RSEs greater than 50%, which are considered too unreliable for general use.
- **9** An example of an estimate with a RSE between 25% and 50% is in table 16. The median duration of current period of unemployment for unemployed females with a bachelor degree or higher, is 11 weeks and the number of persons contributing to the estimate is 14,500. Table T2 shows the level at which estimates of median duration have a RSE of 25% is 16,300. Therefore, the estimate of median duration has a high RSE and is shown in table 16 preceded with an asterisk (ie *11).

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

10 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

$$RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$$

PROPORTIONS AND
PERCENTAGES continued

11 Considering the example from the previous page, of the 270,200 unemployed males who were looking for full-time work, 93,300 or 34.5% had been unemployed for 1 year or more. The SE of 93,300 may be calculated by interpolation as 5,100. To convert this to a RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 5,100/93,300 = 5.5%. The SE for 270,200 was calculated previously as 7,600, which converted to a RSE is 7,600/270,200 = 2.8%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is

$$RSE = \sqrt{(5.5)^2 - (2.8)^2} = 4.7\%$$

- **12** Therefore, the SE for the proportion of unemployed males looking for full-time work who had been unemployed for one year or more is 1.6 percentage points (=(34.5/100)x4.7). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons looking for full-time work who have been unemployed for one year or more is between 32.9% and 36.1% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 31.3% to 37.7%.
- **13** Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

14 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

DIFFERENCES

GLOSSARY

Active steps taken to find work

Steps taken during the 12 months up to the time of the survey:

- writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work;
- answering a newspaper advertisement for a job;
- checking Centrelink touchscreens;
- checking factory noticeboards;
- registering with Centrelink for job search assistance;
- contacting an employment agency;
- advertising or tendering for work; and
- contacting friends or relatives.

All difficulties in finding work

All difficulties in finding work experienced during the current period of unemployment.

Average duration (of current period of unemployment)

The duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group.

Centrelink

Centrelink is a statutory authority responsible for delivering a range of Commonwealth Government services, including the registration of persons for job search assistance and income support.

CES

Prior to April 1998, the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) provided a job placement service for jobseekers and managed labour market programs. It also provided the contact point for eligible jobseekers to register for income support.

Duration of current period of unemployment

The period from the time the person began looking for work to the end of the reference week. Thus, this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full-time for two weeks or more to the end of the reference period.

Educational attainment

Measures the highest qualification completed by the respondent, classified according to the ABS Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ) (Cat. no. 1262.0).

Former full-time employees

Unemployed persons, excluding persons who were stood down, who were employees in their last full-time job and who ceased that job in the last two years.

Interstate

Between States and Territories.

Intrastate

Within the State or Territory.

Job leavers

Persons who have ceased their last job voluntarily, because:

- of unsatisfactory work arrangements/pay/hours; or
- the job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they left that job to return to studies; or
- they retired, started a new business, got a better job, left for family or other reasons; or
- they changed locality but not employer/business for employment, personal or other reasons.

Job losers

Persons who ceased their last job involuntarily, because:

- they were retrenched or their business closed down because of financial difficulties; or
- their job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they did not leave that job to return to studies; or
- they left their job because of their own ill health or injury.

Job Network

Job Network is a national network of private, community and government organisations on contract to the government to provide employment placement services to the community. Jobseekers, who are registered with Centrelink for

job search assistance are able to contact any Job Network provider in their area to receive this service.

Looking for part-time work

Actively looking for part-time work (less than 35 hours per week) only.

Main difficulty in finding work

The main difficulty experienced during the current period of unemployment.

Main English-speaking countries

Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.

Median duration of current period of unemployment

The duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal size groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median, and the other, persons whose duration is below it.

Number of offers of employment

The number of separate offers of employment received during the current period of unemployment.

Persons who were stood down

Persons classed as unemployed who had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks, for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

Unemployed persons

Those persons who were not employed during the reference week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available
 except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks up to the end
 of the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

In this publication, unemployed persons excludes those people who were stood down without pay for less than four weeks, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.

Usual gross weekly pay

The amount of usual weekly pay before taxation and other deductions have been made

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
