## NOTES

#### ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication presents information about the labour force status and other characteristics of persons who were born outside Australia, arrived in Australia after 1980, were aged 18 years or over on arrival, and had obtained permanent Australian resident status. In this publication, these persons are referred to as 'migrants'.

Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Characteristics of Migrants Survey, conducted throughout Australia in November 1999 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics monthly Labour Force Survey.

Information collected in the survey included birthplace, labour force characteristics, main source of income, educational attainment and proficiency in spoken English.

ROUNDING

As estimates have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

OVERVIEW

In November 1999 the Australian civilian population aged 15 years and over comprised 14,694,900 persons (excluding institutionalised persons and boarding school pupils; and persons in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia). Of these people, 28% were born outside Australia.

There were 1,163,600 migrants, or 8% of the civilian population aged 15 years and over, in November 1999. Of these, 749,000 were employed, 54,400 were unemployed and 360,200 were not in the labour force.

MIGRATION CATEGORY


Migrants were classified according to whether they were the principal applicant, the partner of the principal applicant or had migrated from New Zealand. Further categories focused on whether the principal applicant was sponsored, unsponsored or a refugee.

In November 1999, 51% of migrants were principal applicants, 22% had arrived as partners of principal applicants, and 17% had arrived from New Zealand.

Of the 598,600 principal applicants, 52% were sponsored, 42% were unsponsored and 6% were refugees. Males made up 61% of principal applicants.

Most (83%) of the sponsored principal applicants were sponsored by family members. Employers sponsored a further 11%, and other persons or organisations sponsored 6% of principal applicants.

BIRTHPLACE

Almost one-third (30%) of migrants were born in Europe and the former USSR. A further 18% were born in Southeast Asia, 18% in Oceania and Antarctica and 12% in Northeast Asia.

More than one-third (35%) of migrants were born in a main English-speaking country. Of this group, 45% were born in the United Kingdom and Ireland and 41% in New Zealand.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT More than half (55%) of all migrants arrived in Australia with a post-school qualification. Of these people 35% had a skilled or basic vocational qualification and a further 34% had a bachelor degree.

However, less than half (48%) of all migrants who arrived with a skilled or basic vocational qualification had their qualification recognised in Australia. Those with a bachelor degree or higher were most likely to have their qualification recognised in Australia.

Migrants with a post-school qualification obtained in the Oceania and Antarctica region, and in Europe and the former USSR were more likely to have had their qualification recognised in Australia (61% each). In comparison, less than one-third (30%) of migrants with post-school qualifications obtained in the Southeast Asian region had their qualification recognised.

**EMPLOYMENT** 

In November 1999, 749,000 migrants (77% of males and 52% of females) were employed. Of these people, 74% had a job just before migration. Approximately 48% of those who had a job before migration had changed major occupation grouping since arriving in Australia. A high proportion of migrants (22%) were employed as Professionals. In addition 25% of females were employed as Intermediate clerical, sales and service workers, while 22% of males were employed as Tradespersons and related workers.


UNEMPLOYMENT

The unemployment rate for migrants was 6.8%. In comparison, the unemployment rate for all persons born outside Australia was 6.6% and for those persons born in Australia, 6.4%. The rate for male and female migrants was 5.8% and 8.1% respectively. The unemployment rate for migrants who were principal applicants was 6.2%, and 7.2% for partners of principal applicants. Migrants from New Zealand had an unemployment rate of 7.0%.

LABOUR FORCE

For those aged 18 to 64 years, the labour force participation rate for migrants was 73.7%, compared to 69.5% for persons born outside Australia and 77.8% for persons born in Australia. The rates for male and female migrants were 81.5% and 57.1% respectively. The participation rate for principal applicants who were sponsored was 65.2% and 94.3% for those sponsored by an employer. Migrants from New Zealand recorded a participation rate of 75.5%.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT AND PARTICIPATION RATES, Birthplace



Those migrants born in Northern America had the highest participation rate (82.2%) followed by those born in Oceania and Antarctica (75.4%). Migrants born in the Middle East and North Africa recorded the lowest participation rate (54.1%).

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

INTRODUCTION

SCOPE

- 1 The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Characteristics of Migrants Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in November 1999 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
- **2** The publication *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing relevant to both the monthly LFS and supplementary surveys.
- **3** In addition to those already excluded from the LFS, there were approximately 95,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia who were out of scope of this survey. The exclusion of these persons has only minor impact on any aggregate estimates that are produced for individual States and Territories, except the Northern Territory. Please contact the person listed on the front cover of this publication if you require more information.
- **4** Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for the handicapped), and inmates of prisons are further excluded from all supplementary surveys.
- **5** This survey was restricted to persons who were not born in Australia and who arrived in Australia after 1980, were aged 18 years or more on arrival and had obtained permanent Australian resident status. In this survey, these people are referred to as 'migrants'.
- **6** The estimates in this publication relate to persons covered by the survey in November 1999. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See *Labour Force, Australia* (Cat. no. 6203.0).

RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES

COVERAGE

- **7** Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors.
  - Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information on sampling error, refer to the Technical Note.
  - Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers, and efficient processing procedures.

SEASONAL FACTORS

**8** The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED

**9** Occupation data are classified according to the second edition of the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations. For a more detailed explanation, see *ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition* (Cat. no. 1220.0).

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES** continued

CLASSIFICATIONS USED continued

- **10** Industry data are classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), a more detailed description of which appears in *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification* (ANZSIC), 1993 (Cat. no. 1292.0).
- **11** Birthplace data are aggregated according to major groups of the *Australian Standard Classification of Countries for Social Statistics (ASCCSS)* (Cat. no. 1269.0). The ASCCSS was developed by the ABS for use whenever demographic, labour and social statistics are classified by countries.
- **12** The educational attainment data item in this survey has been classified according to the *ABS Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ)* (Cat. no. 1262.0).

COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES

- **13** Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 1999 to take account of the results of the 1996 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 1999 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.
- **14** Characteristics of Migrants Surveys conducted up to and including November 1996 were restricted to migrants who arrived in Australia after 1970, were aged 18 years or more on arrival and had obtained permanent Australian resident status. For November 1999, the survey was restricted to migrants who arrived in Australia after 1980. See paragraph 5 for further detail.
- **15** Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eights of the LFS sample. The reduction in sample size means that the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to previous surveys.
- **16** It is impracticable to obtain information relating to labour force status of persons before migration according to the strict definitions used in the monthly LFS. It is for this reason that 'Had a job' and 'Did not have a job' are used to describe pre-migration labour force status, while employed, unemployed and not in the labour force are used to describe labour force status at November 1999.

COMPARABILITY WITH
MONTHLY LFS STATISTICS

**17** Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and that of the monthly LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS.



INTRODUCTION

- 1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.
- 2 SEs for general application are given in the standard error table below. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

**3** • An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 3 shows the estimated number of migrants who arrived in Australia after 1980 was 1,163,600. Since this estimate is between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 the table of standard errors shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 12,150 and 16,050 and can be approximated by interpolation as 12,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 1,150,800 to 1,176,400 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 1,138,000 to 1,189,200. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.



As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate, the higher is the RSE. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high SEs (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In these tables, only estimates with RSEs less than 25% are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. Estimates and percentages with RSEs between 25% and 50% are preceded by an asterisk (\*) to indicate that they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (\*\*), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of less than 25%.

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

**5** Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below:

$$RSE(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

**6** Considering the example above, of the 1,163,600 migrants who arrived in Australia after 1980, there were approximately 711,000 persons or 61.1% whose country of last residence was other than a main English-speaking country. The SE of 711,000 is approximately 10,500 (interpolating between 9,300 and 12,150) so the RSE is 1.5%. The RSE for 1,163,600 is 1.1%. Applying the above formula, the

RSE of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(1.5)^2-(1.1)^2}$  or 1.0%, giving a SE for the proportion (61.1%) of 0.6 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of persons whose country of last residence was other than a main English-speaking country is between 60.5% and 61.7% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 59.9% to 62.3%.

**7** Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

- **8** While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.
- **9** SEs contained in the standard error table below are applicable to all estimates from this survey.

#### GLOSSARY

Birthplace Classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Countries for

Social Statistics (ASCCSS) (Cat. no. 1269.0).

Country of last residence The country in which the person last lived; see *Birthplace* for country

classification.

Educational attainment Measures the highest qualification obtained by the respondent, classified according to the ABS Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ) (Cat. no. 1262.0).

**Employed** Persons aged 15 years and over who, during the reference week:

- worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and own account workers); or
- worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or
- were employees who had a job but were: not at work and were on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or
- were employers, own account workers or contributing family workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.

# Family or friends in Australia just before migration

Classifies migrants according to whether they had relatives and/or friends in Australia before they arrived. Family includes any person who is related by blood, marriage or adoption. The following family categories are identified:

- sons or daughters of any age;
- husband, wife or partner;
- brothers/sisters (in-law);
- parents (in-law);
- fiance/fiancee;
- uncle/aunt; and
- other relatives.

Friends are persons, known to the migrant, who are not related by blood, marriage or adoption.

Government pension or cash

allowance

Comprises any Australian Government family payment, pension or cash allowance, and overseas pension or allowance.

Labour force

For any group, persons who were employed or unemployed, as defined.

Main English-speaking

countries

Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, United States of America and New Zealand.

Migrant A person who was not born in Australia, arrived in Australia after 1980, was aged 18 years and over on arrival and had obtained permanent Australian resident

status.

Migration category

Classifies migrants according to whether they were:

- born in or a citizen of New Zealand; or
- the principal applicant; or
- the partner of a principal applicant.

Not in the labour force

Persons who were not in the categories employed or unemployed as defined.

Occupation

Classified according to the *Australian Standard Classification of Occupations*, *ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition* (Cat. no. 1220.0).

#### **GLOSSARY** continued

Principal applicant

The family member for whom the eligibility to migrate was determined when migration application was made. Principal applicants are classified by whether they were sponsored, unsponsored or refugees.

Proficiency in spoken English

The subjective response given by a respondent to the question 'How well would you say you speak English?'.

Refugee

All persons for whom 'yes' was the response to the question 'When you came to Australia to live, did you come as a refugee?'. A refugee is defined by the Department of Immigration and Multicultural Affairs as a person outside the country of their nationality who is in fear of being persecuted or at risk of serious harm for their civil or political status in that country and their own government cannot or will not protect them.

Sponsored

Migrants who were sponsored include those who had family already in Australia who sponsored them under the Family Reunion criteria, and those who were sponsored by an employer, or some other person or organisation (other than the Australian Government). Sponsorship is a commitment, signed on a government form by a permanent resident, Australian citizen or organisation, to assist an applicant after arrival in Australia.

Unemployed

Persons aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the reference week, and:

- had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of reference week and:
- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available
  except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of
  the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then; or
- were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week (including the whole of the reference week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

Unsponsored

Migrants who were unsponsored include those who came to Australia under special eligibility criteria.
