IN BRIEF

OVERSEAS ARRIVALS AND **DEPARTURES DATA**

There have been significant delays in the receipt of final Overseas Arrivals and Departures (OAD) data from the Department of Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs (DIMIA) for the periods October 2000 to June 2001. Therefore, the statistics for these months have been compiled from information on passports, visas or other travel documents.

How these delays affect this issue:

- Data for the months October 2000 to June 2001 are preliminary and subject to revision.
- Parts of tables 28, 29, 36 and 39 would normally contain data which is not yet available. Where this is the case, the symbol 'n.y.a.' has been used.

Information on the expected release of final OAD data for October 2000 to June 2001 will be updated on the Demography Theme page on the ABS web site http://www.abs.gov.au, and in future issues of Overseas Arrivals and Departures, Australia (cat. no. 3401.0).

INTERNATIONAL VISITOR SURVEY (IVS)

The Bureau of Tourism Research (BTR) released the latest figures on international tourism in Australia on 12 September 2002. These figures are for the nine months ended March 2002 and provide the first detailed insight into international visitors to Australia since the June quarter 2000. Results from the IVS have not been published since the June quarter 2000 due to delays in the processing of passenger card data by DIMIA. Passenger card data is used to weight IVS results.

CULTURAL FUNDING BY **GOVERNMENT**

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) recently released Cultural Funding by Government, Australia, 2000-01 (cat. no. 4183.0). This publication contains estimates of Australian public funding for arts and cultural activities, facilities and services for the three years from 1998-99 to 2000–01.

Tourism draws on a range of cultural services funded by the Commonwealth, state, territory and local governments, including national parks, museums and art galleries.

Total government funding for cultural activities was \$4,454.5m in 2000–01. The Commonwealth Government contributed \$1,639.7m (37%) of this funding, state and territory governments contributed \$1,942.3m (44%) and local governments provided \$872.4m (20%).

Most of the funding supported Heritage activities (\$2,750.8m or 62% of total funding). In particular, Nature parks and reserves (\$985.6m), Libraries and archives (\$838.8m) and museums (804.0m) collectively accounted for 59% of the total government funding. Arts activities received the remaining \$1,703.7m (38%) of government funding.

GAMBLING INDUSTRIES

Gambling Industries, Australia, 2000-01 (cat. no. 8684.0) contains information on employing businesses providing gambling services by:

- state and territory
- sources of income
- items of expenditure
- characteristics of employment.

There were 6,012 employing businesses in Australia involved in the provision of gambling services at the end of June 2001. A large proportion (75%) of these businesses were hospitality clubs, pubs, taverns and bars. The total net takings from gambling during 2000-01 were \$13,838.6m, an increase of 26% since 1997–98.

2001 CENSUS

On Census Night 2001, there were 69,738 persons visiting caravan parks (including overseas visitors and excluding permanent residents).

There were 101,656 caravans, cabins and houseboats counted, making up 1.3% of the total number of dwellings counted (7,810,352).

Queensland had the largest number of caravans, cabins and houseboats, 35,784 (35%), followed by New South Wales with 27,987 (28%) and Western Australia with 14,096 (14%).

A PROFILE OF TWO TOURISM REGIONS: THE GOLD COAST AND THE SUNSHINE COAST

INTRODUCTION

The Gold Coast and the Sunshine Coast are among the most popular tourism destinations in Australia. In Travel by Australians 2001: Annual results of the National Visitor Survey (2002), the Bureau of Tourism Research ranked Tourism Regions according to the number of overnight visitors in 2001. The Gold Coast ranked fourth of all Tourism Regions visited by Australian residents aged 15 years and over (with around 3.5m overnight visitors to this region, or 5% of all overnight visitors). The Sunshine Coast ranked tenth (with about 2.2m overnight visitors or 3% of all overnight visitors).

This article uses data from the 2001 Census of Population and Housing and the latest available tourist accommodation data to profile the Gold Coast and the Sunshine Coast. The data presented include the state of usual residence and birthplace of residents in the regions on Census Night, together with characteristics of overseas visitors in these two regions. Tourist accommodation data, including capacity, occupancy, guest arrivals, average length of stay and takings from accommodation, are also used.

The Gold Coast is located along the southern coastline of Queensland and features beaches and beach front centres such as Main Beach, Surfers Paradise, Mermaid Beach, Burleigh Heads and Coolangatta. It includes inland areas such as Beaudesert and Labrador. The Sunshine Coast is situated north of Brisbane. It includes Noosa, Maroochydore, Mooloolaba and Caloundra.

The regions selected for this article are just two of the geographic areas for which data are available. One of the important aspects of both the Census of Population and Housing and the Survey of Tourist Accommodation is that they can be used to describe the characteristics of small geographic areas and small population groups. Regional data are used by government and private sectors to assist with planning and the provision of services. In terms of business opportunities and market research, these data can also be used to help identify and analyse the demographics of a particular location.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILES OF PEOPLE IN THE GOLD COAST AND THE SUNSHINE COAST TOURISM REGIONS

The following Census data have been aggregated to the Gold Coast Tourism Region (TR) and the Sunshine Coast TR. The Statistical Local Areas that comprise these regions are specified in the appendix to this article, which also includes a map of Tourism Regions in Queensland.

Basic counts

On Census Night, 7 August 2001, 3,655,139 people were enumerated in Queensland (of these, 69,500 were overseas visitors). This represents 19.3% of all people counted in Australia on Census Night.

Including overseas visitors, there were 494,976 people in the Gold Coast TR (13.5% of people counted in Queensland).

There were 252,011 people in the Sunshine Coast TR (6.9%).

Basic counts continued

There were 397,514 people aged 15 years and over (80.3%) in the Gold Coast TR. About the same percentage were aged 15 years and older in the Sunshine Coast TR (201,675 people or 80.0%) and in Queensland (2,884,181 people or 78.9%).

There were 71,625 people (14.5%) in the 65 and over age group in the Gold Coast TR. A greater proportion of people were aged 65 years and older in the Sunshine Coast TR (44,429 people or 17.6%). The percentage of people in this age group was lower in Queensland (by 2.2 percentage points compared to the Gold Coast TR and 5.3 percentage points compared to the Sunshine Coast TR.)

Most people were enumerated in private dwellings (96.6% in the Gold Coast TR, and 97.6% in the Sunshine Coast TR). Almost the same percentage were in this group in Queensland (96.1%).

In the Gold Coast TR, 16,801 people (3.4%) were 'enumerated elsewhere'. This group includes people in non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, guest houses, prisons, hospitals, etc.) and migratory people (those counted on an overnight journey by plane, train or bus). About the same proportion of people were enumerated elsewhere in the Sunshine Coast TR (5,925 people or 2.4%) and in Queensland (143,787 people or 3.9%).

There were 5,624 people who identified as being of Indigenous (Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander) origin in the Gold Coast TR. This represents 1.2% of people counted in that region, excluding overseas visitors. A similar percentage of people identified as being of Indigenous origin in the Sunshine Coast TR, (2,762 people). In Queensland, 112,772 people were in this group (3.1% of people, excluding overseas visitors).

Overseas visitors

The Census allows the identification of people who are usually resident in another country. An overseas visitor is any person who stated that he or she would be in Australia for less than 12 months. Standard Census products present limited variables for overseas visitors, namely: age, sex and marital status.

On 7 August 2001, there were 15,701 overseas visitors in the Gold Coast TR (3.2% of people enumerated in that region) and 5,422 overseas visitors in Sunshine Coast TR (2.2%). These proportions were greater in these regions than for both Queensland and Australia. The 69,500 overseas visitors enumerated in Queensland represented 1.9% of people counted in that state and the 203,101 overseas visitors in Australia represented 1.1% of people counted in the nation.


In the Gold Coast TR, more overseas visitors were female (8,329 or 53.0% of overseas visitors in that region) than male (7.372 or 47.0%). This was also the case in the Sunshine Coast TR (2,983 females or 55.0% of overseas visitors, and 2,439 males or 45.0%).

Overseas visitors continued

Graph F1.1 presents overseas visitors (aged 15 years and older) by age group for both regions.

Almost one-third of overseas visitors in the Gold Coast TR were in the 25-44 age group (4,388 or 32.6% of overseas visitors aged 15 years and older in that region), followed by the 45-64 age group (3,549 or 26.4%) and the 15-24 age group (3,028 or 22.5%).

In the Sunshine Coast TR, overseas visitors tended to be older than those in the Gold Coast TR, with 29.4% (1,396) aged 65 years and over. There were 1,322 overseas visitors aged 45-64 years (27.8%) and 1,044 overseas visitors in the 25–44 age group (22.0%).

Australian state of usual residence on Census Night This variable refers to the place in Australia where a person usually lives, rather than the place where they were counted on Census Night. Census counts compiled on this basis are less likely to be influenced by seasonal factors such as school holidays and snow seasons, and provide information about the usual residents of an area.

Most people in the two regions were counted at home. There were 442,327 people in this group in the Gold Coast TR (92.3% of people, excluding overseas visitors) and 224,858 people (91.2%) in the Sunshine Coast TR. A similar proportion of people in Queensland were counted at home on Census Night (93.7%).


Graph F1.2 presents the state of usual residence on Census Night (excluding overseas visitors and people counted at home) of people enumerated in the Gold Coast and Sunshine Coast TRs. Over 90% of these domestic visitors in both the Gold Coast and the Sunshine Coast were counted in a different Statistical Local Area (rather than the same Statistical Local Area).

In the Gold Coast TR, most people counted in a different Statistical Local Area listed Victoria as their usual state of residence (12,018 people or 34.0%). This was followed by Queensland (11,022 people or 31.2%) and New South Wales (7,758 people or 21.9%).

Australian state of usual residence on Census Night continued

In the Sunshine Coast TR, Queensland was the state of usual residence with the most responses (7,815 people or 38.1%), then Victoria (6,484 people or 31.6%) and New South Wales (3,794 people or 18.5%).


Birthplace

Most people enumerated in the two regions were born in Australia. In the Gold Coast TR, 335,922 people (70.1% of people excluding overseas visitors) were born in Australia, while in the Sunshine Coast TR, 191,897 people (77.8%) were Australian-born. Similarly, for Queensland, 77.7% of people were in this group.

Graphs F1.3 and F1.4 present the top 10 countries of birth (excluding Australia) for persons enumerated in the two regions (excluding overseas visitors).

The top five countries of birth were the same for both regions. As shown below, in the Gold Coast TR, 33,469 people were born in the United Kingdom (7.0%), 31,319 in New Zealand (6.5%), 3,564 in Germany (0.7%), 2,821 in the Netherlands (0.6%) and 2,556 in South Africa (0.5%).


Birthplace continued

As shown in graph F1.4, in the Sunshine Coast TR, 17,103 people were born in the United Kingdom (6.9% of people excluding overseas visitors). There were 10,201 people (4.1%) born in New Zealand, a smaller proportion than that of the Gold Coast TR.

Germany was the country of birth for 2,065 people (0.8%), followed by the Netherlands (1,635 people or 0.7%) and South Africa (1,002 people or 0.4%).

In Queensland, the top four countries of birth (excluding Australia) were the same as in these Tourism Regions. However, the country with fifth greatest responses was Italy rather than South Africa (which ranked seventh).

TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

This section provides the latest available data (June quarter 2002) for tourist accommodation in the Gold Coast TR and the Sunshine Coast TR. Data relate to hotels, motels (including guest houses) and serviced apartment establishments with 15 or more rooms or units.

Establishments and capacity


In the June quarter 2002, there were 147 hotels, motels (and guest houses) and serviced apartments in the Gold Coast TR (15.2% of total establishments in Queensland).

There were 101 total establishments in the Sunshine Coast TR (10.4%).

Graph F1.5 shows the number of establishments in the two regions by accommodation type.

There were 80 serviced apartments in the Gold Coast TR (54.4% of all accommodation types), 40 motels (27.2%) and 27 licensed hotels (18.4%). Compared to the Gold Coast TR, a greater proportion of total establishments in the Sunshine Coast TR were serviced apartments. The Sunshine Coast had 71 serviced apartments (70.3%), 21 motels (20.8%) and nine licensed hotels (8.9%).

Graph F1.6 presents the number of guest rooms of these establishments available in the two regions.


Guest rooms are the maximum number of rooms available at each establishment during the survey period for accommodating short-term paying guests. Units and apartments within serviced apartments are treated as rooms.

Nearly half of all guest rooms in the Gold Coast TR were in licensed hotels (6,399 rooms or 49.1% of all accommodation types). There were 4,740 rooms in serviced apartments (36.4%) and 1,889 rooms in motels (14.5%).

In the Sunshine Coast TR, there were 3,322 rooms in serviced apartments (71.1%) of rooms in accommodation types in that region). The number of rooms in other accommodation types was not published due to confidentiality issues.

There were a total of 52,827 guest rooms available in Queensland in the June quarter 2002. The Gold Coast TR accounted for 13,028 rooms (24.7%) and the Sunshine Coast TR provided 4,670 rooms (8.8%) of the Queensland total.

Occupancy

Graph F1.7 shows room nights occupied and guest nights in the two regions in the June quarter 2002.

Room nights occupied are the total number of nights each guest room or unit was occupied during the survey period. 'Guest nights' refers to the total number of paying guests counted on each night they stayed at the accommodation establishment during the survey period. In this section, data have been rounded to the nearest 100.

There were 326,100 room nights occupied in licensed hotels in the Gold Coast TR (48.7% of all room nights occupied in that region). The next greatest number of room nights occupied was in serviced apartments (248,500 room nights occupied or 37.1%). There were 94,500 room nights occupied in motels (14.1%).


In the Sunshine Coast TR, about 70% of all room nights occupied were in serviced apartments (139,200 room nights occupied).

There were about 640,000 guest nights in both licensed hotels and serviced apartments in the Gold Coast TR. This represents 43.0% of all guest nights in each case. Motels recorded the smallest number with 207,300 guest nights (13.9%).

There were 361,700 guest nights in serviced apartments in the Sunshine Coast TR (74.9% of all guest nights in that region).

Total room nights occupied in the Gold Coast TR accounted for 24.8% of total room nights occupied and 28.8% of total guest nights in Queensland. The Sunshine Coast held a smaller percentage of occupancy (7.3% of room nights occupied in Queensland and 9.3% guest nights occupied).

Graph F1.8 presents occupancy rates for tourist accommodation. Occupancy rates are occupancy expressed as a percentage of the total capacity available for the period.


Occupancy continued

In the June quarter 2002, the room occupancy rate for total accommodation types was 56.4% in the Gold Coast TR (0.2 percentage points higher than in Queensland). Room occupancy rates by accommodation type ranged from 55.0% for motels to 56.0% for licensed hotels and 57.6% for serviced apartments.

In the Sunshine Coast TR, room occupancy rates were 46.1% for serviced apartments and 46.5% for all accommodation types.

Bed occupancy rates were generally lower than room occupancy rates. At the total level, the bed occupancy rate was 38.6% in the Gold Coast TR and 32.9% in the Sunshine Coast TR. The bed occupancy rate for total accommodation types for Queensland was 34.9%.

Guest arrivals

Guest arrivals are the total number of paying guests counted only on the first night they stayed at the accommodation establishment during the survey period.


The number of guest arrivals are provided in graph F1.9. Data have been rounded to the nearest 100.

There were 457,500 total guest arrivals in the Gold Coast TR in the June quarter 2002 (23.5% of guest arrivals for Queensland). There was a smaller proportion of guest arrivals in the Sunshine Coast TR (155,500 arrivals or 8.0% of guest arrivals for Queensland).

Over half of all guest arrivals in the Gold Coast TR were in licensed hotels (250,300 arrivals or 54.7%). This was followed by 146,800 guest arrivals in serviced apartments (32.1%) and 60,400 guest arrivals in motels (13.2%).

In the Sunshine Coast TR, two thirds of guest arrivals were in serviced apartments (103,600 arrivals).


Average length of stay

Graph F1.10 presents the average length of stay in both the Gold Coast TR and the Sunshine Coast TR. Data are expressed in numbers of days and calculated by dividing guest nights by guest arrivals.

In the June quarter 2002, the greatest average length of stay of all accommodation types was in serviced apartments in the Gold Coast TR (4.4 days) and in the Sunshine Coast TR (3.5 days).

The average length of stay for all accommodation types was 3.3 days in the Gold Coast TR (0.6 days more than in Queensland) and 3.1 in the Sunshine Coast TR (0.4 days more than Queensland).

Takings from accommodation Since 1 July 2000, takings from accommodation include gross revenue from the provision of accommodation, including the Goods and Services Tax. Takings from meals are excluded.

Graph F1.11 presents takings by accommodation type for both regions.


In the June quarter 2002, takings from all accommodation types were \$69.1m in the Gold Coast TR (24.5% of takings in Queensland) and \$21.9m in the Sunshine Coast TR (7.7%).

In the Gold Coast TR, most takings were generated from hotels (\$40.5m or 58.6% of total takings), followed by serviced apartments (\$21.2m or 30.6%) and motels (\$7.4m or 10.8%).

Takings from accommodation continued

In the Sunshine Coast TR, takings from accommodation in serviced apartments were \$15.2m or 69.6% of total takings.

FURTHER INFORMATION

This article provides examples of some of the information that is available for Tourism Regions and other geographic levels (such as Statistical Local Areas). Many more variables describing the population of these areas are available, including age, sex, income levels, marital status and family type.

Census data used in this article were obtained from first release Basic Community Profiles (BCPs). BCPs are free of charge on the ABS web site down to the Statistical Local Area geographic level and are available for purchase for Collection Districts (the smallest available geographic level). These products comprise 21 tables containing the key characteristics of persons, families and dwellings. Second release BCPs, due for release in November 2002, will comprise 12 additional tables, including industry by age by sex of employed persons, and occupation by age by sex.

Census Snapshots, which present information in a narrative format, are free of charge on the ABS web site at the Australia, state/territory, Capital City Statistical Division, and Statistical Local Area geographic levels.

A range of other regional data are available, including regional statistics compendium publications published under cat. no. 1362, followed by the appropriate state/territory trailing character. These annual publications present summary demographic, economic, social and environmental statistics for geographic areas such as Local Government Areas, Statistical Districts and Statistical Divisions. Data may include: population, births, deaths, building approvals, agriculture, retail turnover, industry, education and training, health, labour force, wages and prices, local government finance, overseas trade, tourism, transport, and environmental protection and assets statistics.




AUSTRALIA

Establishments

The total number of accommodation establishments rose marginally in the June quarter 2002 compared to the June quarter 2001 to 3,826 establishments.

Queensland, Victoria and South Australia all recorded increases in the total number of establishments.

NUMBER OF ESTABLISHMENTS—Jun qtr 2001–Jun qtr 2002




Guest rooms

The total number of guest rooms increased marginally (up 310 rooms) in the 12 months to June 2002, driven by an increase in rooms in serviced apartments (up 712 guest rooms or 2%).

Room nights occupied

In original terms, room nights occupied are at their lowest level since the June quarter 1999, down 0.5% in the June quarter 2002 compared to the June quarter 2001. In trend terms, room nights occupied increased 0.5% compared to the June quarter 2001.

QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Australia




The greatest decline in trend terms was seen in the Northern Territory (down 5%).







At current prices, the trend estimate for accommodation takings for the June quarter 2002 is the lowest it has been since the September quarter 2000.


QUARTERLY TAKINGS FROM ACCOMMODATION, Australia: Trend


In constant price terms, the trend estimate for takings from accommodation declined in each state and territory except for South Australia (up 1% from June quarter 2001 to June quarter 2002). The biggest decrease in takings from accommodation at constant prices was in the Northern Territory (down 9%), followed by Victoria (down 8%) and New South Wales (4%).


Capacity

The capacity of accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms in New South Wales fell slightly (2%) in the June quarter 2002 compared to the June quarter 2001.

Room nights occupied

Room nights occupied increased slightly in original and seasonally adjusted terms in the June quarter 2002 compared to the June quarter 2001 (up 0.4% and 0.9% respectively). The trend estimate for room nights occupied fell marginally.

QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, New South Wales



Takings from accommodation

Total takings from accommodation establishments rose 0.6% in original terms in the June quarter 2002 compared to the corresponding period in 2001. Takings from serviced apartments and licensed hotels increased by 5.2% and 0.7% respectively, while takings from motels and guest houses fell 1.3%.


Capacity

The total capacity of accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms in Victoria rose 2% in the June guarter 2002 compared to the June quarter 2001. The number of guest rooms in licensed hotels rose for the ninth consecutive quarter, up 3% on the June quarter 2001. The number of rooms in serviced apartments also increased (5%), while the number of rooms in motels and guest houses declined marginally.

QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Victoria






QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Queensland



QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, South Australia











QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Northern Territory






QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS OCCUPIED, Australian Capital Territory

INTRODUCTION

The statistics in this section are sourced from incoming and outgoing passenger cards collected by the Department of Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs (DIMIA).

There have been significant delays in the receipt of final Overseas Arrivals and Departures (OAD) data from DIMIA for the periods October 2000 to June 2001.


Therefore, the statistics for the months of October 2000 to June 2001 are preliminary estimates of short-term (less than 12 months) movements of visitors to Australia, compiled from information on passports, visas or other travel documents.

The statistics presented here supplement those already released in the publication, Overseas Arrivals and Departures, Australia (cat. no. 3401.0).

SHORT-TERM VISITOR **ARRIVALS**


An estimated 1,029,643 short-term visitors arrived in Australia during the June quarter 2002, a 6% decrease on the June quarter 2001. Arrivals also fell in seasonally adjusted and trend terms, by 6% and 5%, respectively.

OVERSEAS ARRIVALS, Short-term visitors, Total




In original terms, the major source countries of short-term visitor arrivals to Australia during the June quarter 2002 were New Zealand (19%), Japan (15%), and the United Kingdom and the United States of America (9% each).


OVERSEAS ARRIVALS, Short-term visitors, NZ: Trend




OVERSEAS ARRIVALS, Short-term visitors, Japan: Trend

In trend terms, short-term visitor arrivals from the four major source countries fell when compared to the June quarter 2001. Short-term visitor arrivals from Japan showed the smallest decrease (1%). Visitors from the United States of America fell by the largest amount (11%).

Purpose of journey

The reason most short-term visitors came to Australia in the June quarter 2002 was for a holiday (48% or 499,364), followed by visiting friends and relatives (16% or 165,510).

Business travel accounted for 11% of all arrivals (112,586) with most coming from New Zealand (29% or 32,259) and the United States of America (15% or 16,472).

Length of stay

Most visitors (64% or 659,114) planned to spend less than two weeks in Australia.

European visitors intended to stay the longest, with those from Switzerland recording the longest median intended stay at 30 days, followed by those from the Netherlands (29 days) and Germany (23 days).

Age of visitors

Visitors in the 25-34 age group made up almost one-quarter of all short-term visitor arrivals (23%) during the June quarter 2002.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

1 This publication brings together tourism data from a number of sources, including data from the quarterly Survey of Tourist Accommodation (STA) and the Overseas Arrivals and Departures Collection (OAD).

TOURIST ACCOMMODATION

2 The series of tables and graphs in the tourist accommodation section of this publication contain statistics for Australia and each state and territory. Statistics in this publication are the latest available for the June quarter 2002.

Scope and coverage

- Tourist accommodation establishments included in the STA and for 3 which data appear in this publication are: hotels, motels and guest houses with facilities; and serviced apartments which are available to the general public for a minimum of one night. Every third year, beginning with 2000, the STA is expanded to include: holiday flats, units and houses of letting entities; caravan parks; and visitor hostels. Further information can be found in Tourist Accommodation, Australia (cat. no. 8635.0), available from ABS bookshops or by contacting Neil McKellar-Stewart on Brisbane 07 3222 6364.
- 4 Data collected and published relate to both long-term and short-term guests at hotels, motels and guest houses. Data relate only to short-term guests at serviced apartments. For hotels, motels and guest houses the amount of long-term residential activity is considered insignificant. This activity is included in the data presented.
- As a result of the separate classification of serviced apartments from the March quarter 1998, there have been several changes to definitions of accommodation units. Some units which were previously classified as hotels, motels or holiday flats have been reclassified to serviced apartments. A small number of establishments previously classified as motels have been reclassified as holiday flats, units or houses and are no longer in scope of the quarterly STA.
- From the March quarter 1998, only those in-scope establishments with 15 or more rooms or units are covered by the survey. Data for the 1997 calendar year have been recompiled on the new basis. Data for time periods prior to 1997 have been recompiled to only include accommodation establishments with 15 or more rooms, but have not been recompiled to reflect the inclusion of serviced apartments as a separate classification. This means that data for periods prior to the March quarter 1997 only include hotels, motels and guest houses. It should be noted that some serviced apartments may have been included in STA estimates prior to the March quarter 1997, as they may previously have been classified as hotels or motels, as outlined in paragraph 5 above

Scope and coverage continued

- 7 As a result of the changes to the scope and classification of accommodation establishments there is a break in all time series between the December quarter 1996 and the March quarter 1997.
- From 1 July 2000, the item 'takings from accommodation' includes the Goods and Services Tax (GST). By including GST, the survey continues to measure the total cost of accommodation to the consumer. Takings relating to the supply of meals continue to be excluded and bed taxes have ceased to apply.

Estimates at constant prices

- Estimates of quarterly takings from accommodation contained in this publication are also expressed in terms of average 1989-90 prices (constant prices). These estimates are presented in original, seasonally adjusted and trend terms for Australia and each state and territory. Monthly data at constant prices are not available.
- **10** Takings from accommodation for each state and territory have been deflated using the All Groups Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the relevant capital city. The CPI has been used as it is a measure of the general extent of price change (inflation) in the economy. (Note: the CPI is only produced for capital cities.) As an example, an increase of 10% in the New South Wales takings from accommodation at 1989-90 prices over a period would mean that New South Wales takings from accommodation increased 10% more than the Sydney CPI over that period, implying that takings from accommodation in New South Wales increased 10% more than inflation.
- **11** General information on price deflators and constant price estimates is contained in section 4 of Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1989 (cat. no. 5216.0).

INTERNATIONAL TOURISM

12 The tables and graphs in the international tourism section of this publication contain statistics on short-term visitors arriving in Australia. Short-term movement relates to an intended length of stay of less than 12 months.

Source of the statistics

- 13 Persons arriving in, or departing from Australia, are required to complete questionnaires in the form of Incoming and Outgoing Passenger Cards. These cards provide information to the Department of Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs (DIMIA) for administrative purposes and serve as the source of statistics of overseas arrivals and departures. In accordance with the Census and Statistics Act 1905, information relating to individuals, individual flights or ships and individual carriers, which is contained in these cards or other documents, is treated as confidential by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.
- **14** Implementation of the *Migration Reform Act 1992* by DIMIA required that a health and character check be incorporated with the Incoming Passenger Card. The redesign of both passenger cards followed and new passenger cards were officially introduced on 1 September 1994. The main statistical change relating to data in this publication affects the purpose of journey classification and constitutes a break in time series for this data item.

Source of the statistics continued

- **15** From July 1998 there have been changes to passenger cards completed by travellers entering and leaving Australia, as well as to international passenger procedures and DIMIA computer systems. Please refer to the May 1998 issue of Overseas Arrivals and Departures, Australia (cat. no. 3401.0) for more information.
- 16 There have been significant delays in the receipt of final Overseas Arrivals and Departures data from DIMIA for October 2000 to June 2001. Therefore, the statistics for these months are compiled from information on passports, visas or other travel documents.

Scope

17 The statistics in this publication relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than the number of travellers (i.e. the multiple movements of individual persons during a given reference period are each counted separately). The statistics exclude the movements of operational air and ships' crew, of transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and of passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not then engaged on regular voyages.

Estimation method

18 Overseas arrival and departure statistics are derived from a combination of full enumeration and sampling. All movements with a duration of stay of less than one year are sampled. Statistics relating to these movements are therefore estimates, which may differ from statistics which would have been obtained if details of all these movements had been processed.

Corrections and imputations

- 19 Imprecision due to sampling errors should not be confused with errors arising from imperfections in reporting, which may occur in any data collection, whether sampled or not. Every effort is made to minimise such errors, by careful design of the passenger cards and through checks on the information once it is received. During the edit process some items are corrected where they conflict with other known information. Missing replies to certain items such as age are also imputed by reference to other related items.
- **20** Errors of this kind differ from discrepancies arising from the fact that certain information reflects the travellers' intentions at the time the passenger cards were completed. These intentions are, of course, subject to change. Particularly affected is the distinction between permanent and temporary movement and in the latter case, length of intended stay, country in which most time will be spent, and purpose of journey.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

21 Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates are shown in various graphs and tables throughout this publication. In these series, account has been taken of normal seasonal factors, 'trading day' effects (arising from the varying number of Sundays, Mondays, Tuesdays etc. in the month) and the effect of movement in the date of Easter which may, in successive years, affect figures for the months of March and April. SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT continued

- **22** Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effect of other influences on the series may be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment procedures do not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. Irregular influences that are highly volatile can make it difficult to interpret the movement of the series even after adjustment for seasonal variation, and cannot be assumed to indicate changes in the trend.
- 23 As happens with all seasonally adjusted series, the seasonal factors are reviewed annually to take account of each additional year's data. For the Survey of Tourist Accommodation, the results of the latest review are shown in the March quarter issue of this publication. For the Overseas Arrivals and Departures series, the results of the latest review of seasonal factors are shown in the September quarter issue.

TREND ESTIMATES

- 24 Smoothing seasonally adjusted series reduces the impact of the irregular component of the seasonally adjusted series and creates the trend estimates. The trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term Henderson moving average to the monthly seasonally adjusted series and a 7-term Henderson moving average to the quarterly seasonally adjusted series. The 7- and 13-term Henderson averages (like all Henderson averages) are symmetric but, as the end of a time series is approached, asymmetric forms of the average are applied. Unlike the weights of the standard 7-term Henderson moving average, the weights employed with the quarterly data have been tailored to suit the particular characteristics of individual series.
- 25 While these techniques enable smoothed data for the latest period to be produced, the process does result in revisions to the smoothed series, principally of recent months, as additional observations become available. There may also be revisions as a result of the re-estimation of the seasonal factors. GLOSSARY

Average length of stay

Average length of stay is expressed in numbers of days and calculated:

- for hotels, motels and guest houses, by dividing guest nights by guest arrivals and
- for serviced apartments, by dividing unit nights occupied by unit lettings.

Average nightly guests per occupied room

Guest nights divided by room nights occupied.

Average nightly rooms occupied per establishment The average number of rooms per establishment multiplied by the occupancy rate for the survey period.

Average takings per establishment The takings from accommodation for the survey period divided by the number of establishments at the end of the survey period.

Average takings per guest night The takings from accommodation divided by the total number of guest nights for the survey period.

Average takings per room night available The takings from accommodation divided by the total room nights available for the survey period.

Average takings per room night occupied The takings from accommodation divided by the total number of room nights occupied for the survey period.

Balance on travel services

The balance on travel services is travel exports minus travel imports.

Capacity

Capacity in terms of guest rooms/units or bed spaces is the maximum number available to accommodate paying guests during the survey period. Capacity closed temporarily for seasonal reasons is included.

Country of intended stay

For Australian residents travelling abroad for short-term trips, this relates to the country in which they intend to spend the most time.

Country of residence

Refers to the country in which short-term visitors regard themselves as living or as last having lived.

The classification of countries in this publication is based on the Standard Australian Classification of Countries. For more detailed information, refer to the Australian Bureau of Statistics publication Standard Australian Classification of Countries (SACC), 1998 (cat. no. 1269.0).

Establishments

All hotels, motels, guest houses and serviced apartments within the scope of the survey which operated for any part of the survey period, or which closed temporarily for the quarter for seasonal reasons.

Gross Domestic Product

(GDP)

GDP equals consumption by households and government, plus investment in fixed capital and inventories or where separately identified, investment in fixed capital and investment in inventories, plus exports less imports of goods and services.

Guest nights

The total number of paying guests counted on each night they stayed at the accommodation establishment.

Guest rooms

The maximum number of rooms available at each establishment during the survey period for accommodating short-term paying guests. Units and apartments within serviced apartments are treated as rooms in these survey results.

Median length of stay

Defined as the length of stay which divides the relevant population into two equal parts, one half of the cases falling below the median and the other half exceeding it.

Occupancy rate

Occupancy expressed as a percentage of total capacity available during the survey period, e.g. for the period

Room nights occupied Room occupancy rate (%) = (Guest rooms) x (no. of days in the period)

Person days

Defined as the number of short-term visitor arrivals or short-term resident departures multiplied by the intended length of stay for each visitor or resident.

Purpose of journey

From the September quarter 1994, all statistics relating to purpose of journey are published using the following categories: Convention/conference, Business, Visiting friends/relatives, Holiday, Employment, Education and Other. In tabulations of data collected before September 1994 quarter, the 'Other' category includes 'In transit', and the 'Holiday' category includes 'Student vacation' and 'Accompanying business visitor'.

Room nights available

The total of guest rooms/units available multiplied by the number of days for which each was available during the survey period.

Room nights occupied

The total number of nights each guest room/unit was occupied by a paying guest during the survey period.

Rooms per establishment

The average number of rooms/units per establishment.

Short-term movement

Movements of travellers whose intended or actual length of stay is less than 12 months are classified as short-term. The tables for visitor arrivals and resident departures in this publication relate to short-term movements only.

Star grading

The grading of hotels and motels with facilities and serviced apartments is based on the classification system used by members of the Australian Automobile Association (AAA). The gradings are allocated according to a points system based on the amenities and facilities available to guests. Details of the grading scheme are contained in the individual tour guides produced by members of the AAA. For the purpose of classifying establishments to a star grading in this publication, 'half' star gradings are ignored (e.g. a two and a half star grading has been shown as a two star).

Takings from accommodation

Gross revenue from the provision of accommodation, including (since 1 July 2000) the Goods and Services Tax (GST). Prior to GST, bed taxes were included. Takings from meals are excluded. Takings from accommodation for each month generally represent the takings received during that month. Where payments are received in advance of, or after, the provision of accommodation to guests, the monthly figure for takings from accommodation may not necessarily bear a direct relationship to the number of guests accommodated during the month.

Tourism

Comprises the activities of persons travelling to and staying in places outside their usual environment for not more than one consecutive year for leisure, business and other purposes not related to the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.

Tourism consumption

The total consumption made by a visitor or on behalf of a visitor for and during his/her trip and stay at the destination.

Tourism GDP

Tourism gross value added plus taxes paid less subsidies received on tourism related products as these are reflected in prices that visitors actually pay. Tourism GDP will generally have a higher value than tourism value added. Tourism GDP is a satellite account construct to enable a direct comparison with the most widely recognised national accounting aggregate, GDP. While it is useful in this context, the tourism gross value added measure should be used when making comparisons with other industries or between countries.

Tourism gross value added

Measures the value of tourism gross output at basic prices by all industries which supply tourism products, less the value of the inputs used in producing these tourism products. Gross value added is the preferred national accounts measure of industry production as it excludes taxes and subsidies on products.

Travel exports

All goods and services (e.g. accommodation, meals, entertainment, gifts and souvenirs) acquired for personal use by non-resident travellers in Australia (usually individuals who stay for less than one year).

Travel imports

All goods and services (e.g. accommodation, meals, entertainment, gifts and souvenirs) acquired for personal use by Australians travelling abroad (usually for less than one year).

Visitor

Any person travelling to a place other than that of his/her usual environment for less than twelve months and whose main purpose of trip is other than the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited.
