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#### NOTE

(i) New or amended concepts and definitions were introduced in the September 1983 survey, causing a break in series. Refer to paragraphs 21 to 27 for more detail.

#### Introduction

Since 1975, the ABS has conducted regular surveys of persons not in the labour force, seeking information on their labour force aspirations and, if appropriate, their availability for work and reasons for not currently looking for work. As interest has grown over the years in this component of the population, various modifications have been made to the survey to provide a more comprehensive range of data. The September 1983 survey was further modified by the introduction of a new concept, 'marginal attachment to the labour force' (see paragraphs 4 and 12), and some improvements were made to the measure of discouraged jobseekers. These changes caused a break in series (see paragraphs 21 to 27).

2. Persons not in the labour force are by definition those persons who do not meet the criteria that would enable them to be classified as being in the labour force. To be classified as being in the labour force, a person must be aged 15 years or over and be either employed or unemployed. Definitions of *employed* and *unemployed* are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

3. Persons not in the labour force, therefore, include all persons aged 15 years and over who are not employed, who want work but do not meet the criteria to be classified as unemployed; who do not want to work; or who through incapacity or infirmity can not work.

4. The revised survey now provides more detailed characteristics concerning those persons who do not meet

all of the criteria to be classified as unemployed but who have marginal attachment to the labour force. For the purposes of this survey, marginal attachment includes persons who were not actively looking for work but who wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks and persons who were actively looking for work but were not available for work in the week prior to interview (the survey week).


5. The criteria determining those in the labour force are based on actual activity (i.e. working or looking for work) during the survey week. The criteria associated with marginal attachment to the labour force, in particular the concepts of wanting to work, availability to start work and reasons for not actively looking, are more subjective and are not based on respondents' actual activity. Hence, the measurement of these criteria is affected by the respondents' own interpretation of the concepts used. Individual respondent's interpretation is affected by such factors as the respondent's work aspirations, as well as their family, economic and other commitments.

6. Discouraged jobseekers (a subcategory of those with marginal attachment) are those persons who were available to start work within four weeks but who were not actively looking for work for reasons which are assessed to indicate discouragement. (Refer to paragraph 16 for a fuller definition).

7. The survey also provides details of those persons who stated that they want to work, but who are not defined as having marginal attachment to the labour force.

8. The various groups of persons either in the labour force or not in the labour force, including those marginally attached to the labour force, are shown schematically in the following diagram.

9. This survey was run in conjunction with the March 1984 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia. During the two weeks beginning Monday 12 March 1984 specially trained interviewers asked questions of those of the 72,000 respondents in the March labour force survey who fell within the scope of this survey.

10. A preliminary publication containing a summary of the survey results was issued on 23 July 1984 (6219.0). Preliminary estimates from the next survey of Persons Not In the Labour Force (September 1984) will be published in the next edition of that bulletin.

#### Scope

11. This supplementary survey to the labour force survey includes all persons not in the labour force aged fifteen years and over except:

- (a) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- (b) overseas residents in Australia;
- (c) dependants of non-Australian defence forces personnel stationed in Australia.

#### Definitions

12. Persons with marginal attachment to the labour force are those who were not in the labour force in survey week and:

- (a) wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks; or
- (b) were actively looking for work but were not available to start work within four weeks.

13. Persons who wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks are those who:

- (a) in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week had taken active steps to find work and who were available to start work within four weeks, even though they were unable to start in survey week for reasons other than own temporary illness or injury; or
- (b) were available to start work within four weeks and:
  - (i) although claiming to have looked for work in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week, and had not taken *active* steps to find work; or

(ii) in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week had not looked for work but in the survey answered 'yes' or 'maybe' to the question 'Even though you have not been looking for work would you like a full-time or part-time job?'.

14. Persons who were actively looking for work but were not available to start work within four weeks are those who in the four weeks up to the end of survey week had taken active steps to find work but were not available to start work in survey week for reasons other than own temporary illness or injury or within the four weeks following the interview.

15. Active steps to find work include writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.

16. Discouraged jobseekers are those persons with marginal attachment to the labour force who wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks but whose main reason for not taking active steps to find work was that they believed they would not be able to find a job for any of the following reasons: considered by employers to be too young or too old; difficulties with language or ethnic background; lack the necessary training, skills or experience; no jobs in their locality or line of work or no jobs at all.

17. Persons are classified as *married* if they are reported as being married (including de facto) and their spouse was a usual resident of the household at the time of the survey. The *not-married* category includes persons who have never married, or are separated, widowed or divorced; as well as those who, although reported as being married, did not have a spouse who usually lived in the household. For effects on estimates of marital status, see paragraph 28.

18. Further definitions of labour force and demographic categories appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

#### **Population Benchmarks**

19. Following the change in official population estimates to a place of usual residence basis after the 1981 Census the population bechmarks used in this survey are compiled according to place of usual residence. For an explanation of the new conceptual basis of population estimates see *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0). 20. The change from 1976 population Census based benchmarks to 1981 population Census based benchmarks has had little effect on the movements in the estimates between the September 1983 and March 1984 surveys.

#### Discontinuities in the series

21. The modifications made to the September 1983 survey included the addition of certain groups of persons excluded from previous 'Persons Not in the Labour Force' surveys and several alterations to the order and wording of questions used in the survey.

22. Only those respondents who reported that they were available to start work within the next four weeks were asked their reasons for not actively looking for work. Hence persons classified as discouraged jobseekers in this survey must have been available to start work within four weeks. This availability criterion was not applied to the definition of discouraged jobseekers in surveys prior to September 1983. The application of the criterion removes the previous anomally that persons were classified as discouraged jobseekers regardless of whether or not they were available to start work in the near future.

23. Persons not in the labour force aged 65 years and over were added to the September 1983 survey and may be classified as being discouraged jobseekers or as otherwise having marginal attachment to the labour force.

24. Persons belonging to two other groups were added to the survey in September 1983:

- (a) persons who were actively looking for work but who were unable to start in survey week for reasons other than their own temporary illness or injury. These persons are classified as having marginal attachment to the labour force, but not as discouraged jobseekers; and
- (b) persons who had been away from work without pay for four weeks or longer and had not been actively looking for work. Of these persons, those who wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks are classified as having marginal attachment to the labour force, but not as discouraged jobseekers.

25. Respondents not in the labour force who wanted to work and were available to start work within four weeks were asked their *main* reason for not actively looking for work to determine, among other things, whether the respondents should be classified as discouraged jobseekers. In surveys prior to September 1983, the *main* reason was not asked, and respondents were classified as discouraged jobseekers or otherwise according to the 'highest ranked reason' given for not actively looking for work.

26. An extra reason for not actively looking for work ('no jobs at all') was added to the discouraged jobseeker list.

27. A change was made to the ordering of the questions. The responses to some questions may differ from responses in previous surveys because of this change to question order and the subjective nature of some of the questions. 28. Paragraph 17 outlines the definition of marital status now used in this survey. Consequently, estimates of marital status contained in this publication are not comparable with estimates published for this survey in previous years, which classified as married all respondents who reported that they were married or separated.

#### **Reliability** of the estimates

29. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:

- (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. More information on this topic is given in the Technical note.
- (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.



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
#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

In March 1984 there were 750,000 persons who were not in the labour force but had marginal attachment to the labour force. 154,200 (21 per cent) were males and 595,800 (79 per cent) were females. Of the males, 98,400 (64 per cent) reported that their main reason for not actively looking for work was a personal reason and 259,400 (44 per cent) females reported that their main reason for not actively looking for work was a family reason. Overall 528,000 persons (70 per cent) reported that their main reason for not actively looking for work was a family reason.




The following graph illustrates the seasonal pattern in the numbers of persons not in the labour force who were actively looking for work. In March 1984 there were 25,700 persons in this group, while in September 1983 there were 53,800 persons. Since September 1983 it has been possible to split this population into those persons who were available to start work within four weeks and those who were not. The figures from the September 1983 and March 1984 surveys indicate that most of the seasonal change occurs in the group of people who were actively looking for work but not available to start work within four weeks. In September 1983 there were 31,900 persons who were actively looking for work but not available to start work within four weeks and in March 1984 there were only 7,000 such persons. A possible explanation for this pattern relates to school leavers. It is likely that for September 1983 end of year school leavers were already looking for work but not available to start work within four weeks, and by March 1984 most had either found a job or had gone back to school leaving a significantly smaller number of persons who were actively looking for work but were not available to start.





Of the 595,800 females who were not in the labour force but had marginal attachment to the labour force 530,800 (89 per cent) had previously had a job. 425,000 (80 per cent) of these females had not worked for one year or more, and, 110,800 (21 per cent) had not worked for more than 10 years. There were 154,200 males who were not in the labour force but had marginal attachment to the labour force. 109,900 (71 per cent) of these males had previously had a job. Of these 109,900 males, 48,900 (44 per cent) had worked within the last year. Almost all males had worked within the last 10 years.



Of the 21,200 male discouraged jobseekers who had previously had a job, 15,500 (73 per cent) last worked one year or more ago and of the 83,800 discouraged females who had previously had a job, 72,000 (86 per cent) last worked more than one year ago. Comparison of diagrams 3 and 4 indicates that, for discouraged jobseekers who had previously had a job, work experience is much less likely to have occurred in the last 12 months than is the case with all persons with marginal attachment to the labour force who have previously had a job. This is true of both males and females.



Of the 224,000 persons not in the labour force who wanted to work but were not actively looking for work and were not available to start work within four weeks 120,000 persons reported that they were not available to start work within four weeks due to a personal reason. 48,300 (40 per cent) of these persons were in the 15 to 24 year age group. Of the 224,000 persons, 86,400 reported that they were not available to start work within four weeks due to a family reason. 48,000 (56 per cent) of these persons were in the 25 to 34 year age group.

#### **Estimation procedure**


The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

#### **Reliability of the estimates**

Since the estimates in this publication are based on 2 information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability: that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

An example of the calculation and the use of 4 standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 20 on the previous page shows the estimated number of females in Australia who were not in the labour force and who wanted to work but were not available to start work within four weeks was 175,300. Since this estimate is between 100,000 and 200,000 the standard error for Australia will be between 3,900 and 5,100 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 4,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 170,500 to 180,100 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 165,700 to 184,900. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



5. As can be seen from the standard error table, *the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error*. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, of 7. the 175,300 females who wanted to work but were not available to start work within four weeks only 20,100 or 11.5 per cent were studying. The standard error of 20,100 is approximately 2,000 so the realtive standard error is 10.0 per cent. The relative standard error for 175,300 is 2.7 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(10.0)^2 - (2.7)^2}$  or 9.6 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (11.5 per cent) of 1.1 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of females who were studying and who wanted to work but were not available to start work within four weeks was between 10.4 per cent and 12.6 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion was within the range 9.3 per cent to 13.7 per cent.

8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) = 
$$\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
