

#### DECEMBER QUARTER 1992 - KEY POINTS

#### TREND ESTIMATES

- The trend estimate of gross domestic product

   average (GDP(A)), increased by 0.6% in the December quarter 1992.
- The growth recorded in December quarter follows an identical increase of 0.6% in September quarter 1992.
- The trend estimate of GDP(A) has increased by 2.4% since the December quarter 1991.
- The trends of all three independent measures of GDP (I, E and P) have shown modest growth over each of the last five quarters.
- The trend in GDP(A) per capita has increased marginally in each of the last four quarters, after declining for the previous two years.

#### SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

- The movements in seasonally adjusted GDP(A) over the last three quarters are similar
  to those of the trend estimates, with consecutive percentage movements of 0.4, 0.8 and
  0.7%.
- There is more diversity of movement between the three independent measures in the December quarter: GDP(I) grew by 0.2%, GDP(E) grew by 1.3% and GDP(P) grew by 0.6%.
- The gross non-farm product average (GNFP(A)) increased by 0.5% in the December quarter, following growth of 0.5% in September quarter 1992.

## REVISIONS THIS

#### Seasonal reanalysis

Seasonally adjusted estimates have been revised following the annual reanalysis of all adjusted series, except for the components of GDP(P) which were reanalysed using the September quarter 1992 data published in the Information Paper Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989-90 Prices (5243.0).

#### Other revisions

Quarterly estimates for all aggregates have been revised in accordance with revised annual estimates which will be published later in Australian National Accounts: National Income, Expenditure and Product, 1991-92 (5204.0).

#### CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

This is the first issue of 5206.0 to include statistics previously published in Australian National Accounts: Gross Product, Employment and Hours Worked (5222.0). It is also the first issue of 5206.0 to include constant price estimates at average 1989-90 prices. To coincide with these developments the opportunity has been taken to introduce a number of other changes to this publication. The changes were outlined in an Information Paper entitled Change in Format of the Quarterly Australian National Accounts Publication (5244.0) which was issued on 8 March 1993.

The changes relate mainly to the introduction of an improved layout of the commentary and a re-ordering of the tables. State tables have been omitted, but will be included in a new quarterly publication entitled Australian National Accounts: State Accounts (5242.0). (Copies of the State tables previously published in 5206.0 can be obtained in advance of the release of the December quarter 1992 issue of 5242.0 by calling Ross Harvey on (06) 252 6713.)

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE (continued)

The ratios of stocks to sales and imports to sales have been changed and are now expressed in current price terms using a narrower definition of sales (see paragraph 24 in the *Explanatory Notes*).

The only change in concepts or definitions relates to the treatment of the statistical discrepancy and the definition of gross national expenditure. A new treatment has been adopted for presenting the statistical discrepancy (the difference between GDP(I) and GDP(E)). Until now, the expenditure side of the domestic production account has been shown as adding through to GDP(I) because the statistical discrepancy has been shown as one of the expenditure components. In this issue, the expenditure components are shown as summing to GDP(E) with the discrepancy shown as a reconciliation item between GDP(E) and GDP(I). An implication is that gross national expenditure is now defined differently because it excludes the statistical discrepancy rather than including it as was previously the case.

In conjunction with the rebase to average 1989-90 prices a number of changes were made to the sources and methods used to compile the constant price estimates. These were outlined in an Information Paper entitled Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989-90 Prices (5243.0) which was released on 25 February 1993.

# DECEMBER QUARTER Summary comment



#### FINAL CONSUMPTION EXPENDITURE

- Private expenditure rose by 0.3% in the December quarter. Increased spending or rent, entertainment and recreation, financial services and fares were partly offset by falls in purchase of motor vehicles, cigarettes and tobacco and alcoholic drinks
- Government expenditure increased by 0.8%, due to an increase of 1.6% by State and local authorities.

#### GROSS FIXED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

- Dwellings increased by 3.6%, the fifth quarterly rise in succession. There was a
   5.1% increase in new dwelling investment.
- Business investment rose 2.6%. A decline of 1.2% in non-dwelling construction we more than offset by a 4.6% increase in equipment. (See page 9 for further details.)
- Public GFCE fell by 3.4%, reflecting a 7.9% decrease in expenditure by public enterprises and a 1.8% increase by general government. (See page 9 for further details.)

#### INCREASE IN PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS

 The retail industry was the only one to record an increase in stocks in December quarter 1992.

#### **GROSS NATIONAL EXPENDITURE**

• Rose by 0.8%, the fifth quarterly increase in succession.

#### EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

Rose by 2.2% mainly due to increased exports of wheat, gold and machinery.

#### IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

Increased by 1.9% mainly because of a rise of 4.6% in machinery imports.

## DECEMBER QUARTER Summary comment



#### AGRICULTURE, FORESTRY, FISHING AND HUNTING

 Continued to show quite strong growth, increasing by 2.5% in the December quarter.

#### MINING

 A fall of 1.1% follows a fall of 0.6% in the September quarter. The major contributor to the decline was black coal production.

#### MANUFACTURING

Has now recorded two quarters of modest growth, 0.6 and 0.7%, after falling by 9.7% between its peak in December quarter 1989 and June quarter 1992. The major contributors to the growth in both quarters were Food, beverages and tobacco and Other machinery and equipment.

#### CONSTRUCTION

 Fell by 0.3%, and so recorded its 13th consecutive fall, but the rate of decline slowed through 1992. Dwelling construction continued to grow, but was more than offset by weakness in non-dwelling building and engineering construction.

#### WHOLESALE AND RETAIL TRADE

Wholesale grew by a modest 0.5%, but Retail recorded a very slight increase of only 0.1%. The growth rate of both has been declining over the course of 1992.

#### TRANSPORT AND STORAGE

 An increase of 1.0% continued a steady pattern of strong growth over the last five quarters, to which Road and Air transport were the major contributors.

#### COMMUNICATION

Continued to show very strong growth with a 2.2% increase.

#### RECREATION, PERSONAL AND OTHER SERVICES

 Increased by 0.8%, following two quarters of similar growth. Most of the growth came from Entertainment and recreational services.


#### WAGES, SALARIES AND SUPPLEMENTS

- Rose by 0.7 during the December quarter 1992.
- The rise reflects an increase of 0.8% in the underlying average earnings and a sma fall in the number of wage and salary earners.

#### GROSS OPERATING SURPLUS

- GOS of private corporate trading enterprises grew by 1.2% in December quarter 1992, following a rise of 0.5% in September quarter 1992.
- The GOS of private corporate trading enterprises is now 3.2% higher than in December quarter 1991.


WAGES SHARE OF GDP (AT FACTOR COST)\*

#### ANALYSES AND COMMENTS

WAGES, SALARIES AND SUPPLEMENTS

As explained in Chapter 10 of Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5216.0), estimates of the number of wage and salary earners from the labour force survey (LFS) are used in calculating the quarterly estimates of wages, salaries and supplements. An adjustment is made to estimates of wages and salaries from the survey of employment and earnings (SEE) to allow for employees not covered by the ABS register of businesses. An average wage is applied to the difference between the number of wage and salary earners (adjusted for multiple job holders) from the LFS and the number of jobs from SEE. Typically, this estimate is calculated by industry using employment estimates from both LFS and SEE for the mid-month of the quarter (industry estimates are available from the LFS only for the mid-months).


As foreshadowed in the March quarter 1992 issue of 5206.0, alternative assumptions have been considered for calculating the adjustment to wages and salaries for undercoverage of employees on the ABS register of businesses. However, it has been decided to continue the existing procedure. The data on the number of wage and salary earners from the LFS for the mid-months of each quarter are obtained from more detailed survey questions than for the other two months and hence are regarded as providing a more reliable estimate of the number of wage and salary earners. The adjustments made to the September and December quarter 1991 estimates (described in the December quarter 1991 issue of 5206.0) have been retained in the estimates for those quarters.

Over the last few quarters the movements in seasonally adjusted employment (for both the total labour force and wage and salary earners) have apparently included a high irregular component. The estimates of earnings from SEE have also been somewhat volatile. Such irregular movements are reflected in the movements in seasonally adjusted wages, salaries and supplements and GDP(I). This factor should be taken into account when using estimates of GDP(I), and provide further justification for the advice given elsewhere in this publication to give more weight to trend estimates (rather than seasonally adjusted estimates) and to GDP(A) rather than one of the independent measures of GDP at constant prices.


HOUSEHOLD SAVING RATIO

The proportion of household disposable income devoted to consumption in the December quarter was 92.8%. The balance, household saving, was 7.2%. Caution should be exercised in interpreting this ratio in recent years, especially the December quarter, because major components of household income and expenditure may still be subject to significant revisions. The impact of these revisions on the saving ratio can be quite marked, even causing changes in the apparent direction of the trend. The graph on the following page presents the household saving ratio, derived from trend data, from December quarter 1976 onwards (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 26).

HOUSEHOLD SAVING RATIO




PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS TO SALES RATIO The derivation of the stocks to sales ratio has been changed in this issue. It is now expressed in current price terms and uses a narrower definition of 'sales' (see paragraph 24 of the Explanatory Notes). In trend current price terms, private non-farm stocks were run down by \$24 million (0.1%) during December quarter 1992, while sales decreased by \$220 million (0.3%). Consequently, the stocks to sales ratio increased marginally from 0.502 to 0.503. The following graph presents the ratio of trend private non-farm stocks to trend sales at current prices from December 1976 onward.



IMPORTS TO SALES RATIO

The derivation of the imports to sales ratio has been changed in this issue. It is now expressed in current price terms and uses a narrower definition of 'sales' (see paragraphs 24 and 25 of the Explanatory Notes). The imports to sales ratio, trended, at current prices remained unchanged at 0.134 in December quarter 1992. There was a decline of 0.3% in endogenous imports and a comparable decrease in sales, both in trend current price terms. The graph on the following page presents this ration from December quarter 1976 onwards.

PRIVATE GROSS FIXED
CAPITAL EXPENDITURE —
NON-DWELLING CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT

The December quarter 1992 estimates for non-dwelling construction and equipment have been affected by a number of large one-off transactions. The sale of a power station by the Victorian government shows up as a significant increase in purchases from the public sector for both non-dwelling construction and equipment. As well, the new equipment expenditure estimates have been significantly affected by purchases for the Goodwyn A off-shore platform and the OPTUS B1 satellite.

Details of recent transactions in second-hand assets between the private and public sectors are provided in the table below, along with investment on new equipment and new work on non-dwelling construction.

PUBLIC GROSS FIXED CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

Public gross fixed capital expenditure fell by 3.4% in the December quarter. A 7.9% decrease in expenditure by public enterprises was slightly offset by a 1.8% increase for general government. The fall in public enterprises expenditure largely reflects the power station sale noted above.

EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of exports of goods and services at average 1989-90 prices rose by 2.2% in the December quarter 1992. Most commodity groups increased, with the major contributors being cereal grains and cereal preparations (up 12.3%), gold (up 4.0%) and machinery (up 5.3%).

The implicit price deflator (IPD) of the trend estimates of exports increased by 1.4% in December quarter 1992. The original fixed weighted index increased by 1.0%.


IMPORTS OF GOODS
AND SERVICES

The trend volume of imports of goods and services increased by 1.9% in December quarter 1992, mainly due to a 4.6% increase in machinery imports. The only category to record a noticeable fall this quarter was transport equipment which decreased by 4.6%.

Prices of imported goods and services increased during the December quarter with the implicit price deflator derived from the trended estimates recording a rise of 2.3%. This increase largely reflects the devaluation of the \$A in late 1992. The original fixed weighted index also rose 2.3%.


TERMS OF TRADE

The terms of trade (see Explanatory Notes, paragraph 16) declined 0.9% in December quarter 1992, reflecting the combined effects of increases of 1.4% in export prices and 2.3% in import prices. The following graph shows the trend terms of trade (1989-90=100) from December quarter 1984 to December quarter 1992.

GDP at constant prices is a measure of the volume of goods and services produced in Australia. If the terms of trade change significantly over the period of comparison, then this measure of real GDP will not accurately reflect the change in real purchasing power of the income generated by domestic production. (See the *Notes on the estimates* section of the December quarter 1990 issue of this publication for a more detailed discussion of this issue.) A better measure of the real purchasing power of income generated by domestic production is GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices adjusted for the terms of trade effect, which will be referred to in future as *real gross domestic income*. The graph below shows trend GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices and real gross domestic income from December quarter 1982 onwards.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### INTRODUCTION

1 This publication contains estimates of the components of GDP and national expenditure and supporting tables for the latest quarter, together with comparative estimates for the eight previous quarters and the last four financial years. Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates of the major aggregates and some selected series are also provided for the latest quarter, together with comparative estimates for the twelve previous quarters. The List of Tables, page 13, shows the full range of data provided.

# CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

2 These are documented in Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5216.0). In association with the introduction of constant price estimates at average 1989-90 prices, some of the methods used to derive constant price estimates were changed. The major changes are described in Section 4 of the Information Paper Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989-90 Prices (5243.0).

# ACCURACY OF QUARTERLY ESTIMATES

3 Estimating for a period of less than one year presents special problems. It is often difficult to adhere strictly to definitions used in annual estimates when deriving quarterly ones. This is particularly the case for the quarterly measure of income, because it is not always possible to match the value of production for a quarter with the cost incurred in that production. Difficulties are also encountered in obtaining detailed data for short periods and in preparing consistent estimates from different sources with different accounting procedures and periods. Furthermore, the quarter-to-quarter growth in seasonally adjusted terms is very sensitive to the timing of recording a transaction. If the recording of a transaction is delayed by one quarter, seasonally adjusted movements will be distorted for three consecutive quarters. All these problems affect the accuracy of the current and constant price estimates and should be taken into account in interpreting the estimates.

#### **REVISIONS**

4 Most figures are subject to revision as more complete and accurate information becomes available. The revisions are of two types: those made to recent quarters and those made as a consequence of a redistribution across all quarters within a year following revisions to annual totals. Revisions made this quarter are discussed on page 2.

### TREND ESTIMATES

- 5 Given the qualifications regarding the accuracy and reliability of the quarterly national accounts, the ABS considers that trend estimates provide the best guide to the underlying movements, and are more suitable than either the seasonally adjusted or original data for most business decisions and policy advice.
- A trend estimate is obtained by removing the irregular component from the seasonally adjusted series. For estimates in this publication, it is calculated using a centred 7-term Henderson moving average of the seasonally adjusted series. Estimates for the three most recent quarters cannot be calculated using this centred average method; instead an asymmetric average is used. This can lead to revisions in the trend estimates for the last three quarters when data become available for later quarters, even if none of the original data for earlier quarters have changed.
- 7 If a series has a high "irregular" component, then the trend estimates will be subject to greater revision for the latest few quarters as data become available for subsequent quarters than would otherwise be the case. However, it is important to note that this

does not make the trend series inferior to the seasonally adjusted or original series. In fact, in such cases the effect of the irregular component on overall movements is likely to be even more marked in the seasonally adjusted and the original estimates than in the trend series.

- 8 For more information about ABS procedures for deriving trend estimates and analysis of advantages of using them over alternative techniques for monitoring trends, refer to the two ABS Information Papers:

#### IMPLICIT PRICE DEFLATOR (IPD)

9 The quarterly implicit price deflators (IPDs) are derived by dividing seasonally adjusted and trend current price estimates by the corresponding constant price estimates. Movements in IPDs can be greatly affected by changes in the physical composition of the aggregates and their components. For this reason, quarterly IPDs derived from seasonally adjusted or trend data are preferred to those using original data. The seasonal adjustment process itself is also a possible source of distortion. For further information see Appendix VI of Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5216.0).

### SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT : GENERAL METHOD

- 10 Data that are affected by seasonal factors are adjusted to remove the effects of these factors. The general methods for doing so are described in Appendix I of Australian National Accounts: Concepts, Sources and Methods (5216.0). Three important points should be noted here:
- The methods used in seasonal adjustment do not force the sum of the adjusted estimates for each quarter of a year to equal the original annual total.
- Where constant price estimates have no apparent seasonality in their implicit price deflators, the estimates are adjusted using the corresponding factors for current price estimates.
- Special methods have been used to adjust some components of gross farm product. These concern the adjustment of crop production where production/harvest only occurs in a couple of quarters each year. In these instances, the output for each financial year is distributed equally over the four quarters.

#### **MEASURES OF GDP**

GDP(I)
INCOME APPROACH

11 GDP(I) is the sum of factor incomes, consumption of fixed capital (depreciation) and net indirect taxes. The preferred current price measure of GDP is GDP(I). It is the overall measure which is consistent with subsidiary measures such as national income and the other consolidated tables (such as the national income and outlay account). GDP(I) also provides the base year benchmarks for the constant price estimates of GDP(P). Constant price estimates of GDP(I) are derived by deflating current price estimates of GDP(I) by the implicit price deflator of GDP(E).

#### MEASURES OF GDP

(continued)

GDP(E)

**EXPENDITURE APPROACH** 

12 GDP(E) is the sum of all final expenditures, changes in stocks, and exports less imports. Constant price estimates of GDP(E)) are the sum of all these components at average 1989-90 prices.

GDP(P)

PRODUCTION APPROACH

13 GDP(P) is calculated as the market value of goods and services produced by an industry (i.e. gross output) less the cost of goods and services used in the productive process (i.e. intermediate consumption). Constant price estimates of GDP(P) are the sum of constant price estimates (at average 1989-90 prices) for each industry.

GDP(A)
THE AVERAGE

14 While the three measures above are identical in concept, they can differ significantly in practice, especially in the short term, because of the different data sources used for each measure. Using the average of the three, GDP(A), smooths out these differences. GDP(A) is considered by the ABS to be the most satisfactory indicator of short-term seasonally adjusted or trend growth. See the Feature Article in the June quarter 1990 issue of Australian National Accounts: National Income and Expenditure (5206.0).

ANALYSIS OF CONTRIB-UTIONS TO GROWTH 15 Tables 6 and 7 present analyses of the contribution provided by each major component to the percentage change in trend estimates of constant price GDP(I) and GDP(P). The figures in the table are additive within each quarter, unlike the percentage changes shown in other tables in this publication. The formula used to calculate the contribution of each aggregate to the growth in GDP is:

$$\frac{A(t) - A(t-1)}{GDP(t-1)}$$
 x 100.0

where

A(t) = value of aggregate A in quarter under consideration

A(t-1) = value of aggregate A in preceding quarter

GDP(t-1) = value of GDP in preceding quarter.

TERMS OF TRADE

**16** There are several ways of measuring the terms of trade. In this publication, the following index is used:

Implicit price deflator for exports of goods and services

x 100.0

Implicit price deflator for imports of goods and services

Estimates of the terms of trade are shown in Tables 11, 12, 20, 21, 72 and 73.

REAL GROSS DOMESTIC INCOME (previously GDP AT CONSTANT PRICES, ADJUSTED FOR THE TERMS OF TRADE) 17 GDP at constant prices is a measure of the volume of goods and services produced in Australia. If the terms of trade change significantly over the period of comparison, then this measure of real GDP will not accurately reflect the change in real purchasing power of the income generated by domestic production. (See the *Notes on the estimates* section of the December quarter 1990 issue of this publication for a more detailed

### EXPLANATORY NOTES continued

REAL GROSS DOMESTIC INCOME (continued)

discussion of this issue.) A better measure of the real purchasing power of income generated by domestic production is GDP(I) at average 1989-90 prices adjusted for the terms of trade effect, which will be referred to in future as *real gross domestic income* (or real GDI). The following adjustment is made to GDP(I) at constant prices to obtain an estimate of real GDI:

- exports of goods and services at current prices are deflated by the implicit price deflator for imports of goods and services
- the actual constant price value of exports is then deducted from this value, and
- the resultant terms of trade adjustment is then added to GDP(I) at constant prices to give real GDI presented in Tables 72 and 73.

GROSS PRODUCT PER UNIT OF LABOUR INPUT

- 18 Indexes of constant price gross product per person employed and per hour worked are commonly referred to as measures of labour productivity. However, it should be noted that these indexes reflect not only the contribution of labour to changes in product per unit of labour, but also the contribution of capital and other factors (such as managerial efficiency, economies of scale, etc.).
- When analysing labour productivity indexes it is critical to note that they are subject to the vagaries of the growth (or business) cycle as well as the effects of any measurement error in either output or labour input. Differences in the amplitude and phase of the output and input cycles can result in labour productivity indexes deviating substantially from their longer term trend. Analytical work undertaken within the ABS suggests that movements in employment and hours worked tend to lag movements in GDP. Over a 20 year period, the lag at turning points in the growth cycle varied between zero and four quarters, with the average being between two and three quarters. The implication is that, in the period of the growth cycle when the growth in output is declining, indexes of labour productivity are likely to decline, particularly if rapid growth in GDP is abruptly ended. Conversely, labour productivity indexes are likely to grow strongly when the economy comes out of a cyclical trough.
- 20 A simple way to estimate the underlying trend in labour productivity is to compare the values of a labour productivity index spanning a growth cycle e.g. from the peak of one growth cycle to the peak of another. Note that such estimates rest on the assumption that labour is being utilised to the same degree at each growth cycle peak. Average annual growth rates, over growth cycles, of estimates of gross product per hour worked in the market and non-farm market sectors are shown in Australian National Accounts: Multifactor Productivity (5234.0).

MARKET AND NON-FARM MARKET SECTORS

21 The estimates of gross product at constant prices for two industries: Finance, property and business services; and Community services are derived using either deflated input cost data or hours worked as indicators of output. As such, the estimates cannot adequately reflect changes in productivity. For the purposes of measuring changes in productivity, it is therefore preferable that these industries be excluded. The constant price gross product of a group of industries referred to as the *market sector* is defined to be GDP(P) *less* the above two industries, *less* Public administration and defence (which is defined to be in the non-market sector, even though an estimate of productivity change is now produced for that industry), *less* ownership of dwellings (for

### MARKET AND NON-FARM MARKET SECTORS (continued)

which capital stock is used as the indicator of output), plus the imputed bank service charge related to these industries.

22 A second industry group, referred to as the *non-farm market sector*, comprises the market sector *less* Agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting. Productivity estimates derived for this group are free of the effects caused by the volatility of Agricultural production caused by changing seasonal conditions.

# INDEXES OF EMPLOYMENT AND HOURS WORKED

23 The quarterly employment indexes used to derive the gross product per person employed indexes comprise all labour engaged in the production of goods and services and include not only civilian wage and salary earners but also employers; self-employed persons; persons working one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm; and members of the Australian defence forces. For details of how the employment and hours worked estimates are formed refer to Section 23 of Australian National Accounts: Concepts Sources and Methods (5216.0), and also Section 4 of the Information Paper Australian National Accounts: Introduction of Constant Price Estimates at Average 1989-90 Prices (5243.0) which describes changes in methods introduced in conjunction with the rebase of constant price estimates to average 1989-90 prices.

# PRIVATE NON-FARM STOCKS TO SALES RATIO

- The ratio is presented in Tables 72 and 73. The denominator of this ratio, in current price terms, is defined as:
- private final consumption expenditure on goods
- plus private gross fixed capital expenditure on dwellings, non-dwelling construction and equipment
- plus public gross fixed capital expenditure
- plus exports of non-rural goods.

#### IMPORTS TO SALES RATIO

25 The ratio is endogenous imports (imports of goods excluding fuel, certain large items of equipment and certain other government imports) to sales (as defined in paragraph 24 above). This ratio is presented in Tables 72 and 73.

#### HOUSEHOLD SAVING RATIO

26 This is the ratio of household saving to household disposable income, where household saving is the difference between household disposable income and private final consumption expenditure. The ratio is a memorandum item in Tables 29 and 30 and is also shown in Table 71.

### **GDP(A) PER CAPITA**

27 This is the ratio of GDP(A) to an estimate of the resident Australian population. For all but the most recent quarters, the resident population data are drawn from Australian Demographic Statistics (3101.0). For the most recent quarters, estimates are made by extrapolating from the latest available data.

#### **DATA ON FLOPPY DISK**

All quarterly series in this publication are available in spreadsheet format on floppy disk, Australian National Accounts: Quarterly Data on Floppy Disk (5228.0). These data generally run from September quarter 1959. An important exception is GDP(P) and its components which run from September quarter 1974. The cost is currently \$130.00 per release or \$390.00 for an annual subscription. For the December quarter 1992 issue of 5228.0 only, data will be available in both the old and new table formats.
