SECTION XV.—ASSISTED IMMIGRATION.

1. General.—The following table shows the number of immigrants the cost of whose passage was wholly or partly defrayed by the State Governments up to the end of the year 1917, and the number arriving in each year since that date.

For the three pre-war years 1911 to 1913 inclusive, the average number of assisted immigrants was 41,317. In 1914, as the result of the outbreak of war, the number dropped to 20,805. In each of the years 1915 to 1919 inclusive, the number was small, and in 1919 was only 245. Increases are shown in the years 1920 to 1922, and a further increase in 1923, when the total reached 26,645.

Of the total number of immigrants, 8,589, or 32.2 per cent. were dependents, over two-thirds of whom were females. Exclusive of dependents, 79.6 per cent. of the males were in Group XII. (Agricultural, etc.), and 79.2 per cent. of the females in Group XIII. (Domestic, etc.).
