A profile of older people in Australia



As in most developed countries, Australia's population is ageing. Understanding the characteristics and contributions to society of this growing community is increasingly important.

The results from the 2015 Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers provides a profile of older people (those aged 65 years and over) in Australia.



There were **3.5 million**Australians aged 65 years and over in **2015**



Most older people lived in **households**



1 in 20 older people lived in residential care¹

The proportion of older people with **disability decreased** in 2015



Over **1 in 3** older people **needed assistance**² with daily activities



Most older people³ had their assistance needs² **fully** or **partly met**



Around 1 in 7 older people³ were participating in the labour force



were involved in **voluntary activities**⁴



The majority of older people³ **owned their home** outright
